Thomas K. Beecher's Statement.

THE DOCUMENT IN FULL—WHAT HE
SAYS ABOUT HIS "INJURIOUS"
LETTERS.

The following is the full text of
Rev. Thomas K. Beecher's letter to
the Elmira Gazette, a summary of
which was given in the dispatches
yesterday:

Rev. Thomas K. Beecher, whose
letters have proved so injurious to
his brother's reputation—*The Graphic*,
Sept. 1.

Returning to the world from a
month of quietness in the woods,
I find that a confidential letter of
mine, written as a sequel to a confi-
dential and startling conversation
with a much loved but, as I think,
deluded sister, has been by success-
ive breaches of trust allowed to
transpire and become public prop-
erty. The intent of this letter ap-
pears sufficiently upon the face of it.
It aimed to caution and if possible
dissuade my sister from a costly act
of fanaticism. It was written with-
out other knowledge of facts than
what has been stated to me by her,
and by her were sincerely believed.
In writing to her, therefore, to
avoid controversy, the truth of her
allegations was assumed, or at least
not questioned. Assuming them
to be true, the letter exhorted her
to be faithful to her own convictions,
true to her friend, but at the same
time to be extremely cautious as to
her conduct, based as it seemed
likely to be upon the most untrust-
worthy evidence.

Since the year 1854 I have not
been permitted as much as two
hours in all of earnest conversation
with my honored brother, Henry
Ward. We have been both of us
too busy to find time for the visits
which I at least hungered for. Nor
can I recall any occasion whatever
on which we discussed or even al-
luded to the subjects—marriage, di-
vorce, the family, the relation of
the sexes, female suffrage—or any
phrase whatever of these questions,
delicate or dirty, which are now
pushing up through the seam of gen-
eral discontent and demanding at-
tention.

Clearly, therefore, I am not now
and never have been a witness com-
petent to testify as to my brother's
views and tendencies upon these
latter day questions.

The divergencies of view between
my brother and myself, to which
the letter alludes, and which have
prevented a hearty co-operation be-
tween us, were of a kind which,
when known, redound to his credit
in popular esteem, and to my dis-
grace—demonstrating him a wise
man and me a fool. He, an enthusi-
astic lover of freedom, a believer in
the nobility of human nature, a pro-
phet of progress, purity, and happi-
ness; an instant and urgent anti-
slavery man, a promoter of free
thought and free speech in all direc-
tions, an ingrained and thorough-
paced, hopeful, cheerful, American
citizen, accepting the Declaration
of Independence and a manifest
destiny of glory. I, in contrast, pen-
etrated by a mournful conviction
that human nature is essentially
corrupt and moribund; and except
as guided, taught, governed, and
enlivened, tends to evil and disas-
ter continually; that of all woes free-
dom is the most comprehensive;
that the slave is better off than the
master; that the oppressed are bet-
ter off than their oppressors; that
the cry of progress is a delusion;
that men need government, rebuke,
humiliation; and that until men are
broken in spirit through prolonged
despair they are not in position to
receive the kingdom of heaven as
very little children, and thrive by
what they receive and by what is
done for them of God. He, in short,
looks upon every great popular
movement as a tide obeying a di-
vine guidance; and he makes haste
to go with it. I look upon the same
movement as a strong delusion of
the Adversary—the Prince of this
world—which shall deceive, were it
possible, the very elect; and accord-
ingly I shrink back from it, and cau-
tion all with whom I have influence
against being carried away by it.

Once and only—once have we in
practical affairs worked together,
and that was for the preservation
of the Union and the maintenance
of constitutional government.
These divergencies of view are
fundamental. They are to his credit
as a popular leader, and to my
costly discredit.

Of his personal truth, purity, hon-
or, and piety, I have never for a
moment had a doubt that was

based upon any trustworthy infor-
mation. Many things have been
told me with such an air of truth
that they have staggered me, and
filled me with fear and forebodings,
which I suppose I have shared with
thousands of the best of my fellow-
men; and, with them still, I acknowl-
edge a profound relief when the
man in question stands forth and
denies all fault of whatever kind
save that which impeaches his sa-
gacity and discretion only.

Platform of the Republican Party of the Sixth Congressional District.

1st. Louisiana.

From New Orleans comes the startling intelligence that the White Leaguers have risen in arms against the Kellogg government and, after a prolonged and bloody struggle, have captured the Governor and General Longstreet and created a provisional government. At present our information concerning the immediate origin of this insurrection is too imperfect to permit us to indulge in comment upon it. Doubtless President Grant will take steps which will result in affording the people of Louisiana an opportunity of freely expressing their opinions and desires at the polls in November. Ballots are more intelligent than bullets, and the destinies of a great State cannot be decided by the results of a riot between a partisan league and a partisan police.

Why they Will Fail.

The Louisville Courier-Journal, one of the most honest and able Democratic papers published in the South thus expresses its opinion of the political prospects:

We give it up. There was a chance that the next House of Representatives would not be Radical. That chance is gone. The outbreaks in Kentucky and the massacre in Tennessee settle that much. No people, no party, could stand under such a load as the people of the South and the Democratic party of the North are forced to carry. Call it what you will—the fruit of reconstruction, the inevitable conflict of races, precipitated by a bad theory of government—the one effect of the whole mess of violence is a continuance and re-inforcement of the old pretext by which the country has been carried along the same baleful, partisan rut ever since the war.

It will be plain. As surely as the South begins to get on its feet do its madmen proceed to kick

the fat into the fire. The Radicals only want pretexts. The South supplies them. A war, or the appearance of a war, of races, seems inevitable; and that is itself a third term under proscription. That is the road to the overthrow of republican government, but chiefly at the expense of the South.

The news from Louisiana gives a new and national emphasis to these wise words. If the Democracy had consented to learn from the times and to keep step with the march of thought, they might have regained national leadership, but their determination to rely rather on force than on intelligence and, to yield rather to the passions of their desperadoes, than to the counsels of their wisest critics has forfeited forever their chance of power.

Personalities.

Mr. Degener's speech, the publication of which we complete to-day, deserves special commendation not only for its matter but also for its manner. The live issues of the campaign are trenchantly treated, but the candidate of the opposition is mentioned only with deserved respect and courtesy. Is it too much to hope that the speakers and writers on both sides will follow throughout the contest the good example set before them? Personal abuse is the bane alike of American politics and of American journalism. The fault is largely with the journeymen. If they would treat each other with propriety, if they would remember to honor their profession in the persons of their brothers of the pen, and would refrain from the use of such abusive words as "Jenkinses, Bohemians and ink slingers"—whereby they disgrace their own calling—a more gentlemanly tone would be found in political debate. "Principles not persons" should be the motto of civilized newspapers.

ADDRESS OF HON. E. DEGENER.

Concluded.

Fellow-citizens, you have blamed me four years ago that I endorsed Gov. Davis' administration. Surely if the Davis administration is an abomination, can a Republican vote for it? No, fellow-citizens, the Republican Convention is in honor bound to make a nomination. Aye, if the chances were ten times worse than they actually are, still the Convention would be bound to nominate a stand and bearer, round whom the Republicans can rally and enter their protest against the Coke administration and the Morgan monopoly.

This is the eventuality which was anticipated by the leading Republicans, and induced them to insist on a Convention, though they paid due deference to those Republicans who gave more credit to the wisdom of the Democracy than they have proved to have.

This deference is illustrated in the word or in the call for a Republican Convention. The Democrats have made the unnecessary. I trust the Republicans will substitute "and," by a liberal platform, on which every Democrat "who has honestly and truly accepted the situation" can safely stand, without losing his political self-respect. This alone can secure our victory.

After this lengthy review of the situation, I will return to the question which called me to the stand, and with your permission I will add a few personal remarks.

You know I had the honor to represent this district in the 41st Congress. After the expiration of my term, I published an "open letter" giving an account of my stewardship, and offering my services for re-election, "subject to the decision of a Republican Convention."

Nearly every county pronounced in my favor, passing resolutions at the same time, endorsing the administration of President Grant and Gov. Davis.

After an absence of nearly two years on my official duties, and later on a visit to Europe, I was summoned by telegram to attend the Republican Convention at New Braunfels.

I obeyed the call and bowed to the decision of the Convention, as I was pledged by my "open letter." I might have refused to accept the nomination, as I did not relish the idea of being burdened with State issues, over which a Congressman could exercise no influence. Under no circumstances, however, could I enter the canvass as an independent candidate, without violating my pledged faith.

Knowing, that my withdrawal from the canvass would cause the defeat of the Republican party; not prepared to meet the reproach, that my want of courage had endangered the good cause, I accepted a platform, which was in harmony with the resolutions of primary meeting and identical with the resolutions of Bexar county.

For so acting, I incurred the displeasure of those very men who had participated in the primary meetings. I was defeated, and to this day it is alleged that I was beaten because I accepted the New Braunfels platform.

I will acknowledge, that the inconsistency of the Republicans caused in part my defeat, but the "third party movement" and my refusal to act for Texas the part of Carl Schurz was the principal cause. I contended in my campaign speeches, that it was better to attempt the needed reform, with the assistance and within the Republican party, than with a third new, unorganized party. I still contend, that the policy I proposed was correct, and is correct to this day. Those who do not concur with my views, may look to the results of the Cincinnati Convention, and to the present status of Missouri.

Considering, however, my defeat as a verdict of the people, "that they had no use for me" I declined to take a leading position in subsequent elections, and merely used my influence as a private citizen, for the party I had helped to call into existence.

When the correspondence among leading Republicans, in reference to this canvass commenced I was informed, that I should be called upon to allow my name to be brought before the people.

Others strongly urged me to announce my name as an independent candidate. To the latter I would say: I was a Republican long before the Republican party existed, and shall remain a Republican in principle after the party has ceased to exist. And the people know it. I could not account hardly succeed in convincing any one that the name of independent candidate involved a change of principle. If I tried to convey this idea, it would be a deception.

But waiving all these reasons, I will call your attention to the fact, that a Republican, running independently against the nominee of the convention, does nothing else but help the Democratic candidate.

To those who desire to submit my name to the Republican Convention I will say, that I will comply with their desire and accept the nomination, if the platform, framed by the Convention, is broad enough to allow all Democrats, who have honestly and unreservedly accepted the situation, to vote for it; if it is void of a spiteful partisan character, and embraces only those issues which come under the control of a Congressman.

The more liberal, the more independent the platform is, the better will be the chances of the candidate.

My own desire is to serve the whole people, without respect to party. Under no condition will I serve a ring or a clique, be it financial or political in its nature.

In reference to my personal position before the convention, I will add: I either deserve the confidence of the people or I do not. If the latter is the case, by all means let another man be nominated. If I do deserve the confidence of the people, let the convention manifest this opinion by allowing me to run the race without fetters or shackles.

If this is done, I will cheerfully be your candidate, otherwise I would prefer to remain at home and serve the good cause in rank and file.

The Folly of Brutality.

We see that the San Antonio Express, a Radical organ takes up and ventilates grimly the brutal expression of Mr. French Smith, at the Goliad Convention, to-wit: that he loved to kill Indians but would rather kill one negro than two Indians. It is a just order of God's providence, that a malignant principle reacts like the boomerang, in the hands of an unskillful thrower, upon the pate of the one who uses it. We would care very little if Mr. French Smith got a tap on the pate for his inhuman speech; but we do not protest very earnestly against the right of any savage to draw down upon the Democratic party the resentment of the human race for the utterances of his spleen as a member of that party. We heartily repudiate Mr. French Smith's sentiments and trust that we have heard the last of them. It is just such brutal and insane sentiments that keep us back in a state of political pupillage and hardness against us the hearts of the floating Conservatives.—Galveston Citizen.

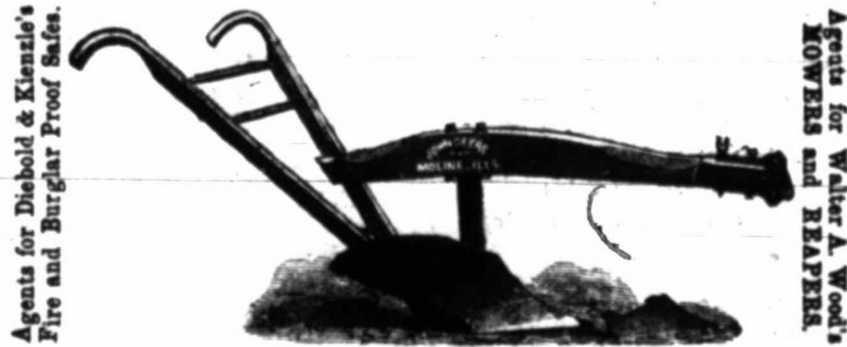

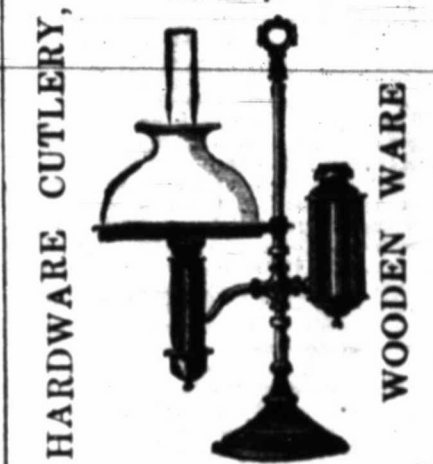

UNITED STATES,

FIRST SESSION OF THE FOR-
TY-THIRD CONGRESS.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 73.]
AN ACT making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and for other purposes.

(Continued.)
CROWS.
For sixth of thirty instalments, to supply male persons, six hundred in number, over fourteen years of age, with a suit of good substantial woolen clothing, consisting of a coat, hat, trousers, flannel shirt, and woolen socks, as per fifth article treaty of May seventh, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, eight thousand four hundred dollars.

For sixth of thirty instalments, to supply each female, seven hundred in number, over twelve years of age, with a flannel shirt, or the goods necessary to make the same, a pair of woolen hose, twelve yards of calico, and twelve yards of cotton domestic, as per same article, eight thousand four hundred dollars.

For sixth of thirty instalments, to supply three hundred and fifty boys and three hundred and fifty girls, under the ages named, such flannel and cotton goods as may be needed to make each a suit as aforesaid, together with a pair of woolen hose for each, per same article, five thousand and twenty three dollars.

For sixth of ten instalments, to be used by the Secretary of the Interior in the purchase of such articles as, from time to time, their condition and necessities may indicate to be proper, the sum of ten dollars for each Indian roaming, as per article, a sum not exceeding ten thousand dollars.

For pay of a physician, per tenth article same treaty, one thousand four hundred dollars.

For fifth of twenty instalments, for pay of teacher and furnishing a cessary books and stationery, under seventh article same treaty, two thousand dollars.

For pay of blacksmith, and iron and steel, as per eighth article of same treaty, two thousand dollars.

For fifth of ten instalments, to be used by the Secretary of the Interior in the purchase of such articles as, from time to time, the condition and necessities of the Indians may indicate to be proper, the sum of twenty dollars for each Indian engaged in agriculture, as per ninth article of same treaty, a sum not exceeding twenty thousand dollars.

For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to furnish flour and meat, one hundred thousand dollars.

For pay of carpenter, engineer, farmer, and blacksmith, as per tenth article treaty of May, seventh, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, four thousand five hundred dollars.

For last of three instalments, for the purchase of seeds and agricultural implements for such Indians as shall farm, one thousand two hundred and fifty dollars.

For transportation of goods, five thousand dollars.
DELAWARES.
For thirty-seven thousand and ninety-five dollars and twenty-five cents, at five per centum, being the value, in part, of thirty-six sections of land set apart by treaty of eighteen hundred and twenty-nine for education, per Senate resolution of June thirteenth, eighteen hundred and thirty-nine, and fifth article treaty of May sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four dollars and seventy-six cents.

D'WAMISH AND OTHER ALLIED TRIBES IN WASHINGTON TERRITORY.
For fifth of twenty instalments on one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, under the direction of the President, per sixth article treaty of January twenty-second, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, six thousand dollars.

For fifth of twenty instalments, for the establishment and support of an agricultural and industrial school, and to provide said school with a suitable instructor or instructors, per fourteenth article treaty of January twenty-second, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, three thousand dollars.

For fifth of twenty instalments, for the support of a smith and carpenter shop and furnishing it with necessary tools, five hundred dollars.

For fifth of twenty instalments, for the employment of a blacksmith, carpenter, farmer, and physician, who shall furnish medicines for the sick, per fourteenth article treaty of January twenty-second, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, four thousand two hundred dollars.

For fifth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair blacksmith, tin and gunsmith, carpenter, and wagon and plow maker shops, and providing necessary tools therefor, per fifth article treaty of July sixteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, five hundred dollars.

For fifth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair saw and boring mills, and for furnishing the necessary tools and fixtures therefor, per fifth article treaty of July sixteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, five hundred dollars.

For fifth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair the hospital, and providing the necessary medicines and furniture therefor, per fifth article treaty of July sixteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, three hundred dollars.

For fifth of twenty instalments, for pay of a physician, per fifth article treaty of July sixteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, one thousand four hundred dollars.

For fifth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair the buildings required for the various employes, and furnishing the necessary furniture therefor, per fifth article treaty of July sixteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, three hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the pay of each of the head chiefs of the Flathead, Kootenay, and Upper Pend d'Oreille tribes, per fifth article treaty of July sixteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, one thousand five hundred dollars.
For first of five instalments, (fourth series,) for beneficial objects, to be expended under the direction of the President, per fourth article of treaty of July sixteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, three thousand dollars.
For transportation of annuity goods and provisions to said Indians, per fifth article treaty of July sixteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, one thousand five hundred dollars.
