|GENERAL NATURE-No. 73.| AN ACT making appropriations for the enrrent and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and for other purposes. (Continued.)

For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to relieve the necessities of the Chippewa Indians attached to the Red Cliff and Bad Blyer reservations in the State of Wiscossin, two thousand dollars; to be available immediately.



INVESTIGATION OF ALLEDGED FRAUDS IN PAYING BOUNTIES TO INDIANS.

For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, so meet expenses occur-red by the Department of the Interior is investigating alledged frauds in the pay-ment of bondties to members of the First, Second, and Third Regiments of Indian Home Guards during the years eighteen hundred and seventy-one and eighteen hundred and seventy-two, two thousand eight hundred and thirty-four dollars and

fifteen cents.

SEC. 2. That the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, or to much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expenses of the commission of citizens serving without compensation, appointed by the President and the provisions of the fourth serving of the act of April tenth, eighteen bundred and staty-nine, is hereby appropriated; and said Board of Indian Commissioners is hereby continued with all the rowers and duties conferred and imposed by existing laws. But pothing berein provided shall be construed to supersede or interfere with the duty heretofore imposed upour said board of commissioners to visit India-

and papers thereof.

SEC. 3. That for the purpose of inducing Indians to labor and become self supporting, it is hereby proviced that in distributing the supplies to the Indians for whom the same are appropriated, the whom the same are appropriated, the agent distributing the same shall require all able-bodied male Indians, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five, to perform service upon the reservation, for the benefit of themselves or of the tride, at a reasonable rate, to be fixed by the sgent in charge, and to an amount equal in value to the supplies to be delivered. And the allowances provided for such Indians shall be distributed to them only upon condition of the performance of such labor, under such sules and regulations as the agent may preseribe: Hrovided, That the Secretary of the Interior may, by written order, except any particular tribe from the operation of this provision where he deems it proper and expedient.

SEC. 4. That none of the moneys appropriated in this act shall be used to pay

salaries or allowances of any kind to emplayers at agencies except where it is ex-pressly appropriated for such purpose; ex-cepting the contingent fund and the inci-dental fund, and except in cases herein otherwise provided, not more than six thousand dollars shall be paid for the sal-prise of employees at any one accuracy. thousand dollars shall be paid for the salaries of employees at any one agency, in addition to the salary of the agent and interpreter, and not mor at any agency than is absolutely necessary; an illudian agents shall be required to state, under oath, upon rendering their quarterly accounts, that the number of employees claimed for were actually sudbons ide employed at the agency and at the salary claimed a suffit that such agent does not, directly or indirectly, receive any part of the compendirectly, receive any part of the compen-sation claimed for any other employee, or vided.
