SCHLEICHER is Ireland's man. The Ireland vote of 30 in the convention held together, and commanded the situation until they found the moment to bring forward Schleicher, and then the Stockdale men came to their help.

A JUDAS KISS.—Burgess of Gonzales, one of Ireland's men, after the Goliad Convention adjourned, offered a resolution to indorse the Democracy of Maj. Brackenridge!

FRENCH SMITH, "the mouth-piece of John Ireland," in a speech at the Goliad Convention, said that "be loved to kill Indians, but he would rather kill two negroes than one Indian." The Convention did not rebuke him, and, by silence, indorsed him. Smith is from Guadalupe county, where they recently whipped Mr. Washburn for teaching colored children how to read. All right.

MORGAN took \$500,000 of Coke's bonds, and the Express said at the time that he would ask favors of Texas in payment for it. The first payment he asks is, that we shall elect his engineer to Congress. This is not the end, either. Let Coke and his Legislature pay him. Western Texas, and especially San Antonio, have nothing to pay him for but the injury he has done us. Schleicher buys and sells land for him, and helps him to make money at the expense of Western Texas and San Antonio. Let Schleicher look to his master, Chas. Morgan, for his rewards. We want neither him nor Morgan, and will not touch them.

COKE'S administration has broken down our public schools, and yet the Goliad Convention indorses it, and gives us a Coke nominee for Congress. In this city two gentlemen advertise to teach a pay school in one of our public school buildings, for \$3 and \$4 a month per scholar. The masses of the people are not able to pay it. Their children must quit going to school. Shall the masses of the people be compelled to support an administration that has done them this injury? Will they support Coke's man, and Morgan's monopoly tool? No, never!

Beecher Items. Moulton refused to be cross examined, and the committee therefore refused to receive his long statement. Moulton says he has "said his say," and will say no more.

Beecher is to deliver a series of lectures in Boston this fall. Mrs. S. B. Anthony indignantly scolds Bessie's account of her sitting on Tilton's lap. Mrs. Tilton is still sojourning with Mrs. Ovington in the country. Tilton admits that he and the ancient Susan were caught in an embarrassing attitude. Mr. Ovington speaks of Bessie Turner as an honest, spirited, fascinating girl, devoted to Mrs. Tilton, and averse to Tilton.

The pulpits of nearly all the churches in the North speak strongly in favor of Beecher. Beecher is quiet and silent in the White Mountains, and pays no attention to Moulton's long statement. Interviewers can get nothing out of him.

The Tilton lawsuits do not seem to be regarded as of any importance by the lawyers on either side. Tilton and two stenographers are engaged on another "statement." Good Lord deliver us!

Mr. Sage, chairman of the investigating committee, describes the scene at Mr. Beecher's house when his statement was read. Astonishing as it may seem, Mr. Beecher had never told his wife or any member of his family the facts of this case. By special request all were present on that occasion, with a single exception. Mrs. Stowe was there, and Mrs. Beecher sat by her husband's side, with one of his hands in both of hers—the wife by this simple act expressing, as words could not ex-

press, her confidence in her husband's innocence.

Rev. Dr. Leonard Bacon, whose foolish denunciation of Tilton, as "a knave and a dog," precipitated the whole scandal, is satisfied with Beecher's statement.

The New Chicago Elevator.

ARMOUR DOLE & CO.'s new elevator "C," near Halsted and Twenty-second streets, was opened for business yesterday. It measures 31x100 feet, is 92 feet high, has 30 bins, holding 1,500,000 bushels, and floor capacity for 250,000 bushels, making a total capacity of 1,750,000 bushels. One thousand cords of masonry form the foundation, and in the superstructure are 4,000,000 feet of lumber and 1,000,000 brick. There are twenty-two elevators with TWENTY-TWO FAIRBANKS' 500-bushel hopper scales. The building cost \$300,000.—Chicago Journal.

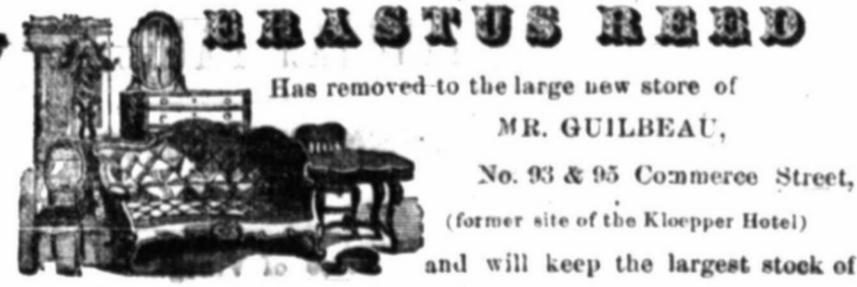

Call for a Mass-Meeting of Republicans.

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 17, '74. O no! Schleicher won't do.

San Antonio will not sell out to Schleicher.

THE frontier people will never support Schleicher.

THE Rio Grande vote will be cast almost solidly against Schleicher.

Victoria, Indianola, Corpus Christi, Texana and Brownsville are all against Schleicher.

THE Democracy of this State have no use for a soldier of the late war—Confederate or Federal. They ignored Tom Harrison and took Coke. They ignored Tom Brackenridge, and took Schleicher. And now they are trying to beat the gallant Col. Mills with Charlie Stewart of Houston. They are also trying to beat Herndon with Reagan. The Democratic leaders of Texas are the stay-at-home speculators during the war, the mossbacks, the homeguards,—the men who wanted to fight awfully before the war, and want to fight awfully since the war, but who fought none during the war. Out with them, and down with them, ex-Confederates.

WEST TEXAS VS. SCHLEICHER.—Western Texas cannot afford to elect Schleicher to Congress. He represents nothing in which she is interested, and can promote nothing in which she is interested. He represents everything to which she is opposed, and everything that is opposed to her.

She is interested in the protection of the frontier by the General Government. Schleicher is not interested in it, and he is Morgan's man. He owns land on the frontier, but so do men in Galveston, New York, and London. He not only feels no interest in the frontier, but he is not the man to do anything for it if he did. He has no experience in frontier matters, and no aptitude for them.

And the frontier men feel no interest in him; they have no confidence in him; they had no voice in his nomination; they were not represented in the convention; they were overruled by the trading ring of political gamblers that made up the convention; and they ought to hold those men to account for their conduct for all time to come.

Western Texas is interested in the improvement of her coast harbors. Schleicher is not interested in any such thing. He is interest-

ed against such improvements. He is Morgan's man; Morgan is opposed to the improvement of our harbors, and the deepening of our bars; because such improvements would take out of his hands the monopoly of the trade to our ports which he now controls.

Western Texas is interested in the extension of railroads into and through her territory. Schleicher is interested in opposing such railroad extension for the benefit of Western Texas. He is Morgan's man, and Morgan is interested in keeping the terminus of his railroad at Cuero, the present centre of the hide and wool trade, because he thinks he can control that trade without the expense of building an other mile of railroad; because he can make better speculations in land, and in town lots, in that region, than at San Antonio. He is actually trying to run the village of Cuero against San Antonio as the centre of the export and import trade of Western Texas.

The contest in this case is really between our frontier interests, our railroad interests, our port interests, the San Antonio interests, and the interests of the Rio Grande, on the one side, and the interests of Morgan, of Schleicher, and of Cuero, on the other. No true friend of either of these interests can vote for Morgan's agent in speculation.

OUR AUSTIN LETTER.

The Sixth Congressional District Viewed from the Capital—Bexar Defeated—Chas. Morgan Names the Congressman—Mr. Schleicher.

AUSTIN, August 31, 1874.

You must go abroad to learn the news at home, and consequently we can see things from this standpoint and hear news which you are in blissful ignorance of. The nomination of Mr. Schleicher may take you by surprise, but it surprises no one here posted in the political wire workings of the Coke dynasty. There is no doubt it was arranged by Ireland during his late visit that one of Chas Morgan's servants should receive the nomination, and thereby the rising aspirations of Bexar would be nipped in the bud. Stockdale being Morgan's vice-President was the first choice, Schleicher being his engineer, second choice. Stockdale was unfortunate in being put forward first—this programme was plain when the Ireland votes, thirty in number, voted for Stockdale—it was plainer when Stockdale withdrew in favor of Schleicher. Morgan buys half a million of bonds and names the Congressman to help him out in his monopoly of our seas. The Bexar delegation was shamefully defeated, retiring in confusion without effecting any terms with the opposition, notwithstanding the fact that they had offered to trade Bexar off for years to come. Mr. Upton's plain talk in behalf of Mr. Brackenridge did not have a happy effect upon the terrified; he told the assembled patriots that besides being an honest man and a good Democrat, he could say from his own knowledge that the victory for the Democracy in Bexar had always been decided by the liberal use of the money of the National Bank, or words to that effect. And when this strong hint was supplemented by the statement of another member that the vote of the Mexicans was as much an article of merchandise as calico, the convention still did not bite. It is perhaps too early to expose the Goliath Convention. The endorsement of Russell, his trade with Bexar, and all that, must be duly set forth at the proper time.

As to Mr. Schleicher, personally, he is understood to be a man of education, but intolerably lazy—very conservative in his views, in fact, not much of a Democrat. It is reported that the nomination he filled him with emotion that he shed tears. It may have been the bitter pill presented at the same time—Coke and Ireland. It remains to be seen if he will tamely wear the Coke-Ireland-Morgan Collar, or, like Throckmorton, disclaim any sympathies with Cokery. Schleicher was too lazy to lift himself out of the old Democratic rut, else he would be a Republican to-day. Will his laziness be fatal now, and will he open his mouth and swallow Coke and Ireland in order to get down the nomination?

The wise ones say that Schleicher was nominated in order to consolidate the German vote, at any rate his nomination was a defeat of the rampant Democracy.

Inland Navigation.

We had the pleasure the other day to converse for a few moments with Mr. J. S. Polhemus and Mr. R. Scott, Assistant Engineers United States acting under the instructions of Major C. W. Howell, U. S. Engineer. They have been engaged since the first of April in surveying the proposed route for a ship Channel along our entire coast. Their work commenced at Flower Bluff, one hundred and fifteen miles from the Point Isabel Light House.

Light draft vessels could at the present time make one-half the distance without trouble. The other half will require dredging more or less.

About twenty-seven miles they consider

a solid cut although at very high tides the water covers this portion of the route a few inches in depth.

They speak very confidently as to the feasibility of opening an Inland Channel for light draft vessels. They have sounded and measured the entire distance and certainly "know of what they speak."

They did not give us their estimates as to cost, but we are satisfied that their work means business, and we only wish that the work could be commenced at once.

It would double our population in less than a year from the day the work is completed to Galveston. It would create Padre Island into one continuous plantation, and enhance the value of the lands on the main land. Our man votes for this and all other frontier bills.—Brownsville Ranchero.

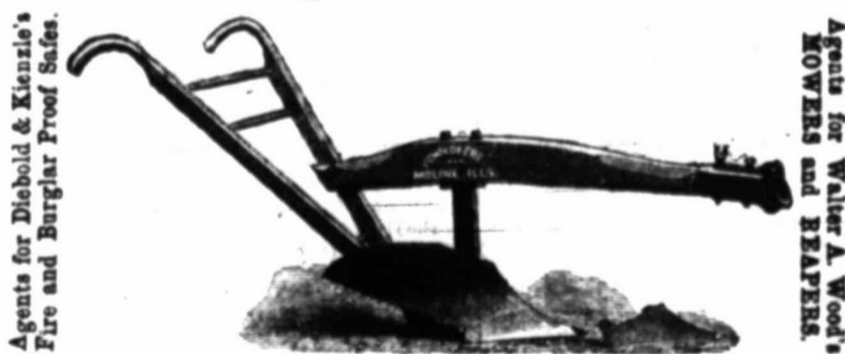

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 72.]
(Continued.)

For the legislative expenses of Idaho Territory, being for fuel, rent, and furniture for both houses of the territorial assembly, light, public and official printing, stationery, repairing, care of legislative furniture, stoves, official postage stamps, and seals, three thousand four hundred and twenty-five dollars.

For the legislative expenses of the Territory of New Mexico, to pay balances due Juan C. Romero, salary as member of the assembly, sixty-six dollars; William F. M. Army, late secretary of the Territory, ninety-four dollars and seventy-one cents; and Henry Weston, late secretary of the Territory, one hundred and twenty dollars; making, in all, two hundred and eighty dollars and seventy-one cents, being deficiency for the fiscal year eighteen hundred and seventy-two.

For the legislative expenses of the Territory of Utah, to pay balance due Chauncey W. West, late member of the Territory, being a deficiency for the fiscal year eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, one hundred and twenty dollars.

To pay the increased compensation of members of the assembly authorized by the act of January twenty-third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six dollars.

For the legislative expenses of Washington Territory, being the amount required for the increased compensation of members of the assembly authorized by act of January twenty-third, eighteen hundred and eighty-six dollars.

TREASURY MISCELLANEOUS.
For furniture and carpets for the Treasury Department: For carpets, desks, tables, chairs, shelving for file rooms, boxes, repairs of furniture, cases, oil cloth, matting, rings, chair covers and cushions, repairs and laying of carpets, and other miscellaneous items of a like character, ten thousand dollars.

For furniture and repairs of same, carpets, and similar necessities for public buildings under the control of the Treasury Department, ten thousand dollars.

For repairs and preservation of all public buildings under the control of the Treasury Department, forty thousand dollars.

To pay commissions allowed by law to collectors of customs acting as superintendents of lights, twelve thousand dollars.

For completion of extension and remodeling of the old building for courthouse and post-office at Indianapolis, Indiana, forty thousand dollars.

For examination of national banks and bank note plates, being amount required to pay C. A. Meigs, bank-examiner, for services rendered in examining banks in the District of Columbia, six hundred and thirty-nine dollars.

For continuing the introduction of shad into the river and lakes of the United States, to be expended under the direction of the United States Commissioner of Fish and Fisheries, fifteen thousand dollars, which shall be available also for the ensuing fiscal year.

To pay Thomas J. Bismut balance due him under contract with Joint Committee on the Revision of the Laws, for the preparation of the report of the late commissioners on the revision, compilation of Indian treaties, post-road bill, and the bill regulating the punishment of military offenses, three thousand one hundred and seventy-five dollars and three cents.

To enable the proper accounting officers of the Treasury to pay the amount for the United States associate justice for the Territory of Montana for the fractional part of the third quarter of the year eighteen hundred and seventy-two, eighty-one dollars and fifty-two cents, or so much thereof as may be necessary.

To enable the Secretary of the Treasury to adjust the account of the expenditures for dies, paper, and stamps for the Internal Revenue Department for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, a transfer of the books of the Treasury of such sums as may be necessary is hereby authorized: Provided, That the same shall not involve any actual expenditure of money from the Treasury.

To pay John Cooper, of the Cooper Engine Manufacturing Company, for tools and work done on the Southwest Pass light-house in eighteen hundred and seventy-two, five hundred and fourteen dollars and twenty-nine cents.
