"COKE AND CORTINA" is the title of an appropriate and ingenious editorial in the Brownsville Ranchero. It cites the murders and robberies of Mexicans out West by Coke's rangers, and quotes the threats of Cortina's newspaper to retake West Texas and re-annex it to Mexico. This looks like Coke and Cortina were laboring by agreement to get up a war between Mexico and the United States, that both of them might make political for themselves.

CHARLIE STEWART, in a speech at the Democratic convention of Harris county the other day, gave great praise to the Democracy of that county for overcoming the stronghold of Republicanism in that place. Let us tell Mr. Stewart that the Democracy never gained that victory. While the Houston Union lived, under the editorial regime that made it powerful, Democracy had no chance in Harris county. But when the Union, and also the Republican party, were sacrificed to the interests of corrupt tricksters, the Democrats had nothing to do but walk over the track. Put the Union back where it was, and the Democracy of Harris would be again thrashed out like a sheaf of wheat.

PROF. A. R. ROESSLER, last spring, showed us the outlines of a new map of Texas which he was then preparing, more complete in every respect than any map of the State we have ever had before. It is now out, and the Austin Statesman thus speaks of it: We have been presented by Mr. A. R. Roessler, the publisher, with one of his late and improved maps of this State, which fills a need that has long been felt. The counties created at the last session of the Legislature appear upon the map, as also much valuable information regarding the area and geology of the State: the enumeration of the principal minerals, rocks, soils, and timber varieties, arranged according to counties, etc., as also information in regard to railroads, completed and in contemplation. In short, it is a complete and valuable map, selling at from 75 cents to 2 dollars a copy.

STILL ANOTHER STRAW.—The Houston Telegraph, which is compelled to give Coke a quasi support, for fear of delay in the payment of its warrants for doing the public printing, is nevertheless bitterly opposed to "backwoods Democracy" of which Coke is the leader in this State. Coke, also, was a supporter of Seth Shepherd against Hancock in the Brenham Convention. Yet see how the Telegraph rejoices in the defeat of the Coke men in the nomination of Hancock. It says: After a long filibustering movement John Hancock, National Democrat, was chosen as the candidate for the fifth Congressional district. The Bourbon or backwoods Democrats were routed, horse, foot and dragons, and Texas will rejoice. It is doubtful whether the Republicans of this district will place a candidate in the field against Hancock, for he has heretofore shown himself an official who will do justice to both parties, and rise above the exactions of political whippers in and their allies. The Bourbons fought hard and died harder.

Truth Stranger than Fiction. A Wisconsin paper has the following strange story: A pardon has been issued by Gov. Taylor to James B. Carter, who has spent over seven years in Waupun on a life sentence for murder, of which he was convicted largely on his own admission, at the LaCrosse county court, in 1867, but of which it now appears, he was innocent. He was living with a shoemaker named Ira B. Wheeler, in Pepin county. He and his wife differed, and she was regarded as quite loose. Quarreling about some shoe pegs she brushed over with her dress while he was at work, she picked up a hatchet, struck him in the

head, and killed him. Carter, horror struck, saw the deed, and attempted to fly, but threats of accusing him of the murder and persuasion induced him to stay and help hide the body. Suspicion was aroused, and both were arrested. On the plea that by confessing the guilt himself he could secure Mrs. Wheeler's discharge, and then her testimony, with other influences, could be used to secure his release, he was induced by counsel to admit the crime. Both, however, were convicted. The woman's discharge was secured by a writ of error on technical grounds, and Carter sent to state prison. His brother has persistently labored to prove Carter innocent and secure the release, and to day left for Waupun with a free pardon granted by the executive on a mass of documents showing the above facts, the man's good conduct in prison, etc. The official statement of the reasons for the pardon relates that the record showed the man was made a victim of the woman Wheeler and her friends, and pardon is recommended among others by the judge who sentenced him, the district attorney who prosecuted, and five of the jurors, several of the witnesses for the state, county officials and nearly 600 citizens of Pepin.

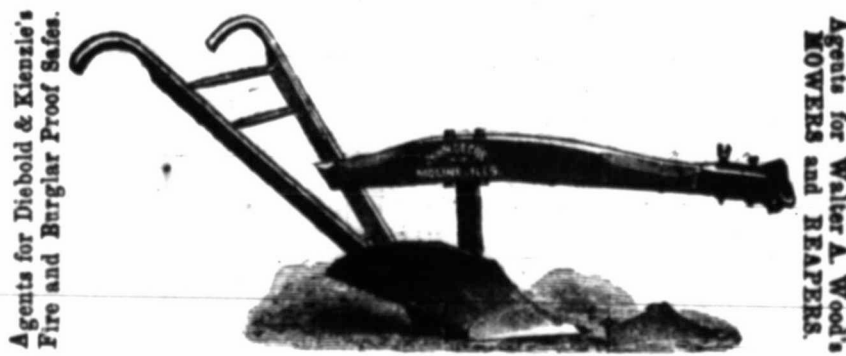
