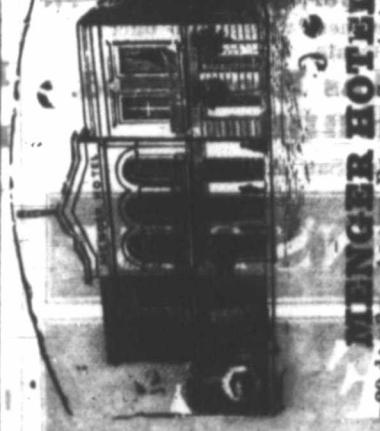

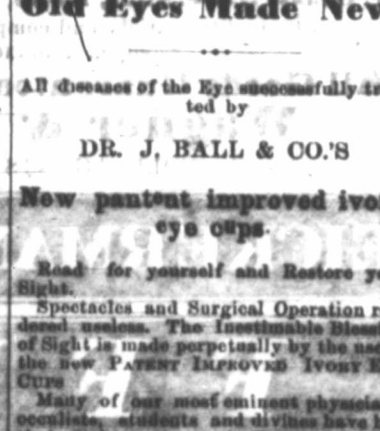

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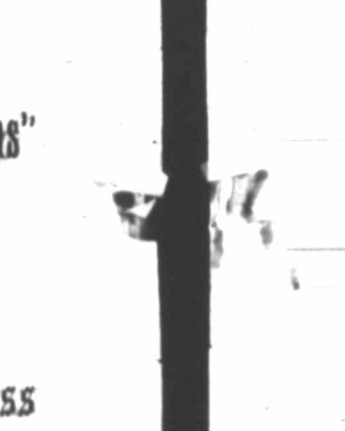

### General News Items.

**BREACH OF PROMISE SUIT.**  
The New York Sun brings the following: Several months ago Rose Massey, the well-known actress, sued Henry J. Mann for \$50,000 for breach of promise of marriage. Mr. Mann was arrested, and was admitted to bail in \$10,000. Mr. Theo. Moss, being his bondsman. Miss Massey supported her complaint with numerous exceedingly affectionate letters written to her by Mann when he was the successful manager of a Loudon theater and her accepted suitor. In them a day for the wedding was frequently set, but Mann's business as often arose to demand a postponement. Lately he has been acting in Wallack's under the name of Henry J. Montague, and has become a favorite with the public in certain parts. Soon after the answer of Mr. Mann was filed, Miss Massey's lawyer, the Hon. Edwin K. Manton, announced his intention to discontinue the suit, and the settlement of his counsel, the Hon. A. Oakley Hall, summoned Miss Massey to a final proceeding. The day for that examination has frequently been postponed, yesterday being the last day appointed. The parties have not yet appeared personally in court, and yesterday their lawyers adjourned indefinitely the time of the examination, each one reserving the right to select any day in the future upon giving five days' notice to the opposing counsel. Both Miss Massey and Mr. Mann have been anxious for a compromise, and the case is probably amicably settled, though it is not known whether the former relations of the parties have been resumed. Rumor has, however, announced Mr. Mann's engagement to several fashionable ladies.

**THE LADIES OF THE EMPRESS EUGENIE.**  
Among the many striking transactions yesterday which attracted the attention of the news gatherer, there was one which combined the peculiar characteristics of the romance of a young girl attaching herself to the name of Eugenie, the late Empress of the French, and it was exciting, because it involved the name of a reputable merchant and publisher of Washington.

It is recalled by all that after Sedan, the flight of the Imperial family from the Tuilleries and their escape into England, a part of her magnificent wardrobe and costly jewels were sold at auction. Among other articles of lace there was a lace shawl so rare and costly that it was valued at \$20,000. Who the purchaser was and what he paid for it is not known at present.

These lace, including the shawl, were smuggled into this country sometime in 1873, by Joseph Horrochis, and, after passing through the hands of two or three parties in New York, they were brought to this city, less than a month ago, by one Dr. Leon De Larnoe, and were deposited as security with Goldstein, the pawnbroker, for \$350. The officers of the custom-house in New York, detailed for the purpose, traced the goods to Goldstein's and yesterday afternoon Captain Brockert, of the custom house, made Mr. Goldstein acquainted with the facts.

Mr. Goldstein was at once thoroughly honest and straightforward in the matter, having innocently come into possession of the goods. He offered every facility in his power to the officer. Of course the formal seizure could not be made here, and so Mr. Goldstein packed up the shawl and Cap Brockert to New York. On arrival there this morning the seizure will be legally made, and the goods turned over to the custom-house officials. It is quite probable that arrests will be made in New York on this account.

DARING HIGHWAY ROBBERY.

Five Men Mob a Village Store. RIDE OFF WITH THE STAGE HORSES. And Astonish the Spectators.

A courier came in from Leon Springs yesterday with the news of a daring highway robbery committed at that place at mid-day.

We have taken pains to gather all the particulars, and also from a correspondent on the spot we are enabled to state the circumstances circumstantially as it happened.

Leon Springs is the first stage stand on Fredericksburg road about 19 miles from our city. A hotel and country store is kept by Mr. Aue. There are several farms and residences in the neighborhood, and quite a number of people rusticating thereabouts during the summer weather. On Sundays there are generally fifteen or twenty men loafing about the place.

About noon three men rode up to the store dismounted and went into the store, where they sat down and called for crackers, sardines and drinks which they partook of and paid for. They said they were looking for horse thieves. Two other men then came up and joined the party in the store. Two of the men then stopped to the doors of the store and drew their pistols, while the other three took aim at Mr. Aue, who was told to hold up his hands. He was then tied. The hostler who had the stage horses in charge was politely requested to step in and take a seat, as were two men who arrived in the mean time. Three of the robbers then went out and took possession of the stage horses, putting their saddles on them, exchanging with the two men who had ridden up, their saddles. They then took the money from the store counter drawer, amounting to thirty dollars, also helped themselves to clothes, whiskey, tobacco, &c. Then mounting the stage horses rode off as gaily as ever did Dick Turpin or Claude Duval. After the robbers had gone the men about the place to the number of fifteen or twenty gathered around the luckless Aue to talk it over. It was decided to send a courier to San Antonio to warn us, of the danger, we suppose which was done as soon as one bold enough could be obtained. Then the down bound stage was anxiously waited for as the robbers had moved off up the road, as if they intended to intercept it.

The stage arrived and the first expression was one of surprise that it had not been attacked. Mr. John Newton, who was a passenger, inquired "what kind of looking men were they," with one voice the crowd said "All Americans." Terror seemed to have seized the neighborhood and no effort was made to pursue the robbers.
