AUSTIN, TEXAS, April 8, 1875. I have to ask your attention to the call of a State Convention of the Republican party issued by Mr. Adolph Zadeck, Secretary of Ex. Committee, during my absence.

Letter from Gen. Shields. CURTIS HOUSE, Galveston, Texas, Collector's Office, May 4th, 1875. GENTLEMEN.—The EXPRESS of the 27th ult. contains an article which requires some notice at my hands.

It is true that during the last eight or ten days, I have received a number of circulars of such import, from different quarters of the State, to which are attached the signatures of gentlemen of the highest respectability and distinction, most of whom bear no official relation to the Government.

Occupying, as I do, by Executive appointment, a position of very heavy responsibility under the Government which requires all of my time and energies, I could not, were I requested so to do by the unanimous voice of the party, expressed through a convention or otherwise, accept the position.

It cannot be otherwise than that every gentleman who affixed his signature to the circulars addressed to me, sanctions and affirms the position that a convention representing fairly and truly the masses of the Party, is the proper authority to organize its Executive Committee and elect a Chairman for the same.

If ever there was a time, in the history of any party, requiring the exercise of a generous forbearance, wise prudence and unselfish devotion to principle, on the part of those who aspire to the responsibility of leading it, that time is now on us.

The Second Chapter of the Public Printing Scandal. All of our citizens know Col. J. D. Logan, and know his straightforward way of doing business. The Colonel was induced to move to Austin and purchase a printing office, under the assurance of Coke that he should have a chance at the public printing.

It is tolerably well known to the people of Western Texas that something over a year ago I sold out my interest in the San Antonio Herald—a paper which I had built up and successfully conducted for over seventeen years. The sudden transition from an active life of labor to one of idleness did not agree well with me, and accordingly, some months ago, I began to look round for something to do.

Having long had a sort of hankering for what is known as "chickoo-pie," I lost no time in paying my respects to Governor Coke, who received me kindly. On my informing him of my intention that I was on a trip to Austin with an eye to setting up a printing establishment to do all kinds of job printing, he expressed his warm gratification thereat.

Under all these circumstances, I recently made several calls at the Governor's office to inquire how things were getting along, but only obtained an interview with the Governor on Tuesday afternoon, fourth instant. And we ask the reader to imagine what was my surprise—not to see a halberd term—when the Governor told me that the Printing Board had that morning let out to A. C. Gray, of Houston, the public printing of the State for the next year!

Before calling upon Governor Coke, I was somewhat familiar with what had transpired previously in regard to the State printing, and I confess that certain papers had failed to impress me with the justice of this complaint; and especially was I of this opinion after listening to the city profession of Governor Coke to myself, and his pleasant assurance that I should have a chance to bid for the printing. But a change has come over the spirit of my dreams, and I now, as a practical printer and a journalist, award to them the same just grounds of complaint that I conscientiously claim for myself.

General Items.

THE ROSS CASE.

All hopes of the recovery of little Charles Ross have now been almost abandoned. It is reported that Westerveldt, Mosher's brother-in-law, is now locked up in Moyamensing Prison awaiting trial on the charge of being concerned in and having a guilty knowledge of the abduction of the boy. The charge is based on certain remarks that accidentally fell from Westerveldt's lips a short time ago in New York. — [Philadelphia Press.]

CUTTING FLOWERS.

Never cut flowers during intense sunshine, nor keep them exposed to the sun or wind. Do not collect them in large bundles, or tie them together, as it hastens their decay. Do not put them, but cut them cleanly off the plant with a sharp knife—not with scissors. When taken indoors place them in the shade, and reduce them to the required length of stalk with a sharp knife, by which the tubes, through which they draw up water, is permitted to ascend freely; whereas, if the stems are bruised or irritated, the pores are closed up. The open water sets them in a state of putrefaction, sticking the ends of the stalks into it, but not in a crowded manner. If in water alone, it ought to be changed daily; and a thin slice should be cut off the ends of the stalks at every change of water.

A ROMANCE IN CINCINNATI.

Cincinnati, April 29.—David Newton has finally decided to erect, on Fifth street next to space, a granite tower 100 feet high, surmounted by a colossal statue of Cincinnati in the top. The tower will be composed of three sections—the first is a square, the last and highest octagonal in shape. A platform for the monument will be at the base, for public speaking. The whole is estimated to cost \$50,000.

THE ENGLISH TURK—THE NEW MARKET.

London, April 30.—In the Newmarket races to-day the one thousand guineas stakes for three year old fillies was won by Spinaway leading Per Se and Chaperon third. Six horses ran. The betting at the start was twelve to one against Spinaway, six to five in favor of Per Se and six to one against Chaperon.

THE MOODY-SARKEY REVIVAL.

London, April 30.—The case of Leader vs. Moody and Sarkey has been settled by the acceptance of a suggestion of the Master of the Rolls that the defendants pay one shilling damages and costs and agree not to publish by Majesty's Opera House for their meetings.

THE PRUSSO-BELGIAN CORRESPONDENCE.

Brussels, April 30.—Belgium sent an answer to-day to Germany's last note. Count d'Appremont-Lyon, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, published explanations in regard to the correspondence in the Chamber of Representatives on Tuesday next.

DEATH OF A NOTED FRENCH TRAVELER.

Paris, April 30.—The death is announced of the famous traveler Jean Yredrick de Waldeck, at the extraordinary age of one hundred and ten years.

M. OPEXENACH ANNOUNCES THAT "Genevieve de Brabant," which is still drawing great houses at the Paris Gaiete, will be withdrawn toward the end of the summer to prepare for Garden and Offenbach's new opera of "Don Quixotte," which is to be winter novelty. Among the many wonderful things which are to be introduced into "Don Quixotte" as a flock of sheep, which browsing about in the meadows, are to be slain by the trusty sword of the Knight of La Mancha. Those sheep, which have already arrived into "poverty," are to be slaves of mechanism.

THE NEW COMMISSIONER OF PENNSYLVANIA.

Washington, April 29.—H. M. Atkinson, recently appointed Commissioner of Pennsylvania, arrived here to-day from Mexico, having fulfilled his special mission by the completion of satisfactory arrangements for the removal of the rest of the Kickapoo from that country to the Indian Territory. He will enter on the discharge of the duties of his new position on the 1st proximo, when General Baker's resignation takes effect.

STEVENS' VISIT.

London, May 3.—The schooner Jefferson Borden, from New Orleans for this port, has arrived off Port Lavaca, and the cap-

tain reports: "Crew mutinied; first and second mates killed, two sailors wounded and put in irons; one sailor wounded and chained to the pump and another dying; vessel worked by three hands."

THE CATHOLICS AND THE MASONRY.

London, May 3.—The *Times* Catholic of Rome, comments in bitter terms on the installation of the Prince of Wales as head of the order of Masons in Great Britain, and denounces that act as a gross violation of the Protestantism with Masonry.

INTERNATIONAL BIBLE SOCIETY.

London, May 3.—The International Bible Society to defray the expenses of entertaining the American Bibles at the coming regatta match amount to a considerable amount. A number of banquets and excursions have already been arranged.

NEW RUSSIAN MINISTER.

St. Petersburg, May 3.—M. Skobeleff, late Russian diplomatic agent in Serbia, who has been appointed Minister at Washington, has left here for that city direct.
