TEXAS BUREAU OF IMMIGRATION, St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 4, 1874.

Hon. J. B. Robertson, General Superintendent Bureau of Immigration, Houston, Texas : DEAR SIR-I write to say that I have succeeded in getting passage on the Mis souri, Kansas and Texas Central reduced to 1‡ cents per mile, a saving of \$5.55 on each passenger to Austin and proportionate to all other points. The fare now will be to Denison, \$10 90; Dallas, \$11 45; Waco, \$15 10 ; Houston, \$16 80 ; Austin, \$17 85 ; Galveston, \$17 67, in currency; but these rates will not be given except to parties holding a printed check, duly signed by an officer of your bureau. I have had 1000 checks printed with stub, and bound in sample to-morrow. I have already issued six to passengers to day, though they are not yet out of press. I also send you sample of my poster, which I shall shortly have up in every county in ten States. I have also an advertisement, the same as my poster, in Colman's Rural World, read by 50,000 farmers. I have also addressed letters to several lines of railroads that are feeders to the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad, and hope shortly to annonnce reduced fare from all the States. days or weeks, and arrange for reduced

AN ACT making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the Government for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred seventy-five, and for other pur-

Chief of the Bureau, five thousand dollars; for payment of employees at a per diem to be paid only for the time actually employed, viz: Two accientant at every dellars per day; one accountant, at seven dollars per day; eight clerks, at four dollars per day; five copyis's, at not more than two dollars and ninety cents per day; and six messengers or laborers, at two dollars per day; thirty-one thousand six hundred and fifteen dollars.

For labor, (by the day or piece or con-tract,) including labor of workmen skilled in engraving, transferring, plate printing, and other specialities necessary for carrying on the work of engraving and printing notes, bonds, and other scouri-ties of the United States, the pay for such labor to be fixed by the Secretary of the Treasury at rates not exceeding the rates usually paid for such work, and for other expenses of engraving and printing notes, bonds, and other securities of the United States, eleven hundred and twenty five

For paper for notes bonds, and other securities, including will expenses, boxing, and transportation, one handred and sexenty-five thousand dollars.

For materials other than paper required in the work of engraving and printing, one hundred and forty thousand dollars. nd dellars.

For the purchase of engravers' tools, died, rolls, and plates, and for machinery and repairs of same, fifty thousand dollars.
For transportation of notes, bonds, and other securities of the United States, finished and unfinished, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.
See, 5. That from and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, and of each year thereafter, the Sec retary of the Treasury shall cause all nuexpended balances of appropriations which shall have remained upon the books of the Treasury for two fiscal years to be carried

to the surplus fund and covered into the Treasury: Provided, That this provision shall not apply to permanent specific ap-propriations, appropriations for rivers and harbors, light-houses, fortifications, public buildings, or the pay of the navy and marine corps: but the appropriations named in this proviso shall continue available until otherwise ordered by Congress, able until otherwise ordered by Congress, and this provision shall not apply to any unexpended balance of the appropriation made by the act approved December twenty first, eighteen hundred and seventy one, for expenses that may occurred under articles one to nine of the treaty with Great Britain concluded May eighth, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, with balance the act approved March third, eighteen handred and seventy three, anthorized to be expended to enable the President to fulfill the stipulations contained in the twentieth, twenty second twenty-shird, twenty-fourth, and twenty fifth articles of said treaty: And provided further, That this section shall not ope rate to prevent the fulfillment of contracts existing at the date of the passage of this act; and the Secretary of the Treasury shall, at the beginning of each session, report to Congress, with his annual esti mates, any balances of appropriations for specific objects affected by this section

GENERAL NATURE-No. 56. AN ACT to provide for the election of Congressmen at large for the State of Alabama.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the two additional Representatives to Congress aboved to the State of Alabama, ording to the apportionment under the ninth census roav be elected by the State at large, and the other Representatives to which the State is entitled by the districts as now prescribed by law in said State; uniess the general assembly of Alabama shall otherwise provide before the time fixed by law for the election for Representatives to Congress from said Stase.

Approved, June 20, 1874.


