

Our Sheep Men.

A correspondent of the Corpus Christi Valley writing to that paper speaks of some sheep ranches he encountered in the following strain: When I left your beautiful city by the sea, the first place I stopped at was with Mr. E. J. Nickerson, sixteen miles from Corpus. Mr. Nickerson is one of the most hospitable men in the country, and the price of good liveries. Here the weary traveler will always find a resting place for himself and animals. I would like to give an extended notice of his ranch, but I will have to defer it to some future occasion. Suffice it to say at this time, that Mr. Nickerson has one of the handsomest places on the Nueces. Everything in and around the residence is kept scrupulously neat and neat. He has a garden in every thing. Mr. Nickerson is a bachelor (the ladies ought to make a note of this.) You may bet your fair dollar, that his mother was a model housekeeper, and a New Englander at that.

The next ranch above is Mr. Donald McIntyre's. (Mr. M. was just through shearing.) While there I saw some fine bucks grazing around the house. These were two specimens and their long horns would show some of the long horn Texas cattle in the state. Mr. McIntyre's books are well improved, and he keeps adding to their number every year. While there, he told me that he sold his wool this year for the highest price that was paid, up to date. Mr. M. is comfortably situated. He keeps his flocks of 4000 head on his own land, and he is in peace with all the world. He owes no man a dollar, and his sheep could not be bought for less than \$5 a head.

The next ranch above is Mr. George Wright's. Mr. Wright was busy shearing at the time, and when I drove up, you could see wool sticking out all over him. How his eyes did sparkle with delight, as he handed me a sample of his wool, coupling it with the remark, "that is what brings the money to this country; this beats the stock business all to pieces."

War Among Sheep Men. It seems that Mr. John McKenzie bragged about having an imported buck that sheared 35 pounds of wool, whereupon J. M. Campbell comes out in the Oakville Tribune and ridicules Mr. McKenzie, and issues the following challenge: The undersigned does not own, or claim to have owned a buck that would cut 35 lbs. of wool. Neither does he claim to own wool that will shear from 17 to 25 lbs. of wool. Yet he is ready and willing to make the following very favorable proposition to Mr. McK. viz: He will match 10, or 20 bucks (the celebrated 35 lb. buck included) against the same number of Mr. McK's, for weight of fleece for the sum of \$100 or \$200. He will also match 100 or 1000 ewes against the same number of Mr. McK's for 100 or 500 dollars. And still another chance. He will cut and weigh 50 or 100 scored fleeces against the same number of Mr. McK's for \$100 or \$500. Finally after the above challenge is accepted and money staked here, the wool growers of Western Texas are notified of same by publication, and they are respectfully requested to select three or four Judges from their number and let their decision be final. Killings—Shootings, and Mobs During the Past Week, in Texas.
Clippings from Democratic Newspapers.
MURDER.
CONFUSION now had made his master-piece most sanguinary in our history. The Lord's appointed temple, and stole thence the life of the building.
Murder has become almost a pestilence among us. It walks at noonday, and waltz at midnight. Every week for three weeks, we have been called on to chronicle a murder! Will the end never come? Is there something in the air that breeds the blood-thirsty passions that have broken loose among us. The bearing of concealed weapons has again brought forth bloody fruit. Cannot the law prohibiting it, be enforced?—Dallas Commercial.
LAST Sunday evening Mr. W. S. Fry got into a dispute with a rough by the name of Shooter, when the latter drew a derringer and shot Mr. F. through the foot, inflicting a painful wound. Mr. Shooter escaped.—Denton Herald, 5th.
FRANK WIKELER, hard-working, honest farmer, was brutally assassinated in his modest home, near Victoria, last week. He was a witness in a case involving the fame and fortunes of men richer than himself.—Austin Statesman, 10th.
DEWISON, June 5.—Pleas Meddleton, a noted desperado, was shot and killed this morning, two miles from here, while trying to resist arrest, by officer Beauchamp.—Galveston News.
Two escaped convicts were shot and killed near Palestine, on the Trinity, last Wednesday. It may be very cruel to shoot these people, but it is very necessary unless the State will erect a Chinese wall and long enough to hold them.—Statesman, 10th.
We learn from the bank driver that a shooting affray occurred at Meridian on Tuesday evening last. Mr. Nicholson, formerly deputy sheriff, and another whose name we did not learn, did the shooting. Nicholson shot the other's horse from under him, and though several shots were fired by each party, neither of the men was hit. The difficulty is said to have grown out of a killing which took place in Bogue several months ago.—Stephensville Gazette, 29th.
COMPLAINT was made before Justice Hastings on last Tuesday by Matilda Berna, of Las Pintas, that one Bitor had destroyed her home by representing that he was the bearer of a message from his sick mother in this city. This occurred on Saturday, 10th inst., since which time Yarna has not been seen or heard from, nor was his mother sick as the pretended messenger represented. The supposition is that he has been roudly dealt with. Bitor was seen in this city on Monday, 17th, and a capias has been placed in the hands of an officer with instructions to arrest him.—Corpus Christi Gazette, 29th.
On Sunday night last, in the neighborhood of Birdton, in this county, a party of men consisting of J. Newman, B. Bowman, J. Polk, H. Swink, and Ezek Hartley, were out cow hunting, and camped near Mr. J. Cooper's. After camping, and while eating supper, a party consisting of several rods up and fired some six or eight shots from double barreled shot guns, wounding D. Bowman, supposed mortally. J. Newman received four shots in the right side and shoulder, and a glancing shot struck Swink in the head, inflicting a slight wound. No discovery as to the parties committing the deed has yet been made.—Corpus Christi Observer, 5th.
SOMETIME last week, a man in the county of Somerville, was riding by a man's house, where some children were playing by the roadside, when he drew a pistol, shot and killed a small child, and rode deliberately off, as if he had only shot his pistol at a target. We have not words at command to express our feeling in regard to what should be done with such an inhuman wretch. We learn that a man was arrested since, who was suspected of having done the deed. We sincerely hope that this may be true.—Stephensville Enquirer, 27th.
THERE is considerable excitement in Mason county, occasioned by the killing of a negro man named Jerry Fite, who lived about five miles from Jefferson. It derives more than usual importance from the good character of the deceased, and the responsibility of the parties engaged in the tragedy.—Marshall Herald, 5th.
We learn from Dr. C. R. Bates, of Palo Pinto, that a man named and known as Linn Bill was lately shot by a man named Smith on Barton's creek. Linn Bill shot at Smith several times and ran. Smith went and got a Henry gun and shot Linn Bill three times. He got yet dead, but he is said to be well recovered. We also learn that a man named Smith was killed by another party, name unknown. They were out fishing together when the difficulty occurred. As no one was present except the two men, it will of course never be known whether or not the killing was justifiable.—Weatherford Times, 5th-12.
Some few days since a tragedy was enacted at Mr. Day's, near Dexter, which it is to be hoped, will have a good effect on such characters as the principal figure in this scene. One Joe Carlos, a negro about 20 years of age, went to the house of a Mr. Wade at night and attempted a nameless crime on his wife's sister, a girl of 15 or 16 years of age, by slipping into the house, where only Mrs. W. and her six children were. Mr. W. having gone from home—he attempted to administer chloroform to the girl. The screams of Mrs. W. alarmed the freed, and he made his escape. The next day a party of some 25 or 30 men found the negro and shot him to death.—Gettersville Gazette.

The San Antonio Herald, during the week, mentions the finding of the bodies of six Mexicans found out West of here, one hung and the others shot.
A MEXICAN by the name of Francisco Aquilera, was shot and killed a few days ago at Stephen Anthony's store, on the Alamooco.—Pleasanton Stock Journal.
AGAIN in the Herald call upon to record another murder. Really it seems as though we were enjoying a very carnival of blood. Scarcely has the smoke died away from the murderous discharge of the pistol of one assassin, ere we are called upon to chronicle another murder, rivaling in blood-thirstiness and cruelty any of its predecessors. Last night about 11 o'clock a number of negro boys and men assembled at the den of iniquity and sin on Main street for the purpose of organizing a base ball club. Of course, there was more or less of low talking and discussions, as is customary on such occasions. While the confabulation seemed to be at its height, a negro named Jno. Stocker walked into the room, and with an oath, remarked that they were making too much noise. One of those present, named Sam. Winn, spoke up and told him to be still, when the ruffian drew a pistol and fired, striking Winn in the forehead and killing him instantly.—Dallas Herald.
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
