A Washington dispatch states that Gen. John J. Foster is dead.

Mr. L. G. Soogin, a Falls county delegate, did suddenly at Waco from apoplexy.

Postmaster General Jewell took the oath of office on the first, and entered upon his duties.

REV. THOMAS A. MORRIS, D. D., the Senior Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States, died at Springfield, Ohio, on the 22nd instant, at the advanced age of eighty years. He was a plain, practical preacher, and an excellent and very useful man. He was the author of a volume of sermons, and young Methodist preachers for the last quarter of a century and over have obtained their first lessons in practice and useful preaching from reading and studying "Morris Sermons."

THESE journals which ridicule and censure the members of Plymouth Church for the uproar caused by Meulton's interference when the report of the committee was read, manifest either great ignorance or great want of candor. In the vast crowd assembled, there were scores, if not hundreds, of boys and roughs attracted by the exciting occasion, and hisses, yells, and attempts at violence could not have been prevented. Had none but church members been there, the feeling manifested was perfectly natural. Moulton, who had been the laggard of the whole tragedy, intruded himself as if on purpose to outrage the feelings of Mr. Beecher's wife, kindred and friends, and, in his hellish rage at the failure of his fiendish machinations to ruin and destroy a great man, he insulted public decency. He had neither right nor business there, and it is a wonder he was not torn to pieces.

GEN. PORTIS, of this city, made a proud record at the Goliad Convention, in bravely opposing Coke's endorsement. He has been a life long Democrat, and is utterly opposed to Republican views; but we always give credit to an honest and brave man. In taking the position he did, he represented the rank and file of the Democracy of this District. When "Bill" Russell, the renegade Radical, was the only man to force a Coke resolution on the Convention, Gen. Portis said that he felt it a duty to accept the issue forced on him. Less than a year ago the Governor told the people of San Antonio that he accepted the platform of the Democratic party, which called for a Convention to revise the Constitution, and that it ought to be one of the main objects of legislation. Gov. Coke, elected by 50,900 majority, had been false to his pledges, and had himself labored to prevent the legislation he promised. The Governor had shown no regard to the needs of a bleeding frontier in his conduct of the frontier forces, and in the appointment of a friend, on account of his failing health, to the neglect of old war horses like Ford and others. Did time allow he would discuss the financial policy and other acts of the Governor.

CANAL BETWEEN THE RED RIVER AND THE TRINITY.—We acknowledge an interesting communication on the above subject. The suggestion is that Red River near Gainsville, in Cooke county, approaches to within less than ten miles of the upper branches of Elm fork of Trinity river; that a canal could be cut between these points and the water of Red river diverted into the Trinity, thereby making the latter a navigable stream at least as high up as Dallas. The advantages that would result from the carrying out of this scheme are forcibly set forth. The communication closes with a call upon "our

able and practical city engineer to give this subject his earnest attention," with a view, we suppose, of expressing an opinion as to the practicability and cost of the undertaking.—Dallas Herald.

Dr. V. O. King, of New Orleans, arrived in Galveston yesterday. He is visiting Texas, after a sojourn in the West, whether he went by appointment of Mayor Wiltz, as agent to receive and forward contributions for the Louisiana sufferers by overflow. Dr. King was a member of the Fusion (McEbery) Legislature, and has been connected with the New Orleans press, mostly as a literary, critical and scientific contributor. He is an accomplished scholar, and is equally versed in medicine and law, the latter being the profession of his choice. Like many other Louisianians of like circumstances and antecedents, he feels impelled by the unfortunate condition of affairs in Louisiana to seek a home in Texas—a State that has a hearty welcome for all such exiles. He goes to San Antonio, where he thinks of making his residence, and where he will find a society of congenial culture and tastes. The News commends him to the press and to the public at large of that ancient, picturesque and attractive city.—Galveston News.

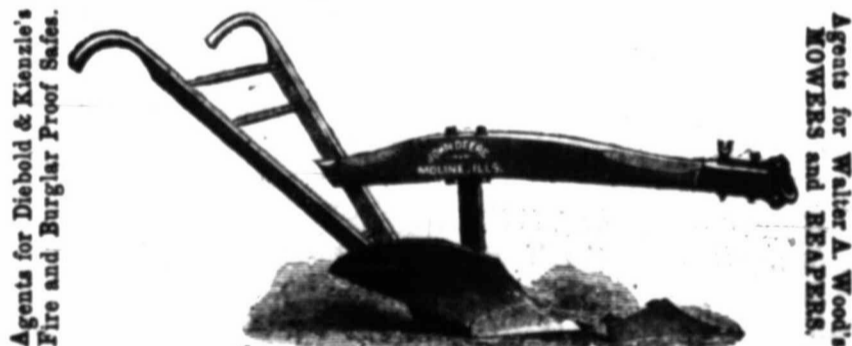

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LAW
OF THE
UNITED STATES,
PASSED AT THE
FIRST SESSION OF THE FOR-
TY-THIRD CONGRESS.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 72.]
(Continued.)

For continuing the collection of statistics and historical data respecting the Indians of the United States, under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior, thirty-five hundred dollars: Provided, That the compensation of the person collecting such data shall not exceed two thousand dollars a year, and his actual individual and necessary traveling expenses.

To enable the Secretary of the Interior to pay Zebulon B. Sturgis, assistant secretary to sign land patents for the President for the month of November, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, one hundred and twenty-two dollars and twenty cents.

PUBLIC LAND.

For surveying the public lands in Kansas, at rates not exceeding ten dollars per linear mile for standard, seven dollars for township, and six dollars for section lines, being a deficiency for fiscal year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, two hundred and thirty-six dollars and sixty-five cents.

For surveying the public lands in Minnesota, at rates not exceeding ten dollars for standard, seven dollars for township, and six dollars for section lines, being a deficiency for fiscal year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, seven hundred and eighty-eight cents.

For surveying the public lands in Oregon, being a deficiency for the fiscal year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-four and prior years, eleven hundred and sixty-two dollars and ninety-five cents.

For office of surveyor-general of California: For rent of office, fuel, books, stationery, and other incidental expenses, for the fiscal year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, nine hundred and fifty-seven dollars and thirteen cents.

For office of surveyor-general of Washington Territory: For clerks in his office for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, seven hundred and one dollar and nine cents.

For office of surveyor-general of Oregon: For clerks in his office for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, six hundred dollars; and for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, three hundred and fifty dollars.

MISCELLANEOUS.

To supply a deficiency in the appropriation for the payment of Navy pensions, seventy-five thousand dollars.

For salary of deputy commissioner of pensions, two thousand five hundred dollars; for salary of medical referee, two thousand five hundred dollars; for additional compensation of four surgeons, two thousand four hundred dollars; making in all, seven thousand four hundred dollars.

To pay John W. Wright for rent of building corner of G and Eighth streets for one year, nine thousand dollars.

For compensation of the commissioners appointed under the first section of the act approved March third, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, entitled "An act to authorize the President to ascertain the value of certain lands in the State of Iowa, north of Racoon Fork of the Des Moines River, held by settlers under the pre-emption and homestead laws of the United States," five thousand five hundred dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary for the payment of the per diem and actual expenses of the commissioners, to be expended under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior.

For the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home, Washington City, District of Columbia, to be expended under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior, eleven thousand three hundred and fifty dollars and ninety-seven cents: Provided, That hereafter no child or children shall be admitted into said home except "the destitute orphans of soldiers and sailors who have died in the late war on behalf of the Union of these States," as provided for in section three of the act entitled "An act to incorporate the National Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphans' Home," approved July twenty-fifth, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, and provided further, That no child nor an invalid shall remain in said home after having attained the age of sixteen years. And the Attorney General is hereby directed to inquire into the necessity for and to take any measures that may be the most effectual to enforce any right or claim which the United States have to this money, or any part of the same, nor involved in the bankruptcy of Henry D. Cooke, or of Jay Cooke and Company.

To complete the grading and erection of stone wall around the Columbia Hospital, eight thousand five hundred dollars.

For defraying the expenses of the Board of Health of the District of Columbia, for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, thirty-one thousand five hundred and seventy dollars.

To enable the Secretary of the Interior to pay Dillingham and Schrems amount due them under their contract for building a penitentiary and an addition thereto in Wyoming Territory, forty dollars.

For completion of the work of the geological and geographical survey of the Territories of the United States by Professor F. V. Hayden, during the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, to be expended under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior, twenty thousand dollars.

For the current expenses of the Government Hospital for the Insane in the District of Columbia, being a deficiency for the service of the present fiscal year, eleven thousand three hundred and sixty-six dollars.

For the Columbian Institution for the Deaf and Dumb in the District of Columbia, to enable the trustees of the institution to pay the amount yet due on the purchase of the estate known as Kendall Green, ten thousand six hundred and ninety-seven dollars and forty-six cents, to be expended under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior.

For repairing and finishing in a thorough and complete manner the bronze statue of Jefferson, placing the same in National Statuary Hall, and procuring a suitable marble base and pedestal therefor, ten hundred and thirteen dollars.

To pay Captain James L. Fisk, of Montana Territory, the amount due to him on settlement of his accounts as officers in charge of overland emigrant expedition, seven thousand eight hundred and sixty-two dollars and thirty-seven cents.
