Indian Territorial Elections.

PARSONS, KAS., August 17.—At
 the recent election in the Choctaw
 and Chickasaw Nations, of the In-
 dian Territory, Coleman Cole was
 elected Governor of the Choctaw
 Nation, and Frank Overton Gov-
 ernor of the Chickasaw Nation. This
 is a triumph of progressive prin-
 ciples.

It is understood that Col. C. Bou-
 dinett will in a few days deliver a
 speech at Vinita, Cherokee Nation,
 in response to an invitation from
 his fellow citizens of that nation.
 The Colonel will say some plain
 words on the subject of Territorial
 organization, allotments of lands,
 property and political rights, and
 the advancement of the people in
 the Indian Territory.

Reports from Gen. Ord.

OMAHA, NEB., August 17.—The
 following telegram was received by
 Gen. Ord to day from Fort Fetter-
 man, Wyo. A Cheyenne half breed,
 from Powder River, reports that at
 a council of Cheyennes and Arapahoes
 it was decided to recall all
 hostile parties from the vicinity of
 the railroad and return to the ag-
 ency. That about 200 lodges of Chey-
 ennes passed 35 miles north of this
 post Friday, en route to the agency.
 That they were very hungry and
 eating their horses. I send this in-
 formation for what it is worth.

SPAIN.

NEW YORK, August 17.—A Pa-
 ris correspondent says that three
 Carlist officers, responsible for the
 execution of the German, Schmidt,
 have been arrested. After Schmidt's
 execution they were arrested and
 sent to Paris, whence they were taken
 to the Belgian frontier. The
 Belgian authorities re-expelled
 them. They then returned to Paris,
 and were arrested at the railway
 station. Their names are Leopold
 Gallatie, aged 22; Louis, aged 19;
 and Pascale Jaque, aged 42.

ITALY.

NEW YORK, August 17.—A Eu-
 ropean letter says Italy seems to
 become more hopelessly bankrupt.
 The people are sincerely loyal to
 their king. The ministers are al-
 most pedantically attached to the
 English theory of Parliamentary
 government. The States ask nothing
 better than to leave the church
 alone, but they have no bread and
 no specie, and they have floods, ma-
 laria, bandits and paper money.

Arrest of an Alleged Horse Thief

SPRINGFIELD, MO., August 17.—
 Great excitement prevails here to-
 day over the arrest of one George
 Deskin, alias James Gibson, on the
 charge of horse stealing, who claims
 to have herded cattle near Wichita,
 Kas., for John Bryden. When
 arrested he had in his possession
 one pair of saddle-bags filled with
 revolvers, one gray mare 7 years
 old, and a small black mare 5 years
 old. He was identified by Detec-
 tive Zork as George Deskin, who
 left his home near Little Pinery nine
 years ago and joined a band of gue-
 rillas. Then he was identified by
 Chris. Richardson, a teamster, who
 was an eye witness to the killing of
 Parson New, in Arkansas, last
 spring, as one of the five Layton
 Pinery robbers and perpetrators of
 that foul deed. Richardson also
 identified James Long as another
 of the robbers. Deskin, in default
 of bail, was placed in jail until his
 trial on Wednesday.

An Unpleasantness at a School

Dedication.

NEW YORK, August 17.—At the
 dedication of the St. Anthony's Pa-
 rochial School, yesterday, the har-
 mony was marred by a dispute be-
 tween the Italian society of the
 church and father James. The so-
 ciety desired to carry the Italian
 flag in the procession, but the Fa-
 ther insisted that they should march
 under the pontifical flag. Extreme
 feeling was displayed by some of
 the members, and, rather than sur-
 render the emblem of the unity of
 Italy, the society dispersed. The
 other nationalities, Ireland, Ameri-
 ca and Belgium, were represented
 by their respective flags.

Notice to Republicans.

BRENNHAM, TEXAS,
August 20, 1874.

Upon consultation with leading Republicans from all parts of the State, it is deemed advisable to recommend that conventions be held in each Congressional District as early as the 15th of September. Chairmen of Congressional Executive Committees are requested to issue calls at once for such conventions, to meet at some central point in each District at the time indicated, or at such other time as may be most suitable.

The conventions thus assembled may nominate candidates for Congress, or take such other action as may be deemed best for the welfare and benefit of the Republican party, at their discretion.

THE REPUBLICANS of this State must, and they will, run candidates for Congress wherever the Democratic nominee indorses the administration of Gov. Coke.

COKE was indorsed at the Brenham Convention. Will Hancock have the courage of Throckmorton, and repudiate the indorsement so far as he is concerned? We shall see. If not, he will have a Republican opponent in the field.

THE CHAIRMAN of the State Republican Executive Committee, Dr. Boulds Baker, issues a call for Congressional Conventions of Republicans in all the six Districts of the State. We publish it in this issue. We hope these conventions will be held as soon as possible.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTIONS are being held in the various counties of the sixth District. We hope every county will act promptly, and be certain to secure representation in the District Congressional Convention which meets on the 9th of September in this city.

COKE'S indorsement is going to split the Democratic party in this State. Two of their Congressional Conventions have already been held, and nominated anti-Coke men, Throckmorton and Hancock, and, at the same time, passed Coke resolutions. The candidates will have to repudiate the Coke resolutions or be beaten. They will repudiate, and then the split will become wider.

SETH SHEPHERD was Coke's candidate for Congress at Brenham, and was defeated. The Coke candidate in Throckmorton's District was beaten out of sight. These are the straws that show the way the breeze tends, that is soon to be a howling storm.

IN THE Cheney Whitehouse case, Judge Williams decided in favor of Rev. Charles E. Cheney and against Bishop Whitehouse, in the Circuit Court in Chicago last Saturday. He decided that Cheney had never been legally deposed from the Protestant Episcopal ministry, because the court that tried him was not legally constituted. Mr. Cheney is now a Bishop of the Reformed Episcopal Church, and Bishop Whitehouse has recently died.

A PARIS correspondent of the London Times says that three socialist members of the German Reichstag—Haszelmann, Regner and Hazenlever—were tried at Berlin for attending meetings of the Workman's Society, after it had been ordered by the police to discontinue its gatherings. Hazenlever was convicted, and sentenced to two months' imprisonment.

COKE has borrowed \$498,000 in currency for which the State will have to pay \$600,000, and seven per cent gold interest annually as long as she owes the debt. Hurrah for the "retrenchment and reform" party! Texas needs Davis back at the door of her Treasury. But she has chosen "Cokery," and must stand it for three and a half years longer. Won't she be sick, though, by that time. Indorse Coke at Goliad and the other conventions! Yes, by all means. "It will ruin the party if you don't," says the convenient special Judge Ferris; it will ruin the party if you do, say we; and we don't care a straw which you do or don't.

THE editor of the State Gazette, Col. J. John D. Elliott, is informed that the gentleman whom he seeks to assail by dirty personalities, has never stolen any money from a brother editor, nor from a trusting lady friend. Perhaps Col. Elliott would like to know who has done these things. Should Col. Elliott prosecute his inquiries with diligence, he will most probably be successful in obtaining the desired information. We not only have the name of the person, but also the history of the cases, and the proofs at hand. Let us hear from you again, Colonel. You are an inquiring youth, and we have some information which we are holding for your personal enjoyment.

ANOTHER STRAW.—The Galveston News, speaking of the proposed Constitutional Convention in this State, recommends that we adopt some of the reforms lately proposed and partially adopted by the Arkansas Convention. One of these, which the News quotes, is as follows: "The removal of the incumbents of all offices by the election of successors." Well, the Democracy can afford to indorse Coke at the Congressional Conventions, since they intend to repudiate him at the Constitutional Convention. The split between "Cokery" and Democracy is beginning to gape open, wider and wider. The breach cannot be healed.

HON. E. DRONER, of this city, has been importuned for months past to allow the use of his name as a candidate for Congress in the Sixth District, but has so far declined to give any definite answer. Mr. Degner has no superior in this District, and has the confidence of all parties. He would get a much larger German vote than any other candidate in the District.

GEN. JOHN B. BAYLOR, we are glad to see, is making serious trouble for the canker-ridden, brass-collar Democracy. If he had had the courage to throw his colors to the breeze as an independent candidate from the first, his chances would have been much better. He is not the man to be hampered by the tricks and intrigues of wire-working canker politicians, and he stands no chance among them. But he does know how to bear himself before the hardy sons of the frontier.

HON. WESLEY OGDEN, late of the Supreme Court, is spoken of as a probable candidate for Congress in the Sixth District. He is one of the ablest men in the State, and of unblemished character. His residence is in Calhoun county.

Mr. Washburn, the School Teacher who was outrageously whipped in Gaudalope County, Replies to the State Gazette.

Editor Express:

Permit me through your columns to refute the statements made by the Austin Gazette. I am preparing a full statement, a copy of which shall be sent to the Governor of Texas, giving full particulars of said outrage. Meanwhile, in regard to the efforts some evil-disposed persons at Seguin are making, to injure my reputation, I unhesitatingly declare that the reports they are circulating are utterly false, and I do most emphatically brand their authors as consummate liars. Has not nearly every Northern missionary and teacher who has crossed Mason & Dixon's line to engage in the noble work of educating the colored people, been slandered by bitter venomous spiteful men? What better treatment can we expect from those iniquitous men who are plotting to rob the colored man of his God-given rights?

Having endured inhuman scourgings at the hands of Texan conspirators, I do not think their slanderous tongues can do me any serious injury.

Shall I give up this good work now, because I have had to endure persecution? "Perish the thought!"

The report that the perpetrators of those monstrous outrages upon the members of the Gesner family and myself were colored men, is so superlatively absurd, that I can not think that any sane man will believe it for one single moment.

Who could be wicked enough to accuse the peaceable law-abiding colored citizens of Cottonwood Colony of being guilty of such a foul crime? Certainly none but those white men who participated in the outrage, or their abettors. The Gesners and myself know that the men who committed the outrage were white men. Moreover, their so-called "Captain" said to me: "Mr. Washburn, we are all white men, and are all citizens of Gaudalope county. We can see you every day; should you remain in the Colony a few days you will be very likely to meet some of us whom you will recognize, but if you tell anybody that you know we are the men who whipped you to-night, you will never leave this county alive."

The Gazette says I had enemies among the Freedmen at Cottonwood Colony. It is not true. I had not one to my knowledge. Neither are any of the charges against my character by the Gazette true.

But the truth will be all told very soon. Half of it has not been told yet.

Five men, Williams, Robertson, Perry, McGuire and Ross, were hanged at Napoleonville, La., last Friday, for the murder of Eastwood, an old flatboatman.

Before dying, Reed stated he was the leader of a band that committed the Iowa and Gad's Hill, Missouri, robberies, the Saint Genevieve robbery and also asserted that he robbed the San Antonio and Austin stages, and had committed several similar robberies in Arizona, California, Nevada and Oregon. He would not give the names of his confederates, but declared positively that neither Arthur McCoy, nor the Younger, or James brothers had anything to do with these robberies.

Brownsville Republican Convention.

MR. JOSEPH W. BLAIN, as we learn from the *Gonzales Index*, was killed by a colored man named Buck Grant, near Harwood, on Tuesday last. The *Index* says:

Mr. Blain had several wagons running between Harwood and Gonzales, hauling material for the iron bridge at Gonzales, and loaded his wagons at Harwood, on Tuesday. Mr. Parke and Mr. Blain rode out on horseback some time after the wagons had left, and after going about two miles, they met a negro man on horse back. He halted and asked them if they could tell him where a man named Butler lived. Mr. Blain asked him what Butler was there for. The negro answered "just Butler, and he lives around in this brush somewhere." The negro being asked where he lived, stated that he lived at Butler's, and had lived there a month or more. He further stated that he had lived at Lewis Lankins, across the San Marcos river. To the question where he was then from, he said from Lavaca county. Mr. Parke noticing the quantity of baggage the negro carried, said that he was so packed up, there must be something wrong. Blain then said he thought the negro had stolen the horse he was riding, and that they had better take him back to town. Mr. Parke or Mr. Blain then took hold of the negro's bridle, when the negro leaped off and ran. Blain also leaped off his horse and pursued him. After running twenty or thirty yards, Blain came up within six feet, when the negro turned and shot him in the groin, severing the main artery. Mr. Blain lived but about thirty minutes, and did not speak except to tell Mr. Parke he was shot, and to ask him to catch the negro. The negro then returned, shot at Mr. Parke, and killed his horse, then ran covering his own horse, mounted him and escaped. The negro left his hat which will help in his identification. There can be but little doubt but the murderer is named Buck Grant, and lives at San Marcos. A strong posse is in pursuit of him.

HON. JERRE GALVAN, of Brownsville, is mentioned by his friends as a candidate for Congress in the Sixth District. Mr. Galvan is a genial, intelligent and very popular man, and has great influence on the Rio Grande, and throughout the West.

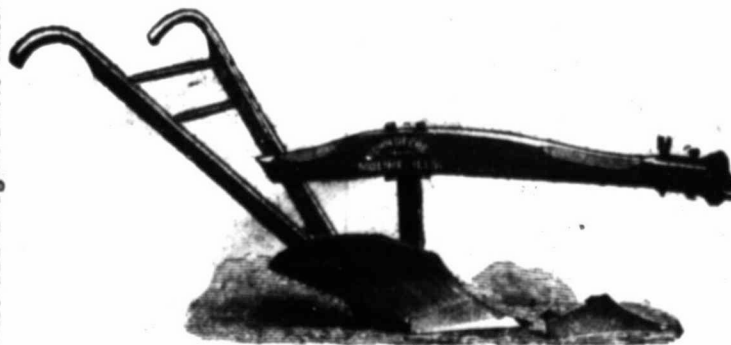

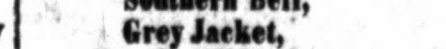

LAW
OF THE
UNITED STATES,
PASSED AT THE
FIRST SESSION OF THE FOR-
TY-THIRD CONGRESS.

(GENERAL NATURE—No. 66.)
AN ACT to encourage the establishment of public marine schools.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Navy, to promote nautical education, is hereby authorized and empowered to furnish, upon the application in writing of the Governor of the State, a suitable vessel of the Navy, with all her apparel, charts, books, and instruments of navigation, provided the same can be spared without detriment to the naval service, to be used for the benefit of any nautical school, or school or college having a nautical branch, established at each or any of the ports of New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Norfolk, and San Francisco, upon the condition that there shall be maintained, at such port, a school or branch of a school for the instruction of youths in navigation, seamanship, marine engineering and all matters pertaining to the proper construction, equipment and sailing of vessels or any particular branch thereof: And the President of the United States is hereby authorized, when in his opinion the same can be done without detriment to the public service, to detail proper officers of the Navy as superintendents of, or instructors in, such schools: Provided, That if any such school shall be discontinued, or the good of the naval service shall require, such vessel shall be immediately restored to the Secretary of the Navy, and the officers so detailed recalled: And provided further, That no person shall be sentenced to, or received at, such schools as a punishment, or commutation of punishment for crime.

Approved, June 20, 1874.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all the western portion of the State of Kansas, included as follows, to-wit, commencing at the northeast corner of township ten of range sixteen, and running thence west to the western boundary of the State; thence south, along said boundary line, to the fourth standard parallel; thence east, along said parallel line, to the southeast corner of Rush County; thence north to the place of beginning, be, and hereby is, constituted a new land-district, and hereby is, constituted a new land-district, to be called the western land district.

Sec. 2. That all the western portion of the State of Kansas, included as follows, to-wit, commencing at the northeast corner of Barton county, and running thence west to the northwest corner of said county; thence west along the fourth standard parallel line to the western boundary of the State; thence south along said boundary line to the southern boundary of the State; thence east along said boundary-line to the southeast corner of Barton county; thence north to the place of beginning, be, and hereby is, constituted a new land-district, to be called the Arkansas Valley land-district; and shall, in addition, include in the district the lands lying in Rice and Reno counties.

Approved, June 20, 1874.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 68.]

AN ACT to create an additional land district in the Territory of Colorado.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all that part of the Territory of Colorado commencing at a point on the south boundary line of Colorado Territory between ranges sixty nine and seventy west of the sixth principal meridian; thence running north, to the northern boundary of township twenty-eight south; thence west, on a line between townships twenty-seven and twenty-eight south, to the western boundary of range seventy-three west; thence north, on said boundary of range-seventy-three west, to a point where the line between townships forty-eight and forty-nine north, New Mexico meridian, will intersect the same; thence west, between said townships forty-eight and forty-nine north, to the western boundary of the Territory; thence south, with said boundary line, to the southwest corner of the Territory; thence east, on the line of the southern boundary of the Territory, to the place of beginning, shall constitute a separate land-district, to be called the Del Norte land district, the office of which shall be located at Del Norte, in Conejos County: Provided, That the President of the United States may change the location of said land office from time to time, as the public interest may require.

Sec. 2. That the President shall appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a register and a recorder of public lands for said district; and said officers shall reside in the place where said land office is located, and shall have the same powers and shall receive the same fees and emoluments as the like officers now receive in the other land districts in said Territory.

Approved, June 20, 1874.
