PASSED AT THE FIRST SESSION OF THE FOR TY THIRD CONGRESS.

[GENERAL NATURE-No. 64.] AN ACT to fix the time for the election of Representatives in the Forty fourth Congress from the State of Mississippi. [Conclusion.]

And said accountant or accountants shall take an cath to faithfully discharge the duties imposed by this act. Said board of audit shall give notice for the presentation of the claims bereinbriore specified in such manner as may be deemed neces-tary; and no claim shall be audited or al-lowed unless presented within ninety days after the first publication of such notice, and said board shall make full report of all their acts and proceedings to the Pres-sident, to be by him transmitted to Con-gress on the first day of the next session thereof. Each of the said officers consti tuting said board shall be paid the sum of two thousand dollars for his services under this act, out of the funds of said District, in addition to his present compensa

That the sinking-fund commissioners of said District are hereby continued; and it shall be the duty of said sink ing foud commissioners to cause bonds of the District of Columbia to be prepared, in sums of fifty and five hundred dollars, bearing date August first, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, payable fifty years after date, bearing interest at the rate of surec and sixty five bundredths per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, to be signed by the secretary and the treasurer of said sinking fund commissioners and countersigned by the by the comptroller of said District, and scaled as the board may direct; which bonds shall be exempt from taxation by Federal, State, or municipal authority, engraved and printed at the expense of the District of Columbia, and in form not inconsistent therewith. and the faith of the United States is hereby pledged that the United States will, by proper proportional appropriations as con-templated in this act, and by causing to be levied upon the property within said District such taxes as will provide the revenues necessary to pap the interest on said bonds as the same may become due and payable, and create a sinkink-fund for the payment of the principal thereof at maturity. Said bonds shall be number-ed consecutively, and registered in the office of the Register of the Treasury of the United States, for which last named registration the Secretary of the Treasury shall make such provision as may be necessary And said commissioners shall use all necessary means for the prevention of any unauthorized oo frau-lulent issue of any of such bonds. And the sinking-fund com missioners are hereby anthorized to exchange said bonds at par for like sums of any class of indebtedness in the preceding section of this act named, including sewer taxes or assessments paid, evidenced by certificates of the auditing board provided

SEC. 8. That the authority conterred on the board of public works to issue addi-tional certificates of indebtedness by section four of the act of the legislative assembly approved on the 29th day of May, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, is hereby annulled. No property shall be advestised for sale of sold for the collec-tion of any assessment authorized by the legislative assembly by the act entitled "An act creating drainage and sewerage sections in the cities of Washington and orgetown, in the District of Columbia, and providing for the payment of the con-struction of sewers and drains therein by sements and issuing certificates there for" approved on the twenty-sixth day of June, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, until otherwise ordered by Congress; and it shall be unlawful to issue an further certificates of indebteduess authorized by

constitute such board or commission.
