The Texas press association will meet in Dallas on Thursday, the 10th of September. A full attendance is requested, and the press of the entire State are most requested to attend.

The Insurgents Concentrating fo Westward March. HAVANA, Ang. 20, 1874.

The details of the engagement at Saneti Spiritus have just reached bere. The battle took place between 200 Spanish troops and a part of Jimeney's forces. As stated in despatches at the time, the object of the entry was the seizure of some 300 Remington Rifles and ammunition stored there. They took the arms from the volunteers and from the colored firemen. WAR DEPARTMENT. QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT. Regular supplies: For fuel for officers, enlisted men, guards, storehouses, and of-fices, forage for the horses, mules, and oxen of the Quartermaster's Department at the several posts and stations, and with the armies in the field, and for horses of the several regiments of cavalry and batteries of artillery, and such companies of infantry and scouts as may be mounted, and for the authorized number of officers and for the authorized number of officers horses, including b dding for the animals, straw for soldiers' bedding, stationery, including blank books for the Quartermaster's Department, certificates of discharged soldiers, blank forms for the Pay and Quartermaster's Departments, and for the printing of division and department orders and reports, being for the service of ers and reports, being for the service of the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eigh-

Signal-Office: For expenses of the ob-servation and report of storms by tele-graph and signals; for the manufacture, archase, er repair of meteorological and other necessary instruments, for telegraphing reports; for expenses of storm-signals, announcing probable approach and force of storms; for instrumen-shelters; for hire, furniture and expenses of offices, main-tained for public use, in cities or ports re-ceiving reports; for river-reports; for maps and bulletins, to be displayed in chambers of commerce and boards of trade rooms, and for distribution; for books and statio-nery; and for incidental expenses not otherwise provided for, being a deficiency for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, ferty-five thousand dollars.


