A Doctor's Quarrel.

Two doctors in Richmond, Va., have called for pistols and coffee and been put under bonds to keep the peace. The facts are that a Dr. Maguire was in attendance upon a lady in advanced pregnancy to whom he administered hypodermically five minimis of Magendie's solution of morphine; she was suffering great pain and felt relief before the Dr. left, afterwards she was seized with convulsions and Dr. Welford and Magill were sent for.

CHARACTERISTIC LETTER FROM WENDELL PHILLIPS. Indianapolis, June 25.—The Indianapolis letter to-morrow will contain the following from Wendell Phillips to James Schuyler, Esq., of this city: Boston, June 18, 1875.—Dear Sir:—The state of the Cleveland platform opted last month has my cordial approval. No words can fully describe the instance of the financial plan it recommends. I am sure it will soon be adopted by the nation, and that it will revolutionize the relations of capital and labor. It will put beyond all danger of interference with its rights, and will immeasurably increase the comfort of the working man. No single measure of change will do so much as this for the happiness and virtue and progress of the race, and in my judgment, everything tends towards such a system of finance, and heralds its speedy adoption. Even here in Boston, the very legislators of legislation, I can assure that the ranks are beginning to break, and some few representative men are bending their thoughts and steps to our side. But there is no use of my giving you this expression of my opinion. I have publicly advocated a third term for Grant, unless some one can be found as sure as he is to rally the whole North, and as true as he has been to the cause from the South all the fruits of our victory. He has not by any means done his duty when he claimed or consented to the rejection of the school classes of the civil rights bill. He made that indispensable measure almost useless, and balked the hopes of the nation. Still, I know no one more to be trusted than he, who has any chance to be elected. His party repudiates him because he is joined to billiards and stock mongers. I lament this so much as you can; still, a nation never can afford

The Black Hills.

The report from the Military expedition to the Black Hills, to the effect that gold has been found in paying quantities, has awakened all the excitement and it is thought that thousands of men will rush there to seek their fortunes and that it will be impossible to keep them out. The St. Louis Globe and Democrat, says: "The critical moment has arrived, and we believe the government, having done its duty in offering liberal compensation of new homes in exchange for the Hills, should stand aloof, and let its enterprising citizens work out the development of this country. To guard the forbidden ground from active aggression would require a cordon of soldiers over 500 miles in length. If the thirty-five hundred warriors who inhabit that region want to make war upon the miners who go there, let them do it. Every adventurer counts his peril before going, and men who indulge in such enterprises are no 'shoochies' in defending their scalps. There would be a good many bald-headed old men after a while, who would live to tell their children how they lost their back-hair in skirmishes with little Spotted Tail, but the general result would be favorable. The pioneer riflemen would kill a few hundred asses, burn a few camps, and finally capture or drive off the entire tribe, who would then be willing to accept the protecting care of the government along with the other tribes in the Territory."

"The Good Old Times." When the Republicans were in office the 'good old times' before the war then taxes were only 15 cents on 100, was almost the single string played upon by democratic office-seekers. They fed the people to believe that if they were entrusted with the government of the State they would introduce economy in public affairs, reduce taxation and return to the "good old time." But alas taxation has been increased, the debt has been doubled and now the State organ of the Oke government, the Houston Telegraph comes out and scolds the cast words, "good old times," "reduction of taxes" &c. In remarking upon the statements of their Austin correspondent, that paper says: "Of correspondent will open the eyes of a good many, when they read that he says about the revenues of the State never having paid its expenses, and while retrenchment and economy and all that, is not very good to talk about, but good practice, let us bring into our discussions a little practical statement and a good share of fact and figures. NEW YORK, June 25.—A single world race for the amateur championship of the United States, took place to-day on Harlem River, between Frank E. Yates, of Grand Haven, Mich., and Richard B. Bainbridge, of the Atlanta Boat Club, three miles straight away. The race was won by Bainbridge in 22 minutes and 30 seconds. It has been stated in the leading papers of Europe that in order to arrest immigration from Germany, Prussia Bismarck has been offering imperial lands for sale in small lots at low prices. This, it was hoped, would stop the tide by showing the working classes of Germany they could live as well there as in the United States. But the plan did not succeed. The lands were not taken. Even the agricultural hands that remain at home are not disposed to till the earth when they can find more remunerative employment. A letter was lately received in New York upon this subject from a highly intelligent gentleman in Prussia, in which the writer says that field hands just now can make more in working upon farms and railroads than in using the plough and scythe, and, therefore, the sale of land is extremely dull and languid. Not until all these improvements are completed can it be seen whether the men of Germany prefer government lots on the Bismarck plan to the advantages obtained under the homestead law of the United States. One thing is certain, that at the present time the sale of imperial lots in Germany is not brisk.

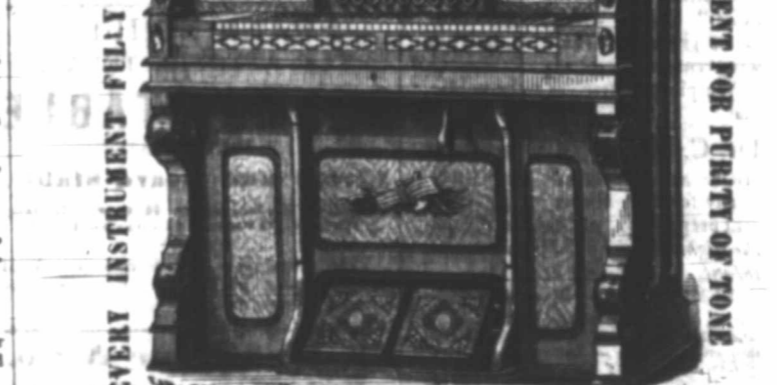

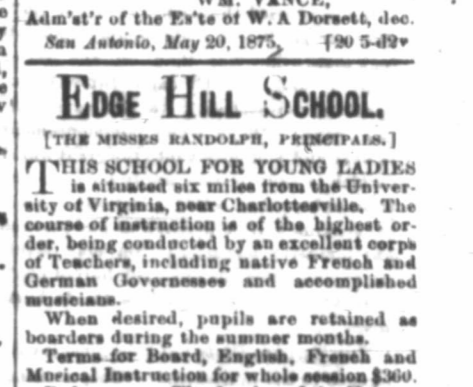

### The Black Hills.

The report from the Military expedition to the Black Hills, to the effect that gold has been found in paying quantities, has awakened all the excitement and it is thought that thousands of men will rush there to seek their fortunes and that it will be impossible to keep them out. The *St. Louis Globe and Democrat*, says:

"The critical moment has arrived, and we believe the government, having done its duty in offering liberal compensation or new homes in exchange for the Hills, should stand aloof, and let its enterprising citizens work out the development of this country. To guard the forbidden ground from active aggression would require a cordon of soldiers over 500 miles in length. If the thirty-five hundred warriors who inhabit that region want to make war upon the miners who go there, let them do it. Every adventurer counts his peril before going, and men who indulge in such enterprises are no 'slouches' in defending their scalps. There would be a good many bald-headed old men after a while, who would live to tell their children how they lost their back-hair in skirmishes with little Spotted Tails, but the general result would be favorable. The pioneer riflemen would kill a few hundred savages, burn a few camps, and finally capture or drive off the entire tribe, who would then be willing to accept the protecting care of the government along with the other tribes in the Territory."

### "The Good Old Times."

When the Republicans were in office the "good old times" before the war when taxes were only 15 cents on \$100, was almost the single thing played upon by democratic office-seekers. They led the people to believe that if they were entrusted with the government of the State they would introduce economy in public affairs, reduce taxation and return to the "good old times." But also taxation has been increased, the debt has been doubled and now the State organ of the *Coke* government, the *Houston Telegraph* comes out and scolds the state words, "good old times," "reduction of taxes" &c. In remarking upon the statements of their Austin correspondent, that paper says:

"Our correspondent will open the eyes of a good many, when they read what he says about the revenues of the State never having paid its expenses, and while retrenchment, and economy and all that, is not only good to talk about, but good to practice, let us bring into our discussions a little practical statesmanship and a good share of facts and figures. Let us be just, and considerate, and when we insist upon carrying on the machinery of the State with as little expense as possible, and counsel and demand a handspanning of all our resources, let us understand what we are talking about, and we shall not so frequently cry out, "Reduce taxation, and get back to the economy that characterized the administration in the good old times before the war."

### General News Items.

A CHARACTERISTIC LETTER FROM WENDALL PHILLIPS.  
Indianapolis, June 25.—The Indianapolis *News* of to-morrow will contain the following letter from Wendell Phillips to James Buchanan, Esq., of this city:

Boston, June 19, 1876.—Dear Sir—The first clause of the Cleveland Bill adopted last March, has my cordial approval. No words can fully describe the importance of the financial plan it recommends. I am sure it will soon be adopted by the nation, and that it will revolutionize the relations of capital and labor. It will put capital beyond all danger of interference with the rights, and will immediately increase the comfort of the working men. No single measure of change will do as much as this for the happiness and progress of the race, and, in my judgment, everything tends towards such a system of finance, and towards its speedy adoption. Know facts in Boston, the very Gibraltar of bigotry, I can see signs that the ranks are beginning to break, and some few representative men are bending their thoughts and steps to our side. Has there been any sign of your yielding to this expression of my opinion? I have pulled advanced a third term for Grant, unless some one can be found and used as he is to rally the whole North, and as true as he has been to "claim from the North all the fruits of my victory. He has not by any means done his duty when he abstains or concedes in the rejection of the school clause of the civil rights bill. He made that "indefensible measure" almost certain, and balked the hopes of the nation. Still, I know you are not to be trusted that you are any chance to be elected. But your party requires a change because he is joined to politicians and stock mongers. I lament this as much as you can; still, a nation never can afford

to let one issue at a time. All history prove this. To-day belongs to the great struggle for equality before the law. The South takes this, and means to defend it. The North has hidden this grand idea in its heart of hearts. This provoked and justified the war. The battle over, it is not ended. For this struggle the nation is ripe—ripened for forty years of discussion and five of war. Much as I value your great financial measure, I must in this next Presidential contest measure my candidate by another standard—loyalty to impartial liberty. Show me a man true to this, and able to the financial reform, and with a fair chance of success, and I am his earnest, devoted, and single hearted supporter, everywhere, at all times. St. Louis, June 23.—The Republican's Kansas City special says: "In an interview with a *Times* reporter, Senator Ingalls, to-day, stated he was opposed to Grant as a candidate for the Presidency. He said he could not carry one State in the Union if he should run. Kansas was dead set against him. Secretary Helms of Kentucky was the strongest man in the Republican party, and, in his opinion, would be the next President. He believed Republicans can elect their man without difficulty."

NEW YORK, June 23.—A single oar race for the amateur championship of the United States, took place to-day on Harlem River, between Frank E. Yates, of Grand Haven, Mich., and Richard B. Bainbridge, of the Atlantic Boat Club, three miles straight away. The race was won by Bainbridge in 22 minutes and 20 seconds.

It has been stated in the leading papers of Europe that in order to arrest emigration from Germany, Prussia has been offering imperial lands for sale in small lots at low prices. This, it was hoped, would stop the tide by showing the working classes of Germany they could live as well there as in the United States. But the plan did not succeed. The lands were not taken. Even the agricultural lands that remain at home are not disposed of to till the earth when they can find more remunerative employment. A letter was lately received in New York upon this subject from a highly intelligent gentleman in Prussia, in which the writer says that he had hands just now can make more in working upon farms and railroads than in using the plough and sowing, and, therefore, the sale of land is extremely dull and languid. Not until all these improvements are completed can it be seen whether the man of Germany prefer government lots on the Bismarck plan to the advantages obtained under the homestead law of the United States. One thing is certain, that at the present time the sale of imperial lots in Germany is not brisk.

SAN ANTONIO, June 23.—The editor and proprietor of the *Colorado Citizen*, is a cheerful visitor as well as editor. But Columbus is the student looking town, included in the demerit College, and on the banks of the last-looking river, overshadowed by steel-iron gloom, beneath the most majestic live oak, draped in the longest moss that is found by the banks of any river. The winds that stray along the valley of the Colorado can hardly lift perceptible waves upon the bosom of the stately river.

The men who fought for the Union on the one side, and men who fought for the Confederate cause on the other side, are after all the truest and safest reconstituters. Fitz Lee in Boston, beseeching Virginia's seceding soldiers, and the Southern good-will to the North to be held on the altar of the Union at Bunker Hill, and treated with civility as he has been, is truly typical of a genuine reconciliation of the best and bravest of both sections.—*Richmond, Phy. Dem.*
