Grant a Methodist.
HIS VISIT TO ROUND LAKE CAMP-MEETING.
 [Round Lake Correspondence, N. Y. World, 17th.]
 President Grant came from Saratoga this (Wednesday) morning, accompanied by General Babcock. He entered the grounds quietly, but soon there was a grand furor over him. Tuesday he passed through on his way to Saratoga; a crowd went to the depot to cheer him as he passed, to whom he tipped his hat, and the President of the Camp meeting Association invited him to visit this great international meeting. On arriving he was introduced to one of the largest audiences that have gathered in the out-door tabernacle. In return the President bowed, but remained speechless. He sat upon the preachers' platform, which was full and running over with priestly array. The crowd sang in their best manner the immortal hymn, "There is a fountain filled with blood." Rev. Dr. Rice, of Canada, offered fervent prayer for "the power mighty to save," and Rev. Dr. Douglass, of Montreal, preached a powerful sermon. After the sermon, the photograph artist was on hand and took the crowd upon the platform in a group. The President dined with Mr. Hittman and family, Bishop James, Bishop Simpson and family, Bishop Kavanaugh and Dr. Poissall. At one o'clock, the people gathered in crowds, and President Grant came forward and shook hands with about 1,500 men. Bishop Simpson had pity on him and made an end of it. The crowd then escorted the President to the depot, where he was locked up to keep off the crowd in the telegraph room with a select few. The President told the reporter he was a Methodist in sentiment, and this great Methodist world took him to its heart or hearts. Bishop Simpson and Gen. Babcock returned to Saratoga with the President.

Republican Convention 4th District.

At the request of leading Republicans in this District, its Chairman of the Executive Committee of the old 4th Congressional District, I hereby call a Republican Convention of the 6th Congressional District, to meet at San Antonio, Bexar Co., on Wednesday the 9th day of September next, at 10 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Congress, or of taking such action with reference thereto as may be necessary. The basis of representation will be fixed by the Convention. All the counties in the District are requested to send as many delegates to the Convention as they deem proper.

T. C. BARDEN, Chairman Rep. Ex. Com. old 4th District.

CAPT. McNELLY, with one company of Gov. Coke's State Police, have moved from Washington to DeWitt county. The Captain was an excellent State Police officer under Gov. Davis, and we hope will do as well under Gov. Coke. Maj. Jones and Capt. Icard, with their State Police, have not done so well on the frontier.

OUR old friend, Bishop Kavanaugh, of the M. E. Church, South, preached a great sermon at the Sea Cliff camp meeting, Long Island, last Sunday, which is reported in the New York Herald. That paper says that "there were flights of eloquence in it that lifted the people up in thought and feeling toward the better world."

The San Antonio Express publishes a letter from its Austin correspondent which is one tissue of lies and misconceptions from beginning to end. They are evidently so malicious and unfounded as to carry with them their best refutation.

We suggest to our contemporary that he cultivate courtesy, good temper, and a "purer speech," that he should remember that to denounce a statement as a "lie" is not resorted to by gentlemen except in extreme cases; that such a convenient way of dealing with inconvenient statements and facts is peculiar to the most vulgar and villainous people; and that it is a mode of argument which proves nothing, either affirmatively or negatively. We shall be most happy to correct any mis-statement made in the EXPRESS, either in editorial or correspondence. Will the Gazette be kind enough to take the trouble to set us right on any given point? As to being their own "refutation," our people over here, Democrats and Republicans, have the same views as to the matter in hand.

THE HOUSTON SHIP CHANNEL, as we learn from the Telegraph's interview with Maj. E. W. Cave, just returned from New York, is to be constructed as rapidly as possible by capitalists, headed by Chas. Morgan. Morgan's superior dredge boats at Achenafahys are to be united with the Standard Company's dredge boats at Houston. This will make Houston as accessible to sea-going steamers as Galveston, for all vessels able to cross the bar at Galveston will be able to go up to Houston - fifty miles farther inland. Then the vessels will be in fresh water, free from barotrales, and in no danger of stopping, and cheap access to water, wood, vegetables, and all supplies. Sail vessels will have to be towed up by tugs.

The rivalry between Galveston and Houston will be more equal and more intense than ever. The first great good to be accomplished by it will be the destruction of the odious wheat monopoly at Galveston; the second will be the reduction of all charges on trade at both cities. Texas is fortunate in the rivalry of

these two cities. She will be more fortunate when Indianola and Corpus Christi also enter the race of competition.

Gov. J. W. THROCKMORTON has been nominated for Congress for the Third District of this State by the Democratic Convention at Fort Worth. He was nominated on the first ballot, without opposition. Gov. Throckmorton deserved the nomination, by the people of the whole district, without respect to party, and we should not be surprised if he should be elected as the choice of both parties. He has long been treated with great ingratitude by the leaders of the Democratic party, ostensibly because he was a railroad man, but really because he was before the war an Old Line Whig and a Union man. So far as we are concerned, we are glad that he has received the nomination, because he was an Old Line Union Whig, and also a railroad man. We hope to soon see the day when the old Whig element, and the progressive railroad element, will be put forward by the people of Texas, in place of the old Bourbon secessionists, and the anti-railroad ex-cart demagogues. It will be infinitely better for the State. This nomination is a severe rebuke to the railroad-bond-repudiation tendencies of the Coke administration, and will be the death of the insidious attempt to form an anti-railroad party in this State. We congratulate the Galveston News on its championship in this matter.

Of course, we know that Gov. Throckmorton is not a Republican, and we are sorry for it. As a Whig, a Union man, and an early supporter of the speedy reconstruction of the State, his proper place was in the Republican ranks. The Democracy understood this logic of his position so well that they have steadily "left him out out in the cold" for the last five or six years. But it took a first class man to withstand the torrent of abuse and odium set afloat by the clamorous revolutionary Democracy against the ex-Confederates who thought it their duty, and the interest of the State and country, to take a national position at the time of reconstruction. It was too much to expect of a first class politician. Gov. Throckmorton is a first class politician, but he is a good man and a considerable statesman, nevertheless.

The Third District is overwhelmingly Democratic, and we are glad that the Democracy of that district have become so national and liberal as to support such a man as Throckmorton. Their moderation is not so disinterested, however, as may at first sight appear. An immense north-western immigration is pouring into that region of the State, and although the new-comers elect, for the present, to act with the Democratic party, they have no taste for the rabid secession leaders heretofore put forward by that party.

THE SUPREME COURT.—Yesterday, in the Supreme Court, Judge Davis read his opinion dissenting from the majority of the Court in the International case. It deals exhaustively with the liability of the Compromise to mandamus. In the case of Wright v. Kuechler, the former judgment against Wright was sustained on the merits. Judge Moore read the majority opinion, which entered largely into the question of mandamus against an executive officer. The opinion as expressed by Judge Ferris in the International case was negative; thus showing that if all the judges had been on the bench, the case would have been decided in favor of the company. Judge Roberts dissented on this point, adhering to his view as given in the International case. Judge Gould thought it needless to express his opinion on this point. The court adjourns to-day.

TELEGRAPHIC.

Terrible Fight With 300 Indians—Rangers and 10th Cavalry Defeated.

FORT WORTH, July 29.—A startling report from the frontier reached here last night and caused much excitement. On Friday last the Montana Company, under Capt. Icard, together with a detachment of the Tenth Cavalry, met a force of Indians, 500 strong at the three forks of the Wichita, and after a severe engagement, were defeated and driven back to Jacksboro with heavy loss in killed and wounded. Capt. Icard's company was sixty strong, and had twelve men killed and a number wounded, while the Tenth Cavalry, about 100 strong, was completely cut to pieces. The Brave Lieutenant Colonel who commanded being killed. It is a negro regiment.

No particulars have yet reached here, but something further will probably come down to-night.

President Cleveland Intervenes. Gov. Coke. AUSTIN, July 29.—President Galusha A. Gray arrived in this city from New York this morning, and has had a long interview with Gov. Coke. No new developments have been made concerning the financial situation.

The International Railroad Company will lend a moral support to the State credit, but negotiations have made no serious progress.

The rumor which has been current that the International Railroad Company was going into liquidation, is false.

A difficulty occurred between Frank Britton and Stanley Welch this evening, while they were bathing together in the river. Both of them were under the influence of liquor at the time. Welch was slightly injured.

Subsequently Britton drew a pistol on a hack driver named Carter, whereupon the latter knocked him down with the butt end of his whip, cutting him severely. Carter had previously interfered to save Welch from Britton's abuse.

Whitelsey Agrees to a Settlement. HOUSTON, July 29.—Ex-Treasurer Whitelsey to-day appeared before the County Court, now in session, and agreed upon terms of settlement to pay to the county, within twenty days, \$10,730 in county scrip and \$2167 in currency. A part of the money is to be immediately forthcoming. Upon executing his part of the agreement, the county is to withdraw the suit now pending in the District Court against Whitelsey.

A man, named Highland, is reported to have been robbed of about \$500 by one Horace Bell and one King, as a grocery, while Highland was intoxicated. Both Bell and King were bound over.

Railroad Interests. SARATOGA, July 29.—A strictly private meeting of eminent railroad men is being held to-day. Commodore Vanderbilt and Thos. A. Scott are said to be in conference, and a large number of railroad men are registered at the various hotels. The most important business is supposed to be the completion of details whereby each road can do its own express business.

Outside in a House of Ill-Fame. DENISON, July 29.—A man named John Beachamps, from Hot Springs, Arkansas, committed suicide here to-day, by shooting himself in the right temple with a derringer, in a house of ill-fame, caused, it is supposed, by despondency.

Beecher-Tilton. NEW YORK, July 29.—Tilton's preliminary hearing on the charge of libel has been postponed to Monday. The action is brought by the Governor on his own responsibility as a citizen, Tilton having violated one of the laws of the State. Loose statements by interviewed parties continue. Fall column papers. Pros. and cons. about even.

Gov. Coke and the U. S. Attorney General. AUSTIN, July 29.—Gov. Coke has received a communication from the U. S. Attorney General at Washington, D. C., with reference to his instructions to Captains Benavides and Wallace, authorizing them to pursue Mexican depredators on the Mexican soil. The Attorney General places an entirely different construction on the U. S. Constitution than does Gov. Coke. The Governor will reply at once, and the correspondence will then be given to the public.

Texas News.

The Britton-Welch drowning affair terminated in very serious results to both. The first was prostrated from the effects of the beating he got from the lockman, and the other came near dying from the combined effects of too much whiskey on the inside and not enough water on the outside.—Saratoga, July 21.

The San Saba News gives an account of two men discovered dead at the Henderson water hole; one shot in the neck severing the spine; the other, through the body. They were supposed to be horse thieves. The Indians came near San Saba recently and took six horses.

AUSTIN, July 29.—Reports being circulated that Gen. Britton attempted to murder me, I have to state that such reports are false—we have been, and are now, good friends.

The Four Corners states that Mr. Thos. Carter, who, as a grand jurymen, has been with us for the past two weeks, was fatally gored by a bull, and died on the 14th instant.

The Sulphur Springs Gazette, has an account of the body of a man being found four miles west of Black Jack Grove.

TO-DAY has been another one of the hot ones vouchsafed us lately in our anxiety to keep off the cotton worm. A little rain now would do no harm, and by the dust, and freshest vegetation, but we are not suffering for it.

"BIG FOOT WALLACE," so celebrated in the story papers as a great Indian fighter and frontiersman, was pointed out to us on the street this morning. We suppose he is one of the men who "woke up one morning and found himself famous." We took a good look at the alleged celebrated scout, and found him to be a stout, roughly-dressed, rough-faced, grey-headed man, of about fifty-five years of age. He was in his shirt sleeves, wore an old battered hat, and shoes and clothes to match. We did not see his foot measured. In conversation he appeared to be jolly, hearty, and good humored, though with a very quiet and unassuming manner. We did not get a chance to "interview" him, but may do so yet.

A **SUBSTANTIAL**, honest-looking old citizen, with his son, about 14 or 15 years old, was on Commerce street about 12 o'clock to day, with a large wagon and about a dozen oxen. The old fellow had "imbibed" a little too much, which, in the great heat, made it very difficult to handle himself and the oxen too. He stepped to a store, and began to talk in drunken style, while the poor boy shed tears of grief and anxiety. The boy waited for him a short time and then drove off—the best thing he could have done, for the father, true to his instinct of taking care of his things, followed after as soon as he saw the wagon driving off, and then they went on out of sight. It was pitiful to witness the wretched helplessness of the old man and the anguish of the boy. "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging, and he who is deceived thereby is woe wiser."

COL. THOMAS G. WILLIAMS, who has but recently returned from Washington, will set out in a few weeks for Mexico, in company with his co-commissioner, Mr. Atkinson, of Nebraska, for the purpose of removing the remainder of the Kickapoo tribe of Indians from the region of Santa Rosa to their reservation in the Indian Territory. It will be recollected that last year the Commissioners, Col. Williams and Mr. Atkinson, appointed by the U. S. Government for that purpose, succeeded in removing about four hundred of these Indians. About one hundred and forty of them still remain in Mexico, having refused at the time to accompany their brethren. Those who went did so with great doubt, on account of some of them having been attacked on the Oncho by Texas troops in 1864, while marching to join their tribe in Mexico, on account of some of them having been attacked by mistake when Gen. McKim's pursued the Lipans into that country, and also on account of the strong influence brought to bear by the Mexicans against their removal. But, when after many weeks of weary marching, they reached the Indian Territory, among strangers and without friends, they met the Commissioners again, they were overjoyed, their confidence was fully established, and, doubtless, these things will influence the remainder of the tribe to follow their example.

Col. Williams has been at work at this matter ever since the close of the war, has run great risk of being murdered by the Indians in Mexico, who were incited thereto by the Mexicans, and has, by their removal, conferred a lasting benefit upon Western Texas, and especially upon the citizens along our Rio Grande border. For these Indians, while in Mexico, could raid across the river, steal horses and cattle, and get back safely into Mexico with their booty. Since the removal of the majority of the tribe, there has been much less depredation across the Texas border from Mexico, and when they are all removed, the benefit will be much greater still. The success of the movement will also inspire confidence among all the Indians who are disposed to be at peace with the white men and the Government. And we do not believe that there are more than 500 or 600 of the reservation tribes who are engaged in the present hostilities. The majority of them are peaceable, but they cannot control the thieving, blood-thirsty propensities of a great many of their young men. The Mexicans encouraged these Kickapoo to remain, because they were a good defense against the raiding Comanches, and were also good hands at stealing Texas stock. We hope they will not succeed in getting the Indians to raise the hair from the top of Col. Williams' head.

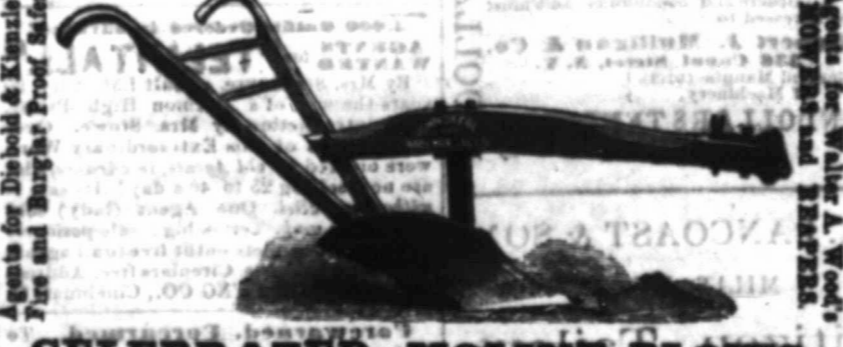

LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES

AT THE FIRST SESSION OF THE THIRTY-THIRD CONGRESS

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 55.]

AN ACT making appropriations for the light-house, lighthouse, and judicial expenses of the Government for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and twenty-five, and for other purposes.

REGISTER OF THE TREASURY.—For compensation of the Register of the Treasury, four thousand dollars; assistant register, two thousand dollars; chief clerk, two thousand dollars; even clerks of class four, two clerks of class three, fourteen clerks of class two, eight clerks of class one, eight copyists, at one hundred dollars each; one messenger; two assistant messengers; and two laborers; in all, twenty-six thousand even hundred and twenty dollars.

COMPTROLLER OF THE CURRENCY.—For compensation of the Comptroller of the Currency, five thousand dollars; deputy comptroller, two thousand five hundred dollars; thirteen clerks of class four, two clerks of class three, twelve clerks of class two, eleven clerks of class one, thirty-three copyists, at one hundred dollars each; one messenger; two assistant messengers; and two laborers; in all, twenty-nine thousand six hundred and eighty dollars.

COMMISSIONERS OF INTERNAL REVENUE.—For compensation of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, six thousand dollars; one deputy commissioner, three thousand five hundred dollars; and one deputy commissioner, three thousand dollars; seven clerks of class four, five clerks of class three, one messenger; three assistant messengers; and four laborers; in all, twenty-three thousand three hundred and forty dollars.

For fines, penalties, and stamps, four hundred thousand dollars.
For salaries and expenses of collectors, to the total one hundred and ninety thousand five hundred and forty-two dollars.
For salaries, expenses, and fees of supervisors, inspectors, agents, surveyors, gaugers, and inspectors of spirits, two million four hundred thousand dollars; and interest on bonds shall receive a greater compensation than six dollars per day.

For detecting and bringing to trial and punishing persons guilty of violating the internal revenue laws, or obtaining in the same, including the agents for information and detection of such violations, one hundred thousand dollars.

Light-House Board.—For chief clerk of light-house board, four thousand dollars; two clerks of class two; one clerk of class one; one female copyist; one messenger; and one laborer; in all, fifteen thousand three hundred and twenty dollars.

BUREAU OF STATISTICS.—For the officer in charge of the Bureau of Statistics, two thousand five hundred dollars; chief clerk, two thousand dollars; seven clerks of class four; seven clerks of class three; nine clerks of class two; two clerks of class one; one messenger; and one laborer; in all, thirty-five thousand four hundred and twenty dollars.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT.—For stationery for the Treasury Department and its several Bureaus, fifty thousand dollars.
For purchase of official postage stamps, two hundred thousand dollars.
Contingent expenses of the Treasury Department, namely:

For arranging and binding canceled marine-papers, regulations, and other important books, sealing ships, receipts, foreign orders, and other books, hand-stamps, and papers of the same, twelve thousand dollars.

For investigation of accounts and records, the necessary traveling expenses, and for other traveling expenses, four thousand dollars.

For freight, express, telegrams, and car tickets, five thousand dollars.

For rent of buildings, thirteen thousand and one hundred dollars.

For coal, wood, grass, grate baskets and stoves, and other articles, six thousand and one hundred dollars.

For gas, lamp lights and tubing, gas burners, brackets and pipes, candles, lanterns, and wicks, twenty-two thousand and one hundred and twenty dollars.

For carriages, harness, and repairs of same, five thousand four hundred dollars.
