DEPLORABLE CONDITION OF THE SOUTH-ORGANIZED MOVEMENT TO OPPRESS AND INTIMIDATE - FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

APPRALED TO FOR PROTECTION. St. Louis, Sept. 1 .- Touching accounts of the condition of affairs in the Southern States continue to arrive, and committees from various sections of the South are now on their way to Long Branch to bring the facts to the attention of the President. Two more Congressmen arrived to-day, Senator Spencer and Representative Hayes of Alabama, and their accounts of outrages are worse than any yet reported. Both of these gentlemen saw the Attorney General, and nrged him to immediate

Mr. Hayes, a Southern man and a General in the rebel army, is represented as saying that if his election were to occur to-morrow, he would be beaten, although he was elected to the present Congress by over 5000 majority. He says the negroes are in a perfect panic and know not what the day may bring forth. They are in hourly fear of their lives, and many of them are praying for slavery to be re-stored. He says he is shunned by the white people on account of his vote for the civil rights bill, and even the negroes the civil rights bill, and even the negroes are afraid to have any intercourse with him. Even his old friends cut him on the street. He says near his place the negroes had quietly assembled to hold a cancus for choosing delegates, and that though their proceedings were of a quiet and peaceable character, yet a large body of armed hersemen rode up to the building, 27 8-w4t

masked, and fired their guns and pistols through the windows and doors, killing ten men and breaking up the cancus. The murderers then quickly dashed away.

Senator Spencer also reported many serious cases. Senator Patterson called and brought forward a similar condition of affairs in South Carolina, and Secretary ristow, who also sought a conversation with the Attorney General, said that he was in receipt of letters and dispatched from people who could not misrepresent affairs, and he was satisfied that there had never been such an example of outrage abuse and persecution in Kentucky as the present.
