Fatal Family Quarrel
HARNE, July 30, 1874.—A family quarrel, to say the least, deplorable. We have an instance that resulted fatally, 4 miles west of here, to-day.
 Jesse Butler, in an altercation with his wife, was urged by his brother-in-law, Wm. M. Luck, to desist. Butler turned upon Luck with a sixshooter, when the latter in self-defense shot Butler, killing him instantly. On a preliminary examination before Judge Davidson, Luck was placed under \$300 bonds.
Mr. Grow Gives His Views on the International Railway Bond Question.
HOUSTON, July 30, 1874.—Hon. Gaiusba A. Grow, President of the International Railroad, returned to-day.
 In a brief interview with him, Col. Grow stated that he had found, during his last visit to New York, the friends and stockholders of the International in that city were hopeful of a final and satisfactory settlement of the bond question by the next Legislature of the State of Texas.
 President Grow announced his opinion, which is shared by intelligent gentlemen throughout the State, that such is the feeling among the masses of the people of Texas, that should the question of the payment of the bonds be subjected to a direct vote of the people a majority would undoubtedly favor their payment as the only means to save the credit of the State.
 Mr. Grow is certain that unless the State comes to the scratch and carries out her compact made by her own Twelfth Legislature, that the building of the International Railroad in Texas must cease, and could not say what would be the course of the company in the event of the next Legislature failing to comply with the contract made by the Twelfth Legislature.

Republican Convention 6th District

At the request of leading Republicans in this District, as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the old 4th Congressional District, I hereby call a Republican Convention of the 6th Congressional District, to meet at San Antonio, Bexar Co., on Wednesday the 9th day of September next, at 10 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Congress, or of taking such action with reference thereto as may be necessary.

Col. Stewart is opposed to the creation of another District of the Federal Court in Texas, because E. J. Davis might get the appointment. A rather lame objection, it strikes us.

Just like Charlie Stewart, and shows in advance both his inability for Congress, and his inability to get there. All such stuff as that is played out among statesmen and thinkers, not to say gentlemen.

If the people of the sixth Congressional District were truly wise in relation to the promotion of their own most important interests, they would sink party feeling altogether, and elect an able Republican as their next Congressman.

SOUND SENSE.—The Cuero Star says that "present indications show that party spirit, so-called, is fast giving way to reason and better judgment. People have set themselves to thinking; they have ceased to follow the demagogue, and have taken up an independent course in politics. In every disaster there is, nevertheless, an important practical lesson, and this lesson our people have just learned during the successive political disasters since the war."

THE PRESIDENT refuses to send troops to "Yokelburg" upon the request of Gov. Ames, "except under a call strictly in accordance with the terms of the Constitution." We are gratified at this course of the President. It is time for all such military interference in civil affairs in the Southern States to cease.

them, and we are glad that the President has not. This preference of carpet bag adventurers has been one great means of breaking down the Republican party in Texas.

As for taxes, if we are to credit the reports contained in the Texas newspapers, ours are not more oppressive than theirs. The debt of Mississippi, compared with that of Texas, which is some \$25,000,000, weighs like a feather in the balance.

We cannot imagine where the Clarion got its figures from. There never was a greater mistake made in the indebtedness of any State. So far from being \$25,000,000, we assert that, exclusive of the subsidy granted to the International Railroad company, it will not exceed one eighth of that amount.

We can very easily "imagine where the Clarion got its figures from." It got them from Democratic papers in Texas who, to damage the Davis administration, asserted that he had "plunged the State into debt," had bankrupted the State, and had "loaded the people of Texas with a debt of from \$25,000,000 to \$40,000,000."

JUDGE FERRIS, of special Judge Supreme Court, International Railroad bond decision fame, got in a resolution endorsing Coke at the Fort Worth Convention which nominated Throckmorton. The Throckmorton men simply wanted a unanimous nomination, and therefore were too sharp to fight the pointless Coke resolution.

The Fort Worth Democrat says that the event of the wreck has been the conviction of A. C. Hill, charged with resisting an arrest. Mr. Hill was a loyal servitor of the infamous dynasty of E. J. Davis & Co., and an effluvent of the State police.

We know Col. A. C. Hill well. He is one of the best citizens of the State,—sober, steady, law-abiding, and, when in office, brave to a fault in the discharge of his duty, and a terror to the gang of thieves and murderers who have infested the northwestern counties for years.

The Oakville Tribune learns that a skirmish took place between five white men and five Mexicans, the latter having their pack horses loaded with fresh hides. The thieves escaped, but left pack-horses and everything.

Telegraphic.

THE LATE ALLEGED INDIAN FIGHT DIS-CREDITED. AUSTIN, July 31.—Adjutant General Steele does not believe the reports concerning the late alleged Indian fight, in the neighborhood of Jackboro.

Major Jones writes that great benefit has resulted to the frontier from the fight in Lost Valley, as well as the capture by Lieut. Campbell of forty-three horses and mules from the Indians.

No mention is made of the immediate presence of Indians in that section.

SHREVEPORT, July 31.—The report of a horrible outrage and swift retribution reached the city to-night. The facts, as far as ascertained, are as follows: A widow named Silas resides with her fourteen year old daughter in DeSoto parish, near the Caddo line.

At six o'clock last evening a negro named March entered the house during the absence of the mother, overcame the daughter and carried her to the woods and outraged her. After returning to consciousness, the girl gave the alarm, and a mounted party started in pursuit of the negro, patrolling the roads in the neighborhood. March was captured at six o'clock this morning near the scene of the outrage, and hung on the Caddo side of Cypress bayou.

VIOLATORS—GRASSHOPPERS.

St. Louis, July 31.—A Kansas City special says that a vigilance committee of about one hundred men has been formed at Wellington and other points in Kansas, for hanging horse thieves. Three men, named Hasbrook, Bill Brooks, and Chas. Smith, were hanged near Wellington last night and made confessions involving other parties.

Great quantities of grasshoppers have appeared in western and southwestern Kansas, and are destroying everything before them. Much damage and distress is apprehended.

CHINESE CONSULATE FOR SAN FRANCISCO.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—The Chinese Government is about to establish a consul at this city, the six Chinese companies here agreeing to defray the expense. It is believed an American will be appointed, with a Chinese Vice Consul.

GOVERNOR COKE AND MEXICO.

AUSTIN, July 31.—Dr. Carothers, of Saltillo, Mexico, is here in a semi-official manner, to interview the Governor. He regrets the public reply of the Governor to Consul Morales, on the part of the Mexican Government, who will aid the United States and Texas in arresting criminals and preventing incursions. For this purpose a brigade of their finest cavalry, the flower of the Mexican Army, has been ordered to the Rio Grande, to co-operate with Gen. Augur, of the U. S. Army.

ARREST OF JUDGE E. W. CULLEN.

DALLAS, July 30.—Judge E. W. Cullen who organized the First District Court in Galveston county, and was also in the Congress of the Republic of Texas, and the First President of the Dallas and Wichita Railroad Company, was arrested on the 29th in City county and carried to Comicans yesterday and delivered to Judge Wood, on whose warrant he was arrested. The charges are for falsely personating another, and the bribery of a witness in a land case.

HORSE-THIEF ARRESTED.

HALLVILLE, July 31.—The horse-thief Foster, alias Snell, alias Wilson, who stole Senator Flaungan's horse from Henderson, several days ago, was arrested yesterday at Dangerfield, and passed through here this morning, en route for Henderson, strongly guarded.

The Oakville Tribune says that the mail contract from Oakville to Banquette will be let soon and a postoffice established at Logartovilla.
