A Reason for Mr. Morgan's late Action.
 The necessity that has caused the late action of Mr. Morgan in the matter of the ship shipment to Houston is the existence of the Galveston Wharf monopoly. This agent has already been stated in general terms, but it is now avouched for. A case may be given. Some two years ago the coming fall, a heavy consignment of flour was shipped through to Dallas from New Orleans by the Morgan line at one dollar a barrel. Out of this amount was to come the respective charges of the steamship line from New Orleans, the Galveston Wharf Company, the Houston Direct Navigation Company, and the Texas Central Railroad. At the time spoken of through bills of lading were given to Dallas from New Orleans, via Red River and the Texas and Pacific Railroad, at fifty cents per hundred. By this route, and while high water prevailed in the Red River, the transportation could be made without loss; although there was no great profit in the business. How was it with Mr. Morgan? He attempted to compete with the Texas and Pacific road, via Red River, charging precisely their freight tariffs, and the consequence has been that he has never repeated the experiment. He was money out by the operation, and his inability to transport freight at these figures is assured from the fact that such through rates have never since been given.
 Mr. Morgan in self defense is compelled to do one of three things—either to withdraw from the carrying trade via the Gulf to Galveston, to have reduced the wharf charges at this place, or to find a landing point beyond which will not affect the success of his financial investments. He has now opposition in the rear both by rail and river, which do not permit him to pay such exactions as are demanded by the Wharf Company; and if this city is not prepared to aid Morgan in keeping his steamships in the Galveston trade, the consequence will be fatal to the entire commerce of the port. There is no exaggeration in this—the facts are patent and known, or should be known, to every intelligent business man in the community. The carrying trade via the Gulf is seriously menaced by opposition lines of travel in the rear of Galveston, and if we would have Mr. Morgan continue the running of his steamships to this point, there must be no embargo placed upon the work in the shape of inordinate wharf charges. Mr. Morgan is now required to give through bills of lading to points in the interior at rates in accordance with those of competing lines, and if Galveston expects to handle this freight she must get rid of all monopolies. This is, no doubt, thoroughly understood, but action is the order of the present hour.—Galveston News.

The Mail Robber Reed Identified and Buried.
 MCKINNEY, August 8, 1874.—Last night, the remains of Jim Reed, the mail robber, arrived here from Paris, near which place he had been apprehended and shot; and were buried to-day, after having been fully identified by those who knew him. He was a noted but desperate character, and the citizens are truly glad at the tidings. Many horses were stolen, and citizens killed and robbed, by the band to which he belonged.
 Morris who captured, and then had to kill him, is, I learn, in hot pursuit after Cal. Carter and John Boswell, Reed's desperate companions in the robbery on April 7 last, of the San Antonio and Austin mail coach. It will be remembered that this party stopped the stage, robbed the passengers, gutted the mail bags and took off the stage horses at the mouth of six shooters, in regular highwayman style. Since this occurred, they have been in this country, and in efforts to apprehend them at the time, one of the Deputy United States Marshals was killed by misapprehension. After this they fled to the Indian Nation, and then again were surrounded by a posse of United States deputies and sheriffs at the house of an Indian named Starr, a short distance from Moscoogee; but they managed to again escape.
 While in the Indian Territory they robbed an old man named Grayson of \$7000 and another of \$1300, and it was feared at one time that would attack and rob the express and mail train on the Missouri,

Kansas and Texas railroad. Much praise is bestowed on Morris for his bold and successful undertaking, and he is justly entitled to the reward offered for the three, besides various other rewards having been offered by the Governors of Missouri and Arkansas.
 Reed's body had become very much decomposed, particularly about the head, he having been shot just between the nose and right eye. The drayman, in carrying him to Potter's Field, mistook the place, and in returning, with the breeze to the windward of the corpse, he took sick, and was compelled to abandon it on the roadside. It was, however, taken charge of by the sheriff, and finally interred. It is hoped that the others may be taken and dealt with in like manner.

FLUMMER, of New Braunfels, who is so much incensed at the criticisms of the San Antonio papers for shooting at an innocent colored man, will be indicted for assault with intent to murder, if the next grand jury of Comal county does its duty. The loss he says about the matter, therefore, will be the better for him. The people of this country are determined to put down the prevalent lawlessness, violence, bloodshed and murder, and to insist on a strict observance of the law by all its officers; and the press will sustain them. Sheriffs and their deputies must be held to a strict accountability for their conduct.

THE CONGRESSIONAL ELECTION in this District is beginning to give a little animation to the languid, yawning conversation which has been characteristic of this city ever since the "heated term" set in. But this new interest is principally confined to the candidates, and their immediate friends and strikers—in short, to those who expect to be personally benefited with the result. Those who have no prospect of making anything by the election do not seem in the least inclined to become very enthusiastic.

The opinion seems to prevail about town that Brackenridge, Baylor, Ford, and Russell will neutralize each other, and that Stockdale will get as many votes in the Goliad Convention as all of them put together. It is believed, also, that in case Stockdale fails to get a two-thirds vote, a new man will come in, and that the new man will be John Ireland. It is also beginning to be understood that Ireland's influence will be given to Stockdale as against Baylor and Brackenridge. In short, that there is, or will be, a good understanding between Ireland and Stockdale. Ireland will help Stockdale, and should Stockdale be nominated and elected, he will help Ireland for the United States Senate, when the time comes.

It is beginning to be whispered that Gen. H. E. McCulloch, and all others opposed to Ireland, who have made boasts to declare for Stockdale, will find out that they have simply fallen into the trap laid for them by Ireland. It is said that the only way to beat the Ireland-Stockdale game is, for the friends of Brackenridge, Baylor, and Ford to compromise, and unite on one man. But it is also said that this has been rendered difficult by the uncooperative manner in which Baylor was treated in the Democratic Convention of this county last Saturday.

It is also said that the people of Western Texas have great interests to be promoted in the next Congress, and that there is nothing of a partisan nature that seriously divides them, and that they should not support a nominee at all, but should support the best man in the field, regardless of party. This is the real feeling of the majority of our best people, but they are afraid of the party lash, and of the loss of their party standing. Some propose that public meetings of the people, of both parties combined, should be held in all the counties in the District, and resolutions adopted favoring this course, and recommending their execution.

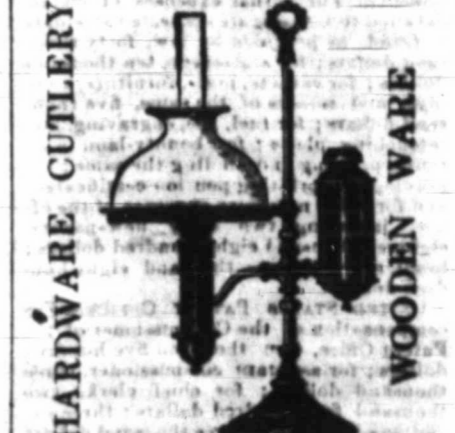
