**BROWNSVILLE, January 18.**—The hide buyers of Mexico, in trying to prevent the inspection of hides imported from Mexico, have afforded protection to stockraisers in Western Texas. It enabled them to recover many hides shipped to this side in transit for New York, and on that account a great advantage to certain parties in Mexico. They combined to prevent this by using the machinery of the United States courts to render the law of this State null. They employed Powers & Maxon, and obtained from Judge Morrill an injunction, and restrained Col. John S. Ford, inspector of hides, from collecting fees for inspection of hides imported from Mexico. Before the event reached Brownsville Col. Ford had turned over the office to Mr. Trevino, and the hide buyers were disappointed. Recently they have commenced anew. Alieus residing in Matamoros are working together to procure another writ of injunction, and thus to enable these hide buyers to obtain hides under the noses of the rightful owners with impunity. They are trying to shield a nefarious traffic by a judicial process. It is said Mr. Maxon has left Brownsville with the intention of seeing Judge Morrill and obtaining an injunction, and that the hide buyers have agreed to pay him \$3000 in case he succeeds.

It is said the present hide inspector will not resist the writ, and will ask for it to be dissolved. In this event the stockraisers will be placed within the power of the raiders and those who purchase what they are assured by notorious means. It will give Mexican enemies the ascendancy, and complete the ruin of this frontier; it will compel honest men to abandon the country between the Nueces and the lower Rio Grande. This movement for an injunction is of foreign origin. The hide buyers on this side have observed the law without regard to compulsion. They pay a higher price for hides than the Mexican dealers, and would be benefited should the traffic in stolen hides be broken up. If there is anything in the inspection law which requires that it should receive the assent of Congress, the present Legislature should take steps to procure that assent, and give the law validity. It is an important matter, and involves the interests of the stockraisers in West Texas. They need more protection, and it should be extended to the struggle between the Mexicans and Americans for supremacy on this frontier. It is the duty of the Legislature to sustain their countrymen. The border war—the war of races—has been waged upon them by Mexicans of every class, and it is time they should be protected against wrong and outrage.

**BROWNSVILLE, Texas, January 20.**—A *provisione amaris* against Gov. Canales is on the tapis in Tamaulipas. There have been skirmishes, in one of which Col. Vargas was killed. Santa Barbara, Tula and Tampico are implicated in the troubles. Col. Correll is said to be at the head of the revolutionists. He is a candidate against Canales and Cortina also.

The hide buyers of Matamoros are longing for the injunction. They have on hand a great many hides which they know will be seized by the owners should they be inspected. They expected to get the writ of injunction served on Col. Ford, and to cross them into Texas without molestation. He defeated them by promptly turning his office over to Trevino. The labor of the aliens was of no avail. They prefer carrying their hides to New York. It is cheaper than to take them to Europe, and prices are higher. The armed merchants of Mexico are indignant that the State of Texas should have the audacity to pass an inspection law. They call it a tax upon commerce. They forget to tell that the said commerce is the result of violence and the robbery of Texas.—*Statesman.*

CARPENTER'S NOMINATION still hangs fire in the Wisconsin Legislature... WATCH and see whether or not the so-called Fourteenth Legislature will either give us public schools, or the International railroad.

THE CIVIL RIGHTS BILL, as amended, is the one which now holds the Lower House of Congress at a dead lock.

Let Western Texas stand as a unit against the miserable political scheme of getting up an expensive State Constitutional Convention for the mere promotion of the individual interests of political hacks, who see no hope for themselves except in thus imposing upon the people of the State.

We give the advice for what it is worth, and charge nothing for it, that the people of Western Texas, public men and private citizens, should devote themselves to the development of the great latent wealth of their section, and do not mix themselves up in the selfish schemes of politicians, who care nothing for the West, except to make political capital for the advancement of their own unpatriotic ends.

WE sometimes feel like uttering the opinion that it would be for the good of the country, and also for the benefit of the people of Western Texas, to cease giving their opinions on political questions, and merely give the political news. We say with regret, but truth compels us to say it, that the majority of the political writers in the United States at the present time seem utterly reckless as to the standards of political ethics by which they are guided. They seem to write as though they cared nothing for truth, but entirely for sensation and popular effect. It is the very evidence of the downward tendency of the civilization at the present time.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION BILL IN THE STATE SENATE. As we understand it, the joint resolution passed by the Senate, provides that the question whether a Constitutional Convention shall be held, shall be submitted to the people at the next general election, and if they decide for a Convention, their delegates shall be elected by the present Senatorial Districts. This is acting sensibly, if the people choose to expend half a million dollars for a Constitutional Convention to permit some few leather-stock demagogues to gas for some months, and then to give them a worse Constitution than they have now—be it so. But do let the people have an opportunity to express their will.

We are compelled by our convictions so often to disagree, point blank, with our respected contemporary, that it gives us great pleasure to be able to say that we heartily concur in every word and sentiment of the above paragraph. The modern idea of Constitutional Conventions being got up by Legislatures, for party purposes, is one of the most dangerous of the innovations that now threaten the original principles of free government.

THERE is and can be no freedom in America while Grant's bayonets keep Kellogg in an office to which he was never elected, and a legislature in session never chosen by the people. We are the slaves of a despot.

Will the Statesmen please tell us upon what authority it boldly asserts that Kellogg was never elected? Will the Statesmen give us credit for entire ignorance when we assert that we believe that Kellogg was elected, and that the sole object of the White League Demonstration in Louisiana was to elect him to the office of Governor of the State? Will the Statesmen please tell us how they know that the Republican party has been in the majority in Louisiana? Will the Statesmen please tell us how they know that the State was reconstructed? Will the Statesmen please tell us how they know that the White League was organized? Will the Statesmen please tell us how they know that the White League was organized? Now, these are questions that ought to be settled honestly, and not in the mere interests of party. We profess ourselves willing to discuss them in that spirit, and with a view to that end. From the evidences of ability, taste, culture, and moral rectitude we have seen in the Statesman, especially of late months, we are anxious to believe that journal to be as candid as ourselves in this discussion. We say frankly and emphatically, that if we could be convinced that the Democracy had the right, by virtue of the majority of votes, to the control of the State government of Louisiana, we should make no protest against it, or opposition to it, whatever.

The welfare of American society, and the future honest administration and success of the American Republic, require that all such serious questions of State affairs as these now agitating the country, should be settled upon their merits, and not for the promotion of party interests. That the two strangers were doubtless assassins, and that on an enquiry no one about the hotel knew them.
