That night Col. Edward Hatch of the 9th U. S. Cavalry in command at Ringgold Barracks without informing the civil authorities of what had transpired, snatched from his stronghold and proceeded to the vicinity of where those offenses against the State had been committed, armed with no warrant but the bayonet and without any authority from any officer of the State, they proceeded to break open houses, search trunks, and to appropriate to themselves money, and all articles of value.

To facilitate this, men were taken from their homes and from the bosom of their families, and for their better security, were tied up and with ropes placed around their necks were told to look down.

One old grey headed man who has passed his three score years and ten tottering upon the verge of the grave was thrust from his home at the point of the market and for the first time in his life was tied up like a common felon.

The virtue of their wives and daughters was left at the mercy of a demoralized negro soldiery. With drawn and loaded pistols in their hands they demanded of fathers

and mothers their daughters; to be sacrificed to their own leathome purposes. A Justice of the Peace living three miles from the vicinity where the crimes were committed was lanted up and amid their jeers and curses was placed under guard. They entered houses and disrobed themselves in the presence of families and taking the cleaner articles of clothing placed them on their own bodies. Even the image of our devoted Saviour was an article of their sacrilegious wrath: Not content with robbing the poor of the little effects which they possessed, they cut the warp and wool from the loom of the industrious housewife.

And now they propose to keep him out of the way of their own promotion by the cowardly device of suggesting his unpopularity, which, so far as the Democratic party is concerned, North or South, has foundation only in the jealous brain of his Northern rivals for popular favor.

If Jefferson Davis is in fact unfit for the office of President of the United States, because of his election to the Presidency of the de-funct Confederacy, Alexander H. THE SYNDICATE AND THE CALL FOR BONDS.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—The call for the redemption of \$5,000,000 coupon bonds issued from the Treasury on Saturday indicates an additional subscription of that amount by the Syndicate, making in all \$35,000,000 called in on that account, the first call under the new contract being for \$15,000,000, and the second for \$10,000,000, and the other two calls, of very recent date, for \$5,000,000 each. The contract with the Rothschilds lasts until the 31st of August next, and until that time every call for bonds by the Treasury indicates an additional subscription by the contractors for the amount named in the call.
