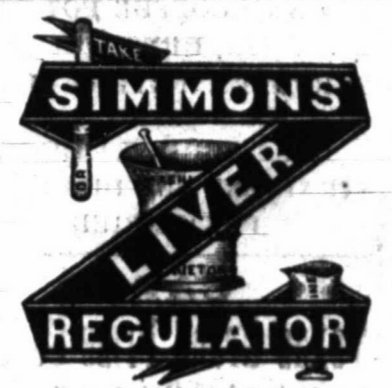

Not a single colored man in the whole District will vote for Schleicher, we verily believe.

POOR Schleicher! He is not a Coke man at heart, and yet he is compelled to heartily indorse Coke, and, thereby, get beaten.

Our Mexican fellow-citizens are all opposed to Schleicher, and they only await the nomination of a man in whom they have confidence to give him every Mexican vote between here and the Rio Grande.

MR. Schleicher has a great many personal friends among our German fellow citizens, and yet they are very generally opposed to his election. They cannot stand Coke and Morgan, and their war upon the railroad interests of the West. They will not indorse the administration that has destroyed our public school system.

THE Houston Telegraph, after getting its breath, takes back its opposition to Schleicher, and praises him; and the Galveston News, after waiting for an issue or two, concludes to support him. That is just the way Democracy did here, and all over the District. They were all opposed to it, but afterward swallowed it as a man takes bitter medicine.

Col. Mills was nominated at Waco by acclamation, having no opposition, Mr. Stewart having withdrawn.

There was heavy opposition in the Waco Convention to the indorsement of Coke.

Mills and Stewart both made full speeches at Waco, but neither of them alluded to Coke.

A colored convict was killed at Jacksonville on the 1st.

The murder of the six white prisoners, former parish officers, by Texans near Shreveport, is confirmed.

The Rio Grande.

Describing the streams of New Mexico, Mr. Elias Brevoort says of the Rio Grande:

It is 1800 miles in length, and of almost equal volume from the source to the mouth, in the Gulf of Mexico. It has two branches, and flows hundreds of miles without a tributary. It is fed almost entirely from the Rocky Mountains. An annual rise occurs about the month of June, from the melting of the snows each spring. Like the Nile, it is almost the sole reliance of the farmer. The natives have made to each town and adjoining lands, canals for irrigation.

These are often twenty or thirty miles in length, affording also considerable mill power. These waters of the Rio Grande, like the Nile, are exceedingly turbid, carrying a large proportion of sediment—probably, at high water, one fifth of the bulk of the water. Each irrigation is consequently a coat of manure to the soil; and cultivation by this process, instead of impoverishing the soil, enriches it. The natives never use any other manure. In El Paso valley the Spaniards found a tribe of Indians cultivating the soil nearly three hundred years ago, and it has been cultivated nearly ever since, yet the soil is of undiminished fertility.

Resources of Texas.

Col. W. L. Moody, Loan Agent of the State of Texas, in a letter to the New York Tribune, of the 24th of August says:

Texas has always met her interest. To-day it is accruing on only \$854,257 05, which is the amount of her total bonded debt, exclusive of \$711,008 21 held and owned by her own school fund. She has an area of 175,500,000 acres of land, of which 84,000,000 acres are unappropriated, reserved and owned by the State. With a taxable property in 1850 of \$51,000,000, to-day it is over 300,000,000. With a population of 212,000 in 1850, to-day it is probably 1,500,000. Raising before the war about 200,000 bales of cotton,

she will probably export over 600,000 bales the coming season. She has a seaport ranking in the value of its exports, the eighth in the United States. She owes less, and is advancing in material wealth and population more rapidly than any State in the Union. All this, and yet she is but in the infancy of her progress, for her railroad connections have been made only in the past few months.

Call for a Mass-Meeting of Republicans.

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 17, '74.
The Republicans of Bexar county are hereby requested to meet on Saturday the 5th day of September, 1874, at 8 o'clock p. m., in Karber's Garden for the purpose of selecting delegates to the Congressional convention, to be held at San Antonio on the 9th day of September, 1874, as per call of the Chairman of the 6th Congressional District.

WE have heard the names of Geo. W. Brackenridge Esq., Judge Noonan, Mr. Degener, Dr. Herff, Judge Galvan, and some others, mentioned for Congress from this District. Who the lucky or unlucky man will be, we cannot foretell, of course, but Schleicher will be beaten.

THE Federal Government is on the point of interfering to protect the people against being murdered by mobs in the Southern States. Sixteen negroes were taken from jail and killed in Trenton, Tenn., and a day or two since six white parish officers were taken from the guard, while prisoners, and murdered by Texans near Shreveport.

THE murder of the parish officers in Louisiana, near Shreveport, originated in an organized effort by a mob to take forcible possession of the county offices. They were killed because they organized a force to protect themselves from violence. Dispatches from Washington indicate early action by the Government in this matter. It is high time for it.

THE Indians, as we reported yesterday, have made a raid into Wise county, driving off several hundred horses, and murdered the Huff family, father, mother and two grown daughters. The Statesman of yesterday says that two other families are reported murdered, and that the people are moving in from the frontier in great numbers. The people complain that the rangers have gone too far out to protect them. We trust we shall soon hear that Gens. McKenzie and Davidson have crushed the hostile Indians.

Federal Protection in the South.

We find in the St. Louis Democrat of the 28th of Aug. the following telegrams:

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28.—Fred Douglas has received the following characteristic letter from Gerret Smith:

"DEAR FRIEND—I do not forget that Howard University needs money, hence I send you my draft for \$1,000. If we would save this guilty nation, we must educate its deeply wronged colored people. Heaven help Howard University, its teachers and students. Cordially yours. (Signed)

GERRET SMITH.
Attorney General Williams will go to Long Branch on Monday to consult with the President regarding the fearful condition of affairs in the South. It is the opinion of that officer that something will have to be done by the national government to stay the outbreaks against negroes to intimidate them. It is even suggested that an extra session of Congress shall be called to provide means for the protection of law-abiding citizens.

Fred Douglas, in his paper today, strongly advocates the calling together of Congress; and it is quite generally spoken of as an act likely to produce good feeling among the law-abiding portion of the South. The time suggested is the 1. of October.

In the same paper is a dispatch dated Memphis, Aug. 28, giving an account of a large meeting held in that city on the evening of that day, to express indignation at the barbarous murder of colored prisoners taken from Trenton jail, presided over by such men as Ex Gov. Harris, and Judge Archibald Wright, Jefferson Davis, Gov. Harris, Col. Duncan McRea, and Gen. Forrest. Speeches were made, denouncing

the cowardly assassination, and demanding of the State authorities the promptest measures to capture the assassins and, at least, partially wipe out the disgrace of such a horrible crime.

On that very date French Smith, an Ireland delegate in the Goliad convention, uttered this sentiment: "I love to kill Indians, but would rather kill two niggers than one Indian any day."

Gerrett Smith strikes the cord in the nation's heart that nerved the nation to preserve the Union and destroy slavery. Local State Government in the hands of Democratic State administrations is branding us as a nation of murderers. The blood of Abel is crying from the Southern soil from Tennessee to Texas for vengeance. The nation cannot look on much longer and not interfere. Murder stalks through our land, while ignorance is growing at a fearful rate. Free schools are practically abolished under all Democratic State governments.

No wonder Jeff. Davis and Gen. Forrest come to the front to quell the rising storm. They know that the civilized world will hold our nation responsible if the Southern Democracy with its "white leagues" is allowed to rule much longer. The bow has been bent too far by the Democracy. An extra session of Congress will probably be called to deal with murder in the South. French Smith and his silent auditors at Goliad had better left unuttered the language of the assassin.

OUR AUSTIN LETTER.

The Advantages of a Democratic Administration to the Capital—A Retrospect and a Few Reflections.

AUSTIN, Aug. 31, 1874.
When the Republican administration went into office in 1870, Austin was a one-horse country village, seventy-five miles from a railroad depot—its business was confined to the farmers living in the immediate neighborhood, and with the exception of one or two establishments, its merchants were little country dealers. Headquarters, the Constitutional convention of '68-'69 had contributed something to its support, but it was still a dead place deriving all its life from occasional visits of military occupation when Gen. Reynolds commanded, and that prince of Quartermasters, Col. Hunt, built houses at Government expense for Hancock, and pontoon bridges and macadamized roads, we were miserably poor; real estate was very low, commanding but a nominal value, and I have seen, in 1869, a squad of soldiers cutting grass and weeds with scythes from the upper end of Congress Avenue.

Let us turn for a moment from this dull picture to one of life and unprecedented prosperity. The year 1870 brought in Republican rule, and the Capital felt the effect of fresh blood in its veins. Business revived, because the State revived, law and order were established, and Governor Davis began the work in earnest to make good his promise to the people. The 12th Legislature with all its sins supported the Governor in his efforts to give protection to the humblest citizen, and extend the advantages of education to all. It was a corrupt body, honest when it convened, but corrupted by the money of railroad speculators; but I am not going to discuss their honesty now, but merely to say that they made Austin a prosperous city. They spent hundreds of thousands and caused to be spent hundreds of thousands of dollars in our midst. Our people began to grow rich, and before 1873, our city was in the zenith of its prosperity. We had a railroad, our prospects had advanced until holders of real estate became wealthy, our population doubled, and our commerce rivaled that of San Antonio.

During this time our entire State prospered, over three hundred thousand people were added to our population, and the value of the property in the State appreciated nearly fifty per cent.

With the meeting of the 13th Legislature we began to feel the effects of Democratic restoration. That Democratic body came mostly from the backwoods, and were controlled by the Jno. Irelands among them. They were a hungry set who carried away more greenbacks than they brought, and spent less money with us during their entire session than the 12th did in one month's time. It was economy illustrated upon Democratic principles, to wit: The State paid out as much money as under Radical auspices, but the individual Democratic patriots saved it all. The 13th had a sprinkling of Republicans in it, and Governor Davis and other State officers were still in office, and it was not until the forcible usurpation of Coke and the 14th Legislature, that we felt the grand change. During the session of the 14th the State Treasury was led sorely to pay witnesses from all parts of the State in impeachment cases, and those very witnesses went home with their pockets full of greenbacks. Besides impeachment of judges there were investigations and prosecutions instigated against Republicans. No Legislature ever assembled

in the State that performed so little real public legislation and yet it was the most expensive. They were industrious, hunting down their political opponents, and providing places for Democratic favorites and patronage for a Democratic administration.

The public printing, one of the perquisites of the Capital, was sent to Houston at the instance of Coke, thereby taking at least \$30,000 out of our pockets. A spirit of economy never before inaugurated has made its appearance since the Legislature adjourned. The State pays as much, but it all goes into the pockets of the Coke family; "nepotism" is now a permanent phase of Cokery. As to the transactions of the government, the people are in the dark; certain it is that Coke uses the treasury and his patronage in a personal way. Money is paid to favorites, and certain persons are subsidized at the public expense—for instance, Elliott, of the Gazette, gets a few crumbs of public printing which belong to Gray, of the Telegraph. This is a little arbitrary on the part of Coke, and Gray dare not complain. The independence of the press does not exist here. The Statesman has been the greatest sufferer by the arbitrary acts of Coke, and yet it dare not speak.

And now our city has reached its zenith of prosperity. It grew under Davis, it declines under Coke. Ask every business man, every owner of a corner lot, every merchant, every hotel keeper, ask everybody but the newspaper men who dare not tell the truth because they fear Coke, (in their imagination there is danger of his closing up the shop and spending the dull times between legislative sessions at Waco) and you will hear the same story I have told, corroborated. O. K.

GOOD NEWS.—We have conversed with a gentleman who has just returned from Seguin, who brings encouraging news in relation to the completion of the Peirce Railroad to San Antonio. The railroad men wish to run it within three quarters of a mile. This was the only question between them. Senator Ireland favored the proposition of the railroad men.

Thus it will be but a short time until the road will be running to within, say, forty-three miles of this city. It is now expected that the road will be pushed through, by over 2000 hands, to San Antonio by February next.

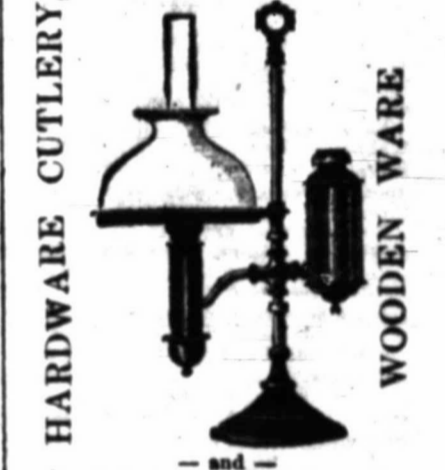

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 72.] (Continued.)

For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, in payment for services rendered and expenses incurred connected with the appraisal and sale of the diminished reserve of the Kaw Indians in the State of Kansas...

For the L'Anse and Vieux-de-Sert bands of Chippewas of Lake Superior, at the rate of one dollar and twenty-five cents an acre for all the lands in township fifty-one north, of range thirty-one west...

For the following sums, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the outstanding indebtedness for, and on account of, the Indian service prior to June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, namely:

For collecting and subsisting Apaches of Arizona and New Mexico, four hundred and twenty-three thousand four hundred and twenty-six dollars and thirty-two cents.

For subsisting the Arapaho, Cheyenne, Apache, Kiowa, Comanche, and Wichita Indians, fifty-four thousand two hundred and seventy-eight dollars and ten cents.

For subsisting and clothing the Sisseton, Wahpeton, Medwakanton, and Wahpatoke bands of Indians, thirty thousand nine hundred and forty-two dollars and three cents.

For incidental expenses of the Indian service in Oregon, forty-nine thousand and five dollars and twenty-eight cents.

For incidental expenses of the Indian service in Utah, five thousand three hundred and ninety-five dollars and thirty-six cents.

For fulfilling treaty with Flatheads and other confederated tribes, one thousand two hundred and seventy-five dollars and forty cents.

For fulfilling treaty with Mixed Shoshone, Banacks, and Sheepaters, eight thousand seven hundred and thirty-seven dollars and seventy-five cents.

For fulfilling treaty with Blackfeet, Bloods, and Piegan, nine thousand seven hundred and fifty-seven dollars and one cent.

For fulfilling treaty with Sioux of different tribes, including Santee Sioux of Nebraska, eighteen thousand eight hundred and forty dollars and forty-nine cents.

To replace money erroneously paid to certain Kickapoo Indians, five hundred and two dollars and eighty cents.

For transportation of North Carolina Cherokees, two thousand one hundred and twenty-five dollars.

For payment to North Carolina Cherokees, three thousand five hundred and three dollars and sixty-five cents.

That none of the moneys hereby appropriated for the payment of deficiencies in the Indian service shall be paid until the necessity for the expenditures shall have been examined into by the Secretary of the Interior and any existing board of peace commissioners.

For the survey of the exterior boundaries of Indian reservations and subdivisions of the same, being for surveys in the Indian Territory embraced within the lands ceded by the Cherokee, Seminole, and Creek tribes of Indians, being a deficiency for the present and prior years, forty-five thousand dollars.
