City, GTE Discuss Telephone Problems

Local School Could Get More State Funds

The Muleshoe Independent School District would receive \$194,700 in new state aid under the Foundation School Program if a bill sponsored by the Texas State Teachers Association is enacted in the current legislature.

Included in this new state aid would be a \$61,300 increase in equalization aid for the Muleshoe ISD. Generally, this aid is provided by the state to school districts whose wealth per student is less than the state-wide average.

In addition, the TSTA bill

would allow the Muleshoe ISD to reduce its local fund assignment -- the district's share of Foundation School Program costs of \$66,900.

Sen. W.E. Snelson of Midland, author of the TSTA-sponsored bill (S.B. 525) has been granted a hearing on the measure at 5 p.m. Wednesday, March 7, before the Senate Education Committee. The public hearing will be held on the senate floor.

Cost of the Snelson bill in new state spending would average an estimated \$722.5 million per year for each year of the next biennium, or some 1.445 billion for the two-year period.

TSTA Exec. Secy. Callie W. Smith said the bill would provide a 25 percent increase for school maintenance and operation, 25 percent increase for school bus transportation, and a 40 percent increase for equalization aid.

Also included is a revised pay schedule which would raise the salaries of all Foundation Program personnel. The beginning pay for a bachelor's degree teacher would be increased from the present \$8,540 per year to \$10,000, and for a master's degree

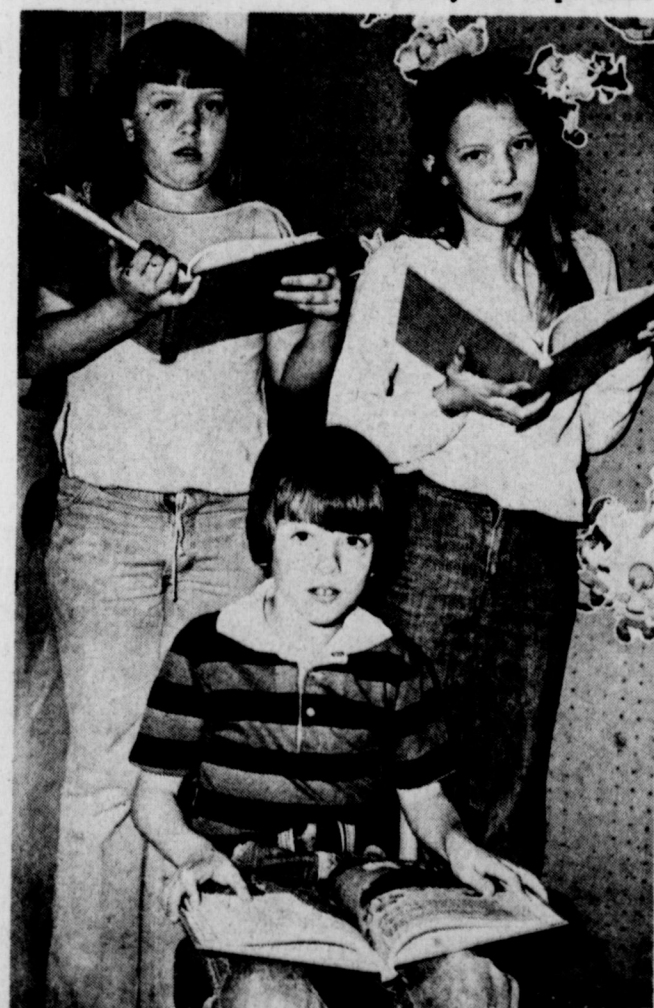

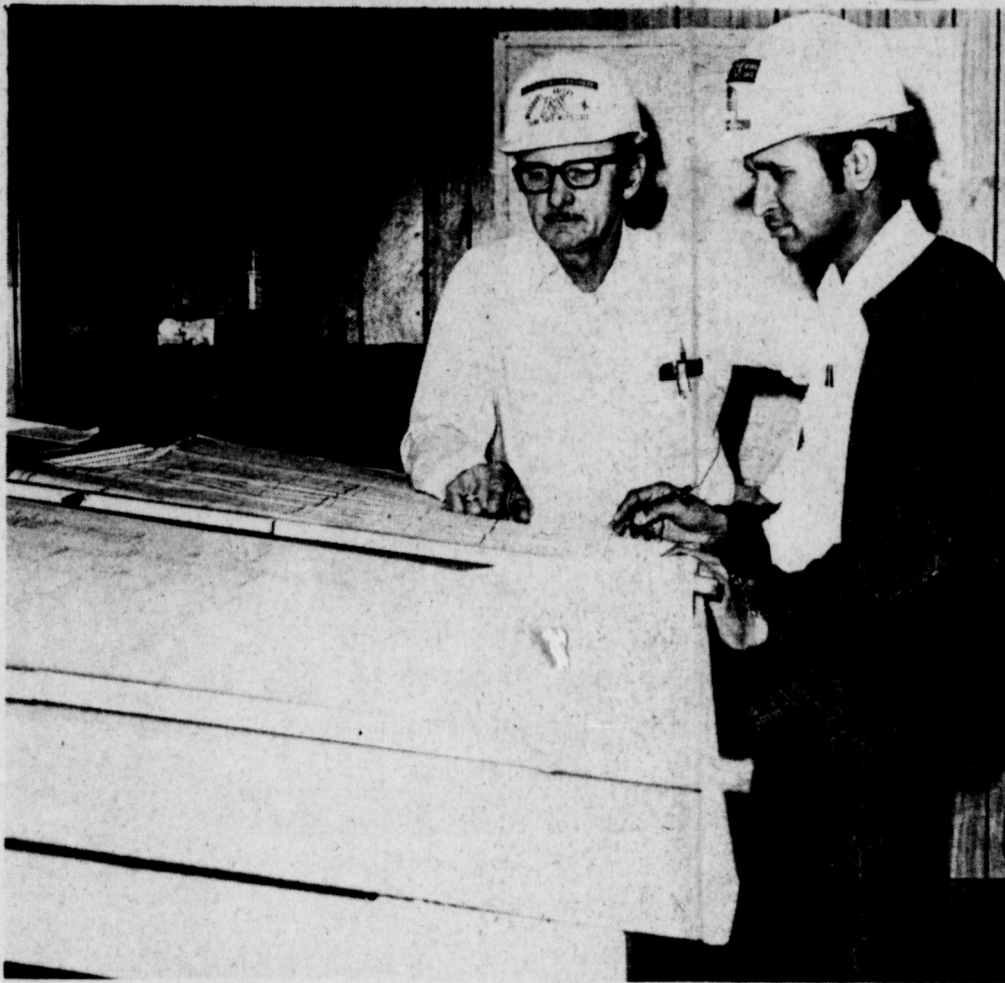
Qualifications for selection to membership in this society include distinguished scholarship in the area of engineering and exemplary character. Pledges will be initiated at the end of the spring semester.

Bovina Church Annual Dinner Set March 11

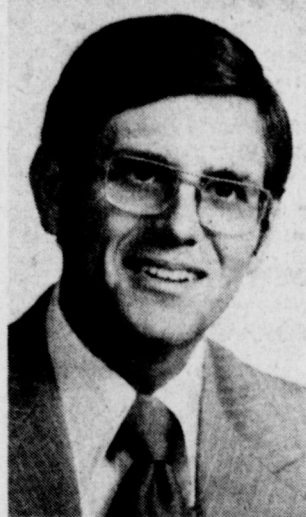

Phone Lines Checked; Repairs Underway Fiscal Year Change Mandated By State

Visiting with the Muleshoe City Council Tuesday morning were four representatives of General Telephone Company to discuss telephone problems reported here.

George Spivey and Lloyd Bailey were both from the Brownfield office and Howard Warren and Joe Williams were here from the Littlefield office to explain a rehabilitation program currently underway to try to alleviate some of the problems being encountered.

Spivey asked for a list of problems, and asked if 'wrong numbers' were still a problem following recent work on the central office in Muleshoe. One council member assured the GTE spokesman that he received five wrong numbers the day before, and another council member said he had received a wrong number call.

The GTE spokesman said they have gone through the central office, here, and are currently going through the toll office at Littlefield and on to Lubbock, to try to solve long distance problems as well.

It was suggested to the GTE people that they make information available to the local news media explaining what steps are being taken to help alleviate some of the many problems encountered with telephone service.

Spivey said outside line work was expected to be completed by April 30, and most outstanding problems should be solved by that time. He said four telephone experts are working on the toll line problems and "they have run into more problems than they had expected."

He also said that problems which show up in wet weather are being worked out at this time. The GTE workmen said they will be steadily working on the problems until they get telephone service back into good condition.

In other action during the city council meeting, a low bid of \$66,750 and 150 completion days was submitted by Jake Diel Paving of Hereford was approved for sealcoating city streets, approximately 100 blocks being designated for the sealcoating process.

Also bidding were Hi Plains Pavers of Plainview,

\$69,000 and J. Lee Milligan Pavers of Amarillo, also \$69,000.

Following a meeting with city and county officials last week, the commissioners court unanimously agreed during a meeting on February 28, to turn the enforcement center over to the city operation and control, effective April 1. This change was discussed Tuesday.

A transition period of one month has been established to work out the contract and necessary paper work.

Discussed briefly was the proposed fire department subsidy asked of county officials. No action has been taken by the county on the proposal.

Coming under considerable discussion was the proposed change in the fiscal year of the city to conform with state law. It was explained as follows:

Senator Tower Levels Wage, Price Charges

Senator John Tower (R - Tex) today charged that the Administration is acting without constitutional authority to force compliance with White House wage and price guidelines. The senior Texas senator joined several of his colleagues in announcing intentions to submit a friend of the court brief concurrently with an AFL - CIO lawsuit that will be filed in federal court in Washington, D.C. within the next two weeks. Under White House regulations issued this year the government is requiring firms seeking federal contracts of \$5 million or more to certify standards, including compliance with its 7 percent guidelines for annual increases in wages and benefits. Many companies with federal contracts claim they risk losing those contracts if they offer more than 7 percent in wage and fringe benefit increases, and unions are complaining this restriction thwarts their right to free, unfettered collective bargaining. "The Administration insists that its program is voluntary, but, of course, this is a fiction. By threatening to deny federal contracts to firms which de-

cline to honor the "voluntary" provisions, the President has indirectly asserted the power to levy fines, in effect, against those businesses who defy his mandate. Companies not in compliance will be denied the contracts they would otherwise receive. Their workers will suffer correspondingly when their employers have to cut production and employment," Tower declared. The legal action planned challenges the Administration's authority to withhold federal purchases of goods and services from firms and employees who fail to comply with wage and price guidelines or to use Export-Import Bank credits to coerce guideline compliance. Tower also asserted the wage and price guidelines

are founded on dubious legal premises. "The Administration is completely overlooking the fact that Congress specifically forbade mandatory controls in the 1974 law setting up the Council on Wage and Price Stability. That act clearly states that nothing in its terms authorizes the continuation, imposition or reimposition of any mandatory economic controls with respect to wages or prices. Therefore, the President has no constitutional power to act, unilaterally, without the permission of the Congress." Tower added that the timing of the legal challenge is particularly appropriate now because the Senate Banking Committee is currently debating the authorization of funds

for continuation of the Council on Wage and Price Stability. "I question the wisdom of throwing away more of the taxpayers' money to carry out a program that rests on dubious constitutional grounds in the first

place," Tower said. A suit filed last December questioning the validity of the government's procurement sanctions, in which Tower joined in a similar friend of the court brief, was never decided

on its legal merits. Like the earlier suit, this current effort seeks a declaratory judgment that the government lacks the power to enforce its guidelines by threatening to withhold contracts.

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Comptroller Gives Warning On Rationing

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today said mandatory gasoline rationing could cost Texas about \$75 million in lost fuel tax revenues a year and turn major urban freeways into permanent parking lots. He said gasoline rationing authority being considered in the Congress was the most controversial aspect of the Carter Administration's mandatory energy control measures. Holding drivers to two gallons of gasoline per day will drastically reduce the state's collection of motor fuel taxes, Bullock said. "I don't know what the real likelihood of rationing is at this time, but rationing would work a genuine hardship on thousands of Texans, particularly those living in Houston or the sprawling Dallas - Fort Worth area," he said.

Texas drivers, because of the great distances between cities, simply can not get by on two gallons of gasoline per day. Besides, a person could burn two gallons of gasoline just trying to get on a freeway in Houston during rush hour, Bullock said. He said Texas will suffer more than many other states and said he hoped that Congress would not approve mandatory gasoline rationing unless they gave some consideration to the state's geography and population density.

"If people can't get to and from work, the economy will eventually suffer. I hope Congress will consider the political and economic effects of mandatory rationing before they give their stamp of approval to something that would be a disaster for Texas."

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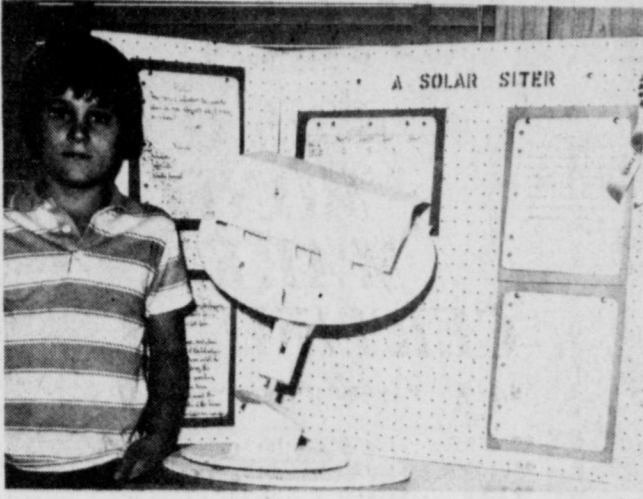

RECIPE

By Sarah Ann Sheridan
Ham-Burger Roll-Ups

- 1 c fresh bread crumbs
- 1/2 c milk
- 1 1/2 c ground beef
- 2 t instant minced onion
- 1 1/2 t Worcestershire
- 2 t seasoned salt
- 1/4 t seasoned pepper
- 6 slices boiled ham, 1/8-inch thick
- whole cloves
- 3 T butter
- 1/2 c packed light brown sugar
- 1/2 t prepared mustard
- 1 large can apricot halves, drained
- 1 med. can cling-peach slices, drained
- 1/2 c drained canned pineapple chunks

Using a medium bowl, soak crumbs in milk a few minutes; combine with beef, minced onion, Worcestershire, seasoned salt and pepper. Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees.

Spread some of meat mixture on each ham slice; roll up, jelly-roll fashion; place seam-side down, side by side, in oblong baking dish and stud each with 3 whole cloves.

In small saucepan, stir brown sugar and orange juice in the butter; cook until sugar is melted; stir in mustard. Pour over ham rolls; bake 45 minutes, basting occasionally.

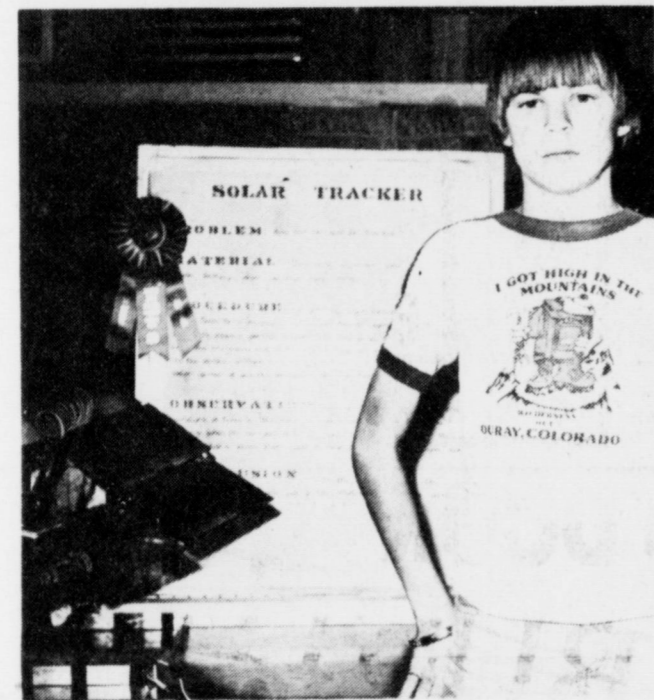

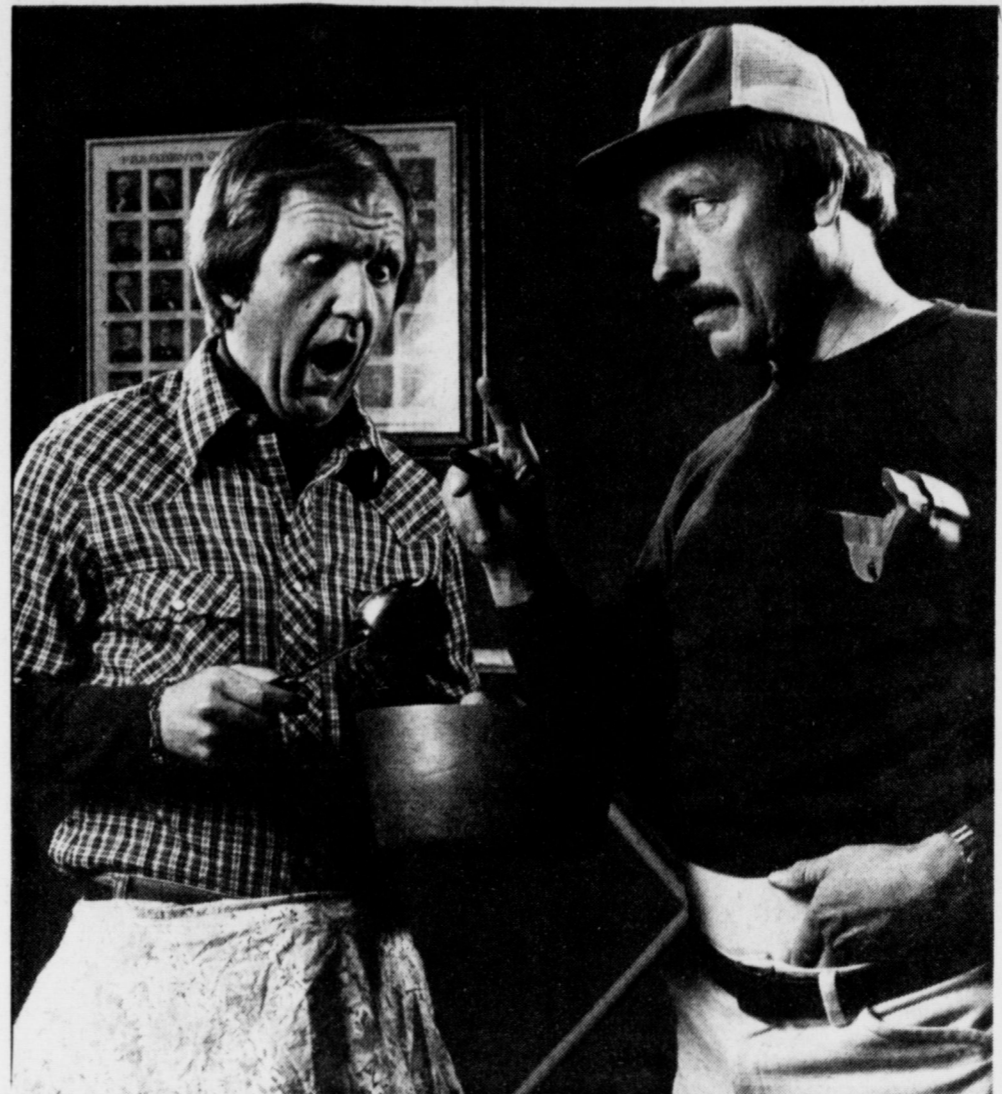

 The statute (H.B. 8) requires the tax assessor-collector to calculate a tax rate after the Board of Equalization has approved and certified the tax roll. It would be impossible for the City to comply with this requirement if it continues to operate on an April 1 to March 31 fiscal year.
 "Basically, the City Council sets a tax rate for the fiscal year when it adopts the annual budget in March. The Board of Equalization has not met at this time and does not meet until June. In June, the Board of Equalization will meet and review the tax roll. In July, the tax roll is approved and certified. Obviously, the tax rate for the City has been set before this time and not after as required by the new statute.
 "Upon changing the fiscal year, the Board of Equalization will continue to meet in June to review

the tax roll. The tax roll will also continue to be approved in July. The tax rate, however, will be set by the City Council when it adopts the annual budget in September or after the tax roll has been approved and certified. With the October 1 - September 30 fiscal year, the tax assessor-collector can calculate the tax rate as required by law after the tax roll has been certified.
 "In summary, the change in fiscal years will allow the City to comply with the new State law. The City will operate on an interim fiscal year for six months (April - September) until the new fiscal year begins in October. From there after, the fiscal year will remain the same, with the City operating normally with a fiscal year beginning in October."

The proposal to change the fiscal year will be on the ballot for the city election on April 7.

In other city council action, the proposed purchase of several large trees was discussed. If purchased, the trees will be four inches in diameter and will be 15-18 feet tall.
