"Do you endorse, Sheridan?" has been the cry of the White League Democracy for some days past. We now ask the honest, law-abiding Democracy, "Do you endorse Wiltz and his band of disguised White Leaguers in seizing the Representative Hall of Louisiana by force, and in forcing a minority into the control of the House at the point of the pistol?" Sheridan called these men "banditti." You do not like his. Well, what do you call them? Let us hear. Political desperadoes they certainly are.

THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH gains largely in influence by the accession of King Alphonso to the Spanish throne, provided he can maintain himself. She would have gained more by the accession of Don Carlos, could he have been maintained. She is already strong in France under the Presidency of McMahon, and will be stronger still should France become either a kingdom or an empire. In Russia she is now, as in all the past, but little tolerated. In Italy, the seat of some and the Papacy, while the people are nominally Catholic, she is not at all in harmony with the administration of the Kingdom, or the thought and philosophy of the leading public men. In free England and America, she has the same freedom with all other churches. In the German Empire she is fighting even the most formidable foes ever countered in its history.

SPAIN has suddenly ceased to be a Republic, and become a Monarchy. Young Prince Alphonso, of the deposed Queen Isabella, has suddenly acceded to the throne of his mother, amid the struggles between the Republic and Monarchy, the latter represented by Don Carlos. France may follow the same course as Spain, Hon. Oliver S. Orth, Chairman of the committee on Foreign Affairs in the United States Senate, predicts it in ninety days Marshal-Président McMahon, like Marquis Bryant, in meeting on Louisiana affairs, night in New York, loses all its when read alongside of Gen. Sheridan's statement of the late military were called upon by Democratic members of the Senate, after they had seized the State, to preserve order, maintain peace, and prevent bloodshed, speaker, Wiltz, declaring that could not do it. Gen. De Trob refused to act until Wiltz made this declaration. And Mr. De Trob is mistaken in asserting that Kellogg had not called for the assembling of the Legislature. He had made the call, legally, and the President, ed, saying he would only suppress violence which it arose. This is done, according to the Constitution, and would have been his place had he not done so. At any rate, the White League agency cannot complain, for it is in their favor that the first inauguration was made. And the legal members were put out on their own request. Mr. Bryant got a map to understand the dress of the White League.

A PEOPLE'S TICKET was irately elected yesterday, with the exception of the City Attorney, Engineer, and Street Commissioner. While we regret that a member of the ticket should have been elected, we have nothing to say against the gentlemen on either side who were for enough to save themselves the general defeat of the ticket which they ran. And while we regret that the general uprising people in favor of good government, as against all parties, has been so signally triumphant, we do not rejoice over the

gentlemen who are defeated. Indivdally, the most of them are excellent gentlemen and worthy citizens, and our warmest personal friends. The success yesterday was, in no sense, a party victory. And while the EXPRESS, a Republican paper of the most temperate and moderate school, has been the organ of the People's Movement, and feels proud that it has been able to contribute to a result so auspicious to the future of San Antonio; it does not and will not forget that the administration elected is a people's administration, and not a party one. The EXPRESS will strive, in the support of the new administration, to truly represent and interpret the sentiments of "the people" in selecting it.

Our Railroad Prospects. It is the general belief, and hope, that the completion of the Pierce railroad to San Antonio, now soon to take place, will cause the Morgan railroad also to be pushed forward to this place. These two roads are now each within about fifty miles of us, the first giving us communication with Galveston and Houston, and the second with Indianola. If San Antonio has maintained a reasonable prosperity under present circumstances, what will that prosperity be when she has the benefit of these two railroads! And then we have strong hope that the present Legislature will settle the long vexatious warfare between the State and the International railroad, and that this road also will be pushed forward to San Antonio. This will be an immense stride in railroad progress for San Antonio.

And it may seem premature to say so, but it is nevertheless true, that as soon as San Antonio has the benefit of these railroads, and enjoys the prosperity they will bring, other shorter but very important roads will soon be built. A railroad to Corpus Christi will be one of them. Then San Antonio will have an outlet for our Gulf ports, Houston, Galveston, Indianola, and Corpus Christi. A short railroad will also be built; without doubt, to Boerne. These short roads will be narrow gauge. Then the Houston Narrow Gauge road will certainly come to us.

Night Dispatches. New York, Jan. 11.—Upon taking the chair Mr. Bryant said: "When we read the history of revolutions in Spain we rejoice that such proceedings were unknown here; but now we are astonished to hear that Gen. Sheridan, sent to New Orleans by the President, had occupied the Hall of the Legislature and thrust the Conservative members into the streets. Such proceedings ought to be for Spain, not for this country. We manage things differently here, and by God's help would continue to do so. "We have a Constitution which forbids the President from intermeddling in the affairs of a State unless to save it from invasion, or on application of the Legislature, or of the Governor when the Legislature is not convened, to prevent the State against domestic violence. What authority is there in these provisions for the President to set himself up as a Judge of elections; or drag from the Legislative Chambers those whom he chooses to regard as having no right to them? The State should have left this to the courts of law. He might as well, if he should be a candidate for the 3rd term of President, send his minions to disperse the electoral college in those States which shall refuse him their votes. He might as well send another Sheridan to remove the gentleman whom we have just elected Governor of this State out of the Executive chair. He might with just as good a warrant disperse this meeting by sending a band to clear this hall as the point of the bayonet. Why do not our West Point men seem to comprehend the limits of military power? Had Gen. Sheridan been properly trained, or not forgotten his training, he would have never obeyed the mandate which ordered him on his guilty errand to New Orleans, but rather have torn off his spurs, broken his sword, and thrown the fragments into the Potomac. "The application of Kellogg four months ago for military aid had lost its effect, and could not be used as a pretext for this outrage in Louisiana. Force had prevailed since then. If new danger of violence arose the request should have been made again for the interposition of the President. No such request was made. For in fact, no danger was expected. It was the sense of the Legislature was an act of protection against domestic violence. Even if Sheridan's actions of the prevalence of anarchy and anarchy in Louisiana are true, how could such an act remedy the state of things? "The wrong done has no possible extension. It was a violation of the Constitution. No citizen has a right to withhold his condemnation. It must be rebuked the instant it is perpetrated. The evil must be crushed before it becomes formidable as a precedent. These practices of substituting local politics to Federal authority by military power must be denounced, stopped, and broken in pieces. Bryant, in conclusion, said: "The proceedings of this meeting, as far as the

great proportion of these who take part in it are concerned, have no party purpose or object. Far from us be the petty and narrow policy which could so pervert their sincere desire to preserve the Constitution from violation, and to prevent an act of arbitrary power from becoming a precedent in future. This is, and should be, our single motive."

Notwithstanding, he makes no protest; the dignity of himself and army is the only protest he can offer. He avers that he will remain faithful to his holy mission, and keep his flag unstained. Bismarck Speaks. LONDON, Jan. 12.—The Times has reason to believe that Bismarck has intimated to Spain that the German Government will defer the recognition of Alfonso until the decree suspending the two Protestant newspapers, and closing the Protestant chapel in Cadix, is repealed.
