THE Northern Indignation Meetings over Sheridan have turned out to be nothing but the old Copperhead movement of '61. The American people have spotted them.

THE PROCEEDINGS of Congress at the present time are exceedingly interesting. Questions involving the very character of the Government are now before the country, and must be settled.

THE Southern people will be wise if they pause and consider over the history of Northern copperheadism. It got them into a rebellion in '61, and left them to fight it out. It is trying the same game now.

GEN. COCKRELL, late of the Confederate army, has been elected to the United States Senate as the successor of that magnificent philosopher and statesman, Carl Schurz. Missouri is the loser, not the Republican party.

TEXAS has an ink fish for a Governor. The peculiarity of this animal is that he attempts to cover his tracks by exuding an enormous quantity of ink. Even the 14th Legislature could not summon patience enough to hear the message read.

Two superb ball dresses, valued at \$800 each, were recently seized on board a steamer from Europe, by the New York Custom-house officers. In the folds of the dresses were three dozen pairs of kid gloves.

The State Delegate Convention of the Republicans of Kentucky will be held at Louisville on the 13th of May, 1875, instead of the 17th of February, as heretofore ordered, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the various State offices to be filled at the ensuing August election.

Betty Williams, one of the last of Pennsylvania slaves, died in Lewisburg recently, at the advanced age of seventy-five. She was purchased by William Davis, of Limestoneville, Montour County, when only eight years old. At the age of eighteen she became free. Her skill as a cook was unsurpassed, and she wielded her authority with regal sway in the kitchen.

MR. STEPHENS, ex-Vice President of the Southern confederacy, called on the President recently, and was honored by Gen. Grant's coming down to the lower floor of the Presidential Mansion. The interview was cordial, and the two distinguished gentlemen separated the best of friends. Mr. Stephens justifies the President in his course in Louisiana, to the vexation of many of his Democratic associates. [Telegram to the Springfield Republican.]

AN editorial paragraph got into the EXPRESS, by mistake, in our yesterday's issue, which puts a wrong view upon the action of the City Council. The Mayor was authorized to borrow four thousand dollars to pay the retiring officers, and the papers. This was right, and just, because the new Council did not have time to interfere into the acts of the preceding Council, and it would have been an ungracious thing for them to have done so.

COLORADO U. S. SENATOR—Revels of Mississippi was the first colored man ever admitted to the floor of the United States Senate. Pinchback of Louisiana is to be the second. A special to the St. Louis Democrat says that it is the intention of Senator West to introduce in the Senate to-morrow the credentials of Mr. Pinchback as a Senator elect from Louisiana, under the recent election. This is to be followed by a motion, to be entered by Mr. Morton, for his immediate swearing in and admission. Should such action give rise to debate, and again reopen the Louisiana question, as it is anticipated, the understanding with the Republican members is to sit it out and close the debate, even if it takes an all-night session to accomplish it.

Charles Warren Stoddard quietly removes the romance from the Venetian flower girls by saying: "There are flower women who offer you a straw with a bud and three geranium leaves at the top of it. Offer, I said. Offer is a mild word to apply to their attacks; they stab you in the button-hole with their villainous little bouquets, and follow you for half a block imploring you to buy. Legislative Proceedings.

HOUSE.

Friday, January 22, 1875.
Roll called; journals read and approved.

Mr. Munson presented a resolution to appoint a committee of five to investigate the Mexican frontier question; and to ask the Senate to appoint a like committee. He said he recognized that such an investigation was necessary, and therefore he had embodied in his resolution that appropriation of \$1000 be made to pay the expense of collecting evidence, etc.

The bill authorizing counties to sell school lands was reported adversely, with a minority report presented by Mr. Stephens. Mr. Foster moved that Mr. Harris be added to Committee on Game and Fish Laws.

Mr. Munson introduced a bill to amend the Code of Criminal Procedure.

Mr. Chambers introduced a bill to exempt improvements for manufacture, etc., from taxation. Mr. McHenry reported a multitude of bills, which will come up in due time. Mr. DeMore introduced a bill concerning the collection and disbursement of funds for the Lunatic Asylum. Referred.

Mr. Stogard introduced a resolution that an assistant engraving clerk of the State be at times employed from now to the end of the session, to be operative.

Mr. Jenkins introduced a bill requiring county courts to furnish county surveyors with books to carry on their business. Referred.

Mr. Sayers presented a memorial from citizens of Travis county, asking for the protection of game and fish.

The Senate bill authorizing the construction of two new State penitentiaries was taken up and read.

Mr. Stewart, of Montgomery, asked that the bill be read a second time.

Mr. McHenry wanted the bill in the hands of a committee. Referred.

The resolution to defend certain State officers was taken up, with Senate amendment to add Senator Dillard. Referred to Judiciary Committee No. 2.

Mr. Keeshower presented a joint resolution to make an appropriation to pay for fitting public buildings for gas. Referred.

New Orleans Market.
NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 25.—Cotton—Fair ordinary to strict good 13-15; low middling 14-15; middling 14-15; good middling to middling fair 15-16; Gold 128.

Congressional Investigating Committee.
The Congressional Committee is still investigating the action of the Retaining Board. The evidence to-day is about the same as that given before the Sub-Committee. Whitaker, Arroyo, and others were examined and the Secretary of State was required to furnish the papers that were before the Retaining Board.

The McKennies have again promised to submit the election of 1872 to the arbitration of the Congressional Committee.

Speaker Hahn don't believe that the Republicans, if they had the power, would submit to the plan proposed by the caucus resolution of the conservatives, that the Congressional committee now in New Orleans take the returns, and declare who were elected to the Legislature.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—SENATE.—Vice-President Wilson being absent from the city, Anthony of R. I. was elected President pro tem.

Robertson of South Carolina presented the joint resolution of the South Carolina Legislature, asking an appropriation of \$100,000 to deepen the harbor of Charleston; referred to Com.

Morrill of Pa. introduced a bill to establish an Education Fund, and apply a portion of the proceeds of the public lands to Public Education; and provide for the more complete endowment and support of National Colleges; for the advancement of scientific and industrial education; ordered to be printed and lie on the table.

Morrill gave notice that he would call the bill up at an early day, for the purpose of submitting some remarks thereon.

The Chair laid before the Senate a letter from the Secretary of War in answer to a resolution of the Senate of the 11th inst., transmitting copies of correspondence in relation to certain disorders in the State of La.; ordered printed and referred to the Com. on Privileges and Elections.

Finagan of Texas presented a memorial of the Mayor and Common Council of Houston, Texas, in favor of having that place declared a port of entry of commerce.

An Italian Murdered.
YACKSON, Jan. 25.—An Italian named Antonio Vancro was found dead in his doorway, and was probably murdered for his money. A number of negroes were seen in his saloon a short time before his death. The deceased was supposed to have \$3000 on his person.

Capt. Hutchinson arrived from the steamer City of Quincy, to-day; he reports the boat had aground, but above

water and he thinks that when the freight is taken out of the hold she will lighten off, and can be set adrift without the aid of the wrecking boat.

Late Press.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—The chances of Congressman Sam. J. Randall of Pa. for the next Speakership of the House have been brought into prominence, and greatly strengthened, by his vigorous course regarding the Louisiana outrage, and his ready knowledge and efficient use of parliamentary rules against the Civil Rights bill.

The President sent to the House to-day the report of the Lecom Commission, who recommend the immediate appropriation of three millions of dollars to repair the existing crevasses in Louisiana, and a half million each for Arkansas and Mississippi.

It is stated on good authority that no appropriations will be made beyond three hundred thousand dollars for the official survey.

The statements frequently made and frequently published, that certain members of the Cabinet have threatened to resign on account of difference of opinion concerning the management of the Louisiana matter, and that in consequence thereof, the Message of the President was changed in tone and language, are arbitrarily stated to be without foundation in fact.

Boston, Jan. 25.—By a collision on the Old Colony Road, a local train carrying passengers, and bound for this city to attend various amusements, was demolished, and several passengers injured. No lives lost.

LONDON, Jan. 25.—The Emperor of China died on the 23rd. His successor is a Prince five years of age.

MADRID, Jan. 25.—The Carlists have left the Province of Huesca and Guipuzcoa, and moved into Navarra, and taking with them all their material of war. The army of the North has assumed offensive against the Carlists.

VIENNA, Jan. 25.—The Governments of Turkey and Montenegro have withdrawn the forces which they had collected on the borders of their respective countries in anticipation of hostilities.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—SENATE.—The Chair presented a communication from the Secretary of Interior in answer to the Senate resolution of the 15th inst., (relating copies of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, relating to swamp lands in Louisiana. Ordered to be printed and laid on the table.

The House is engaged in the call of the Committee for reports.
