Letter from Houston.
Stagnant and Rain on the Coast.
Narrow Gauge Railroad and Ship Channel.
Houston's Trade and Enterprise.

HOUSTON, TEX., Sept 18, 1874.
Editors Express:
It seems that this place and surrounding country is to be flooded out with rains. It rained some yesterday, the larger portion of last night and is still raining. The air is cool and the streets are muddy. It may not be generally known, but the first detachment of Morgan's Dredgeboats arrived some days ago at Morgan's point in Galveston Bay, and have been steadily at work ever since on the lower end of the ship channel coming towards this city.
Maj. E. W. Cave, the stirring, pushing President of the ship channel company is at Morgan's Point, witnessing the operations of the boats and pushing matters rapidly. The continued bad weather making the Gulf so rough has retarded the arrival of Commodore Morgan's entire dredging fleet. Five boats with tugs, derricks and dunnage, and the consequence is that the channel will not be finished as early as was intended by ten or fifteen days. But the sun crosses the line day after to-morrow, when the stormy weather will be succeeded by a genial calm, and the fleet can cross the Gulf in safety. Mr. T. W. House, the President of the Narrow Gauge Railroad, as soon as he heard that the city charter had been amended by a vote of the people, so as to allow the city council to subscribe \$100,000 to the capital stock of the company, returned to New York, and report says purchased twenty miles of iron.
It is generally understood here that work will commence on the road at once. Col. Mitchell, the chief engineer, is in the city, and says that he will have cars running to the Brazos river by the first of January.
Congress, some time ago, made Houston a port of delivery, and now, through the exertions of Mr. W. Brad, vice-president of the Narrow Gauge Railroad, the Secretary of the Treasury will give this place all the facilities of a port of entry, which it will be made at the next session of Congress. Houston's business men are up and doing with a vim, and

The State Gazette says a son of Colonel Shands was robbed by a highwayman of \$30 recently.
The Galveston Citizen is now a morning paper.
The rains are reported to have been fearful in many parts of the State.
The first car load of cotton ever shipped by rail from Shreveport went to St. Louis instead of Galveston.
Houston banking capital and facilities are complained of as insufficient, merchants having to apply to Galveston banks.
The Baptist Church in Houston has a revival in progress of several weeks' continuance.
Ricardo Flores, a Mexican desperado, is said to be organizing a band to cross into Texas.
Rev. Father Geissen, who preached in San Antonio some time since, is preaching with great popularity in Galveston.
Registration has been completed in Harris county, preparatory to the Congressional election.

The Irish Rifle team pay a high compliment to the skill of the Americans in the late rifle match, as will be seen by our dispatches.

Reverdy Johnson thinks a new election the best way out of the Louisiana difficulties. That might have been done before the rebellion, but not now.

GOOD news for Galvan begins to reach us from all parts of the District. We regard his election as certain. The people of the West are waking up against the injuries done us by the Coke administration.

The moral tone of the editorial columns of the Galveston News sadly needs re-invention. There is a levity and wantonness in treating of serious and sacred things that is disgusting. What is the matter?

Work on the Texas and Pacific railroad between Dallas and Fort Worth has been given up, as it seems, for the winter. It was not in the monopoly and administration ring, we suppose.

The difficulties in Louisiana between the Republicans and Democrats about the composition of the Returning Board, seem about to be settled. The Republicans had the whole Board of five, by law, but they have allowed the Democrats two members.

THE Herald seems fretted because Judge Galvan is a wealthy man. We do not know that this is a fault. He has made his money honestly. He began a poor boy, and he truly represents the masses of our laboring men, as well as the interests of the West.

WE learn that they have a Democratic organization at Oakville, which patrols the streets at night with armed men, demanding passes of Mexicans, colored men, and whoever else they choose. What authority is there for this outrage on a free people? Will our people support such a party?

OUR readers will please excuse the limited amount of editorial in today's EXPRESS. We have so little space to spare, after giving the news, that we cannot do much better until we enlarge. We should have enlarged at the same time that we began to take the Associated Press dispatches, but our large size paper is lying at Oudero, and we have, as yet, been unable to get it. It will not be long, however, before the EXPRESS will come out in an enlarged form.

It is hoped that the mails will be received regularly from this time forward, although the bad roads may cause them to be somewhat behind time for some days to come. We think the attention of the Department ought to be called to the secondary attention paid to the forwarding of the mails in this section of country. They have to give way to passengers on all occasions when there is difficulty of getting through. This ought not to be. The mails should go throughout at every hazard, on horseback, if necessary. The Government should see to this matter at once.

FREIGHT.—A gentleman informed us yesterday that he shipped freight from Cincinnati to Houston for \$110 a car, and that the same cars cost him, from Houston to this city, \$170. From Cincinnati to Houston the distance is at least fifteen hundred miles, while it is but one hundred and sixty-five from Houston to this city. The same

gentleman said that he would give two thousand dollars in gold if the International Railroad could be completed to Austin this winter.—*Austin Statesman.*

The above is a fine illustration of the Coke-Morgan-Central-International combination which Schleicher supports, and by which the whole West is being ruined. Had it not been for this combination, the International would not only have reached Austin, but also San Antonio by this time; and the Pierce road would have been here also. Schleicher represents the vengeance of Coke, and the selfishness of Morgan, and both are against the West.

New Orleans Market.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 29.—Price current this afternoon says of western produce under the present cash, or monthly account system, trade is in a state of suspension just now, awaiting proceeds of the staples and unexecuted orders from the country for all sorts of goods and for produce and provisions of all kinds, and the inward trips of coast packets are looked for with more than usual interest.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—The secretary of the Irish Rifle team yesterday said to a reporter: "I consider it the most remarkable rifle contest that has ever taken place. Your men surprisingly outdid us. It was an issue that we did not expect, but under the circumstances it was a contest that we are not ashamed of. Do not consider me as an individual, but as speaking for the entire team, when I say, we have had no such contest before in our lives, nor have we ever before met with such excellent marksmen as you Americans. As far as the ranges are concerned, it is admirably, and could not be better. It far exceeds our range at home. I was perfectly delighted with it."

Troops for Louisiana.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—A special to the Herald from Bismarck says that 4 companies of the seventh cavalry from Fort Abraham Lincoln, and four from Fort Rice have been ordered to Louisiana. A portion leaves to-morrow, and the remainder immediately thereafter.

German Men of War in Spain.
LONDON, Sept. 29.—The people of Bayonne refuse to sell coal for the German men of war. The latter are to go from the port as intended, their commander deeming it prudent not to give cause for trouble.

McMahon to the Pope.

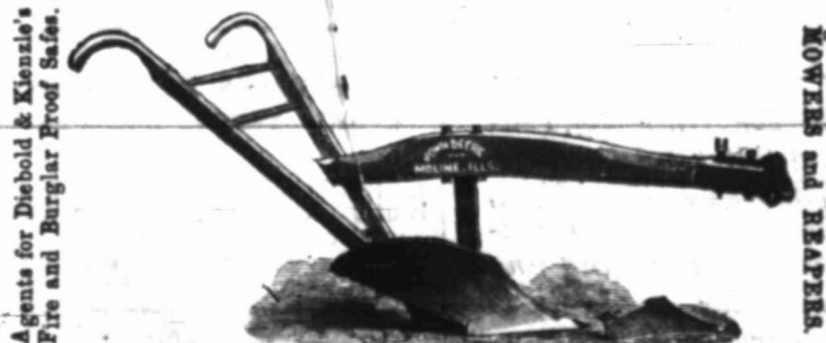

Investigation of Alleged Frauds in Paying Bounties to Indians.

For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to meet expenses incurred by the Department of the Interior...

Sec. 2. That the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expenses of the commission of citizens serving without compensation...
