Muleshoe edged out of top spot in sales tax allocation race

Although Muleshoe took second place in the monthly race for the tax revenue dollar it was in percentage alone. Sudan took the top prize with a 32.15 percent jump, but also took in the least amount of sales tax revenue of the area communities studied.

Muleshoe's second place award was for it's 20.54 percent increase compared to the same period in 2007, a significant jump of \$10,677.33.

Littlefield pulled in the most sales tax dollars for the area, but showed a smaller percentage of increase than the Bailey County seat.

The communities of Friona, Bovina and Earth respectively showed the smallest increases in this months sales tax allocations, however, they still exceeded Sudan in actual amounts collected.

And while Littlefield has shown sales tax dollars for the current year at \$530,336.81 — compared to Muleshoe's year-todate total of 367,881.71 -Littlefield's collections for the year have shown a 2.20 percent decrease. At the same time, Muleshoe has shown economic growth of 3.59 percent.





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His Wing Shelters You by Max Lucado

"He will shield you with his wings. He will shelter you with his feathers." (Psalm 91:4)

My college friends and I barely escaped a West Texas storm before it pummeled the park where we were spending a Saturday afternoon. As we were leaving, my buddy brought the car to a sudden stop and gestured to a tender sight on the ground. A mother bird sat exposed to the rain, her wing extended over her baby who had fallen out of the nest. The fierce storm prohibited her from returning to the tree, so she covered her child until the wind passed.

From how many winds is God protecting you? His wing, at this moment, shields you. A slanderous critic heading toward your desk is interrupted by a phone call. A burglar en route to your house has a flat tire. A drunk driver runs out of gas before your car passes his. God, your guardian, protects you from

"every trap" (Ps. 91:3);

"the fatal plague" (Ps. 91:3);

"the plague that stalks in darkness" (Ps. 91:6);

"the terrors of the night...the dangers of the day" (Ps. 91:5).

One translation boldly promises: "Nothing bad will happen to you" (Ps. 91:10 NCV). "Then why does it?" someone erupts. "Explain my job transfer. Or the bum who called himself my dad. Or the death of our child." If God is our guardian, why do bad things happen

Have they? Have bad things really happened to you? You and God may have different definitions for the word bad.

God views your life the way you view a movie after you've read the book. When something bad happens, you feel the air sucked out of the theater. Everyone else gasps at the crisis on the screen. Not you. Why? You've read the book. You know how the good guy gets out of the tight spot. God views your life with the same confidence. He's not only read your story...he wrote it. His perspective is different, and his purpose is clear.

God uses struggles to toughen our spiritual skin. Consider it a sheer gift, friends, when tests and challenges come at you from all sides.

You know that under pressure, your faith-life is forced into the open and shows its true colors. So don't try to get out of anything prematurely. Let it do its work so you become mature and well-developed, not deficient in any way. (James 1:2-4)

Trust him. "But when I am afraid, I put my trust in you" (Ps. 56:3). Join with Isaiah, who resolved, "I will trust in him and not be afraid" (Isa. 12:2).

God is directing your steps and delighting in every detail of your life (Ps. 37:23-24). In fact, that's his car pulling over to the side of the road. That's God opening the door. And that's you climbing into the passenger seat.



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

66 CNN Alert: My Custom Alerts.

That's what the subject line of the e-mail said. I didn't remember subscribing to anything by that name. But who can you trust if not CNN? (Actually, my answer would be FOX News, but . . .)

Anyway, I clicked on the email, was taken to a site that told me I needed to upgrade a "Flash" plug-in to read the

content, and . . . somewhere along the line, a "pop-up" ad popped up, and a fairly impressive-looking program screen told me that "Antivirus XP 2008" had found some potentially harmful files on my computer and was running a scan. Then came the bad news: I had 3,130 viruses. My computer was more virusriddled than a kindergarten class spreading chicken pox!

It just didn't ring true, though I was pretty sure the weird behavior of my computer indicated that some "potentially harmful" files had indeed been welcomed aboard and were more than "potentially" harmful. The bogus program had pretty much taken control of my computer and was making it hard for me to get to the Internet to find out what I'd just done. The program didn't want me to pull down a "mal-ware" or "spyware" removal program, because it was trying to "protect" me. It was actually trying, with a good bit of success, to propagate.

To make the long story a bit shorter, I'll just tell you that I did finally find on the Web a good bit of genuine information about this pernicious "malware" program, including a number of possible ways to exterminate it. (The term "malware" is a relatively new techie term that combines "software" with the Latin root meaning "bad," as in "malicious," "malignant," etc. It is all of those things!

I chose an anti-malware program recommended by and an expert sufficiently "geeky" that I felt he knew whereof he spoke. And, after running a scan that kept me up late into the night or early into the morning, I managed to find and, I hope, destroy, 63 pernicious files of various sorts. (Less than 3,130 but malfeasant enough nonetheless. "Malfeasant": "engaging in misconduct or wrong-doing.")

I think I'm on the road to a "cured" computer, though what I may still find in the next few days has me a tad concerned. I also wonder how many e-mails my computer sent out from my address but without my permission telling people that they have a "CNN Alert" of their very own, and all they have to do is click and read. Perhaps "caveat emptor" ("let the buyer beware") needs to be updated: "Let the clicker beware!" Or something like that.

All of this makes me think. If we own computers, we surely need to be careful what we allow into our operating systems. But it's even more important what we allow into our lives. Greed and envy, anger, bitterness, covetousness and such, may not be labeled "mal-ware," but they do indeed mess up lives.

Texas poised to lead American nuclear renaissance

Soaring energy costs are taxing our economy and leaving us dangerously dependent on foreign energy

The U.S. Department of Energy projects that our need for electricity will increase 25 percent by 2030.

While global demand increases, worldwide energy supply remains fairly stagnant, unnecessarily restrained by government regulations and prohibitions. In order to reduce the cost of fuel and power and ensure we can meet energy demands into the future, we must increase domestic supply and expand our portfolio of energy options.

Now is the time to make nuclear power a greater part of America's energy solution.

Nuclear power is a clean, efficient, domestic source of energy, but it is currently underutilized.

From 1950 through the 1970s, there was a surge in U.S. nuclear power, and over 100 reactors were commissioned in 31 states.

However, by the end of the 1970s, construction on nuclear reactors slowed. Federal research and development funding for nuclear technology declined as investors pursued sources of electricity with lower capital and development costs. America began to turn away from nuclear power.

Meanwhile, other nations, like France, began to develop nuclear technology and made it a centerpiece of their energy portfolios.

Though the entire country of France is over 50,000 square miles smaller than Texas, it now has 59 of the world's 439 nuclear units. A whopping 80 percent of its power is nucleargenerated.

Japan - roughly half the size of France – has 55 nuclear power plants. Though the U.S. has 104 reactors, a new one has not been constructed since

In July, I sent a letter to Energy Secretary Sam Bodman, urging the Energy Department to swiftly approve the application for Texas' two new reactors. There are presently 23 applications for construction on new U.S. nuclear power plants. Four of them, including the STP reactors, could be slated for Texas more than any other state.


It is my hope that the approval and completion of the STP reactors will pave the way for nuclear power plant construction across our nation.



Extension center offers food safety suggestions for outdoor activities

"Engage in regular physical activity..." this is one of the key recommendations from for Americans. Having an active lifestyle can mean outings as a family for hiking, camping, and other recreational activities which often involve food.

During these hot summer temperatures we experience on the South Plains, we need to be sure and handle food safely.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimate that there are 76 million cases of foodborne illness resulting in 325,000 hospitalizations and 5,000 deaths each year says Amanda Scott, expanded nutrition program specialist, Texas AgriLife Extension Service.

foodborne illness include diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, fever, and abdominal cramps.

The first step to food safety for outdoor activities is to plan ahead. Take some in a cooler with plenty of time to decide what you are ice.

In hot summer weather, itis also important to remember that foods should not sit out for long periods of time. Generally speaking, you should discard any food left out more than two hours. However, if temperatures asp.

are greater than 90 degrees, food should not sit out any longer than one hour.

Finally, the most important food safety tip for outdoor fun is to wash your hands. "Handwashing is crucial to the prevention of foodborne illness," said Scott.

"It's best to wash your Try packing meat and hands with warm, soapy water for 20 seconds. If running water is not available, use a disposable towelette to wipe hands clean," he said.

"You may also consider which can reduce germs but will not eliminate any dirt or grime present," he added.






