Main item of business for the Muleshoe City Council Tuesday morning was the passage of an ordinance governing Mobile Home

Parks. After several meetings of the City Planning Commission, and following revisions requested by the Muleshoe City Council, the final draft was approved with a minor change.

The caption on the ordinance reads: "An Ordinance Providing Minimum Standards for Mobile Homes and Mobile Home Parks) Establishing Requirements for the Design, Construction, Alteration, Extension and Maintenance of Mobile Home Parks and Related Utilities and Facilities; Authorizing the Issuance of Permits for Construction, Alteration and Extension of Mobile Home Parks; Authorizing the Inspection of Mobile Home Parks and Fixing Penalties for Violations; Providing an Effective Date."

A minor change approved included changing the reading from the installation of a master meter for water connections, to an optional section which will allow the developer to install individual water meters.

Briefly discussed during the meeting was the current ordinance regulating mobile homes outside of mobile home parks. No decisions were reached, although several complaints concerning the placement of mobile homes on lots were discussed.

The discussion was tabled for further study. Robert Green Inc. was awarded the bid for a new pickup for the animal warden. His low bid of \$4,580.23 for a one-half ton pickup

with an automatic transmission was approved.

Crow Chevrolet bid \$4,694 for the comparable pickup and Muleshoe Motor Company, on a comparable bid, had a bid of \$4,615.

Truck parking problems were also discussed after residents of several residential areas filed complaints about trucks obstructing streets, driveways and residential ac-

He will continue to make his headquarters at Paris, Tx., making frequent trips to Muleshoe as he has done throughout the recent corn harvest season.

Wimberly is a 1959 graduate of Texas A&M, with a degree in Agricultural Economics. He served four years in the U.S. Air Force. The Wimberlys plan to continue to make Muleshoe their home.

Wayne Crittenden joined Texas Sesame in August, 1978 as Assistant Manager in charge of Operations and Field Services. His background with the Ford Tractor Division of Ford Motor Company and other farm machinery dealerships has given him a special insight into solving problems at the elevator and for farm customers.

Wayne grew up on a farm near Spade and his parents now live in Anton. He and his wife Jean live at 210 Ave. J in Muleshoe. They are the parents of four children.

In announcing Crittenden's promotion, Parker, commented that large scale food processing has already been rejuvenated at the Company's excellent processing plant in Muleshoe. "Increased demand for food quality corn, stimulated by booming sales throughout the nation for corn chips, taco shells and other Mexican food products, can offer Muleshoe area farmers a better market for their crop," said Parker.

Adverse Weather Keeps Cotton Harvest Slow

SPS Construction Slides Presented

Ben Green, named manager of the new Southwestern Public Service Company Tolk Station under construction near Muleshoe, was guest speaker for the Muleshoe Rotary Club Tuesday at noon.

He gave a slide/discussion presentation, as he showed slides of the new coal-fired Harrington Station near Amarillo, along with a few shots of an older gas-fired generating station and Jones Station at Lubbock.

After watching the presentation, it was hard for the more than 30 Rotarians and guests to realize the large scope of the operation under construction near Muleshoe.

For instance, Green explained that by 1985, Tolk Station is expected to produce 20-25 percent of the electric power used by the one-quarter million customers in its 45,000 square mile territory served.

Tolk will be the eleventh power plant in the service area, and of that number, Tolk will make the fifth major plant, with the others being smaller and older operations.

Coal will be brought by train from Gillette, Wyo. to power the new plant, and included in the slide presentation was an overview of Harrington Station, which is also coal-fired. Green explained that the plant will burn 600 tons of coal per hour, around the clock, seven days a week.

Ginners Predicting Long Harvest Year

Last year, cotton harvesting was nearing completion in Bailey County and the entire area at this time. This year, cotton harvest, which was delayed again and again due to adverse weather conditions, was also slowed again at mid-week when another arctic cold front whistled through the area Tuesday night.

On November 29 last year, more than 55,564 bales had been ginned in the 12 cotton gins served by Bailey County Electric Cooperative and one area gin, along with some 13,000 reported by the Muleshoe Co-op Gin. At the same time this year, the rural gins had reported 9,199 and somewhere around 200 for the Muleshoe Co-op.

Hit and miss weather, including a surprise eight inch snow, have kept producers out of the fields and cotton gins idle. Just last week, farmers began stripping their fields, a move that was expected to be affected by the very cold front that moved through

the area this week.

Bright sunshine and windy days were expected to help dry out the cotton before the latest cold front, which was predicted to leave additional moisture in the form of blowing snow. However, Wednesday morning, although the sky was overcast and a cold wind blowing, no moisture had materialized. Bailey County Agent Spencer Tanksley explained that cold weather alone will not stop farmers from harvesting, but combined with wet weather, all operations will cease again.

He said not enough cotton samples have been returned to get a true picture of cotton quality. He said the short, burned up cotton in the south part of the county is not representative of the true quality of cotton which will be produced from this county this year.

Tanksley added that weather conditions and a prolonged harvest will

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Young Adults Sought For Refuge Projects

Since the Youth Conservation Corps first started working two years ago at the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge the program has proven to be so popular, that several months ago, a new program was instituted.

At the close of the regular summer YCC program, the Young Adult Conservation Corps program was begun at the nearby refuge.

This week, Andres Narvaez, Camp director in charge of the Texas Camp of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Young Adult Conservation Corp was in the area assessing the program at the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge.

He was accompanied by the local refuge by Loyd Brazzell, project investigator and in control of individual projects as well as Manuel Vega, who inventories government supplies purchased by YACC so necessary items will be assured and to account for funds used.

All the men are based in McAllen. Narvaez, who said he had come to Muleshoe to meet with Al Jones, manager of the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge, said this was his first trip to this part of the country and praised the attitude of the local people.

He said he was expecting to fully cover all aspects of

the YACC program with Jones while he was in the area.

He explained that YACC is for all young men and women between the ages of 16-23, inclusive, and said they are paid the minimum wage during the time of their employment. Narvaez added that additional workers, in fact, 14, are needed for the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge.

According to Narvaez, the young man or woman must be unemployed, out of school, although not necessarily a drop-out. He cited the instance of one young woman with a mas-

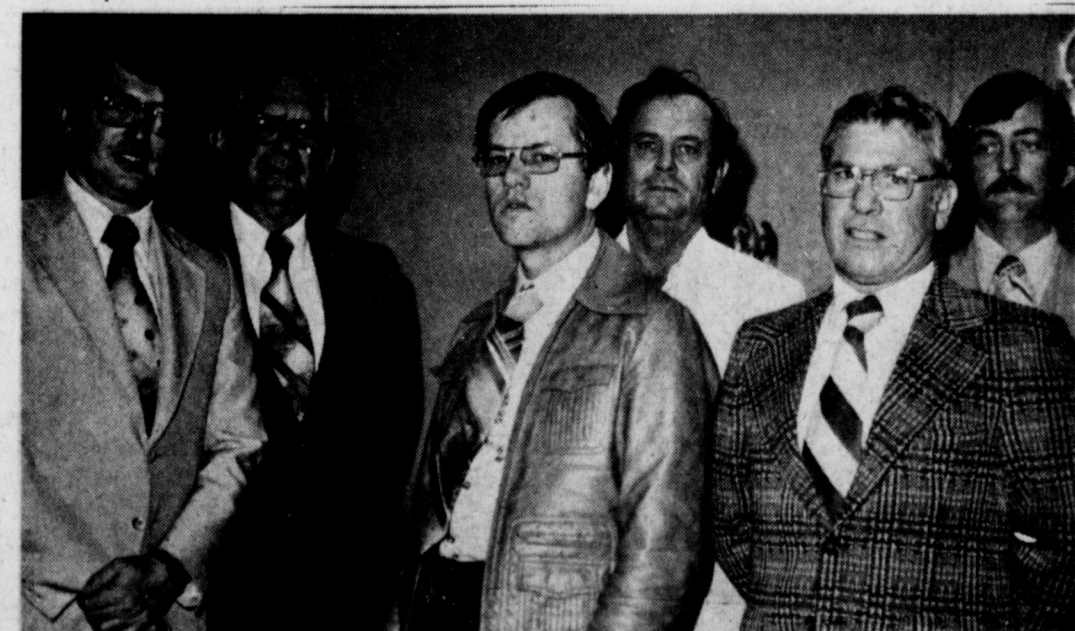

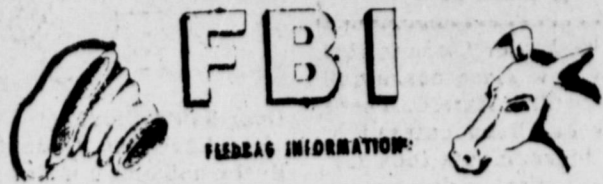

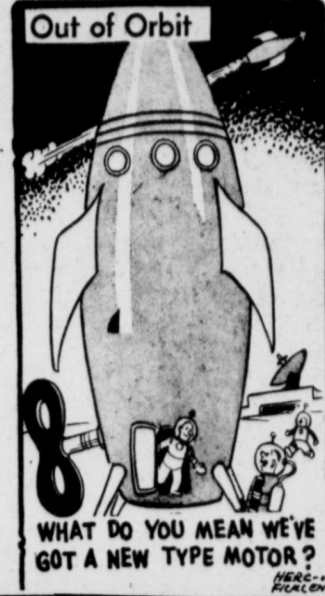
7th Grade

Rice . . . plentiful. The 1978 crop is forecast at record levels, up 39% from 1977 production and 20% above the 1975-77 average.

Wheat . . . plentiful for U.S. food needs. 1978 output to be down 12% from year-earlier levels and 15% below 1975-77 average, but large carryover stocks to keep supplies large.

Corn . . . plentiful. 1978 crop to be up 8% from previous record of a year ago and 12% above 1975-77 average.

Dry beans . . . plentiful. Production for 1978 is forecast at 16% above year-earlier levels and 10% above 1975-77 average. Larger-than-usual carryover stocks also add to supply levels.

Dry split peas . . . plentiful. Production for 1978 is forecast at 3 times the 1977 drought-reduced crop and about 79% larger than three-year average.

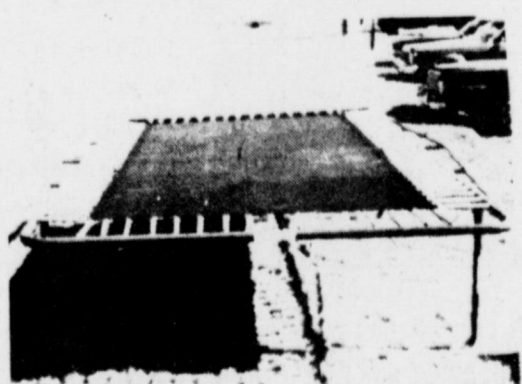

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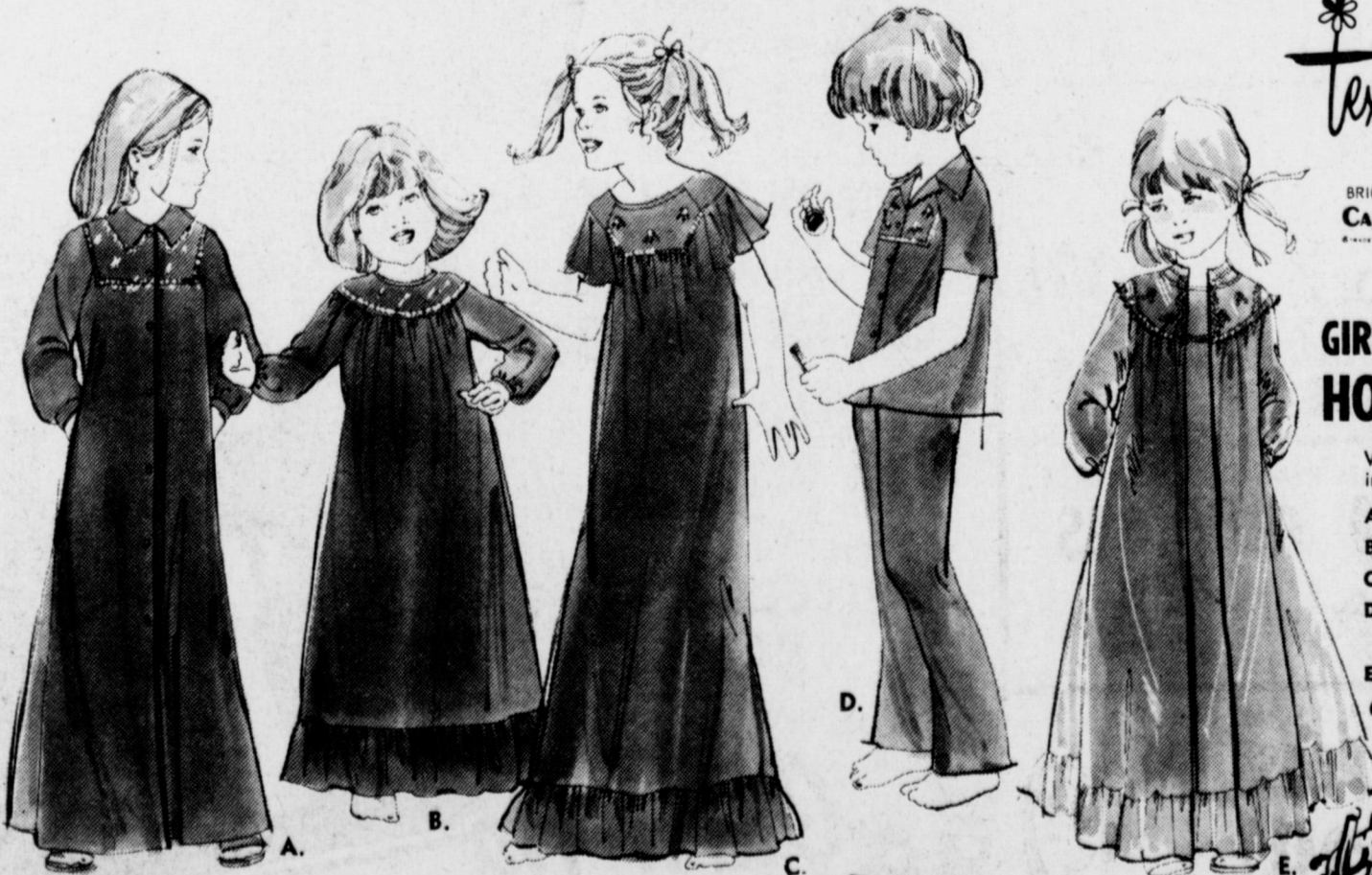

- 10 oz. frozen red raspberries, thawed
- 1/2 c walnuts, chopped
- 2 eggs
- 1 c sugar
- 1/2 t baking powder
- 1/2 t salt
- 1 t vanilla
- whipped cream topping

Combine 1 cup flour, confectioners sugar and butter; blend well. Press mixture into bottom of 13 X9 inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Cool. Drain raspberries, reserve liquid for sauce. Spoon berries over crust, sprinkle

with walnuts. Beat eggs with sugar until fluffy. Add salt, 1/4 cup flour, baking powder and vanilla. Blend well. Pour over walnuts. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes; cool. Cut into squares. Serve with whipped cream and sauce.

Raspberry Sauce

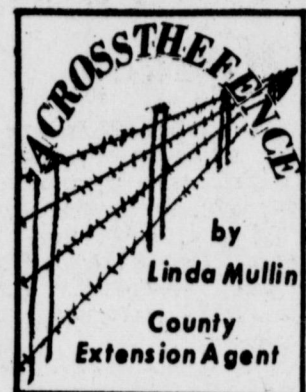
- 1/2 c water

Crisis demands action. Unless individuals and families know how to combat an upset in life's routine--and what feelings to expect, it can create an unresolved crisis.

DISORGANIZATION

In most cases, tension rises, and most people feel helpless.

RECOVERY

When people emerge from this stunned condition, they must cope with a different future life -- one changed by the traumatic event.

They have two choices -- to hide from the event or face it and fight back.

Those who choose to hide may escape into fantasy or worry, or they may retreat within themselves. Some people become resentful. Guilt feelings are

common. Also, many will deny what has happened.

To start recovery, it is important to face the crisis, not hide from it.

As a person begins to face a crisis, he can start to measure it realistically and start to get organized.

Many times, people cannot rebound by themselves.

This is when they should ask friends or trained professionals for help in dealing with the situation.

REORGANIZATION

Reorganization is the final step.

It begins once the person decides what to do and starts to accomplish the tasks.

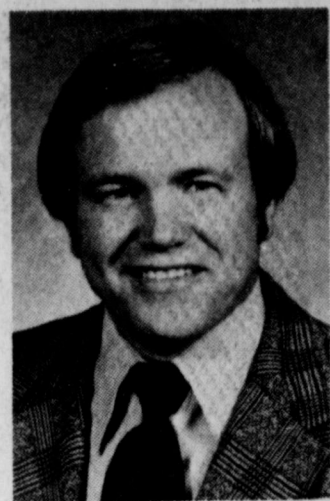

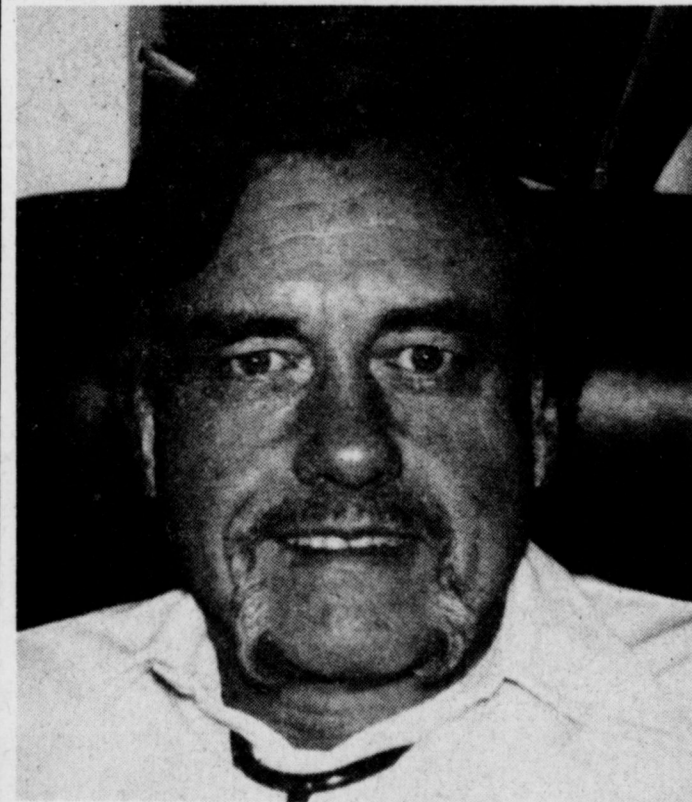

definitely affect the cotton harvest and that the cold, wet weather of three to four weeks ago will cause a lot of cotton to be spotted and tinged. He also said some producers will be more affected than other according to the varieties they planted and how tight the cotton stayed in the boll during the wet weather.

At mid-week, only some 25-30 percent of the cotton on the South Plains was harvested this year, with ginners thousands of bales behind what had been produced during the last year at the same time. Also, many farmers have stored cotton in their fields in trailers and modules waiting for ginners to catch up. Some gins are

Cotton harvesting and ginning is presently expected to continue for at least 10 more weeks, if the weather cooperates so farmers can get their crops out of the fields and to the gins.

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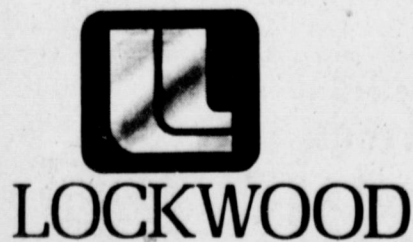

**Cotton Harvest Now
Gaining Momentum**

The High Plains cotton harvest resumed when skies cleared last Friday, according to Paul R. Dickson, Area Director at USDA's Marketing Services in Lubbock.

High Plains Marketing Services Offices graded 45,000 samples this week, bringing the season's total to 228,000. This compares to 1,813,000 graded by December 1 last year, Dickson said.

Predominant High Plains grades this week were grade 41 at 15 percent, grade 51 accounted for 20 percent, grade 42 amounted to 37 percent and grade 52 was 20 percent. Twenty three percent were reduced one grade because of bark, according to the Marketing Service. Five percent was reduced because of grass.

Staple lengths were mostly staple 31 at 26 percent, staple 32 was 38 percent and staple 33 ac-

counted for 19 percent. Micronaire was mostly in the desirable 3.5 - 4.9 range at 80 percent of the total. Twenty percent was lower.

Breaking strength averaged 87,000 pounds per square inch.

Cotton prices were steady to firm the week ending November 30.

Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30 - 33, mikes 3.5 - 4.9 around 59.45 cents per pound. New crop lots of mostly grades 43 and 53, staples 30 and 31, mikes 3.5 - 4.9 brought about 54.35 cents.

Gins paid growers \$110 to \$130 per ton for cottonseed, mostly \$115 to \$130.

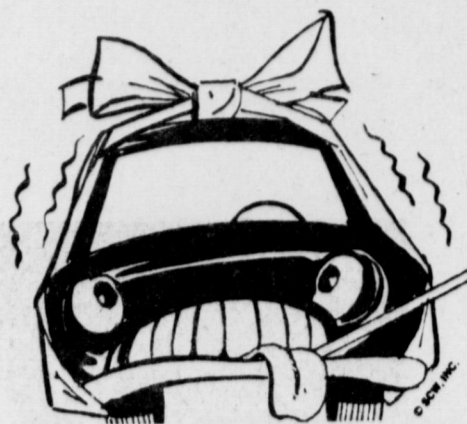

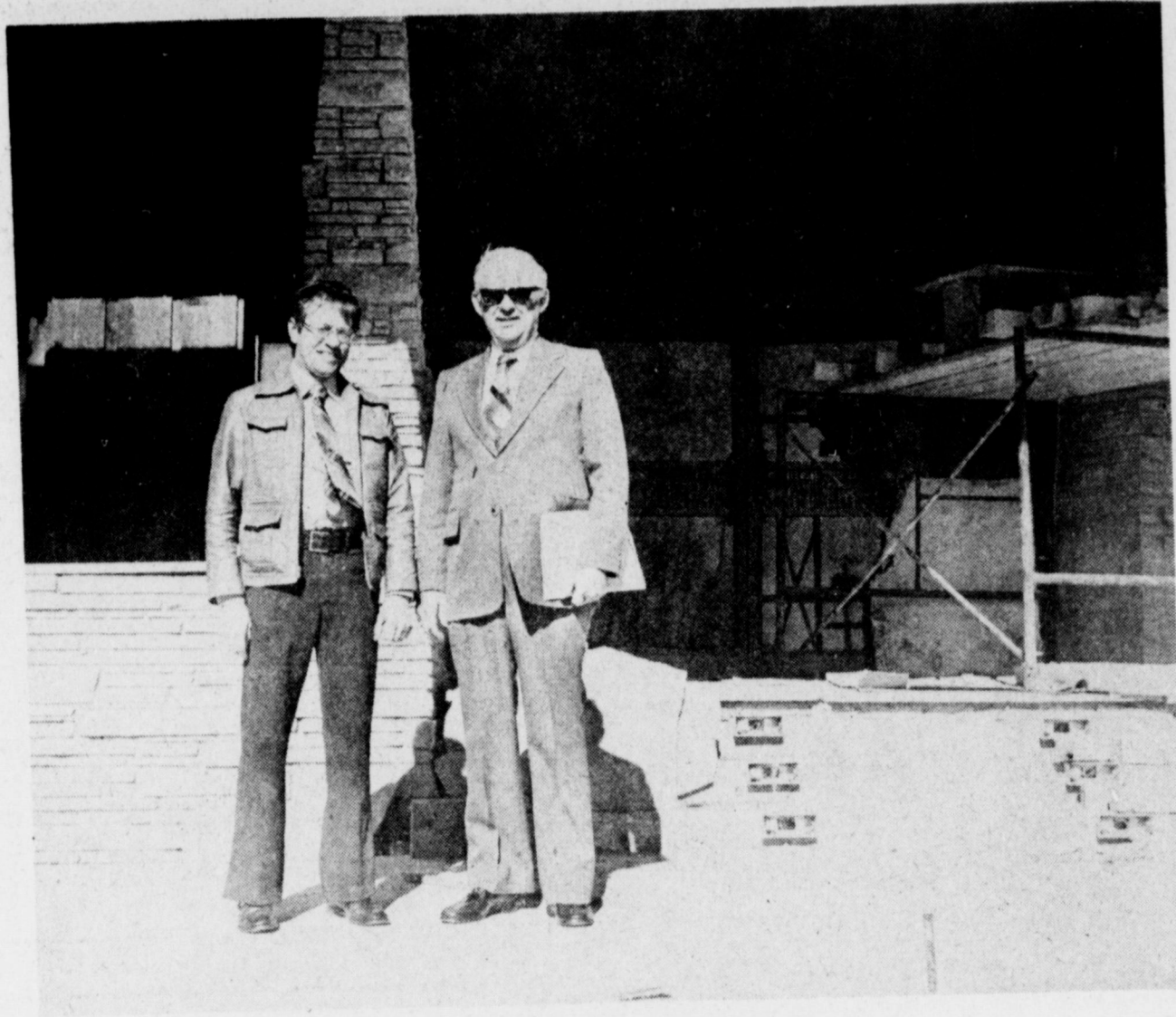

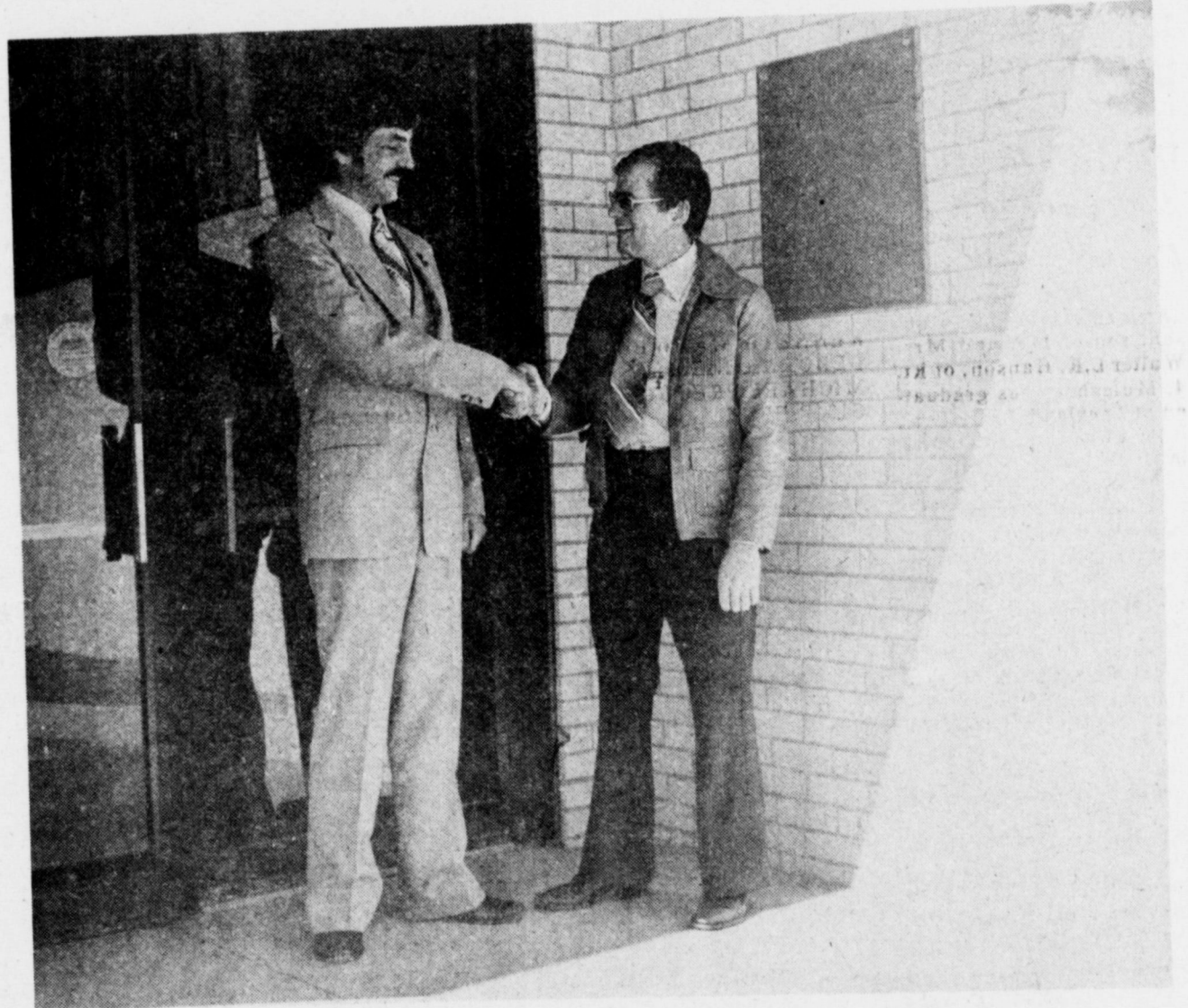

Hay Testing Is Advised By Experts

Hay is now being fed in many areas of the state, yet most producers do not know the quality of hay they have. Since much of the 1978 hay crop was of low quality due to dry conditions, producers should consider having their hay tested. A hay test to determine

the protein content is helpful in several respects, points out Al Novosad, forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Protein content relates to production practices which influence quality, such as maturity and fertilization, and also provide a guide as to feeding such hay according to its nutritional value. Different classes or types of beef cattle have different nutritional requirements, emphasizes Novo-

sad. Animal nutritionists say that beef cattle cannot meet their requirements for protein when hay is 7 percent crude protein or below. Yet a recent summary of hay tests conducted for producers by the Forage Testing Service at Texas A&M University revealed that 39 percent of the Coastal bermudagrass hay tested 7 percent or below. The summary also indicated that more than 65 percent of such hay as bahiagrass,

sudan, sorghum, blue-stems and Johnsongrass tested 7 percent crude protein or below. A hay test for protein is therefore encouraged because of the variability, says Novosad. Hay samples can be tested at several public and private laboratories over the state, including the A&M Forage Testing Service. County Extension Agents have information for submitting hay samples for testing at Texas A&M.
