Texas News.
Fort Stockton.
A correspondent of the Fredericksburg *Sentinel* speaks as follows of Fort Stockton: This fort is situated on Comanche Creek is 170 miles from Ft. Concho and 386 from San Antonio, and is built mostly of adobe, except the guardhouse and magazine, which is of stone, and erected in 1868 by M. Humphreys, Q. M.
Water for this garrison is obtained from a large spring on the bank of the creek, which is forced through two-inch pipes to different parts of the post by a hydraulic ram.
In the guardhouse we found a colored soldier heavily ironed, charged with killing one of his own regiment (9th Cavalry.)

St. Louis, July 23. The delegation from the Boards of Trade of Dallas and Jefferson, Texas, and Shreveport arrived here this morning, and were escorted around the city by the President of the Merchants' and Cotton Exchange.
A man, named Hall Grubb, committed a gross outrage on a woman, at Walters, Kansas, on Tuesday. Yesterday while going to jail in Troy, in charge of a constable and guards, the wagon containing the prisoner was followed by excited crowds of men and women, on foot and horseback, and in wagons, the former armed with guns and revolvers, and the latter carrying ropes, and demanding revenge.
When about a mile from Walters, Grubb sprang from the wagon and attempted to escape, but was at once riddled with bullets and killed.
One of the crowd following the wagon, named Melpherson, received one of the shots fired by the mob, and was mortally wounded, and a woman riding toward Walters, not connected with the crowd, was thrown from her horse, and perhaps fatally injured.
Advices from Elrito Creek this morning, to July 17th, say 21 persons, 6 Americans and 15 Mexicans, were killed by Indians between Fort Boston and nation Mountain up to the present time, and that 400 horses have been driven out of the territory. A company of the Eighth Cavalry left Fort Union July 17th, for Dry Cimarron river, the scene of the late Indian outrages.

Republican Convention 6th District.

CAPT. W. W. LANG is the Grangers' candidate for Congress in the Fourth District, and the Democrats do not at all like it. Of course not.

If the International Railroad Company ever gets a cent's worth of relief from the State of Texas, it will only be when they have fully repaid the damage done her credit in New York, and after their behavior has been good long enough to win back the respect and sympathy of the people.

This is a great mistake as to who it is that needs to "win back the respect and sympathy of the people." A Republican Convention. [From the Free Press.]

We publish in to-day's issue a call for a Republican Convention, signed by Judge Barden, formerly Chairman of the 4th Congressional District, who has assumed the functions of chairman of the new 6th District.

The Democracy, having made its preparations for the coming campaign, will nominate its candidate on the 26th of August at Goliad. It is then in order that all those who object to the present administration and the state of affairs of Western Texas generally, should express themselves in regard to the policy hereafter to be pursued.

We have repeatedly stated that in this campaign we shall place the welfare any the future of Western Texas at the head of our programme, and that we shall support

the candidate who is best qualified to further the interests of our district. We wish the Republican party to adopt this platform, and we therefore favor a Republican convention, provided it will place itself upon such a platform without regard to historical party divisions.

The convention is to meet on the 9th day of Sept. at San Antonio. We shall then know what the Democratic convention has done. If it has proposed a man who answers our expectations, who is moderate and liberal, who is no drilled partisan, and in whom, as a fellow-citizen, we can trust, the question arises, whether it would not be good policy to give him our support and thereby prove that we Republicans are better enabled to rightly judge the necessities of our country and to labor for its welfare, than the Democracy, which hitherto has obstinately worked for the ruin of the West in favor of the aggrandizement of personal interests.

But should the Democratic convention nominate a man of the stripe of Ireland, it would become the duty of the Republican convention to nominate a candidate from the ranks of the opposition, upon whom the Republicans and the liberal Democrats, in fact all who battle for the development of our district, can unite.

Do not believe that this policy is weakness. The Republican party of Western Texas is a power yet, worthy of respect. But it needs thorough organization. It has to check the leaders of 1872 who struck the party to the ground, and it has to invite new friends by inaugurating a rational and liberal policy. May good advice find a fertile soil at the convention. Let the Republicans in the different counties elect respectable delegates, and all will be well.

Coke Backs Out from the Brennan Barbecue - suggests total Resolutions - Takes Nothing From Nothing and Nothing Will Remain - An Office-Holder's Organ in Contemplation.

Coke backed out from making a speech at the Brennan barbecue, and the announcement is made that pressing public business prevented his leaving the Capitol. The truth is, that it became too evident that his appearance at the Congressional hustings was for the purpose of influencing the choice of the Democracy, and every aspirant in the field became alarmed at the prospect of being compelled to either endorse or antagonize Coke prior to the meeting of the nominating convention.
