CINCINNATI, Aug. 5 The telegraph operator at Autora, Indiana, reports that the steamer Pat Rogers was burned this morning one mile below Aurora, and about 200 lives were lost. The victims were princtpally ladies. Further particulars are expected soon.

A CURIOUS TREE. - Says the Op-

casieu River, in the parish of Calcasicu River, in the parish of Cal-casicu, is a white oak tree, about 2 and a half feet in diameter. 
