I have placed the letter from F. M. Kinney with pleasure, in an office-holder so prominent among us.

WACO, Texas, May 6, 1875.

I called on the office of last week, and used in my circulars the same language as in the circular presented to me, and I presume the circular, did not call for a Republican Convention was called.

That call superseded any such action as was the circular to Gen. Sherman, and to act as Chairman of the Republican Committee as I have said, because he was a soldier, but because of his honesty, and intelligence.

Permit me to avail myself of this opportunity to say that, in my judgment, the present prostrate condition of the Republican party in this State is due as much to their own suicidal dissensions, and consequent failure to improve the great opportunities which they possessed, as to the superior number of their opponents.

Let the State Executive Committee be composed of Republicans of intelligence and integrity, and of the respectability of all classes.

Bartlett, the Boston orator, by the head and pat him on the back because he has been so foolish as to compare the rebels who fought under Jeff Davis to the men who fired the shot that was heard around the world at Lexington in 1775.
