A MILITARY COMPANY FROM MEMPHIS KEEPING THE PEACE BETWEEN WHITES AND BLACKS.

MEMPHIS, TENN., Aug. 8.- From Capt. Parvey Mathies, editor of the Evening 1 edger, of this city, who returned from Somerville this afternoon, the following account of the riot, or rather what threatened to become one at Somerville, yesterday, is obtained: The election of the day before had been hotly contested, and many negroes had attended the polls during the day, ly threatened to burn the town. Du ring the day a prominent negro politician, named Cash Warren, had cursed and abused a young brother encountering Mayor Hendon on the street, began to abuse him, and finally snapped a pistol twice in the Mayor's face, who then threw a pistol and shot him dead. Almost simultaniously two or three shots were fired at the negro by friends of the Mayor, who has collected there, among whom Oscar Burton, a young man noted for being an excellent shot, and brave, who was charged firing at Warren, when he met his death, by the negroes who had become very much incensed at ed to kill Burton, who, about 11 o'. clock, appeared on the streets arm ed with a double-barreled shot-gun

and pistols. Judge J. G. Reeves. Sheriff elect, and another brother, named Paul, attempted to arrest and disarm Burton, and owing to a report that a body of negroes were marching into town. Burton refused to be arrested, and they opened fire on him, wounding him se verely in four different places. He returned the fire with a shot gun, mortally wounding Paul & Albert, and then tell bimself, but raising himself on his elbow, drew his pistol and shot J. G. Reeves in the shoulder, inflicting a dangerous, but not necessarily fatal, wound. A

Payment for Slaves.

The discussion over the question of the payment to the owners of slaves in the Southern States previous to the rebellion their value is being revived with great earnestness in various localities in the South. It is claimed that there were in the South before the war about 4,000,000 of negroes. The census of 1870 gives the number of negroes in the United States at 4,. 886, 387. Calculating the slaves at an average of \$600 apiece, we have the sum of \$2,400,000,000. Put it down at \$300 as an average, and then we would have \$1,200,000. Georgia gave in 1860 the value of her negro property at \$302,694,855, or about an average of \$700.

It is urged that these slaves were the property of individual citizens, legally obtained, and which they were entitled to under the Cousti tution of the United States; that they were arbitrarily freed and their value destroyed, and that this occurred in many cases without the fault of their owners, but as one of the incidents of the war. A correspondent, in discussing the subject, suggests that they do not expect to get the money value of the negroes directly out of the Treasury of the United States with the national debt upon the country, but that other means should be devised which would be more equitable and then further urges the South in Congress, as one man, to vote against any more donations of pub lic land, and to insist that this domain must be held for more sacred purposes—the paying of the South for her negroes. It is very discreetly suggested that it may not be apropos just now, but that it is well to have such thoughts in one's mind for future use.

An appeal is then made for all owners of slaves to record them, as their children will not doubt at some future day be paid for what their fathers lost. There is no question that the idea of the payment for the loss of slaves is a very popular and potent element in Southern politics, and, surrounded as it is with some technical ground of legality, it will be urged with additional ernestness and persistence.

OUR AUSTIN LETTER.

mmutation of Jenkins' Sentence-The Lindsey Case as a Contrast-Coke turus a Denf Ear-He dare not Extend Mercy to a Negro but he Pardone a Virgin ian out of the Peniten tiary upon the Bare Place of Birth.

AUSTIN, August 15, 1874.

The several petitions and letters sent by the citizens of San Antonio, without regard to race. color or policies asking Gov. Coke to grant a commutation of sentence to the negro Jenkins who is to be hung in your city on the 17th instant, have all been tossed into the waste basket by His Excellency. Whatever excuse he may give to the worthy gentlemen who have ventured to ask elemency in behalf of a poor, friendless, black man who they believe is to be hung unjustly, the real reason is tast being a meral coward, Coke dare not pardon a negro-for such an act he might receive the applause and thanks of a few San Antonians, but how satisfy the Ku-Klux Democracy; how explain such an act to the great body of his supporters who hold the life of a negro as of no consequence to the principle involved; this added to Coke's natural delight in marder and assassination, (like all such men) is the cause of the failure of your requests.

Contrast Jenkins' case with that of Dr. Lindsey. Jenkins, in the heat of passion, rashed upon and shot a German who had dealt him blows and heaped insult and indignity upon him; even admitting that it was murder, still there were extennating circumstances, sufficient to warrant a Paints. commutation of the sentence to imprison-

Dr. Lindsey came to San Antonio with a companion named Smith. Lindsey was a Virginian, Smith a northern man and an ex-Federal soldier. Smith had acted as Lindsey's friend, supplying him with means &c. At last Smith told Lindsey that he could do nothing more for him, and Lindsey caught up a pistol and shot his friend dead. Lindsey was tried and condemned to imprisonment for life, a new trial was obtained, and Lindsey gaining time, and being a doctor, made his second appearance in an emaciated condition, and the jury assessed his punishment at five years imprisonment. Efforts were then made to secure pardon from Gov. Davis, which failed. Coke had hardly usurped his position than he granted a pardon to Dr. Lindsey, because he was a Virginian and had killed a Yankee soldier. Lindsey committed a cold-blooded ungrateful act to his murder of Smith, and in comparison with the crime committed by Jenkine, he deserved the extreme penalty of the law, and Jenkius deserved a lesser punishment than is to be meted to him. Yet Coke pardoned Lindsey, because he was a Virginian and let Jenkins bang because he is a negro, notwithstanding, the petitions of your best citizens. A Governor of a great State should hold the scales of justice with a firm unshaken hand, and exercise the power of mercy, so wisely intrusted so his keeping, with caution and wisdom. and without prejudice, because the great Judge of all the earth will hold him to a strict account for all his acts and omissions; the violated law should be vindicated, at the same time neither vengeance or prejudice should send a citizen to the zallows.

UNITED STATES,

PASSED AT THE

FIRST SESSION OF THE FOR-TY THIRD CONGRESS.

GENERAL NATURE-No. 60. AN ACT providing for publication of the revised statutes and the laws of the United States.

[Conclusion.] To the War Department, including a copy for the Military Academy at West Point, fifty copies; to the Navy Depart-ment, including a copy for the library at the Naval Academy at Annapolis, a copy for the library of each navy-yard in the Upited States, a copy for the library of the Brooklyn Naval Lyceum, and a copy for the library of the Naval Institute at Charlestown, Massachusetts, sixty-five copies; to the Department of the Interior, including those for the use of the survey-ers-general and registers and receivers of public land-offices, two hundred and fifty copies; to the Post Office Department, fifty copies; to the Department of Justice, including those for the use of the chief and associate justices, the judges and the officers of the United States and territorial courts, four hundred and twenty five copies; to the Department of Agriculture, ave copies; to the Smithsonian Institution, two copies, to the Government Printing Office, one copy; and the Secretary of State, shall supply deficiencies and offices newly created.

SEC. 8. That the said printed copies of the said acts of each session and of the said bound copies of the acts of each Congress shall be legal evidence of the laws and treaties therein contained, in all the courts of the United States and of the several States therein.

SEC. 9. That the said laws of each session of Congress shall also be stereotyped and printed for sale as proxided in respect to the said revised statutes. And the copies of the said revised statutes and of the said laws of each session of Congress, as issued from time to time, shall be respectively sold at the cost of the paper, press work and binding, with ten per cent there-of added thereto, to any person applying for the same. And the proceeds of all sales shall be paid into the Treasury.

SEC. 10. That the Secretary of State shall cause all the copies of the Revision of Indian treaties made by Thomas J. Durant, new printed to be bound, and the same shall be deposited with the Secretary of the Interior, for the use of the De-partments and officers of the Government.

Approved, June 20, 1874.

(GENERAL NATURE—No 61.) AN ACT prohibiting the publication of the Revised Statutes of the United States in the newspapers at the expense of the United States.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Cangress assembled, That the revised Statutes of the United States and no part thereof shall be published in the newspapers at the expense of the United States.

Approved, June 20, 1874.

GENERAL NATURE-No. 62. AN ACT making appropriations for the payment of invalid and other pensions of the United States for the year anding June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and

Be it enacted by the Senate and House Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the payment of pensions for the fiscal year ending the thiertieth of June, eighteen hundred and seventy-five:

For Army pensions to invalids, widows, and dependent relatives, revolutionary pensions, and pensions to soldiers of the
