AN attempt was made a few weeks since to assassinate the President of Peru, but it failed. If the White League continues its operations, we may expect similar things in this country.

J. M. West, mentioned as one of the "white leaguers" killed in the insurrection at New Orleans, was well known here among our old citizens. He was one of the original proprietors of the San Antonio Herald. He was known as a very excitable revolutionary character, having served with Walker in Nicaragua, and was always ready to engage in a mob or a row.

The "White League" is only another name for the original "Ku Klux Klan." It has had various names, "Knights of the Camelia," and many others. It once existed all over the South, shortly after the war, and has occasionally been locally revived. This last revival in Louisiana shows that Grant knew what he was about in punishing its crimes in Georgia and elsewhere. The brazen effrontery and falsehood of the Democratic press in denying the existence of such an organization shows that no truth can be expected from the bitter partizan Democracy of the South.

How Gen. Badger and his Police were Massacred.
 A special dispatch to the St. Louis Democrat dated New Orleans Sept. 15th says:

"The concentration of the police at the foot of Canal street yesterday was for the purpose of preventing the capture of the arms on board the steamship Mississippi. While in an exposed position they were fired into by the White League, who were secreted in the adjoining buildings, in steamboats, behind cotton bales and sugar hog-heads. Volley after volley was poured into the police, and their assailants yet invisible. The wounding of Badger and the capture of their cannon demoralized them, and they retreated to the Custom-house. Almost all of the killed were shot in the top of the head showing that the shots were fired from adjoining buildings." The murderous ambuscade thus described above might have been expected from a band of apaches, but was disgraceful to an army composed of Southern white men. The further this Louisiana business is exposed, the less honor or excuse will be left the perpetrators of the massacre of the 14th of September.

Southern Republican Convention.

The call for a convention of the Republicans of the reconstructed States, to be held at Chattanooga, Tenn., on the 13th of October, is being signed by many prominent Republicans. The call says: "All Republicans, whether of these or other States, who still earnestly seek to maintain the principles on which the Union was defended, and to inaugurate which in the South reconstruction was begun, and who feel an interest in the preservation of citizenship, are invited to attend this convention. All should come possessed of the facts as to the true condition in their respective localities, so that an authoritative statement may be made to the country. The Republicans of the South, equally with the good citizens of other sections, demand peace and security that prosperity may follow. Why these are not enjoyed by them should be made manifest by this convention. If there are those anywhere who doubt as to the purposes or capacity of Southern Republicans, or who believe the oppressions under which they are laboring have been magnified, let them come and see and hear for themselves."

MAINE swings into the Republican line with a majority of over 12,000. The canvass which has just closed was an unusually quiet one,

although the Democrats fought hard to cut down the majority, especially in Mr. Blaine's district. Mr. Hamlin will, in all probability, succeed himself in the United States Senate.

MORE than four fifths of the Bourbon Democracy of this city—the American part—is Know-nothing. The "Sons of the South" all vote the Democratic ticket.

THE Democracy of San Antonio might well be divided into two classes—Union, and Know-nothing. The former go for men and measures, the other for "anything to beat Grant."

THE Know-nothing Democrats of the South are very consistent. They "don't vote with them. But whenever they do they are a "proud race"—the Teutonic—noble specimens of manhood.

JERRY GALVAN is an Irishman, and was, doubtless, before the war a good Democrat; but, being a Union man, his property was confiscated by the Bourbons. Could he be, consistently, anything else now than a good Republican?

WHEN the Bourbons of the South are politically defeated, and true Democracy, or Republicanism—the same thing—takes its place, we shall find Mr. Galvan, and all lovers of liberty, in the front ranks. The Irish love liberty.

JUDGE GALVAN will soon be in San Antonio. Nothing but the tremendous rains, and the terrible condition of the roads, have prevented his arrival here before this time.

There is a great desire to see him, and more curiosity is manifested in relation to him than any man we have heard of lately. When he comes, his many friends, and the public generally, will both see him and hear from him. He will have such an ovation as this city has rarely given to any man. There will doubtless be a grand ratification meeting on his arrival, and addresses delivered by many gentlemen among his supporters, in English, German, and Spanish. But our friends must be patient, as the weather has been horribly bad, and even Col. Haynes could not reach the Convention at all.

THE REBELLION in Louisiana is not merely against the State, but against the General Government; for Kellogg had positively been recognized as the legal Governor for two years. This rebellion was causeless, for the evils complained of were caused by Warmoth, the leader of the opponents of Kellogg in the canvass; and Kellogg has done his best to ameliorate the condition of the State, and has greatly succeeded. This rebellion is also representative. Public meetings, speeches, bonfires, and flaming newspaper editorials, throughout the South, show that the unreconstructed majority of the Southern Democratic party are ready for another war.

This party will never be trusted again, either by the Government, or the peace-loving and Union-loving people of the United States, of either party, North or South. They have killed the Democratic party dead. We shall only have peace when it is buried.

THE REPUBLICAN PARTY of the Sixth Congressional District of Texas has taken a truly liberal and patriotic position. From the very first session of the canvass for Congress, its organs have insisted that the interests of the West should be above all party considerations, and a willingness to support any man of the

Democratic party, rather than endanger these interests, or even suffer them to be neglected. We have our great frontier to protect; we have our important harbors to improve; we have our Mexican relations to be conciliated; we need to be freed from the depressing power of dangerous monopolies, which have long ruined the interests of the West. And we must even seek a division of the State, if nothing else will do.

The West must have her great interests, so long, so cruelly, and so criminally neglected, attended to, and attended to now. No ordinary pledges from ordinary politicians, will do us. We have depended on these for a quarter of a century, and matters grow worse instead of better. Our very next Congressman must devote himself solely to the great objects we have in view.

Therefore, we have placed Judge Galvan, an unmistakable man, upon an unmistakable platform. That platform represents, not the Republican party merely, but every interest of the whole District. There is not a man in the District, of either party, that does not believe every word of that platform. And the result will be, that citizens of both parties are going to support Judge Galvan with great heartiness. And he will be elected. The West is aroused for one, and she is going to speak for herself.

The Louisiana Insurrection.

Some Facts not Related in the Associated Press Dispatches.

A special correspondent of the Cincinnati Gazette throws considerable light upon the recent insurrection in Louisiana, and relates the events passing under his notice in a different style from the one-sided doctored, Associated press dispatches. He says:

"All through Tennessee, Mississippi, and Northern Louisiana the excitement for several days has been intense, and I found that this was regarded as an experiment, the result of which they were awaiting with anxiety, and should it be successful, it was intended to follow it up elsewhere. And the war of races would have become general."

THE U.S. GOVERNMENT, THE REAL OBJECT OF THE ATTACK.

In detailing the overtures made to Kellogg by the insurrectionists, he says:

"One of them, presented to him by a committee of prominent citizens, was that in case Penn retired and his supporters delivered up their arms, that he should publish a general amnesty proclamation. To this he declined. Blood had been shed, he said. Cold blooded murder had been committed, and while he was in power, he had no power to suspend the laws of the State or the United States."

"A delegation of Penn's supporters told him that the war had not been upon him, but upon the United States Government, and apologized for assaulting the Federal authority over his shoulders."

"On the other hand, Kellogg was constantly receiving appeals from different parts of the country, desiring him to make no concession."

KELLOGG TO BE ASSASSINATED.

Kellogg has the proof that the White League had decided in secret meeting to assassinate him, and had cast lots to designate which of a chosen band should strike the blow.

STATEMENT OF CONDITION OF STATE.

The correspondent gives an interview with Kellogg, from which we extract this statement:

"We have reduced the taxes of the State one-third, continued Mr. Kellogg. The last Legislature passed less obnoxious laws than any one since reconstruction, and my bitterest enemies can not say that I have tampered with the public funds, or that I have done one dishonest or disreputable act since I have been in office. I defy any man to say it. The height of my offense is that nominated for Governor in 1872, against my wish, I left a seat in the Senate of the United States, fought for my rights, and overcame the organized fraud of the elections of 1872, which was intended to turn the State over to the Democracy, under a bargain with Warmoth, by which he was to go to the Senate. I have never been forgiven for this by the Democracy. Georgia has gone, Texas and Kansas have gone, either by fraud or violence, or both. The colored man has been remitted to a servile state, and every man left in office in any of those States, tens of thousands discharged, and now a reign of violence and bloodshed is proposed to be inaugurated in Louisiana, a State having a large excess of colored voters, for the purpose of wresting the State from the Republican party."

The absence of McEnery is accounted for in the following strange manner:

THE CORRUPT BARGAIN.
"It seems that a bargain had been made among the White Leaguers to secure a united spirit in the insurrection, and to satisfy some of the best men connected with it, to the effect that McEnery should leave the State, that Penn, who is much more popular, should head the movement, and upon its success should become Governor by the resignation of McEnery. To this McEnery and all the leading Democrats consented. Penn and his friends contributed liberally to satisfy McEnery's mercenary demands, and the latter left the city some months ago, having spent the intervening time at Mobile, Vicksburg, and other places, being supported by funds from New Orleans."

A COWARDLY MURDER.
The correspondent relates several outrages perpetrated upon inoffensive colored men by the White Leaguers; one instance of White League bravery was on the occasion of a false report, that Longstreet was massing his forces at the city park, when three thousand armed Leaguers rushed to the spot.

"Their disappointment was expressed in violent yells, and a poor unarmed negro who was drawn by curiosity to the crowd, was taken, put up as a mark, and shot full of bullets, every man that could crowd up in range firing into his body. This is only one of the numerous incidents of the kind that my ears are filled with."

It is now quite certain that the disagreement between McEnery and Penn in regard to the position of Governor, has contributed to the complete demoralization of the Leaguers. McEnery is a miserable adventurer, and has been acting his part for money paid him by the ambitious Penn and his friends.

Minor Editorials.

THE Nueces Valley gives an elaborate, comprehensive, minute, and graphic account of the recent great storm at Corpus Christi, which is highly interesting, and very creditable to the editor.

OUR old friend, Dr. Boulds Baker, has returned from Washington, where he has interviewed President Grant. We should now like to interview Dr. Baker.

THE Indians killed three men, and drove off twenty saddle horses last week within 15 miles of Llano. Coke's rangers have not diminished these things.

THE Austin Statesman and State Gazette are rivaling each other in their insane glorification of the Louisiana rebellion—one of the greatest political crimes of the age.

THE Democracy are striving, by the use of the telegraph wires, to get up a negro insurrection in Edgfield, S. C., as an offset to their own disastrous insurrection in New Orleans.

THE Working men's Party is gradually being formed. A press dispatch of the 21st says that the National Labor Council has issued an official call for State conventions in every State, preparatory to a National Convention. State conventions are called for the 25th instant.

THE Houston Telegraph admits that colored men have, and should have the right to vote. Yet it says that Grant has denied Louisiana "officers of their own choice," when it is well known that there was at the last election a large majority of Republican votes in that State.

THE Galveston News of last Sunday is the largest and handsomest daily we have seen published in this State. This Sunday issue is considerably larger than the usual daily issue.

CAPT. McNELLY, in command of Coke's State Police in Mr. Schleicher's county, DeWitt, has returned to Austin. He does not seem to have been able to effect much good. He says that a volcano may burst forth at any moment.

THE infamous J. H. Baker, of the indecent and scandalous Galveston Mercury, has been indicted by the Grand Jury of Galveston county for unprovoked and wanton slanders of the late Miss Mary Cooper. His Houston secret partner has not yet been reached.

It is said that a new daily paper, to be called the Republic, is to be established in York, in a very short time, and that it will rely upon the American Press Association, instead of the Associated Press, as its telegraphic news agency. Some surmise that it will advocate the "third term."

THE Sherman Patriot gives a full account of the proceedings of the recent Texas Press Convention, held at Dallas, which is very interesting. It had been forgotten, and the idea was revived too late to make it general. Still it was well represented, comparatively. Its next meeting is to be in Houston.

Agricultural, Stockraising and Industrial Association of Western Texas.

A regular meeting of this association was held at Karber's Hall on the evening of the 23rd instant.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Maj. J. T. Brackenridge, and Col. Thos. G. Williams was appointed Secretary, *pro tem*.

A committee, consisting of Messrs Steves, Siemering and Upton, appointed at a previous meeting, to correspond with Messrs. Adams & Wickes, concerning the purchase of a tract of land near the San Pedro Springs, reported a letter from E. D. L. Wickes Esq., offering to sell the tract of land, just south of, and adjoining the San Pedro Park, to the Association, for the sum of \$2500 currency; that amount not more than covering first cost, interest and taxes.

In the discussion upon this report, it was stated, that Mr. H. B. Adams had very generously proposed to make a donation of \$250 of the purchase money, to the Association, thereby reducing the actual price to \$2250, upon motion, it was

Resolved, That the same committee, Messrs Steves, Siemering and Upton be authorized on the part of the Association, to close the bargain with Messrs. Adams & Wickes, and to make the purchase of the property offered, on the terms stated. On motion it was also also

Resolved, That public notice be given that the stock book of the Association is still open for subscription, at the office of the Treasurer, G. W. Caldwell Esq. at Adams & Wickes' office on Main Plaza.

The Board of Trustees was instructed to offer a diploma for the best meat extract exhibited at the Fair, and also authorized to award diplomas to such other articles exhibited at the Fair (and not named in the programme) as might be judged worthy.

On motion a committee of five was appointed to arrange for a mass meeting of the citizens of Western Texas to be held on the Alamo Plaza, Saturday evening October 3rd, 1874, to promote the interest of the Association.

On motion the meeting adjourned until September 30, 1874, 8 o'clock P. M.

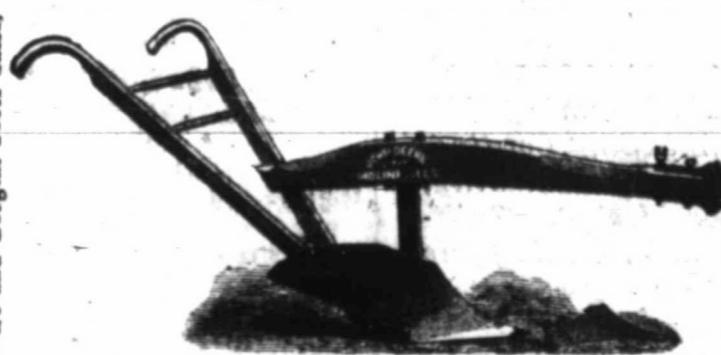

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 73.]
AN ACT making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and for other purposes.
(Continued.)
S'KALLAMS.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, on the first series, to be applied to the use and benefit of said Indians, under the direction of the President, per fifth article treaty of January twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, two thousand four hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the support of an agricultural and industrial school, and for pay of suitable teachers, per eleventh article treaty of January twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, two thousand five hundred dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the employment of a blacksmith, carpenter, farmer, and a physician, who shall furnish medicine for the sick, per eleventh article treaty of January twenty-sixth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, four thousand six hundred dollars.

For support of a smith and carpenter shop, and to provide the necessary tools therefor, per same article of same treaty, five hundred dollars.

TABEQUACHE BAND OF UTAH INDIANS.
For pay of blacksmith, as per tenth article treaty of October seventh, eighteen hundred and sixty-three, seven hundred and twenty dollars.

TABEQUACHE, MUACHE, CAPOTE, WEEMNUCHE, YAMPA, GRAND-BIVIER AND UNITAH BANDS OF UTES.
For pay of two carpenters, two millers, two farmers, and one blacksmith, as per fifteenth article treaty of March second, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, six thousand dollars.

For pay of two teachers, as per same article of same treaty, one thousand eight hundred dollars.

For the purchase of iron and steel, and the necessary tools for blacksmith-shop, per ninth article of same treaty, two hundred and twenty dollars.

For sixth of thirty instalments, to be expended under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior, for clothing, blankets and such other articles as he may think proper and necessary, under eleventh article of same treaty, twenty-five thousand dollars.

For transportation of such goods as may be purchased for said Indians, five thousand dollars.

UMPQUAS AND CALAPOOIAS OF UMPQUA VALLEY, OREGON.
For last of twenty instalments of annuity, for beneficial objects, to be expended as directed by the President per third article treaty of November twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, one thousand dollars.

For last of twenty instalments, for the pay of a teacher and purchase of books, and stationery, sixth article treaty of November twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, one thousand four hundred and fifty dollars.

WALLA-WALLA, CAYUSE AND UMATILLA TRIBES.
For fifteenth of twenty instalments, being the last of the third series, to be expended under the direction of the President, per second article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, four thousand dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the purchase of all new earl mill fixtures and mechanical tools, medicines and hospitals, stores, books and stationery, for schools, repairs of school building and furniture, and for employees, three thousand dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the pay and subsistence of one superintendent of farming operations, one farmer two millers, one blacksmith, one wagon and plow maker, one carpenter and joiner, one physician, and two teachers, per fourth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, nine thousand dollars.

For fifteenth of twenty instalments, for the pay of each of the leading chiefs of the Walla-Walla, Cayuse, and Umatilla bands, the sum of five hundred dollars per annum, per fifth article treaty of June ninth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, one thousand five hundred dollars.

FOR COLONIZING AND TUTORING THE WICHITAS AND OTHER AFFILIATED BANDS.
For this amount, to be expended in such goods, provisions, and other articles as the President may, from time to time, determine, including transportation thereof, in instructing in agricultural and industrial pursuits, in providing employees, educating children, procuring medicines and medical attendance, care for and support of the aged, sick, and infirm, for the helpless orphans of said Indians, and in any other respect to promote their civilization, comfort, and improvement, (including pay of physician and clerk, twelve hundred dollars each, blacksmith, carpenter, Sawyer, and head farmer, at nine hundred dollars each per annum, and two assistant farmers, one mason, one mason, two teachers, one engineer, six hundred and sixty dollars; and one seamstress, two cooks, and one laundress, six hundred dollars each per annum) fifty thousand dollars.

WINNEBAGOES.
For interest on eight hundred and eighty-six thousand nine hundred and nine dollars and seven cents, at five per centum, per fourth article treaty of November first, eighteen hundred and thirty-seven, and joint resolution of July seventeenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-two, forty-four thousand three hundred and forty-five dollars and forty-six cents.

For error in appropriation for interest on the above named principal for last fiscal year, five thousand dollars.
