THE President's proclamation will be read by every law-abiding citizen with satisfaction. The majesty of the law is about to be asserted and every good man in the country feels more secure in his life, liberty and property.

THE insurrection of the "White Leaguers" in Louisiana has been called "an uprising of the people to regain their liberties." It is as false as it is impudent, and will meet a severe rebuke at the hand of the people of the Republic.

THE spirit of the Texas Democratic press over the recent outrages committed in Louisiana by McEnery and his "White Leaguers" will go far to convince the loyal public over the nation, that the spirit of '61 is still rampant.

Gov. COKE's friends and supporters in Waco got up a wild demonstration over the New Orleans massacre, fired 100 guns, and listened to some senseless twaddle from one G. B. Gerald. It is always best to avoid whistling until you are out of the woods.

GOV. KELLOGG'S DISPATCH, which we publish, gives the true state of the case in Louisiana. His opponents to not pretend to deny it. That vast corruption existed in that State, is not denied, but it was not his fault. He remedied it as rapidly as possible, under the fiercest opposition. Warmouth, the corrupt leader of the Democratic party in the last canvass, is the author of all that corruption.

THE New Braunfels Zeitung, an able German paper, published as an independent journal, and in most previous elections leaning to the Democratic side, has come out openly for Hon. Jere. Galvan, and the platform upon which he was nominated. It will not support the Coke and Morgan candidate. We shall soon translate the able editorial of the Zeitung for the columns of the EXPRESS. Our Goliad Convention friends will soon see that we were right in our early predictions in relation to the present canvass. They see it now, we imagine.

NEW YORK merchants write to the Attorney General that large quantities of arms and ammunition have been sold there for the organized bodies in the Southern States.—*Telegraph Dispatch.*

LOUISIANA is the first battle ground of the new rebellion, a rebellion headed by Democratic politicians, and men who, unfortunately, did not get fighting enough during the first rebellion. The Louisiana affair was no sudden uprising, but a deliberate, well planned, cold blooded attempt to force a war upon the Government, and to overthrow a State government.

Treason and Murder.

The Democrats of the South, who support the unparalleled outrage of overthrowing the State government of Louisiana, will soon find the public opinion of the country and of the world is against them. Secession, which claimed that it was not in violation of the Constitution nor of the original compact between the States, and therefore a peaceable remedy for alleged wrongs, was formal and decent compared to this bloody and murderous affair. And yet secession is dead forever, although no one was punished for treason or murder in fighting against the government and killing our soldiers.

But what will be the condition of the country, Penn, Ogden, and their

associates, when brought to trial for both treason and murder? And that they will be thus brought to trial, as soon as the State government is restored, there can be no doubt. And they will be convicted, if there is any just enforcement of the laws. Treason against the State they have committed. Murder they have committed in overpowering and killing about twenty or thirty of her officers and citizens. All this will certainly follow the re-establishment of the State government.

WE feel it our duty as well as pleasure to compliment our neighbor, the *Herald*, upon the absence of bitterness, and the exercise of a fair and respectful spirit, in its leader on the present Congressional canvass, in yesterday's issue. We hail every such manifestation of a return to a better state of feeling between the political parties in this country, with pleasure and with hope. Bitter partizan feeling in the past has well nigh been the ruin of the country on several memorable occasions, and we are at this moment passing through a crisis of the most dangerous character. Despotism is always the final result of anarchy, and anarchy is always dangerously near when the passions of contending parties are lashed to fury by bitter and violent journals and orators. The press of this country has not done its duty in the past in this regard. It has been an engine of great power, but that power has not been as conservatively used as it should have been. Surely the fearful struggle of our late civil war, the scarcely less fearful struggle of opposing parties since, together with the late instances of the overthrow of civil order in whole States, should teach our political journals and teachers wisdom, moderation, and charity.

Press Comments on the Louisiana Campaign.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—The evening papers have the following comments on the situation in New Orleans: "The *Post* says in a meeting to petition for redress of grievances, the people exercised a constitutional right, but when the same men erected barricades in the streets, they acted precisely as if they had been Frenchmen, and appealed only to revolution. It is true Kellogg and his associates, confident in the support of the Federal Government, treated their petitions with derision, and the petitioners, aware of the legal means, resorted to arms. This step the *Post* considers illegal, and advises the people of Louisiana that they cannot obtain their rights by force of arms. The Administration is bound to maintain order, and despite the course of the Southern people, it only forges weapons for their adversaries."

"The *Mail* deplores the outbreak of a conflagration of which no man can see the end, earnestly deprecates a war of races, and regrets the necessity for the interference of the general Government with the concerns of the States."

"The *Express* denounces the President for again supporting Kellogg, but feels there is nothing left for Louisiana but submission to the strong arm of the Federal Government. The revolution must be ended by legal and constitutional means, but to stand by Kellogg's usurpations would only add to the present wrong. The *Express* also urges that Gen. Sherman be placed in command at New Orleans, with power to see justice done to the whites and blacks, and pacify the State."

"The *Commercial* says the bloody riot has been caused by the incendiary action of the White League, evidently in pursuance of a pre-arranged plan; but lawlessness must be put down at all hazards, and it is better the battle be fought out in New Orleans than elsewhere, unless a premium be put on rioting. The recognized Government of Louisiana must be sustained. Result of the Cabinet Meeting—The Insurgent Government not to be recognized."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—The result of the Cabinet meeting this evening, was an agreement that the following dispatch be sent immediately by the Adjutant General of the army:

WAR DEPARTMENT,
WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 }
To Gen. Emory, commanding the Federal forces in Louisiana:

Under no circumstances recognize the insurgent government of Louisiana. Within five days of the date of the proclamation to the insurgents, such action will be taken, as the emergency may require. By order of the President.

Dispatch from Kellogg—He wants to hold on.
Kellogg in a dispatch says: Amid all the troubles which have beset the State, I have reduced the State and parish taxation each fully one-third, and measures have been passed for the reduction of the State debt, and for a constitutional limitation of the debts both of the State and

of the city. Also an amendment limiting taxation.

The obnoxious features of the election and registration laws used by the Fusionists in the last election have been repealed, and in the appointment of the officers of registration I have voluntarily tendered the opposition a representation, which they entirely denied to the Republican party in the last election.

These and other measures have deprived the opponents of the Republican party of any just cause of complaint against the State Government. They have by a long prepared plan violently overthrown the Government even before the election, to prevent the election being held, and to prevent the evidence that they had not a majority before. Upon shallow pretenses and by incendiary statements and appeals, they have got together their clans, which they have organized in secret, and drilled in their club rooms, and in the city, have taken possession of the public offices by violence and bloodshed. Personally, I have no desire to discharge the very serious and vexatious duties of Governor, but I feel it a duty I owe to the State and to the party to hold on until relieved by competent authority.

Gov. Kellogg in the Customhouse and in Good Spirits.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 16.—Gov. Kellogg and his followers remain in the customhouse. The Governor appears in good spirits and is quietly awaiting the expiration of the five days allowed by the President, when he expects to be restored by the military. He insists that he must be put back by United States troops and maintained by them.

THE MIDDLE between the Pierce road and Seguin seems as far from settlement as ever, from what we see in the Times of that town. But the report on our streets is that the road will be pushed through to this city. We hope it is true, but the mysterious silence preserved makes us wish for more assurance. A correspondent of that paper makes the following statement: "To understand the relation of Seguin to the Pierce R. R., it is necessary to know that the last Legislature passed a railroad law granting all railroads, that had complied with their charters, a renewal, to which law Senator Ireland added an amendment, requiring the Pierce road to run by and maintain a permanent depot not more than a half mile from the Court house in Seguin. In compliance with that law, the representative of the road has run several try lines through Seguin and its vicinity, and finds the best practicable crossing of the San Geronimo immediately East of Seguin, will throw the road a little over a mile from the Court House; the citizens of Seguin at a public meeting, sanctioned in their individual capacity, the change of distance from a half mile to a mile from the Court House, and appointed a committee to confer with the road representative, in relation to the matter. That conference resulted in a request from the road, that the citizens of Seguin would partially indemnify for the expense incurred in deflecting from their former route, and grant them the right of way through the county, and fifty acres of land at their depot—which they estimate at seven or eight thousand dollars, about one-tenth of the cost of deflection; to which the citizens of Seguin object, and this leaves the matter just where it started."

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 14, 1874.

Editors Express:

Our present railroad system has so wonderfully developed as to become, probably, the largest and most powerful (financially and politically considered) organization now extant in the United States. The building of so many thousands of miles of costly railroads within the last five or six years; the draining of many millions of the capital of the world to this one source; the fact that our country is suffering from a reaction—a panic arising from this sole cause of excessive speculative railroad absorption, and failure of such enterprises to meet their dues and obligations, causes our wisest statesman to pause, and cast about for a remedy for this gigantic evil, and at the same time not to retard the continued growth and prosperity of the newer portions of our country where railroad communication is a prime necessity. To meet this necessity, the Narrow Gauge railway system, which has now fully established itself in public was inaugurated. Still the want of still cheaper railway facilities for city streets for suburban residents, for farming communities, and for interior and remote regions, remains unsupplied, and the public mind is probably more exercised, to day, over the problem of safe, speedy, cheap and frequent railroad facilities, than upon any other topic of general public interest. To meet this great want of the country the American one-rail railway system is presented to the people of the United States and to this section particularly as a means of arriving more nearly to these desirable conclusions than has yet been attained by any other plan of railway locomotion now in existence. In connection with the foregoing facts it is probably necessary to speak more in detail of the necessary considerations entering into the construction of a railway on this system; these are safety, speed, durability and cost of construction and maintenance. It is a physical impossibility for engines or cars to be thrown from the track. Only by tearing out the entire rolling stock from beneath the cars, or by destroying absolutely the track itself, can a disaster happen from this source. To its speed there is no appreciable limit. It can be estimated only by the power of the engine used. While forty to fifty miles per hour is the limit to the best of our present railroads, by this system one hundred miles per hour can as readily be obtained, with far greater assurance of safety. The Prismoid track, well built, and painted is almost indestructible. The iron rail weighing eighteen pounds to the yard, being thoroughly cushioned by the wood beneath it, will last four times the ordinary life of a rail on the two-track system, and as to repairs, the fact of its complete exemption from frost action, broken rails, low joints, and spreading of tracks, makes them less than nominal. As for cost this road can be built and equipped for less than the cost of the narrow gauge railway for construction alone, and with the same amount of rolling stock, will do three times the amount of business that can be done by any broad or narrow gauge railway in the country at two thirds less cost. This railway system presents itself especially to the citizens of the West. A slight co-operation will build roads to remote distances paying tribute to San Antonio, large districts of country which would remain for years inaccessible by the present expensive plan of constructing railroads. In fact, it renders railroads possible where heretofore they have been an impossibility.

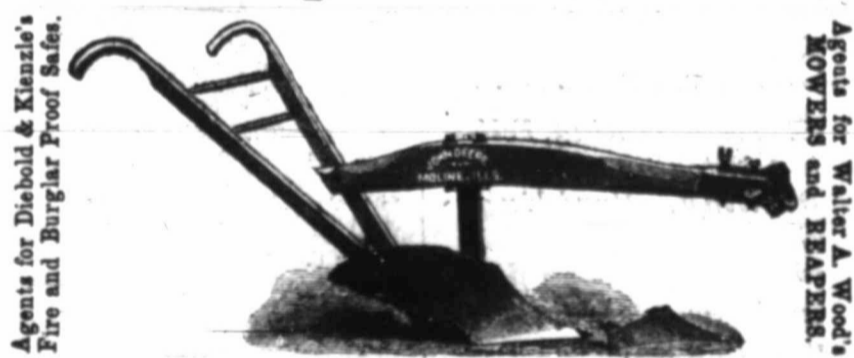

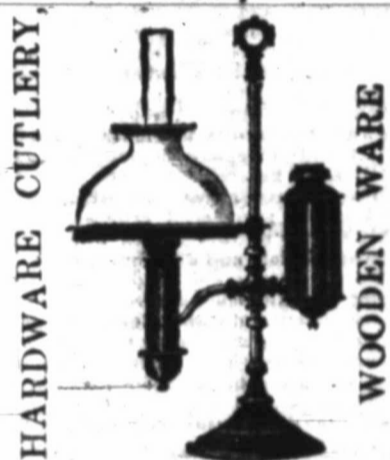

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 73.]

AN ACT making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and for other purposes.

(Continued.)

POTTAWATOMIES.

For permanent annuity, in silver, per fourth article treaty of August third, seventeen hundred and ninety-five, three hundred and fifty-seven dollars and eighty cents.

For permanent annuity, in silver, per third article treaty of September thirtieth, eighteen hundred and nine, one hundred and seventy-eight dollars and ninety cents.

For permanent annuity, in silver, per third article treaty of October second, eighteen hundred and eighteen, eight hundred and ninety-four dollars and fifty cents.

For permanent annuity, in money, per second article treaty of September twentieth, eighteen hundred and twenty-eight, seven hundred and fifteen dollars and sixty cents.

For permanent annuity, in specie, per second article treaty of July twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and twenty-nine, and second article of treaty of September twentieth, eighteen hundred and twenty-eight, five thousand seven hundred and twenty-four dollars and seventy-seven cents.

For educational purposes, five thousand dollars.

For permanent provision for payment of money, in lieu of tobacco, iron, and steel, per second article treaty of September twentieth, eighteen hundred and twenty-eight, and tenth article treaties of June fifth and seventeenth, eighteen hundred and forty-six, one hundred and seven dollars and thirty-four cents.

For permanent provisions for three blacksmiths and assistants, and for steel and iron for shops, per third article treaty of October sixteenth, eighteen hundred and twenty-sixth, second article treaty of September twentieth, eighteen hundred and twenty-eight, and second article treaty of July twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and twenty-nine, one thousand and eight dollars and ninety-nine cents.

For permanent provision for fifty barrels of salt, per second article treaty of July twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-six dollars and fifty-four cents.

For interest on one hundred and sixty-three thousand one hundred and twenty-three dollars and eighty-five cents, at five per centum, in conformity with provisions of article seventh of treaties of June fifth and seventeenth, eighteen hundred and forty-six, eleven thousand five hundred and three dollars and twenty-one cents.

POTTAWATOMIES OF HURON.

For permanent annuity, in money or otherwise, per second article treaty of November seventeenth, eighteen hundred and seven, four hundred dollars.

QUAPAWS.

For the education, during the pleasure of the President, per third article treaty of May thirtieth, eighteen hundred and thirty-three, one thousand dollars.

For blacksmith and assistants, and tools, iron, and steel for blacksmith-shop, per same article of same treaty, one thousand and sixty dollars.

For one farmer, during the pleasure of the President, per same treaty, six hundred dollars.

QUI NAJ-ELT AND QUI-LEH-UTE INDIANS.

For last of five instalments on twenty-five thousand dollars (being the first series,) for beneficial objects, under the direction of the President, per fourth article treaty of July first, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, one thousand dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the support of an agricultural and industrial school, and for pay of suitable instructors, per tenth article treaty of July first, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, two thousand five hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for support of smith and carpenter shop, and to provide the necessary tools therefor, per tenth article treaty of July first, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, five hundred dollars.

For employment of a blacksmith, carpenter, and farmer, and a physician, who shall furnish medicines for the sick, per tenth article treaty of July first, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, four thousand one hundred dollars.

RIVER-CROWS.

For this amount, to be expended for such goods, provisions, and other articles as the President, from time to time, may determine, including transportation thereof, in instructing in agricultural and mechanical pursuits, in providing employees, educating children, procuring medicine and medical attendance, care for and support of the aged, sick, and infirm, and in any other respect to promote their civilization, comfort, and improvement, thirty thousand dollars.

ROQUE RIVERS.

For last of five instalments, in blankets, clothing, farming utensils, and stock, per fourth article treaty of September tenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-three, three thousand dollars.

SACS AND FOXES ON THE MISSISSIPPI.

For permanent annuity, in goods or otherwise, per third article treaty of November third, eighteen hundred and four, one thousand dollars.

For interest on two hundred thousand dollars, at five per centum, per second article of October twenty-first, eighteen hundred and thirty-seven, ten thousand dollars.

For interest on eight hundred thousand dollars, at five per centum, per second article treaty of October eleventh, eighteen hundred and forty-two, forty thousand dollars, of which sum one thousand five hundred dollars shall be paid for a physician for the agency, who shall furnish the necessary medicines: Provided, That so much of the appropriation herein made for the Sacs and Foxes on the Mississippi as shall be deemed necessary by the Secretary of the Interior, not exceeding fifty per centum thereof, may be used, under his direction, for the purpose of education and civilization: Provided further, That the Indians shall consent thereto.

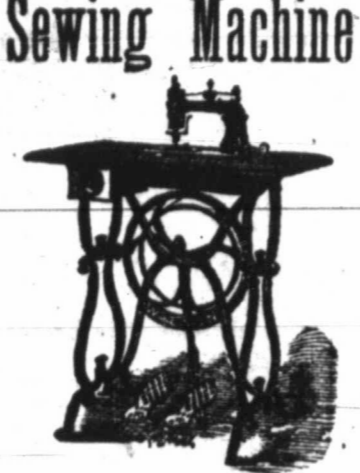

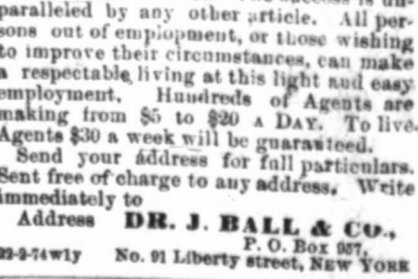
