The Boy Pomerooy.

This unhappy being has attracted so much interest, especially as to his probability he has to suffer the penalty of death for his crimes, that we believe, if it is our readers to present them by himself. He was visited at the jail, where he has been confined since his conviction, by members of the Council of Boston, who conversed with him upon the subject of his crimes. They found him to be an unusually bright and intelligent lad; his answers were given with promptness, and decision; there was no wavering or hesitation in them, and he was perfectly satisfied with his quick reply was, "Two, sir!" He was asked why he killed the little boy, and replied that "he did not know." He said that "he was standing, with others, looking at the working of a fire-engine, when he noticed a pretty looking little boy standing near. He suddenly asked the little fellow if he would not take a walk with him, and upon consenting, he was led across a marshy distance of at least a mile, where suddenly he felt a something in his hand and mechanically he took his pocket-knife from his pocket, rapidly opened it, and stabbed, stabbed, stabbed it into the little victim, leaving no consciousness of what he was doing at the time, and never that day fully realizing what he had done. That in all the time he was walking with the boy he did not leave in his hand to injure him, his only intention being to injure him with his companion-ship, and it was only when he suddenly seized with this uncontrollable impulse that he did the deed, and it all occurred within a minute. The boy was a pretty child and that was what attracted him toward him."

When asked about the circumstances of his killing the little girl in South Boston, he said that "that morning his mother and brother were away or engaged, and he was obliged to attend to the periodical store. He sat reading awhile, when a pretty little girl, whom he had never seen before, came in and asked for some papers. As soon as she spoke, this terrible feeling all through him, with the fluttering in his head, came over him, and he replied, "They are down below." Unsuspectingly she opened the door and passed down the stairs, Pomerooy immediately following, drawing his knife as he went. As soon as the bottom was reached he placed his left hand over her mouth, drew his head toward his shoulder, and with the knife in his right hand cut her throat, and she was dead in a minute. Not three minutes had elapsed from the time he first laid eyes on the little girl before she was dead.

At one of the hearings before the Council were present with their parents several of the little victims of his previous attacks. They recalled of the injuries and tortures inflicted upon them by Pomerooy were startling. He met one little boy, when there was snow on the ground and the thermometer near zero, standing looking into a window; he told him a story as to how a man wanted a bundle of straw and a bundle of hay, and he had a sled with him he would give the boy a quarter if he would assist him. Content being given he led the boy away some two miles to a shed, entered and made the hay stick to the sled, tied him up, took out his knife, stuck it into each cheek, drawing it away, looking at the point to see the blood, then caused the little fellow to don his clothing, placed him on his sled and drew him to the boy's own door and left him. Another boy he enticed into a boat-house, climbed with him into a boat, made him strip and then tortured him for an hour or more by sticking pins into his skin to the depth of from a quarter to half an inch, and this hundreds of times, threatening to kill his victim upon the least outcry, finally releasing him and seeing him safely home. One thing is inexpressible—how did he dare to cozen with his little victim to their very doors, unless it was, as he says, that "he didn't know what he was doing!"

Pratt relative to the Kiowa and Comanche prisoners who were captured at Staked Plains, in the Indian Territory, and were subsequently confined at Fort Marion, St. Augustine Fla. The President through Gen. Babcock, suggests that the request of the Indians should be complied with, and in the absence of Secretary Deland (Gen. Cowan has given the necessary order accordingly. Commissioner Smith states there are about three hundred women and children to be transported, and nearly three thousand mules and oxen at an expense of nearly \$15,000. The captive number about 60.

THE PIERCE RAILROAD will reach the Guadalup: river this side of Seguin in six weeks. So says Col. H. B. Andrews. Then we shall have only thirty miles of staging.

GEN'S FOREST AND PILLOW have immortalized themselves by making national and conciliatory speeches to the colored people on the Fourth of July, and addressing them as "ladies and gentlemen."

HON. J. B. REAGAN, running for the Convention, comes out in favor of reviving the miserable and shameful barbarity of the whipping-post, and the press of the Union is ashamed of him.

THE PLYMOUTH gunboat, accompanied by steam launches for service on the Rio Grande river, has arrived at Brazos Santiago, and will look after Mexican murderers and cattle thieves.

THE SIDE-SHOW in politics at the present time is the race between the "green back party" and the Democratic party. Each is trying to swallow the other, forgetting that the country will swallow neither of them, nor both combined.

THE COST of the Beecher-Tilton trial is said to amount to \$140,000, of which half falls on Mr. Beecher. But his congregation have voted him a salary of \$100,000, and we suppose he can manage to live, after all.

COL. VALENTINE BAKER, a brother of the celebrated African explorer, Sir Samuel Baker, and a friend of the Prince of Wales, is to stand his trial at the Assizes for an indecent assault on a young lady in the cars.

JOHN IRELAND was defeated at the Luling convention for nomination as a delegate to the Constitutional Convention, and the Austin Statesman rejoices thereat. John is getting under par in the whole West.

LET all friends of Western Texas and of the State vote solidly against the expensive and dangerous folly of a Constitutional Convention. It will cost a vast amount, and will not do the State or her people a particle of good.

THE PEOPLE of Georgia are getting alarmed over the apprehension that they have hung an innocent on circumstantial testimony. They did that once before as we happen to know. Innocent men are convicted constantly on circumstantial testimony.

THE interest excited by the rifle matches between the American and Irish teams, has led to the proposition to have an annual national rifle match in this country, at which teams from every State shall contest for the prize. Texas can do her part.

CLERICAL SCANDALS seem to be epidemic about now. About a week ago Rev. John W. Hanner D. D., of Tennessee, one of the most eloquent pulpit orators in the South, over sixty years old, was denounced by Bishop McTyeire, of the M. E. Church, South, for writing an obscene letter to a young lady.

F. P. Blair, Jr.

Francis Preston Blair, jr., died at St. Louis the 8th of July last. He was born at Lexington, Ky., Jan. 19, 1821. The late John C. Breckinridge was born near that city about the same time, so that the two men, afterward so prominent in public affairs, may be said to have started in life together. Both enjoyed more than ordinary advantages in parentage, both were possessed of more than average talents, both died in the same year. Mr. Blair was educated at Princeton, studied law, and practiced it in Missouri. He afterward became editor of the St. Louis Democrat, and, by his advocacy of free institutions, showed that he dared to rise above the level of his party. He was elected to Congress in 1856, and again in 1861. He proved himself an able defender of his country in the hour of its peril, and not content with advocating national unity at Washington, entered the field in 1862. He was appointed Major-General, and, on being re-elected to Congress for a third term, was not willing to remain long a way from the scene of hostilities. He fought long and well, and was one of Sherman's most energetic officers. When the war closed he was appointed Collector of St. Louis by President Johnson in 1866, and a little later Commissioner of the Pacific Railroad. During the same year he was prominent at the Soldiers and Sailors' Convention at Cleveland. In 1868 he was nominated for the Vice-Presidency by the Democrats, but defeated. In 1870 he was chosen United States Senator, and showed himself a strong Democratic partisan, especially in manipulating the politics of Missouri. As Breckinridge missed his opportunity for greatness in yielding to the secession tide in Kentucky, so Blair, after demonstrating his intelligent preference of nationality to selfish party aims, changed his ground and sacrificed his reputation and usefulness for present advantages.

THE GREENBACK PARTY, that is, the inflationists, have called a meeting at Detroit on August 25th. B. P. Butler, W. D. Kelley, M. W. Field, and others, are expected to address the meeting. This is the beginning of the organization of an element which will either split the Democratic party in the next Presidential election, or force it to run its candidate on the inflation platform. In either case, Democratic defeat would seem to be almost a certainty. The Republican party is almost unanimous against inflation, and the financial wisdom of the country is with it.

THE Austin Statesman is of the opinion that the unexpected arrest of Cortina by order of President Lerdo was to get rid of his very dangerous opposition in the coming Presidential election, Lerdo being a candidate for re-election. This may be true, and, after awhile, we may have Cortina back again on the Rio Grande. At any rate, we trust the United States military and marine forces will continue to act with the same vigor as though Cortina were still commanding the murderers there as of oldtime. Having commenced this little job, let us finish it up finally and forever.

GEN. B. P. BUTLER has written a letter in support of the inflation plank in the platform of the Ohio Democracy. As they have great confidence in him, and great liking for him, this will doubtless give them great encouragement. It seems to us that the Democracy, in the next Presidential canvass, will be compelled to support inflation, or split upon that issue. If they do not run their candidate upon that issue, a third party evidently will. The Western and Southern Democrats nearly all support the inflation theory. The Republicans will be unanimous in the support of specie payment and a sound currency, and upon that issue they will win the race.

THE ENGLISH ROYAL MEN are afraid to shoot any of their teams against the American team now in England, unless they are allowed to pick a team from all the other teams in the kingdom. The English are a selfish set in these matters. They tried to cheat Heenan out of the victory in the pugilistic contest with Sayers; they tried to cheat Paul Morphy out of the victory in the chess contest with Staunton; and now they will not match their riflemen with ours on fair and equal terms.

FRANK BLAIR, with his genius and national reputation and influence, came to the help of the Democracy of Missouri, when they were prostrate and helpless, and thus gave them the control of the State. They pledged themselves to elect him to the United States Senate for the long term after his short term should expire. They broke faith, threw him overboard, and broke his heart. This was the cause of his death at the early age of 54.

THE STORMS IN HUNGARY, which have been previously reported, prove to have been of a very destructive character. The bodies of twenty-eight persons were found, and over one hundred people are also reported missing. The loss of life and property has been of such an extensive nature that aid for the relief of the survivors is earnestly asked for.

OATS are now being shipped from Texas to New Orleans—148 sacks from Dallas having recently arrived, and arrangements having been made for further shipments. It promises to become a remunerative industry, and an important element of trade, and indicates the steady progress Texas is making in the development of her vast latent resources.

MESSRS Moody and Sankey, the celebrated American revival preachers, who have produced such a tremendous sensation in Great Britain during the past year, held their farewell meeting in London on the 12th inst., at which 188 clergymen of the Church of England attended, besides many from other communions.

GENERAL MEIGS, our veteran Quartermaster, sailed for Europe on Wednesday, June 20. He goes abroad to investigate the workings of the European armies in his particular branch, and will no doubt return loaded with valuable experience.

RECENTLY MADE BURGLARY—The Old Mill, has been the scene of a successful burglary. The mill is run by two industrious Germans, Messrs. Byer and Wagner, who, it seems, very foolishly kept their money in an old iron safe in the second story of the mill.

PERSONS in the neighborhood heard a report of an explosion about three o'clock Sunday morning. No one slept in the mill and the burglars had it all their own way, and the deliberate manner in which they proceeded to the safe which they perfect knowledge of the situation.

In the lower story were several savage dogs, so they ascended to one of the upper story windows in the rear of the mill and entered; a tin funnel was cut out of a piece of tin and the powder poured into the exposed key hole of the safe; this was not reported until a child had been tried. The money being rather bulky, was put in a sack, and taken off. A candle was used to inspect the interior of the safe and surroundings.

The burglar then by means of a screw driver, who may be proved a willing to all persons who are as careful with their funds as to plant temptation in the way of burglars. The "Old Mill" was entered in 1866, and almost six months to rob the safe, the miller was killed, but the burglar failed to open the safe, which now stands alone side the safe opened last Saturday night, both disfigured wreck.

Accident to Hiram Hall—A Dangerous Fight Between the Jailers and Prisoners.

Yesterday, Sunday evening, about five o'clock, an alarm was spread over the city that the prisoners confined in the county jail had made a desperate attempt to escape and having captured the arms of the jailers refused to surrender. A large crowd of people gathered about the jail to learn the particulars, and long after everything had quieted down the crowd lingered.

We interviewed Mr. Moran, one of the jailers, and Mr. Kettel, in relation to the affair. It seems that about 5 o'clock, before feeding the prisoners, two jailers, Mr. Kettel, and Mr. Theo. Leopold, proceeded to examine the shackles of the prisoners in the main cell, ten in number. Kettel examined while Leopold stood at the door. While Kettel was stepping down he was struck in the head and seized by several of the prisoners. Leopold was also seized and disarmed. Kettel fought like a tiger, and Leopold succumbed in escaping and slaying John Moran, the other jailer, who rushed to the aid of Kettel, who bleeding from his wounds, was struggling for the door, held by two of the prisoners. Moran leaped his gun and fired over Kettel's head and the prisoners released Kettel. Moran stood with his gun at the cell door, and the prisoners demanded that the jailers should escape. Leopold made an attempt to very soon on the city jail and others rushed to the jail.

While the prisoners, which consisted in a lot with a knife and a blow from a pistol on the head were drawn, and their hands bound, proceeded to the cell door and demanded the prisoners which were kept through the window, which was held by Schmitt, who was captured by the city police for burglary, Ed. Watkins and O'Leary.

Limes—Cements—Important Hints and Reflections upon the Art of Building.

No. 2. Continued.

All I can say in regard to the manufacture of limes is to mention here a paragraph taken from a communication made by M. F. Colinet to the Society of the Civil Engineers of the city of Paris, dated May 19, 1830:

"Certain parties have tried to make artificial stones of agglomerated limes, but being satisfied by a spirit of bad economy, some have expressed the energetic trituration with compression, which is necessary to produce a powder paste, have contented themselves with obtaining without the necessary trituration a moist mixture of lime, sand and cement; while others have sought to replace it by heavy pressure. Those pastes are bad, and I do not hesitate to say that by the suppression of the trituration, the beton being in a pulverized state without unity, when it ought to be in a pasty pulverulent state, does not agglomerate under the perth unity, and is not obtained, unless recourse is had to immense pressure, almost impossible to obtain.

"In regard to the compression obtained by the pressure substituted for the pounding, the result is still worse, when limes are compressed in a mould, the air is compressed at the same time and with the limes; and when the pressure ceases, the air expands, and by doing so disintegrates the limes; besides the exterior particles of the block of limes under the action of pressure become convex and thereby prevent the interior of the same to feel the pressure. This fault in manufacturing the same in the United States has caused many misfortunes where artificial stone had already obtained much favor. A hospital has crumbled down, causing the death of 15 or 20 workmen; a college that threatened ruin, had to be abandoned."

This sentiment of so called economy is carried too far in this country. For instance a certain piece of work is made; the workman looks at it, but never to my knowledge would he try to give a more perfect form or more solidity without elumescence, etc., in other words, he never tries to better his work. If it is carpenter's work, for instance a double door, he will suppress a portion of the screws needed to place them together, if they ought to be three inches in length, he will reduce them to 2 1/2 inches, etc.; of a good piece of work he will do his best to make it bad. I have made many models for others, and I have always found that they had been modified, to the injury of shape and quality.

They have not only done that, but they have been in the habit of shooting and hanging the thief, whenever overtaken. They do so to the present day. If anybody is to be sent to the Penitentiary for taking the shortest road for the recovery of stolen property, let us begin at home, and not make our first example out of a poor ignorant, frightened stranger boy.
