In a speech delivered by Judge
 Maskey of South Carolina, last
 week, he very pertinently called at-
 tention to the absolute necessity of
 reform in the government of that
 State, and but echoed the public
 sentiment of the country in urging
 be selected for office—men
 that none but honest men should
 honest and capable—Republicans,
 if they can be found, but, anyway,
 honest men; reform through Repub-
 lican nominations if possible, but
 against them if it was necessary to
 secure reform.

In giving his account of his visit to
 President Grant he says:

"Four or five weeks ago I visited
 Washington, and at the suggestion
 of a distinguished Republican Sen-
 ator called upon President Grant.
 Hardly had I taken a seat before he
 asked: "What do you mean by
 such a government as you have in
 South Carolina?" I replied: "I hope
 you do not mean that I support it
 in its iniquity?" "I mean that all
 Republicans are responsible unless
 it is checked at the ballot box," re-
 plied the President. And while the
 President speaks calmly of all the
 great battles he fought, or the most
 stirring events of the war in which
 he participated, yet when I talk to
 him of South Carolina his apparent-
 ly pulseless lips quiver, his veins
 and his eyes enlarge, and he says:
 "You must stop the robbery!" As a
 Republican I regard this as a field
 order, and am moving under it."

PROFESSOR BLEDSOE, ex clergy-
 man, ex-Assistant Secretary of State
 under the Confederacy, and now an
 Atheist, and editor of the *Southern
 Review*, who claims to have been op-
 pressed by a tyrannical Govern-
 ment, says of Northern Christianity,
 that it becomes, "in the sphere
 of legislation, the rabid radicalism
 of rampant rogues, who are now ri-
 otting, like so many filthy worms,
 in the horrible corruption they them-
 selves have created."—*Washington
 Chronicle*.

**Marshal Bazaine's Escape—Inter-
 esting Particulars—Excite-
 ment in Marseilles.**

LONDON, Aug. 12.—The following
 interesting particulars of the es-
 cape of Marshal Bazaine, from his
 prison on the Island of St. Margue-
 rite, has been received. The apart-
 ments occupied by Marshal by Ba-
 zaine opened upon a lofty and pre-
 cipitate cliff overhanging the sea. A
 sentry was posted on the terrace
 with orders to watch the prisoner's
 every movement.

Sunday evening the Marshal
 walked upon the terrace with Col.
 Vilette, his aide camp. At two o'-
 clock he retired as usual, apparent-
 ly to sleep, but before day-break

was it discovered that he had affect-
 ed his escape. He must have cross-
 ed the terrace in the dead of night,
 and eluding the sentinel, gained
 the edge of the precipice; thence, by
 means of a knotted rope, he de-
 scended to the sea. He evidently
 slipped during the descent, and
 tore his hands, as the rope was
 found stained with blood in several
 places.

Under a cliff in a hired boat, were
 Bazaine's wife and cousin. They
 received him as he reached the wa-
 ter, and Madame La Marechale tak-
 ing the oars, rowed directly to the
 strange steamer, which had been
 lying off the island since the previ-
 ous evening. They reached the
 vessel in safety, and were taken on
 board, and the steamer then put to
 sea. It is thought that they have
 landed at Genoa, as the steamer
 proceeded in that direction.

J. B. OMOHUNDRO ("Texas Jack") has started for Denver City, Colorado, where he has engaged to meet the Earl of Dunraven, Canon Kingsley and others, and act as their guide in a grand hunt near the head of the Yellowstone.

THE train on the Western Branch of the Central Railroad was fired into near Elgin, several balls passing through cars, and the passengers falling on the floor in their fright. So says the *Austin Statesman*.

MR. SHARMAN, the Austin correspondent of the *Houston Telegraph*, and one of the best informed and most accomplished newspaper men in the country, is now in the city, and stopping at the Menger. He will spend a few days here, and then proceed to the Goliad Convention.

We had the pleasure a day or two ago of meeting Mr. J. C. Carr, of Pleasanton. The stock and ranche men of that beautiful and healthy country are beginning to appreciate the efforts of the EXPRESS for the development of Western Texas.

THE Galveston *News* at last favors a Constitutional Convention, evidently with the hope of getting rid of the Coke administration, and of getting out of the interminable labyrinth of troubles in which that administration has involved the State. As we have said before, on that issue, we shall favor the Convention, but on no other. It is full of danger to the State. It can only be favored as a choice of evils, by all candid men, who act from principle, and not from partizan spirit.

THE defamation of the dying stranger-girl, Miss Cooper, by the *Galveston Mercury*, and the report of the post-mortem examination, rendered necessary for the vindication of her honor, as it all appears in the *Galveston News*, constitutes the most horrid chapter of local Texas history we have ever read. If lynch law could ever be justified, it could be in this case. The human byena that could gloat over the miseries of a poor unfortunate family would be blessed by being sent to the hell of ordinary sinners.

THE PRINCE OF WALES, the future King of England, is in debt to the amount of about \$3,000,000, and is sorely pressed. The British Ministry have resolved to pay him out, for the honor of the nation. But the public feeling is, that the Queen, his mother, should pay these debts. She was voted money sufficient to support the court in royal splendor, but, since the death of her husband, Prince Albert, she has received the money, kept it, lived in retirement, and the expense of maintaining the

style of the court has fallen upon the Prince and Princess of Wales. Hence, they are impoverished, while the Queen is vastly rich, with immense revenues, and comparatively few expenses. She is rapidly and justly gaining the reputation of a miser, it not that of a selfish and unfeeling mother. She was once almost worshipped all over the world. Such is life.

A. B. HALL, former sheriff of Harris county, and present postmaster at Galveston, has been arrested and taken to Houston on the charge of embezzlement while sheriff. He is also sued by Harris county for a large amount, which he is trying to compromise. He may be able to compromise, for he has the means that generally succeed in effecting compromises. It is thought he compromised with special post office agent Petheridge for a white-wash report to the President by the same means. He is one of that corrupt ring at Houston which has so long disgraced the Republican party. But the leaders of the Republican opposition to him in Houston are his former partners in corruption, and that is the reason why their attempted exposures of him have had no weight in high quarters.

His Republican accusers at Houston are as corrupt as he is, and only jealous because he has got the lion's share of the spoil. If all the sinuosities and intricacies of the corrupt Republican ring at Houston, for the last five or six years, could be brought to light, it would astonish the State. With all our admiration of President Grant, we must say that his appointment of Hall to the postmastership at Galveston is one of the very worst appointments he ever made. But the appointment of any of his Houston rivals would be worse still.

THE *State Gazette* is guilty of the following bit of the same sort of damnable defamation, of which it very justly accuses Baker of the *Galveston Mercury*. Speaking of the whipping of the school-master, Mr. Washburne, in Guadalupe county, it says:

"Gov. Coke has instituted the most rigid enquiry and directed the District Attorney to prosecute the offenders to the extent of the law. The most searching investigation has been made by the Grand Jury and no proof can be obtained to fix the guilt on any one. Sen. Ireland has exerted himself to the uttermost to obtain testimony and has professed to prosecute the offenders, if they could be discovered, without fee or reward. It is believed that it was a party of negroes who committed this crime. There were two parties in the colony one of whom was bitterly hostile to Washburne and Gesner. Before they came two negroes, who were teachers, had large and flourishing schools in the colony, which were broken up by the success of Washburne and Gesner in establishing their schools. Gesner's sisters, it is rumored, received the attention of and were gallanted about by negro men, and Washburne and Gesner both played the beaux to the young negro women of the colony."

We call on the *Gazette* for its authority for the above miserable statement. We have the assurance of gentlemen who are familiar with that region that the original statement is true.

PRESIDENT GRANT has written a letter to Gov. Oglesby declining to deliver the dedicatory address at the inauguration of the National Lincoln Monument, at Springfield, on the 15th of October. He says that placing himself in such a position would be so foreign to his usual wont that he feels himself unequal to the task. He hopes that the association will select some man to deliver the address who will meet the expectations of the nation, and who can do justice to the memory and patriotic services of the great man in whose honor the monument is erected.

THE great German Minister of State, Bismarck, appears to have a vision that brings him no happiness whatever. He fought duels in the university, and indulged in deep excesses, that were totally inexcusable, even in the son of a Premier. Now he has come suddenly to a pass which leads him from private reprobation to public prosecution. He has engaged in a duel with pistols, and has killed his adversary. The offense has come, and though he be a Chancellor's son who offends, punishment is likely to follow.

THE *Nevada Valley* states that "four more of the Penescol murderers are in jail, and within the hearing of the execution yesterday. They are awaiting trial.

Yesterday, the seventh instant, the second act in the tragedy of the Penescol murder closed, and two of the murderers paid the forfeit of their lives to the laws of the country. A strange ceremony, and one almost unknown in the annals of crime, was that of the marriage of Hypolito Tapia to his former mistress, while standing, as it were, with the rope around his neck. The woman, named Trinidad Bayastro, had long been living with Hypolito, and was the mother of several of his children. To have them legitimized as far as was possible, she induced Hypolito to consent to a marriage, which he readily did. They were married on Thursday, the sixth instant. The final parting between Tapia and his family was a scene, as the guard avers, "that would make the heart of a stone quiver." After frenzied regrets and agonizing farewells, the prisoner blessing his children and family, they were parted, and the former told to make his peace with the world and prepare to meet his God."

POSTAL ARRANGEMENT WITH CUBA.
HAVANA, Aug. 12.—Through the exertions of the American Consul General, an arrangement has been effected with the Havana postoffice authorities, by which mails for the United States will for the present be made up in the Consulate.

THE BEECHER BUSINESS.
NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—Pointed phrases of Mr. Shearman, member of Congress: "And yet, even now, I would not advise Mr. Beecher to speak out, knowing as I do, the circumstances. Should he tell the public what they have absolutely no right to know? The disgusting business is absolutely shocking. Beecher has held his tongue."

Speaking of Mrs. Hooker, Shearman continues: "She, it was well known, was a weak-minded woman, and the Woodhull people got hold of her and preyed upon her weak intellect. If Beecher opened his mouth and told his story, there are distinguished citizens who have been mixed up in this matter who would become involved, but he has spared their feelings. When I reflect on what would be the consequence of his telling out what he knows about this unholy business, I would advise him even now to keep silent and explain away only what is necessary to the committee."

SENTENCED FOR SEVEN YEARS.
HOUSTON, Aug. 12.—In the District Court to day, there was nothing of importance; but the entire day in the Criminal Court was taken up in the trial of H. C. King, charged with being a confederate in the late robbery of James Highland of four hundred dollars. E. Jones, another of the robbers, turned State's evidence. King gets seven years.

King had formerly been a clerk in the District Clerk's Office, under the late administration.

REINFORCEMENTS FOR THE WHITES IN MISSISSIPPI.

MEMPHIS, Aug. 12.—Three hundred men will leave this city at four o'clock, on the steamer St. Francis, for the seat of war, under command of Gen. King White, of Arkansas.

It is reported that five or six white men were killed last night in a fight.

Posters are published in this city calling for volunteers and thirty artillery men. They take three pieces of artillery with them.

It is said that a young man from Memphis was killed at Austin last night.

A BATTLE IMMINENT—GEN. CHALMERS IN FULL COMMAND AND AWAITING SUPPLIES, MEN AND ARMS.

MEMPHIS, Aug. 12.—News from Austin is anxiously expected this a. m., but as Helena is the nearest telegraph station it is not probable that anything definite will be obtained before noon.

Owing to a want of proper authority and a suitable number of men and ammunition, he preferred landing at Moon's, above Austin, where he could place himself in a better condition to await executive authority.

Later.—The following is just received: "Send us reinforcements by the St. Francis. Send guns with fixed ammunition. If possible, send rations for ten days for 500 men."

LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES,
PASSED AT THE
**FIRST SESSION OF THE FOR-
TY-THIRD CONGRESS.**

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 57.]
AN ACT to authorize the issue of duplicate agricultural land scrip where the original has been lost or destroyed.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the provisions of the act of Congress of the twenty-third day of June, eighteen hundred and sixty, relating to the release of land warrants in certain cases, be, and the same are hereby, extended so as to include the release of agricultural college land scrip lost, cancelled or destroyed without the fault of the owner thereof, under such rules and regulations as the Secretary of the Interior may prescribe.
Approved, June 20, 1874.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 58.]
AN ACT making additions to the fifteenth section of the act approved July 2, 1864, entitled "An act to amend an act entitled 'An act to aid in the construction of a railroad and telegraph line from the Missouri River to the Pacific Ocean, and to secure to the Government the use of the same for postal, military, and other purposes,' approved July 1, 1862."
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That there shall be, and is hereby, added to the fifteenth section of the act approved July second, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, entitled "An act to amend an act entitled 'An act to aid in the construction of a railroad and telegraph line from the Missouri River to the Pacific Ocean, and to secure to the Government the use of the same for postal, military, and other purposes,' approved July first, eighteen hundred and sixty-two," the following words, to-wit: "And any officer or agent of the companies authorized to construct the aforesaid roads, or any company engaged in operating either of said roads, who shall refuse to operate and use the road or telegraph under his control, or which he is engaged to operate for all purposes of communication, travel, and transportation, so far as the public and the Government are concerned, as one continuous line, or shall refuse, in such operation and use, to afford and secure to each of said roads equal advantages and facilities as to rates, time, or transportation, without any discrimination of any kind in favor of, or adverse to, the road or business of any or either of said companies, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one thousand dollars, and may be imprisoned not less than six months. In case of failure or refusal of the Union Pacific Railroad Company, or either of said branches, to comply with the requirements of this act, and the acts to which this act is amendatory, the party injured or the company aggrieved may bring an action in the district or circuit court of the United States in the Territory, district, or circuit in which any portion of the road of the defendant may be situated, for damages on account of such failure or refusal; and, upon recovery, the plaintiff shall be entitled to judgment for treble the amount of all excess of freight and fares collected by the defendant, and for treble the amount of damages sustained by the plaintiff by such failure or refusal; and for each and every violation of or failure to comply with the requirements of this act, a new cause of action shall arise in case of suit in any such Territory, district, or circuit, in which any portion of the road of the defendant is situated, and such suit may be brought, and such service shall be by the court held to be good and sufficient; and it is hereby provided that for all the purposes of said act, and of the acts amendatory thereof, the railway of the Denver Pacific Railroad and Telegraph Company shall be deemed and taken to be a part and extension of the road of the Kansas Pacific Railroad, to the point of junction thereof with the road of the Union Pacific Railroad Company at Cheyenne, as provided in the act of March third, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine."
Approved, June 20, 1874.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 59.]
AN ACT to amend the act entitled "An act transferring the control of certain Territorial penitentiaries to the several Territories in which the same are located," approved January twenty-fourth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, be, and the same is hereby, amended by striking out the words "Montana, Idaho, and Wyoming" wherever the same occur in said act, and the said act shall hereafter have no applicability to the Territories of Montana, Idaho, and Wyoming.
Sec. 2. That the penitentiaries in the Territories of Montana, Idaho, and Wyoming, shall continue under the care and control of the marshal of the United States for said Territories, under and pursuant to the provisions of the act entitled "An act in relation to certain territorial penitentiaries," approved January tenth, eighteen hundred and seventy-one; which said act last mentioned act is hereby revived and re-enacted so far as the same applies to the Territories of Montana, Idaho, and Wyoming.
Approved, June 20, 1874.
