Telegraphic.
 The Indians made a raid into Llano, and

THE Democratic press of the State
 is cold to Schleicher, and the Re-
 publican press is hot against him.
 LETTERS and telegrams reach us
 from all quarters protesting against
 Schleicher.

COKE, Ireland, Russell, Stockdale,
 Morgan, and the Central Interna-
 tional Morgan monopoly against
 Pierce, are too much for Schleicher
 to pack.

THE GERMANS of Calhoun, Victo-
 ria, and Dewitt counties are dis-
 satisfied with the nomination of
 Schleicher, and are calling upon
 Mr. Degner of this city, to run.

"SCHLEICHER is an educated and
 intelligent German gentleman," and
 has many personal friends, but the
 Germans of the West cannot swal-
 low Coke and Morgan.

THE German friends of Schleicher
 say that he does not and will not
 indorse Coke. Well, let him be
 "brought to book" on that question
 before this whole community. We
 venture the assertion in advance,
 that he will indorse Coke.

THE Germans say that if Schlei-
 cher indorses Coke, they cannot
 support him. Some of the Ameri-
 can Democrats say that if he does
 not indorse Coke, they will vote for
 a "Radical" against him. So, he is
 between two fires. Let him speak
 out "like a little man."

THE case of the State vs. Richard
 Coke is now on trial. The testimo-
 ny on both sides has been heard,
 and the argument of counsel has
 commenced. In several incidental
 issues Coke has been acquitted, but
 the main issue will be decided by
 the constitutional convention, which
 is to assemble some time next
 spring or summer. The result is
 awaited with great interest through-
 out the State.

THE case of the Sixth District vs.
 Gustave Schleicher has been called
 for trial, and the witnesses are be-
 ing examined. The counsel on each
 side throw in short speeches occa-
 sionally upon points of law, or as to
 the relevancy of testimony. The
 verdict of the jury will be brought in
 at the close of the second day of
 November next.

The ridicule of the Goliad fiasco
 by the Express has made the Herald
 quite savage. Now, don't we know,
 and don't the public know that the
 nomination was perfectly nausent-
 ing to the Herald? Did't one of its
 editors say, when asked about it,
 that it was, "unfortunately a dis-
 agreeable fact?" Certainly. The Ex-
 press, therefore, in ridiculing the
 nomination, is really representing
 the sentiments of the people of San
 Antonio, and of the District, gener-
 ally. Not one single man in this
 city has received the nomination
 heartily, or even with approbation.
 Many Democrats have openly de-
 nounced it, and others have de-
 clared that they would not vote
 the ticket. The Express truthfully,
 as a public journal should, gives
 voice to the views and feelings of
 this community, and the epithets
 and personalities of the Herald and
 its correspondent can, not hide the
 fact.

Call for a Mass-Meeting of Republicans.

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 17, '74.

THE EXPRESS is independent, and can do justice to men of all opinions and creeds, in politics and religion.

THE EXPRESS is growing rapidly in circulation. There's where the shoe pinches.

A LEADING DEMOCRAT in this city states that he would never, of his own accord, indorse the administration of Coke.

SCHLEICHER will be beaten, the loud assertions of "A Goliad Delegate" to the contrary notwithstanding.

THE Goliad delegation, we learn, is not responsible for the selling out of San Antonio and the frontier. But "A Goliad Delegate" is.

GOOD Democrats have told us that "A Goliad Delegate" is sore over the condemnation he receives from his own party, and that he is trying to divert attention by a row with the EXPRESS. We shall have no row with him, but we shall expose his rottenness, and chastise his insolence.

THE GOOD LADY, a Democrat, who exclaimed "What! Old Schleicher!" has been denounced by the Herald as "no lady!" Poor lady! That's what she gets by being in bad company. We have shown her the Herald, and one vote for Schleicher is lost. What next?

NOT a single personality, or vulgar or abusive word, has been indulged by the EXPRESS; yet Democratic blackguards assail it with vulgar abuse. The time is close at hand when it will be the strongest and most widely circulated journal in Western Texas.

SCHLEICHER is expected in town to-day or to-morrow. He may have arrived by the time this reaches the eyes of our readers. When he comes, let a public meeting be called, and let him declare himself plainly and unequivocally on the question of the indorsement of Coke. That is the question in this city, and in many other places.

YESTERDAY three Democratic Congressional conventions assembled in this State. The one at Waco nominated Col. Mills for the Third District; the one at Sulphur Springs will most probably nominate Col. D. B. Culberson, for the Second District; the one at Nacogdoches will decide between Col. Herndon and Judge Reagan.

DEMOCRATIC MISTAKE.—Some of our Democratic friends in San Antonio express the opinion that the EXPRESS would have opposed any candidate the Goliad Convention could have put forward, just as it has Mr. Schleicher. This is a mistake. We might not have controlled the Republican Convention, but it was the feeling of leading Republicans here, and that of the EXPRESS, that if Maj. Brackenridge, Gen. Baylor, Col. Upson, or any fair minded San Antonio man had been nominated, we should not antagonize him. These gentlemen know this. Now, we are insulted by a few Democratic fools and blackguards because we will not support Morgan's man Schleicher. So be it.

THE EXPRESS has treated all the Democrats of this city with courtesy. It has many old friends among them. But the black-guards of the party pay us back with insult. We shall survive all such miserable assaults.

"A GOLIAD-DELEGATE" figures somewhat in the Herald of yesterday. We propose that he shall figure somewhat in the EXPRESS of to-day. His unprovoked personal flings are unworthy of notice by any gentleman, because they are ungentlemanly in character, and no gentleman would be guilty of such things. But, then, we are some what charitable to him, because we learn that he has no particular claim, even in his own party, to be ranked among gentlemen.

We learn that his own co-delegates to Goliad held him responsible for selling out Maj. Brackenridge, thus breaking down the morale of the delegation, and really causing Brackenridge's defeat.

We learn, also, that it has been said among his own party friends that he would make speeches for the "Radical" candidate for \$500.

We reserve our heavy artillery until the "Goliad Delegate" again exposes his rear.

COL. ROGERS Q. MILLS, a private dispatch says, has been nominated for Congress from the Third District by the Democratic Convention which assembled at Waco yesterday, over Chas. Stewart Esq., of Houston, and Maj. H. H. Boone, of Anderson.

Col. Mills was the fellow-soldier and friend of the writer of this article during much of the late war. They fought together at Arkansas Post, sojourned together at Camp Chase, and served together under the immortal Cleburne in Tennessee. They differ in politics, but they are bosom friends for life. Col. Mills is a noble gentleman, a man of fine ability and good culture, and will do honor to any station. This is spoken by his friend, not by his political partizan.

Gov. COKE of Texas does not seem to fulfill the expectations of his supporters. Unpleasant accounts reach us of disorder and outrages upon individuals in that State, which indicate an inefficient administration of the laws. Texas offers peculiar inducements for immigration if order can be maintained within its boundaries, and its people are laboring earnestly to make these advantages known. But if it should be understood that life and property are insecure there, all such efforts will be of little avail. There can be no excuse for the prevalence of mob law in Texas or in any other State.—N. Y. Sun.

The Corpus Christi Valley is fighting the proposed railroad subsidy of \$200,000.

J. Putegnat, deputy postmaster at Rio Grande City, has died of small-pox.

Young fellows are in the habit of galloping about on horseback perfectly naked near Corpus Christi.

Capt. Pulliam, at Ingleside, near Corpus Christi, has created a lake 180 yards wide, 500 yards long, and 8 feet deep, by damming a dry bayou.

The Calvert Texas says that Catharine Schertz, a female Israelite, was to preach last Sunday on the "Ingathering of Israel" in a grove near that place.

The Galveston News at last speaks up for Schleicher.

A separated man and wife, named Mitchell, are contesting in the courts the possession of their only child, a little girl.

The State Gazette learns that Indians have been in Llano county, and proved too strong for the citizens.

Rev. E. D. Shindler, Episcopal Minister at Nacogdoches, died of apoplexy.

Gov. Coke has offered \$1000 reward for the arrest of those who burned out and tried to poison Mrs. L. A. Jones, in Fayette county.

The Insurgents Concentrating for a Westward March.

HAYANA, Aug. 20, 1874.

The details of the engagement at Saneti Spiritina have just reached here. The battle took place between 200 Spanish troops and a part of Jimenez's forces. As stated in despatches at the time, the object of the entry was the seizure of some 300 Remington Rifles and ammunition stored there. They took the arms from the volunteers and from the colored firemen. They also came near capturing Brigadier Acosta, but he made his escape by hiding on the roof of his house. The door was burst open, the house searched, but in vain.

The Cubans marched away quietly about 4 A. M., unmolested, expressing their intention of shortly again paying their respects to the city.

The Cinco Villas are menaced by an invasion of all the Cuban forces from the east, and it will doubtless have the effect of increasing the ranks of the insurgents. The latter have all withdrawn from the Eastern Department and manifest signs of concentration preparatory to a march westward. Trinidad and other cities are receiving considerable reinforcements.

MILITARY ORDERS.—By command of Gen. Augur a Board of Survey, to consist of Major W. R. Gibson, Pay Department, Captain C. D. Emory, 9th Infantry, and First Lieutenant Colon Adgur, 2nd Cavalry, will convene at the subsistence warehouse, in this city, to-morrow, the 29th inst., at 11 o'clock A. M., or as soon thereafter as practicable, to examine into, and report upon a deficiency found to exist in certain articles of subsistence stores, invoiced by Captain T. C. Sullivan, Commissary of Subsistence, U. S. Army, to Capt. H. Schreiner, 9th Cavalry, Depot Commissary of Subsistence, San Antonio, Texas.

Captain E. J. Strang, Assistant Quartermaster U. S. Army, at Denison, Texas, will proceed to Atoka, Choctaw Nation, I. T., on public business, on completion of which he will return to his proper station.

A General Court Martial will convene at Fort Brown, Texas, on Monday, the 7th day of September, 1874, for the trial of such persons as may be properly brought before it.

LAW OF THE UNITED STATES, PASSED AT THE FIRST SESSION OF THE FORTY-THIRD CONGRESS.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 72.] (Continued.) WAR DEPARTMENT. QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

Regular supplies: For fuel for officers, enlisted men, guards, stables, and officers' horses for the horses, mules, and oxen of the Quartermaster's Department at the several posts and stations, and with the armies in the field, and for horses of the several regiments of cavalry and batteries of artillery, and such companies of infantry and scouts as may be mounted, and for the authorized number of officers' horses, including lading for the animals, straw for soldiers' bedding, stationery, including blank books for the Quartermaster's Department, certificates of discharged soldiers, blank forms for the Pay and Quartermaster's Departments, and for the printing of division and department orders and reports, being for the service of the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, one hundred thousand dollars.

For incidental expenses, consisting of postage and telegrams or dispatches received and sent on public business, extra pay to soldiers employed under the direction of the Quartermaster's Department in the erection of barracks, quarters, storehouses, and hospitals; in the construction of roads and other constant labor, for periods of not less than ten days, including those employed as clerks at division and department headquarters, and hospital stewards on clerical duty; expenses of express to and from the frontier posts and armies in the field; of escorts to passengers and other disbursing officers, and to trains, where military escorts cannot be furnished; expenses of the internment of officers killed in action, or who die when on duty in the field or at posts on the frontier or other places, when ordered by the Secretary of War, and of non-commissioned officers and soldiers authorized to purchase furniture; hire of labor in the Quartermaster's Department, including the hire of interpreters, spies, and guides for the Army; compensation of clerks for officers of the Quartermaster's Department; compensation of forage and wagon masters; for the apprehension, securing, and delivering of deserters, and the expenses incident to their pursuit; and for the following expenditures, required for the several regiments of cavalry, the batteries of light artillery, and such companies of infantry and scouts as may be mounted, namely: the purchase of traveling forges, blacksmiths' and shoeing tools, horse and mule shoes and nails, iron and steel for shoeing; hire of veterinary surgeons; medicine for horses and mules; picket ropes; and for shoeing the horses of the corps named; also, generally, the proper and authorized expenses for the movement and operations of the Army not expressly assigned to any other department, being a deficiency for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, two hundred thousand dollars.

For transportation of the Army, including the baggage of the troops, when moving either by land or water; of clothing and camp and garrison equipage, from the depots at Philadelphia and Jeffersonville to the several posts and Army depots, and from these depots to the troops in the field; of horse-equipments and of subsistence-stores from the places of purchase and from the places of delivery, under contract, to such places as the circumstances of the service may require them to be sent; of ordnance, ordnance-stores, and small arms, from the foundries and arsenals to the arsenals, fortifications, frontier-posts, and Army depots; freights, wharfage, tolls and ferriages; the purchase and hire of horses, mules, oxen, and harness, and the purchase and repair of wagons, carts, and drays, and of ships and other sea-going vessels, and of boats required for transportation of supplies, and for garrison purposes; for drayage and cartage at the several posts; hire of teamsters, transportation of funds for the Pay and other disbursing Departments; the expense of sailing public transports on various rivers, the Gulf of Mexico, the Atlantic, and the Pacific; for procuring water at such posts as from their situation require that it be brought from a distance and for clearing roads, and for removing obstructions from roads, harbors and rivers, to the extent which may be required for the actual operations of troops in the field, being a deficiency for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, not including Pacific railroad accounts not hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars: Provided, That no part of the sum appropriated by any provision of this act shall be paid to any railroad-company which has received a grant of land on the condition that its road should be a public highway for the transportation of the property and troops of the United States free from toll or other charge.

Barracks and quarters: For rent or hire of quarters for troops, and for officers on military duty; of store-houses for safe-keeping of military stores; of offices; of grounds, for camps and cantonments, and for temporary frontier stations; for construction and repair of temporary huts, of stables and other military buildings at established posts, and for repairs of buildings occupied by the Army, being a deficiency for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, ninety thousand dollars.

Signal-Office: For expenses of the observation and report of storms by telegraph and signals; for the manufacture, purchase, or repair of meteorological and other necessary instruments, for telegraphing reports; for expenses of storm-signals, announcing probable approach and force of storms; for instrument-shelters; for hire, furniture and expenses of offices, maintained for public use, in cities or ports receiving reports; for river-reports; for maps and bulletins, to be displayed in chambers of commerce and boards of trade rooms, and for distribution; for books and stationery; and for incidental expenses not otherwise provided for, being a deficiency for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, forty-five thousand dollars.

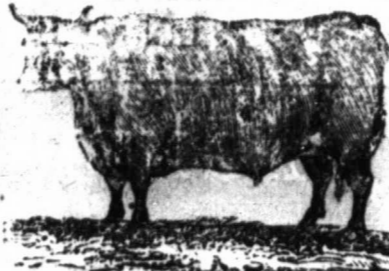
