THE BLACK HILLS.

News of the Black Hills—Reported Gold Discoveries. (Corr. Chicago Tribune.)

CHICAGO, June 27. The four United States Commissioners who are on their way to treat with the Indians at Red Cloud and Spotted Tail Agencies, and to gather them in for a grand Black Hills Convention, arrived here today, accompanied by your correspondent.

This afternoon, Dr. Daniels and Major Howard arrived from Spotted Tail Agency. Dr. Daniels has been entirely successful in his negotiation with all the Indians that had the right to vote in the grand Black Hills Convention, and they have all signed a treaty relinquishing the privilege. They are to receive as compensation the \$50,000 appropriated for the purpose at the last session of Congress. The treaty is a masterpiece of diplomacy, and is a great help in advancing the interests of the Indians. It is an important point gained for Nebraska. The annual bonus was always desired, and this treaty will be a great help in advancing the interests of the Indians. Dr. Daniels says that the Indians are feeling well, and that they are perfectly satisfied.

The Indians of the Black Hills, which has been alive all the season, has been greatly augmented in the last week. The official report from Colonel R. I. Dodge, commanding the military expedition, in which he said that gold had been found in paying quantities, and that General Custer's report had been confirmed, had been supplemented by specimens of the real stuff sent from the hills by men who are now at work there. I learned this morning from Judge Carter, an extensive cattle raiser, that he has seen some fresh gold in a letter by a secret courier within a few days. The gold was in nuggets, and the letter said that diggings had been found that pay well. The writer advised his friend, who had been driven back by the military, to go to give up the undertaking. Judge Carter knows the parties well, and has no doubt that the gold and silver are both genuine.

I was told today that a military man here had received a letter, also containing some specimens of gold, with information that gold diggings had been found. This evening I called upon him, and he showed three fresh nuggets, worth \$5 or \$10, and was informed that the letter accompanying them was written by a practical miner of many years' experience, who said that gold had been found in paying quantities.

General News Items.

SHERMAN AND THE NATION.
The New York Sun, edited by C. A. Dana, formerly Assistant Secretary of War to Stanton, which has said that he was on the platform here to denounce the military triumph at Washington, when Gen. Sherman says he refused Stanton's proffered hand, continues to affirm that Stanton did not offer his hand to Gen. Sherman, and that "he had no idea of seeking any recognition with a man whom he thought dangerous to the country, because he believed that he had attempted to set the military above the civil power, and to dictate to the government the terms on which the political questions of the war should be settled." Sherman had given Stanton reason to think so. He had attempted a "military coup d'etat." In the ten interregnum, with Lincoln slain and Johnson recently in disgrace, the time was full of peril. If not instantly checked by a united front, there is no telling to what length Sherman's mad presumption would have led him in his military dictatorship. If Stanton felt as Dana represents, he felt no more than the country should feel. We may suppose that Sherman intended the indignity to Stanton, but that Stanton was so dignified in his conduct. And in this view, Sherman's insult—so far as he could intend—was put upon the whole country, which approved Stanton's course, and felt as he did.

AGAINST THE CONVENTION.

FOR DELEGATES. E. DEGENER, of Bexar. WESLEY OGDEN, of Bexar. A. O. COOLEY, of Gillespie.

TAKING THE testimony of leading Democratic papers outside of Ohio, the platform of the Democratic party of Ohio is a failure.

If we are to judge from the scare of the Democrats and the hopefulness of the Republicans, we may safely predict the election of General Hayes as Governor of Ohio by a majority of about 20,000.

ST. LOUIS bids high for the next National Democratic Convention to be held in that place. She offers the use of the Merchants' Exchange, which can seat 15,000 people, and also to pay the expenses of the convention. Let her have it.

THE Herald of this city calls the State Gazette at Austin a double headed copper bellied moccasin snake. Brethren, you should control your tempers and your tongues, or you will damage the unity of the "Pharmaceutical Democracy."

THE news from Spain is still favorable to the Alfontists. Gen. Durrugaray is surrounded by several brigades in the mountains near Huasca. Gen. Campos is expected there to complete the cordon around the Carlists. When this is done the holy cause of Don Carlos, the butcher, will have its Sedan.

THE Commissioners appointed by the Governor to select locations for the two new Penitentiaries provided for by the last session of the Legislature, have decided to locate the one for Eastern Texas at a point on the line of the East and West Narrow Gauge Railroad, about one and a half miles west of the town of Rock in Cherokee county.

THERE is civil war in Afghanistan between Jakook Kahn and his father, Ameer Shere Ali. The paternal forces have lately taken some prisoners at Herat, and have shown their appreciation of English teachers in Hindostan, by blowing two of the captured Colofons from the mouth of cannon. Afghanistan will soon be civilized enough for thorough incorporation into British India.

THE one hundred and twenty-six Jesuits who are living in England in defiance of the law, will not probably cause any serious danger to the government which ignores their existence; but England would be a great deal more like the country it boasts itself to be if it would boldly remove this silly and uncalled for relic of old religious persecutions and discriminations. The truth is, however, that John Bull has grown so constitutionally timid that he has neither the pluck to persecute the Jesuits, as his laws direct, nor to repeal the laws which he does not enforce.

THE Herald of this city denounces the Houston Age for favoring an inflation of the currency, as un-democratic. Our neighbor seems to forget that the Galveston News, the great Democratic paper of the State, did the same thing last year, and has never taken it back. It also overlooks the fact that in the present great contest in Ohio, which will probably decide the fate of the Presidential election of next year, the Democracy of that State, virtually representing the Democracy of the whole Union, are battling upon an open and avowed inflation platform.

History of the Democratic and Republican Parties.

It is very little known that the Republican party is as old as the Union and that it is the original democratic party, entirely antagonistic of what is to-day called the democratic party.

Soon after the adoption of the Constitution of the United States a division of sentiment, and subsequently of parties, arose on the proper construction of that instrument. The supporters of Washington and Hamilton called themselves "Federalists," being the supporters of a Federal Republic, and their opponents were called "Anti-Federalists."

This was, however, rather an awkward name, and Mr. Jefferson himself suggested the name of Republican, which was adopted by the party, and which ever after, without any exception, called itself in all official proceedings the Republican party, and never by any other name.

The term Democrat was seldom used or countenance by Mr. Jefferson. On the 18th of May, 1812, James Madison was nominated for reelection by a caucus of eighty-two Republican members of Congress. One national caucus was called after that in 1816, which also was a Republican caucus, and nominated William H. Crawford. It was the last appearance of the old Republican party on the political stage.

Jefferson, Madison, Crawford, Jackson, or the Finleys, of Pennsylvania, talking politics, he would have heard them universally speak of their party as the "Republican party." Their opponents, of course, called them "Democrats," for it was used as a term of opprobrium. In that day revolutionary France was one of the world's great failures, and it is not far from it to-day. It had undertaken to establish the government of the people, which is the literal meaning of "Democracy."

"Demos" means "the people." It had overthrown the alters of religion. It had poured out like water the blood of the noble families whose names were renowned in history. It had raised to their places the Dantons, and Marats, and Brissots, the butchers of society, the brute cannibals of the gutters. France was a grand failure. It was a magnificent conflagration, but it was a conflagration, and like some of the great volcanoes of the world, burnt itself out in the violence of an infernal debauchery.

In the meantime Democratic societies were formed. Jacobin clubs appeared under the lead of such fellows as Danton. Some of our readers will recollect how Genet (the French Ambassador) tried to inflame our people with such ideas, and how Washington snuffed him out very quick. Democratic societies were formed in Philadelphia and other places. The Federalists took advantage of this and called the Republicans "Democrats" in contempt, and by way of odium. To suppose that Mr. Jefferson would have baptized his party with what was at that time an odious name is to suppose him destitute of common sense. He did not. He called them "Republicans," and so they called themselves in every official caucus of the party until 1816, when that party died a natural death.

It is conceded that the Federalists called them "Democrats," that it was quite common to speak of them as such; and that that name was common in the newspapers; but the question is, what is their historical name? What did they call themselves? Anybody who will go back and look into the calls for the "Republican" caucuses can answer that in the only way history can answer it. For years the Democratic party of to-day was called "Bitternuts," and "Secessionists;" but will some intemperate Quackenbom be justified in calling the Democratic Convention at Columbus the other day a "Bitternut" or "Secession" Convention?

There is another point about this which seems to be forgotten: Mr. Jefferson was the author of the "resolutions of 1798," and Mr. Madison defended them. Mr. Jefferson's idea was, that the government was a confederation of States, not a government formed by the people only. If then, Mr. Jefferson had called his party Democratic (that is, a government of the people only) he would have called it, if the word be taken in a fair sense, just what it was not. He was willing enough to court popularity, and to appeal to the people of Virginia, Kentucky, or Pennsylvania to support him. But he believed

that Virginia had a right (see the resolutions of '98) to veto what the people of the country had no right to enforce. He believed in the sovereignty of a State, but not the sovereignty of the nation. No comment on this is necessary, further than to say that in no fair sense is such a government a democracy. Mr. Jefferson knew this, and, however willing he was to play the demagogue for the sake of political power, was far too able a man to impose on his own intellect. He left that to his followers in another generation.

The only real democratic party in the country (that is, the only one which does, or ever did, hold the sovereignty of the nation—the right of the whole people to govern) is the present Republican party. The old Republican party never professed to hold any such doctrine. The present Democratic party will certainly not have the assurance to say that they were really a democratic party when supporting slavery, and State rights, and quite largely sympathizing with rebellion! With slavery a very large body of people could not vote at all. With State rights (as defined by the resolution of 1798) one State could veto the whole country, and with secession the whole government would be destroyed. No fair-minded man can say that these principles are consistent with a democracy is the fair sense of the word. But the Republican party holds some of these heresies. It holds that this is a nation, and that the people have a right to govern, without any regard to condition. This is democracy, pure and simple, and it has been held by no other party in the country.
