Beecher's Defense.
[From the New York Graphic.]
"The document will be a very powerful and startling one, and which will create a great surprise as did Tilton's now famous presentation of his alleged personal grievances. Mr. Beecher will acknowledge that, since the beginning of his ministry, he has been beset by letters addressed to him from women, expressing great personal admiration—adoration, indeed, of him as a man and a minister. He will show that communications of this nature are constantly received by every noted man in the community, and that it is especially the fate of clergymen, poets, and actors, to be the recipients of these abnormal demonstrations from women who are generally diseased, physiologically and psychologically.
"After this general statement of a well known fact, Mr. Beecher will allude to the case of Mrs. Tilton, who, it seems, conceived for him a most extravagant passion. Knowing the lady from childhood, and having married her to her husband, and been on terms of close social relationship with them both, he was led by a strange infatuation to submit to her blandishments, and an intimacy was formed which, while it was not criminal, was reprehensible, or at least put him in a position which made him seem to do a great wrong to Theodore Tilton. He will confess that both he and Mrs. Tilton are very emotional, given to exaggeration in sentiment, and that the correspondence between them was not what it should have been between a pastor and a lady, that lady the wife of his friend.
But the peculiarity of the case was, that Mrs. Tilton had complained bitterly of her husband's selfishness, and want of kindness to her, and possible infidelities, and she looked up to Mr. Beecher to give her that affection and sympathy which she failed to find at home. Mr. Beecher will acknowledge that he was tempted; that he allowed kindnesses and expressions of a sympathetic tenderness for Mrs. Tilton, that he reciprocated them to a great degree,—so much so that, while not guilty of any wrong to Theodore Tilton, he so far compromised himself and the lady as to render necessary, as it appeared to his mind, the letters which he subsequently wrote to Mr. Moulton and Mr. Tilton, humbling himself before the latter as before God for his extravagant demonstrations of affection for the wife of his friend.
"Hence, while he will declare that he was guilty of indecorum; guilty, perhaps, of leading a wife to love him more than her husband; guilty, possibly, in the depth of sympathy for her, and in allowing his impulsive nature to lead him away, he will insist that his relations with Mrs. Tilton were no more intimate or blamable than the religious flirtation with the priest indulged by 'Catharine Gaunt' the scottish character quoted by Mrs. Tilton, in which he will find almost a perfect parallel for this case. Furthermore he may be expected to show that his position has been greatly embarrassed by the fact that malignant rumor had already been making free with his name, and that, owing to the unhappy personal peculiarities of one near and dear to him, whose ungrounded jealousy was the bane and torment of his life, stories had been invented and circulated which had injured his fair fame and did him grievous wrong, which, however, he was debarred from denying by the fact that, in branding those falsehoods as they deserved, he would have necessarily been forced to sacrifice one to whom he was bound by the tenderest and most sacred ties which can exist between man and woman. He will show that the difficulty in this whole case was due primarily to the extravagant jealousy of this inmate of his family, whose teeming imagination had conjured up amours upon his part which had no foundation in fact, and who was ever ready to apply theories of her suspicion to the slightest sign of apparent fact, until his whole existence was filled with apprehension. In this connection, Mr. Beecher will explain why, from this cause, he was for years compelled to abstain from pastoral visits to the families of his congregation, and forced to demand the appointment of Mr. Halliday to discharge this important part of his duties, simply because he could not be seen with a woman without being subjected to suspi-

cions which filled him with anguish. "It is said that Mr. Beecher's statement of his domestic troubles owing to the dangerous and painful hallucinations which he has been constantly compelled to combat, and of which, from their very nature, it was impossible for him to speak openly, and the unhappy affair of Tilton and his wife, will constitute his formal defense one of the most curiously dramatic and interesting papers ever presented to the public. Those who already know the nature of the contents predict that it will make great revelations, which will not only settle finally the troubles in his own family, but will fully account for the peculiarity of his relations with Tilton and his wife, and set at rest at once and forever the other terrible scandals connected with his name already given to the public, and still further threatened by Mrs. Woodhull and other maligners of his good repute."

Republican Convention 6th District.

THE Galveston News intimates that a Constitutional State Convention would probably "vacate the executive office." In that case, put us down in favor of the Convention.

THE State Gazette is not friendly to Judge Hancock for Congress in the Fifth District, but it admits that the Bastrop delegates, though not instructed, will go for him.

THE State Gazette thinks the Bexar county Democrats will declare for Stockdale for Congress. We hope they will; for then the Republicans will "beat them out of their boots" at the coming election.

We should like to see a convention that expected to elect its candidate without endorsing Gov. Coke. We believe it would be political death to any congressional candidate who dared to go to the polls without it.—State Gazette

There now, ye brass collar Democrats; you "dare not go to the polls without" endorsing Gov. Coke. You are sentenced to "political death" if you do, and that by Coke's own organ. This endorsement of Coke will be forced down your throats at the Gold Convention, ay, even at your own county convention. You may denounce Coke as much as you please in private for the wrongs and harm he has done Western Texas, but you have got to swear by him in public. Now it is our turn to "dare" a little. We "dare" you to nominate a Coke man for Congress. If you do, we shall be much obliged to you, and then "beat blue blazes" out of you.

THERE are some philosophies which always develop bigotry and intolerance in their disciples, whether these philosophies be religious, ecclesiastical, social or political. Democracy in the United States, and especially in the South, is one of these bigot-begetting philosophies. For instance, the Austin Statesman has a local news editor who is a Republican of the most moderate character, and one of the best local editors in the State. He has no more to do with the politics of the Statesman than a Republican lawyer has to do with the politics of his client, or a Republican land agent with the politics of those who employ him. He is also a gentleman of irreproachable character and conduct. Yet the State Gazette uses the following language about him:

There is nothing in a name. The St. Louis Democrat is a Radical paper, and the Democratic Statesman has the most infamous Radical editor in the State.

The word "infamous" falls very flippantly and frequently from the pen of the Statesman editor in relation to gentlemen of the first character, simply because they do not belong to the bigoted and persecuting Democracy. The Gazette will permit a friendly though opposing contemporary to suggest a change in its style in this matter, for the honor of Texas journalism, for the good of society, and for its own interest.

Let it remember that Hurlbut, the celebrated editorial writer of the New York World, the leading Democratic paper of the Nation, is a Republican.

THE Galveston News says that the default of the International Railway Company in regard to its convertible bonds, is not surprising. Those bonds were based upon the expectation of subsidy from the State, under charter contract as stipulated by the Twelfth Legislature, for completed sections of the road. The company issued bonds purporting to be convertible into subsidy bonds, about \$2,000,000 of which would now be forthcoming, if the State had not refused compliance with the charter contract, and it is to be presumed that the company has defaulted to an extent approximating to that amount. It appears that the company expressly assigns this refusal of the State as its reason for not meeting its own obligations.

This will now ruin the credit of the State hopelessly, during the whole of Coke's administration. Not a single State bond can now be sold. Not a capitalist in the world will let the State have a dollar. And yet Texas has the smallest debt, the lowest taxation, the richest resources, the most rapid development of wealth, the best growing crops, and the brightest future of any State in the Union. Shall "Cokery" choke the life out of the State for three years and a half longer? Is there no relief? Why, we are suffocating now. And they said, "Let us get into power, and all will be well!" Who will vote for a Coke man now?

REAGAN is trying to beat Herndon, the present incumbent, for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the first District, and will probably succeed. There is no choice between them; both are bad enough. Culberson and De Morse are the principal aspirants in the Second District. Both are good men, considering that they are Democrats, but Culberson is the best. Throckmorton is already nominated in the Third District; we are rejoiced at it, and hope the Republicans will support him. In the Fourth District Mills, the present incumbent, is opposed by Stewart of Houston. Mills, though an ardent Democrat, is much the best man. He is a gentleman of the first water, and was a gallant soldier and officer. Stewart is a bigot, who did not fight any in war, but wants to fight now, when there is no danger, like Coke Ireland, Stockdale, and all the other bitter Democrats. In the Fifth District the race is between Hancock and Giddings, and in the Sixth it is between the Coke-Ireland anti railroad ring, and their opponents.

Report of Combined Fleet to Watch the Spanish Coast Denied.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—The Standard says the report that England, Germany and Italy have agreed to watch the Spanish coast is denied. Germany has not proposed intervention to Austria, but the latter is ready to join the other powers in an acknowledgement of the Spanish Republic. Bismarck, whose health is greatly improved, leaves Kissingen in a fortnight.

Heavy Rain Storm in Indian Territory and Kansas.

DENISON, Aug. 3.—A heavy rain storm visited our town this afternoon. It has been very general, and prevailed throughout the Indian Territory and Kansas.

A Good Man Sick—Politically.

Just after the precinct meeting was held at Dallas, and declared for Throckmorton over Good, at the home of the latter, we see that Good withdraws in a card in the Herald, of the 19th instant, in which he says:

I do not think the result of that convention is a fair expression of the wishes of Dallas county, but at all political movements in this large city an impression is conveyed by the potency of ring influence. I, like all others, must bow in submission to this power. For my part my obedience is made with all the grace that such integrity is entitled to.

Immense Enthusiasm for Coke.

This is a heading of the telegraphic columns of the Houston Telegraph. We looked down the column but found no dispatch giving the particulars. If there is in Texas any "enthusiasm" for Coke we would like to know where it is. We regret to note that expressions directly to the reverse are frequently heard in this part of the woods.—McKinney Enquirer, (Dem.) July 25th.

GORDON, THE SOI DISTANT LORD, ENDS HIS TROUBLES WITH A PISTOL.
FORT GARY, MANITOBA, Aug. 3.—Lord Gordon shot himself on Saturday last at his residence at Headingly, in this province. Two English detectives arrested him, and he promised to go quietly with them if they would not go through the United States. While in his room preparing for the journey, he blew his brains out with a pistol.

A JEALOUS LOVER KILLS THE OBJECT OF HIS AFFECTION.

AUGUSTA, Aug. 3.—At Moffittville, Henderson county, a young German named Gardemann, shot and killed a young lady named Miss Kate Tucker. It appears that Gardemann was employed by the father of the lady, with whom he fell desperately in love. He became jealous of a supposed rival, and deliberately killed her while they were sitting in Mr. Tucker's parlor. The murderer fled, but was arrested and put in jail at Henderson Courthouse.

THE TRIBUNE THINKS RAILROAD CONGRESS MEANS FORGIVING FOR GRANGER AGGRESSIONS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—The Tribune thinks that while the ostensible purpose of the recent railroad conference at Saratoga was to make combinations to facilitate transportation and establish uniform freight and passenger rates, the roads really combined to resist what they look upon as the forthcoming encroachments of the western Grangers.

THE FABRICATE WALWORTH REMOVED TO INSANE PRISON.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Frank Walworth, the parrot, has been removed from Auburn prison to the prison asylum for insane convicts, on the advice of the Board of Examining Physicians.

GAYNOR VERSUS TILTON POSTPONED.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Gaynor versus Tilton postponed to Wednesday, when Magistrate Riley will dismiss it, as Gaynor has no personal interest in the matter.

LIGHTHOUSE OFFICERS ASSIGNED TO DUTY.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—Major W. E. Merrett, of the corps of engineers, U. S. A., has been assigned to duty as lighthouse engineer of the fourth district, headquarters at Cincinnati. Maj. Chas. R. Suler, of the corps of engineers, U. S. A., assigned as engineer of the 15th lighthouse district, headquarters at St. Louis. These officers are assigned under an act of Congress extending the jurisdiction of the lighthouse board over the Mississippi, Missouri and Ohio rivers.

GOVERNMENT SELLS FIVE MILLION GOLD.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—The Government sells a million and a half on the first and third, and a million on the second and fourth Thursdays, of August, making five millions gold.

MRS. TILTON EXAMINED.

A partial report of Mrs. Tilton's examination before the committee Friday night, touches only a few points of the full examination of Mrs. Tilton, which, however, before the committee, as elsewhere, maintained a tone of most effectuate forbearance toward her husband, refusing to speak of his faults, except where the thread of his testimony absolutely required it.

Two incidents, which Mr. Tilton had introduced in his statement, as matters he had passed over and forgotten when they occurred, to reveal to them when this suspicion of Mr. Beecher arose, for of necessity alluded to the improper cases, alleged by Mr. Tilton to have been given and received in Mr. Beecher's parlor, is totally denied, both specifically and in general denial. Of any improper intimacy or other incident, Mrs. T. remembered nothing of, except so far as this, she, with her husband and Mr. B., was sitting one day in a bed room connected by folding doors with a common sitting room, at Mr. T.'s house. Mr. T. left them for a few minutes, and when he returned found them where he had left them.

A HERALDIC REPORTER ON TILTON'S HERALDRY.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—A reporter who has been studying the heraldry of the Tilton family announces that the bulk of the ancestry and kinsmen have been curious, and that a large minority of them have frequented lunatic asylums.

JUDGE DEVINE'S able and very satisfactory opinion, delivered from the Supreme Court bench, on the application of the International Railway Company for mandamus to compel the Comptroller to issue the bonds of the State to the company, appears in full in the Houston Telegraph of the 4th received last night. We should be very much pleased if we had space to enable us to reproduce it, but we have not. It supports the doctrine that the writ of mandamus to compel the Comptroller to do an act which is made his duty by a law of the Legislature, and which he refuses to do, is the proper remedy in the premises, and that the Supreme Court should so hold. Any other view is an absurdity so patent that it does not require a lawyer to see it.

But we cannot agree with Judge Devine when he expresses the opinion, as we understand he does, that Gove, Coke did not have any idea of Judge Ferris' views of the case when he appointed him special Judge to fill the place of Judge Moore, who was disqualified to sit. It is utterly inconsistent with Coke's character, and with the conduct of his administration thus far, to suppose that he was thus indifferent to the decision of this case. It is notorious that his ambition was set upon the negotiation of the State bonds before the decision was rendered, and, after its being rendered, in spite of its character. He wanted to show that he was stronger with the capitalists than the International Company. Hence his bitterness toward the Company since his failure, and his desire to heap the blame of his own repudiation policy upon the shoulders of the Company. Then why did he choose a man entirely off the line of the road, and in county known to be opposed to the subsidy? Why did Ferris seek to have Coke indorsed at the Fort Worth Convention?

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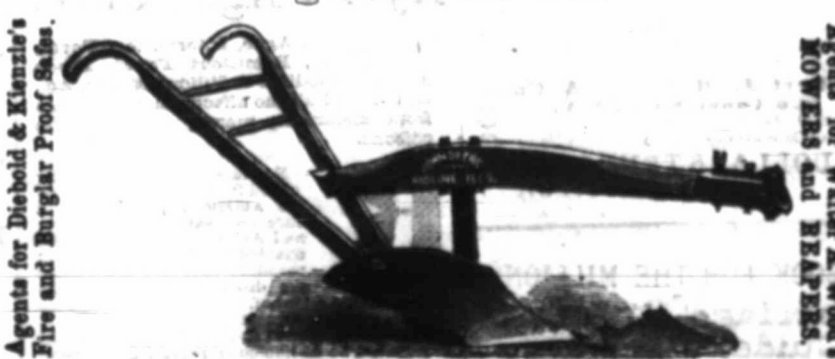

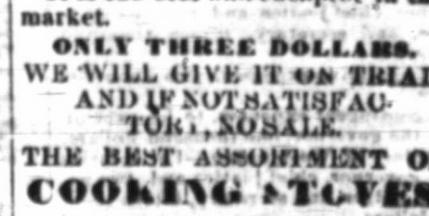
