General Items.

THE Northern Railway station of Paris was recently draped in satin and velvet, crowded with the Russian diplomatic corps, and thousands of spectators, to welcome Alexis, his brother and mama, who were traveling strictly incognito, and were theoretically blind and deaf to these vast preparations.

M. SACRE was nineteen years in the French oper as machinist. In that period all the ordinary deductions from his pay were made that would have entitled him to a pension at the age of fifty; but he was recently dismissed, without good reason, as he holds. He therefore sues for 40,000 francs damages on account of the loss of his pension.

WARM! The Empress of Russia wears a crimson velvet and fur-lined cloak, valued at \$20,000. It is lined with 228 skins of Russian sable, each of which is worth \$60. The czar possesses a still more costly mantle, lined with the fur of the blue fox, which is worth \$30,000. He presented to Adeline, Empress in St. Petersburg a set of furs of the value of \$10,000.

MR. HANDWERK, of Allentown, Pa., has been bricked up in a cell four feet square for twelve years, by his relatives. He was said to be insane, and his kind-hearted parents thought this the most economical way of disposing of him. He owned \$4,000, which the State would have appropriated to pay his expense at an asylum had he been sent there. This careful oversight on the part of relatives is unspeakably touching and disinterested.

GEN. SHERIDAN'S OPINION OF THE STATE OF things in Louisiana, as shown in our dispatches to-day, will attract the attention of all good citizens throughout the Union. It is perfectly clear that Louisiana is now incapable of self-government. It grieves us to say so, but the military power of the Government alone can now preserve order in that unhappy State, and the sooner Sheridan takes charge of everything there, the better it will be for the people. The "White League" Democracy are wilder than ever the old secessionists were. They seek to control everything by force and bloodshed. They have tried to organize a Legislature without the least show or pretense of legality. They ought to be seized, every man of them, and thrown into prison. They have no respect for law, justice, God or man.

The Citizens' Ticket.

The Mass Meeting of the citizens of San Antonio last night at the Hall of the Alamo Literary Society was one of the most tremendous and overwhelming uprisings of an indignant people that has ever been seen in any town or city of late years. Gentlemen of all parties came together with one accord and one purpose. The determination to beat the Ring nominations made a few nights ago was manifest in every countenance. There was no quarrel about politics. All present seemed to be governed by one impulse and one purpose. All seemed to have suddenly awakened to the importance of saving San Antonio from the mis-government of the past, and of putting our beautiful and promising city upon a new career.

The meeting was called to order by Judge A. Siemering, Chairman of the Republican Committee of Bexar county, who stated that he yielded his party rights to the manifestly overwhelming desire of the people. A resolution was then introduced by Jas. Biggar Esq., changing the meeting from a Republican meeting into a "citizens' meeting," which was unanimously adopted, with great enthusiasm, and amidst immense cheering.

Dr. M. Slocum, Col. J. T. Thornton, and others, of both parties, were then proposed for President, and at last that old war-horse of San Antonio and Western Texas, Gen. John B. Baylor, was chosen unanimously, and with deafening cheers. The following gentlemen were then chosen as Vice-Presidents:—Don Antonio Superville, F. Groos, Geo. B. Cochran, A. Siemering and W. H. Houston.

On motion of Mr. Ernest Altgelt, the President, with the assistance of three additional Vice-Presidents, who were chosen on the spot, appointed a committee of five gentlemen from each ward, to report

nomination for city officers to the meeting. The Committee retired, and many enthusiastic speeches were made. They finally came in, and reported two names for each office, and the following nominations were made, with great unanimity and enthusiasm.—For Mayor, Jas. H. French; for Recorder, T. G. Anderson; for City Collector, Julius Hoyer; for City Engineer, H. McCormack; for Marshal, John Dobbin; for City Physician, Dr. Petersen; for Treasurer, J. F. Minter; for City Engineer, F. Giraud; for Street Commissioner, Poeschel.

Night Dispatches.

Miscellaneous.
New York, Jan. 4.—The Beecher Tilton case was called, but Tilton was not ready. A message from the Mayor says the debt of the city of New York is \$149,000,000. Expenses of the current year \$37,000,000. The Mayor says the wooden pavements are neither useful nor safe.
Boston, Jan. 4.—The city's debt is \$29,600,000.
The boiler of the Weymouth Iron Works burst, killing one, wounding four.
Washington, D. C., Jan. 4.—The Treasury will not sell gold this month.
The Louisiana Republican lobby here are not encouraged by the events of to-day in New Orleans.
There will be a quorum in both houses to-morrow.

London, Jan. 4.—The German bark Uriel from Savannah for Reval is stranded near Boulogne.

Norfolk, Jan. 4.—No change to-day in the condition of the steamship San Marcos.

Washington, Jan. 4.—Nothing from N. Orleans through regular channels. Private dispatches indicate clearly that the lower House has, or will organize under Conservative officers.

New Orleans, Jan. 4.—Both Houses organized temporarily.
In the House a motion was put to admit members from five contested parishes, reserving matter of contest for the Legislature. It was carried amid wild excitement and demonstrations upon the radical side. To such a point did the excitement reach that the Sergeant-at-Arms was called on to seat members and preserve order.

The newly declared members from the contested parishes in question, viz: Bienville, Winn, DeBoussier and Grant, were sworn in by the speaker.

A motion was carried to go into permanent session.

L. A. Wills and Ex-Gov. Hahn were nominated. The clerk then proceeded to call the roll.

Mr. Matthews moved, from his seat, that Mr. Lowell be elected permanent speaker. This moved a storm in the House, but a motion to elect a permanent speaker was not being out of order, the speaker so announced and quieted the House down at considerable muscular exertion.

The roll call then commenced amid yells from the radical side. When proceeded with about half way, Ex-Gov. Hahn requested permission from speaker to address House which request was acceded.

He made a quite liberal speech, protesting against this organization and called on the Democrats to join with him in the effort to bring about an honest and economical government, etc. He declined to participate in this body, organized as it was, and therefore entered his protest.

The roll call proceeded with and resulted: Wills 55, Hahn 2, Black 1.

A quorum having voted, Wills was accordingly declared elected. Several other members entered protest against its organization.

Gen. DeTrobandt, U. S. A., entered the House and stated he had a communication from Gov. Kellogg. He desired it read. It was read and was illegible. Kellogg's confusion ensued. Several were ejected. Wills, clerk, and all Conservatives retired. The radicals are organizing their own House.

Nothing definite yet in Galveston from the Senate.

New Orleans, January 4.—In the Congressional Committee this morning an opinion was made by members of the Republican Committee for a subpoena, requiring Mr. Connel to appear before them, to prove that he had been kidnapped by the Democrats or prevent his attendance in the Legislature.

Mr. Foster stated that the fact of Connel's arrest on the eve of the meeting of the Legislature, in which the Returning Board had declared him elected, was prima facie evidence of his mind, that arrest was made to keep him from being present.

Mr. Foster stated in reply, that whether it was so or not, the committee had no right to facilitate his return to the Legislature. If he had been wronged, the remedy was wholly under the laws of the state, and that the Congress of the United States had no power to relieve him; but if his evidence was important to show the condition of things in Louisiana, and if unable to attend, it would be resolved by the committee.

The committee decided to take no action at present on the application.

During the day it appeared before the Committee that Connel had been arrested on a regular warrant, charging him with subornation. The officer making the arrest had consulted an experienced criminal lawyer as to its regularity, and had been advised that it was regular. This Counsel was not then aware that Connel had been returned to the legislature, but learning that fact later had examined the question of privilege with a view of recalling the officer if misled in his advice by ignorance of this fact, but became thoroughly satisfied upon investigation, that the man was not privileged from arrest.

Mr. Phelps moved that the Committee take a recess, so as to be present at the meeting of the General Assembly to-day. Mr. Potter objected, stating he had ap-

plied as an individual for permission to enter the State House and had been denied admittance by the police, who were supported by Federal troops.

Mr. Potter disclaimed any power on part of Congress to control in any way the organization of State Legislatures, and thought its Committee had no right to supervise such organization. Mr. Phelps' motion was carried, Mr. Potter voting nay.

The Committee then proceeded to the State House, but were refused admittance by military. The supervising officer was sent for and the Sergeant at Arms, Committee, and clerk were permitted to enter, but gentlemen accompanying them were refused. The Committee was invited by the officer to charge to seats in the floor; Mr. Potter declined, however, and remained without the bar. Immediately upon the election of Mr. Wills the company withdrew.

It is with deep regret that I have to announce to you the existence in this State of a spirit of defiance to all lawful authority, and an insecurity of life which is hardly realized by the General Government and the country at large; the lives of citizens have become so jeopardized that, unless something is done to give protection to the people, all security usually offered by law will be overridden. Defiance to the laws and the murder of individuals seems to be looked upon by the community here from a standpoint which gives impunity to all who choose to indulge in either. The civil Government appears powerless to punish or even arrest. I have to-night assumed control over the Department of the Gulf.

Trouble in New Orleans.

New Orleans, Jan. 4.—At 3:15 this evening Gen. DeTrobandt knocked at the door of the House of Representatives and was admitted. Upon reaching the speaker's stand, he stated that he had two communications from Gov. Kellogg which he desired the House to hear. The clerk, refusing DeTrobandt's aid, then read a letter, which stated that the House was illegally organized, and demanded the rejection of all persons seated as members without certificates from the Returning Board.

DeTrobandt said he was instructed by his superiors to obey all orders from Kellogg.

His aid then read the roll of the House, certified by the Secretary of the State.

Speaker Wills protested and finally requested that force be used, as the members were unwilling to go without force.

Five members were then ejected by the soldiers.

Wills, the Clerk of the House, and all the Conservatives retiring also.

The radicals will organize their own House.
