**Marshal Bazaine's Letter.**

NEW YORK, September 12—The  
*Herald* publishes a letter from Marshal  
 Bazaine, addressed to Bennett, which  
 was received by cable to-day. Bazaine  
 thanks the *Herald* for its impartiality  
 and the American and English press for  
 their words of sympathy. Several Americans  
 had wished to shake him by the hand,  
 and he felt deeply touched by their  
 sympathy. He complains of the injustice  
 of the verdict of the court-martial, pre-  
 sided over by a prince of the blood who  
 had never conducted a military operation  
 of any importance. He looks to time  
 and history for justice. He bitterly  
 reproaches MacMahon, and makes a large  
 defense of his own military and political  
 course during the late war. He expresses  
 gratitude to ex-President Thiers, who  
 defended him on his return from Mexico.  
 As regards Mexico, the Emperor had to  
 choose between evacuation and a war with  
 the United States to avoid a conflict.  
 He gave the order to return, but Maximilian  
 was unwilling either to return to Austria  
 or to abdicate, although he well understood  
 that Napoleon could not sustain a struggle  
 with the United States. Maximilian, in  
 spite of wise counsel, preferred to seek  
 an honorable death.  
 That is the truth, and that is the  
 extent of each one's responsibility.  
 For my consolation the thought remains  
 that even Washington did not escape  
 injustice, and that Lafayette passed  
 through an ordeal more terrible than  
 mine. In conclusion he says:  
 "I am very far from being rich;  
 but, besides liberty, there still remains  
 an innumerable treasure. For a companion  
 I have an American lady, who gives me  
 the strongest proofs of devotion. I have  
 children. I adore a brother and some  
 friends, who have remained faithful. My  
 position is not hopeless. It need should  
 be, I would follow the example, and  
 take refuge in the labor of a simple  
 soldier. I have carried a musket. Labor  
 does not dishonor. I do not look to my  
 military career as ended. I enjoy health  
 and bodily vigor. Some duties remain to  
 be filled, and I shall fulfill them when  
 the time comes. I hope Fortune will  
 grant me a last smile, as she often  
 does to old soldiers."

**The Memory of a Heroine.**

The noble conduct of Deborah  
 Stiner, who refused to save her own  
 life by forsaking her mother, on the  
 occasion of the burning of her house,  
 last January, will be remembered  
 by many of our citizens. The following  
 needs no explanation and refers to a  
 tablet erected to the brave girl's memory,  
 which was formerly unveiled on Sunday  
 last, at Temple Emmanuel, on which  
 occasion Dr. Gutbell chose his text from  
 the commandment, "Honor thy father  
 and thy mother, that thy days may be  
 long in the land which the Lord thy  
 God giveth thee." With reference to  
 the courageous girl, the preacher said,  
 her days had not been long on earth,  
 but her memory would long be cher-  
 ished. The following is the inscription:  
 "By this tablet the trustees of Temple  
 Emmanuel honor the memory of  
 Deborah Steiner, daughter of Jacob and  
 Linah Steiner, a former pupil of this  
 school, who, in a conflagration, clung  
 to her invalid mother, and, forgetful  
 of her own safety, cried, 'Save my  
 mother!' She remained only to die with  
 her, giving her youthful life of twenty-  
 one a free will offering to filial duty.  
 Parents and daughter died at the same  
 time, viz., January 13, 1874. 'Those  
 beloved and dear to each other in their  
 lives were not divided in death.' I  
 Samuel, i., 23.

People are apt to think of the  
 Scottish guinea as a thing gritty with

THE sad news of domestic discord and bloodshed in Louisiana, and elsewhere in the South, reveals a fearfully dangerous state of feeling. We make no comments now. The patriotic good sense of the country will right all those things in time.

THE interviewer employed by our enterprising cotemporary to visit Col. Schleicher thought it the proper thing to attempt to accost the gallant candidate in German. He was, however, so impressed by the "man behind the scenes," that instead of saying "Guten Morgen" he involuntarily exclaimed "Guten Morgen."

WE publish to-day the speech of Mr. Schleicher, delivered at Goliad on accepting the Democratic nomination for Congress. We do this for two reasons. One is, that we intend to show the perfect fairness of the Republican party in the coming race. We are entirely willing that the candidate of the Democratic party shall have as fair a showing in the Republican press as in the Democratic press. We feel compelled to say that we have but little hope that the Democratic press of the State and of the District will deal as fairly by us as we are trying to deal by them.

Another reason we have for reproducing Mr. Schleicher's speech is, that, while we are compelled to oppose him politically, and to beat him if we possibly can, in the interests of Western Texas, we have respect for him as a well known and intelligent citizen of the State. We desire to do him full justice. It is not that we love Caesar less, but Rome more. He is in bad company, both politically, and also in regard to the welfare of the section of the State which he seeks to represent in Congress. This view of the case is fully set forth in the able and powerful speech made a few days since by Hon. Edward Degen, and to that speech we refer the people of the District. It is really unanswerable. Mr. Degen has made himself the champion of the interests and welfare of West Texas; and his speech, if read throughout the District, will be the principal cause of the defeat of Mr. Schleicher. The best proof of the truth of our position will be, that the Democratic press will not dare to publish Mr. Degen's speech. They may garble it and criticize it, but they will not fairly publish it as a whole.

Present Dangers and Duties.

From an address delivered by H. Ammit Brown on the occasion of the celebration of the Centennial of the First American Congress, we make the following extract, commending its spirit and advice to the voters who in a few weeks will be called upon to discharge their duty to their country at the polls:

The dangers of to-day come from within. The worship of self, the love of power, the lust for gold, the weakening of faith, the decay of public virtue, the lack of private worth. These are the perils which threaten our future; these are the enemies we have to fear; these are the traitors which infest the camp; and the danger was far less when Catiline knocked with his army at the gates of Rome, than when he sat smiling in the Senate House. We see them daily face to face; in the walk of virtue, in the road to wealth, in the path to honor, on the way to happiness. There is no such peace between them and our safety. Nor can we avoid them and turn back. It is not enough to rest upon the past. No man or nation can stand still. We must mount upward or go down. We must grow worse or better. It is the Eternal Law—we cannot change it. Nor are we only concerned in what we do. \* \* \* My countrymen, the moments are quickly passing, and we stand like some traveler upon a lofty crag that separates two boundless seas. The century that is closing is complete. "The past," said your great statesman, "is secure." It is finished and beyond our reach. The hand of dejection cannot dim its glories nor the tears of repentance wipe away its stains. Its good and evil, joy and sorrow, its truth and falsehood, its honor and its shame we cannot touch. Sigh to them, blush for them, weep for them, if we will, we cannot change them now. The old century is dying and they are to be buried with him; his history is finished, and they will stand upon its roll forever.

The century that is opening is all our own. The years that lie before us are a virgin page. We can inscribe them as we will. The future of our country rests upon us; the happiness of posterity depends on us. The fate of humanity may be in our hands. That pleading voice, chocked with the sobs of ages, which has so often spoken to deaf ears, is lifted up to us. It asks us to be brave, benevolent, consistent, true to the teachings of our history, proving "divine descent by worth divine." It asks us to be virtuous—building up public virtue upon private worth. It asks us to be patriotic—loving our country before all other things; her happiness our happiness, her honor ours, her fame our own.

The Houston Telegraph favors the abolition of the two-thirds rule in Democratic conventions, and cites the nomination of Schleicher by the Goliad convention as one of the unfortunate results of this rule. The Telegraph makes a strong point there.—Waco Register.

THE GOLIAD CONVENTION.  
Col. Schleicher's Speech of Acceptance.  
On the nomination of the Hon. Gustave Schleicher at the Goliad Convention he replied as follows:  
"Mr. President and Members of the Convention—I am deeply gratified at the honor you have tendered me, so much so that I can scarcely give expression to my feelings. I came here with entirely different expectations; I came to support with all the means in my power and to nominate a friend whom I have long known and respected—Gov. Stockdale. I have done all in my power to do so, and if I feel any regret at all—if such a thing can be—it is that my success rests upon the defeat of a friend. I am astonished and more gratified than I can express at this expression of friendship, considering the fact that I have been so long absent from public life, that this proof that I am not entirely forgotten is gratifying beyond measure. I now take this honor at your hands and promise you that as far as I am capable, it shall be directed to the success of our cause. I have been a Democrat ever since I could vote. I never cast a vote but a Democratic vote, and never expect to. I have stood by the Democratic party when in its strength and glory, and have stood as faithfully by it when in defeat and misfortune. There is no time and no occasion now to go into any discussion of the principles of the party. My leading idea of politics is, that there are two ideas of government, one a personal one, and the other governed by supreme law; the one controlled by one person or a rabble of persons, and the other by immutable law prescribed by the people. I have always thought that the Democratic party has sustained and held aloft the government of law as against the personal government of the other party. There is a Monarchical form of government; ours is the reverse. My opinions are well known, and having held such opinions for so long a period, I cannot change them if I would. So much for political status. I am not prejudiced so far as localities are concerned, and give my support to all of them. I well know the extent and the cause of the frontier troubles. I lived for twenty years among you—San Antonio was my home—and I am proud to call as friends many of those I see around me. I have not been much upon the frontier and the Rio Grande, but the sufferings detailed by Maj. Murphy, Gen. Baylor and others, have sunk deep into my heart. On the frontier and among Indians I cannot claim many heroic deeds. Gen. Baylor knows more of those things, but I know what the frontier people need, for I have been among them somewhat

and have had some difficulty sometimes in preserving my own hair. My will to serve every section of this district is good. What my ability to do so may be, it is not for me to say this, that in as much as selfishness in the individual is the basis of every vice, so is the benefit of one section to the injury or exclusion of the other, the basis of every vice politically. Let the wants of any section obtain the support of all the others and let all sections be considered equally. This is a basis on which every man in the District can stand.  
"Ten or fifteen minutes ago I thought I should go from here a very sad man, because I am free to say that the man of my choice was defeated. I regret that still, and I hope it is not disrespectful to the will of the convention to say, that I would rather have seen the gentleman I supported the nominee than myself. Maj. Brackenridge has also been called to the front. I assure him and you that it was not my purpose to be antagonistic to any of the candidates, and it was repugnant to my feelings from the very first moment it was mentioned. But as from your action it appears desirable that I should be your choice, I have no right to say "no," and what I can do between now and the day of election shall be done to the best of my ability.

## Telegraphic.

AN ACCOUNT OF THE GREAT STORM—SUFFERING AND LOSS OF LIFE.  
BROWNSVILLE, Sept. 12.—The storm lasted sixty hours.

The persons in the surf boat at Brazos reached the sand hills and were saved. They remained on the hills forty eight hours and suffered intensely. They reached Point Isabel on Monday morning. Everything was swept from Brazos. The lighthouse fell and killed Mrs. Hamilton, the keeper's wife. One Mexican drowned. The beach is lined with lumber, goods, dead cattle, etc.

The Texas Ranger was capsized and went ashore on Padre Island. Two of the crew were saved. The schooner Rudd, steamer Sellers, and every craft near Brazos and Point Isabel, went ashore, except the pilotboat at Bagdad. Everything swept away. Two houses standing in Clarksville.

The railroad has been considerably damaged. The railroad warehouse and ticket office were blown down at Point Isabel. On Sunday the steamer San Juan left here with supplies for sufferers. She brought people from Bagdad to Matamoros.

Money and supplies have been sent to Brazos for the sufferers at Point Isabel. The damages here and in Matamoros are not extensive, but repairs will cost considerable. Matamoros is half under water, and the river still rising. A great many animals have been drowned. The Brazos people speak highly of the pilot, Jan. Baker, for his exertions to save them; also of Mr. Van Eipper, telegraph operator. No mails have been received here since last Saturday, and none in Matamoros for several days. Twenty five lives are known to have been lost. Although the track of the Rio Grande Railroad has been somewhat injured by the late storm, the railroad company has given public notice that they are prepared to receive and forward goods as usual, and that their transportation business is not interrupted.

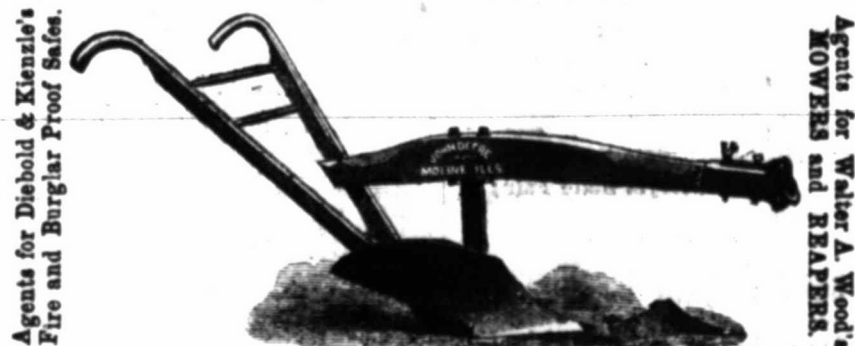

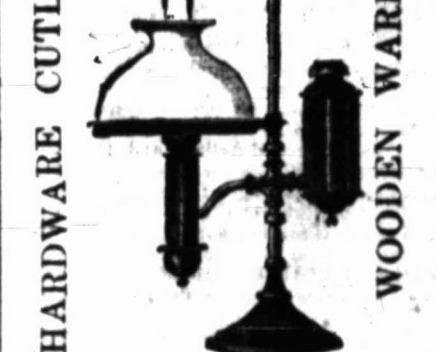

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 73.]  
AN ACT making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and for other purposes.  
(Continued.)

**GROS VENTRES.**  
For this amount, to be expended in such goods, provisions, and other articles as the President may, from time to time, determine, including transportation thereof, in instructing in agricultural and mechanical pursuits, in providing employees, educating children, procuring medicine and medical attendance, care for and support of the aged, sick, and infirm, for the helpless orphans of said Indians, and in any other respect to promote their civilization, comfort and improvement, thirty-five thousand dollars.

**IOWA.**  
For interest in lieu of investment on fifty-seven thousand five hundred dollars, balance of one hundred and fifty-seven thousand five hundred dollars, to July first, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, at five per centum per annum, for education or other beneficial purposes, under the direction of the President, per ninth article of treaty of May seventeen, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, two thousand eight hundred and seventy-five dollars.

**KANSAS.**  
For interest in lieu of investment on two hundred thousand dollars, at five per centum per annum, per second article treaty of January fourteenth, eighteen hundred and forty-six, ten thousand dollars.

**KICKAPOO.**  
For interests on ninety-five thousand nine hundred and forty-five dollars and ninety-five cents, at five per centum per annum, for educational and other beneficial purposes, per treaty of May eighteen, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, four thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven dollars and twenty-nine cents.

For settlement, support, and civilization of Kickapoo Indians in Indian Territory, lately removed from Mexico, and such as may be removed hereafter, twenty-five thousand dollars.

For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to complete the removal of the remaining Kickapoo and other American Indian tribes, roving on the borders of Texas and Mexico, to reservations within the Indian Territory, not to exceed sixty-five thousand dollars, and this sum to be made available for said purpose from and after the passage of this act: Provided, That no liability shall be incurred for said removal for any sum in excess of the amount herein appropriated: Provided further, That the expense of said Indians shall not exceed ninety dollars for each Indian removed to the reservation, and no liabilities shall be incurred or payments made for a greater amount; but this provision shall not be so construed as to prevent the payment of the salary of the commissioners appointed to remove them, and their legitimate and proper traveling and personal expenses; and not exceeding five thousand dollars may be used for compensation of interpreters, guides, and couriers and such other expenditures as may be deemed actually necessary, to contribute, in affecting said removal.

**KLAMATH AND MODOC INDIANS.**  
For fourth of five instalments, to be applied under direction of the President, as per second article treaty of October fourteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, one thousand dollars.

For eighth of twenty instalments, for keeping in repair one saw-mill, one flouring-mill, buildings for the blacksmith, carpenter, and wagon and plow-maker, the manual-labor school, and hospital, as per fourth article treaty of October fourteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, one thousand dollars.

For ninth of twenty instalments, for the purchase of tools and material for saw and flour mills, carpenter, blacksmith, wagon and plow-maker shops, and book and stationery for the manual-labor school, as per fourth article treaty of October fourteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, one thousand five hundred dollars.

For ninth of fifteen instalments, for pay and subsistence of one superintendent of farming, one farmer, one blacksmith, one sawyer, one carpenter, and one wagon and plow maker, as per fifth article treaty of October fourteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, six thousand dollars.

For ninth of twenty instalments, to pay salary and subsistence of one physician, one miller, and two school-teachers, as per fifth article treaty of October fourteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, three thousand six hundred dollars.

**MAKAH TRIBE.**  
For fifth of ten instalments of thirty thousand dollars, (being the first series,) under direction of the President, as per fifth article treaty of January thirty-first, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, one thousand dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for support of a smith and carpenter shop, and to provide the necessary tools therefor, per eleventh article treaty of January thirty-first, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, five hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the support of an agricultural and industrial school, and pay of teachers, per eleventh article of same treaty, two thousand five hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the employment of a blacksmith, carpenter, farmer, and physician, who shall furnish medicine for the sick, four thousand six hundred dollars.

**MEMONONES.**  
For the ninth of fifteen instalments of seventy upon two hundred and forty thousand six hundred and eighty-six dollars, for cession of lands, per fourth article treaty of May twelfth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, and Senate amendment thereto, sixteen thousand one hundred and seventy-nine dollars and six cents.

**MIAMI OF KANSAS.**  
For permanent provision for blacksmith and assistant, and iron and steel for shop, per fifth article treaty of October sixth, eighteen hundred and eighteen, and fourth article treaty of June fifth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, nine hundred and forty dollars.

For permanent provision for miller, in lieu of gunsmith, per fifth article treaty of October sixth, eighteen hundred and eighteen, fifth article treaty of October twenty-third, eighteen hundred and thirty-four, and fourth article treaty of June fifth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, six hundred dollars.

For interest on fifty thousand dollars, at five per centum, for educational purposes, per third article treaty of June fifth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, two thousand five hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments upon one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, per third article treaty of June fifth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, seven thousand five hundred dollars.

**MIAMI—EEL RIVER.**  
For permanent annuity, in goods or otherwise, per fourth article treaty of August third, seventeen hundred and ninety-five, five hundred dollars.

For permanent annuity, in goods or otherwise, per article treaty of August twenty-first, eighteen hundred and five, two hundred and fifty dollars.

For permanent annuity in goods or otherwise, per third and separate articles treaty of September thirtieth, eighteen hundred and nine; three hundred and fifty dollars.

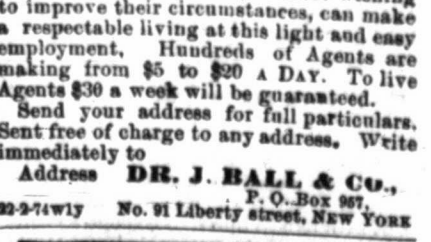
