A FEARFUL STORM at Browns. ville and Brazos Santiago is made known by a special to the Telegraph:

BROWNSVILLE, Sept. 4. A fearful storm has been raging on the coast since early yesterday morning and gradually increasing in tury. Near Bagdad, on yesterday morning, the French brig Coromandel, from Bordeaux, was cast ashore and completely wrecked. The vessel and cargo are a total loss. The captain and three of the crew succeeded in gaining the shore in safety, having clung to portions of the wreck. LIAMS TO U. S. ATTORNEYS AND MAR-SHALS-SQUALLY TIMES AHEAD.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3 .- As a result of the conference held at the War Department and Belknap and Attorney General Williams, the following circular was issued this afternoon at 2 o'clock, to United States Attorneys and Marshals. It has the approval of the President, the substantial parts of the same baving been communicated to him during an interview with the Attorney General at Long Branch.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE, WASH NGTON, Sept. 3, 1874. Sir : - Outrages of various descriptions, and in some cases atrocious murders, have been committed in your district by bodies and intimidating peaceable and law abiding citizens, and depriving them of the

Your attention is directed to an act of Congresa, passed April 9, 1866, entitled an negroes are dead, and eight or ten more act to protect all persons in the United States in their civil rights, and to furnish means for vindication; and to another paered April 20, 1870, entitled an act to enforce the provisions of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, and for other purposes; also, to one passed May 30, 1870, entitled an act to enforce the rights of citizens of the United States to vote in the several States of this Union, and for other purposes, which, with their amendments, make these deeds of violence and blood offenses within the jurisdiction of the General Government. I consider it my duty, in view of these circumstances, to instruct you to proceed with all possible energy and dispatch, to detect, expose, arrest and punish the perpetrators of these crimes; and to that end you are to spare no effort or necessary expense.

Troops of the United States will be stationed at different and convenient points in your district, for the purpose of giving all needful aid in the discharge of your official duties. You understand, of course, that no interference whatever is hereby intended with any political or party action but is for the protection of all classes of citizens, white and colored, in the free exercise of the elective franchise, and the enjoyment of the other rights and privileges to which they are entitled under the Constitution and laws as citizens of the United States. NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 3.-Gov. Kellogg has issued a proclamation placing a reward of \$5000 a head on all the persons implicating in the Coushatta affair and accompa nying his proclamation by the following statement to the public :

government and be directed by the information received at the executive department, that on or about the 28th day of August, 1874, a body of persons belonging to a semi military organization, known as the White League of Louisiana, assembled in the town of Conshatta, parish of Red River, in this State, for the purpose of compelling by force of arms, the State officers of that parish to resign their positions. These officers were men of good character, most of them largely interested in planting and mercantile pursuifs. They held their positions with the full consent of an admittedly large majority of the legal voters of the parish, this being a beavily Republican parish, as admitted by the Fusion returning boards. The only known objection to them is that they were of Republican principles. F. S. Edgerton, the duly qualified Sheriff of the parish, in strict compliance with the laws of this State and of the United States, summoned a posse comitatus of citizens, white and colored, to assist him in protecting the parish officers in the exercise of their undoubted rights and duties, from the threatened unlawful violence of the white leagues. His posse, consisting of 65 men, were overpowered by a superior force assembled from the adjacent parishes, and finally after several colored and white men had been killed, surrendered themselves prisoners, with the explicit guarantee that their lives would be spared if the more prominent Republicans would agree to leave the parish, and those holding office would resign their positions. These stipulations, though unlawfully exacted, were complied with on the part of the Republican officials, who were then locked up in iail for the night.

> "The following named persons were amongst those so surrendering and resigned: Homer J. Twitchell, planter and Tax Collector of Red River parish and Deputy 3.8. Postmaster, in charge of the postoffice at Coushatta; Robt. A. Dewees, Supervisor of Registration, DeSoto parish; Clark Holland, merchant and Supervisor of Registration, Red River parish; W. F. Howell, parish attorney and U. S. Commissioner; F. S. Edgerton, Sheriff of Red River parish, and M. C. Willis, merchant and Justice of the Peace. On the following morning, Sunday, the 30th of August, these persons were bound together, two and two, and conducted by an armed guard to the McFarland plantation, just over the parish line of Red River, and within the boundaries of Bossier parish, about forty miles east of the Texas line. There they were set upon and deliberately murdered in cold blood. On the night preceding the murder, a body of forty members of the white league of Caddo parish, mounted and armed, left the city of Shreveport and were seen riding in the direction of the place where the murder was subsequently committed. For foundation and pedestal for the bronze statue of the late General John A. Rawlins, authorized by act of Congress ap-proved April tenth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, three thousand dollars. And the Secretary of War is authorized to place the same in Rawlins square, or such ber reservation in the city of Washington as he may select.

POST-OFFICE DEPARTMENT.

To enable the Poetmaster-General to offer a reward for the apprehension of the parties concerned in the late mail-robber ies in Missouri, five thousand dollars; and for the same purpose in the matter of the late mail robberies in Texas, three thousand dollars.



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
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
