"The State finances are in such a condition that the propriety of calling the Legislature is much discussed, but it will hardly be convened, as it is believed by many that it would do no good. By November, when the taxes fall due, a total of \$1,000,000 in State warrants for borrowed money will accumulate, and will have to be paid. It is very doubtful whether the January, 1876, interest can be met. It is believed that the debt will finally be settled by low-rate bonds, sailing or repudiation."

Shot in Seguin Last Night.

The war which John Ireland instigated and headed some years ago against Republicans and Republican officials in Guadalupe county, seems not even now to be finally closed. This war was first commenced on Judge Maney, one of the best Judges, and one of the worst treated men in this State. Not by any strictly legal course, but by bullying, backed by a John Ireland bar, Judge Maney was kept in constant trouble, and, when the Coke Legislature and administration came in, he had no chance whatever, and had to yield to the storm.

But Ireland and his crew have not been so successful in getting rid of the Republican Sheriff, Mr. Gordon. He had him removed by the District Judge, but he ran again, and was elected over even so good and so popular a man as Gen. Henry E. McCulloch. He was again removed, and Ireland had a law passed by the Legislature to the effect that a removed sheriff could not be eligible to office again for two years. Nevertheless, Gordon again ran for the office, was again elected, and was again refused the office by the Judge of the District Court. He then took the case to the Supreme Court, and a short time since they decided in his favor.

So, Mr. Ireland had the mortification, all at the same time, of being defeated for nomination for the Convention and for the State Senate by the Democratic convention at Luling; and also of being beaten in his own county, and on his own daughter of Seguin, where he had so long been "cock of the walk," by the persistent Republican sheriff whom he had so greatly wronged. Every body who knows the egotistic selfishness and partisan and personal bitterness of John Ireland, can well imagine the rage he is in about the present time.

On yesterday this fostering ulcer came to a head, burst, and overflowed to the disgrace of Seguin and Guadalupe county. The District Court being in session, and the Supreme Court having decided Mr. Gordon to be the legal sheriff, he had engaged in the duties of his office, when, shameful to relate, still another attempt was made to deprive him of his position. On what ground this action was taken, we have not learned; but it was led by the District Attorney. In the discussion which followed, he called "V. Gordon a liar, and struck him, whereupon the Judge fined them both fifty dollars! O Democratic justice! O most impartial Judge! Judge Maney then took part in the discussion, when the District Attorney called him a liar also. Judge Maney replied that he was not ambitious to be fined fifty dollars, but that he would call the police official to personal account outside of the court house.

The result was that the friends of both parties began to arm themselves, and last night there were two armed and hostile camps in John Ireland's town of Seguin, and bloodshed was momentarily expected when the stage left. We do not know the particulars, but it seems to us that the officers of the District Court of Guadalupe county are in very great danger of being punished out of contempt of the decree of the Supreme Court in this persistent persecution of the lawfully elected Sheriff of that county. This whole disgraceful and bloody mischief is the result of the influence of that bold bad man, John Ireland. It is time that he be punished for his misconduct, and made to behave himself like any other citizen.

John Ireland as a brag.

Judge Ireland, who affixes "Chair man Cent. Com." to his signature, proposed to sign the Chairman of the Central Commission, is again out of humor and in print. He is greatly excited by the burlesque "Additional Instructions for the guidance of the Inner Circle of the Democratic Party of Texas." Why is it cause they are so true that they "Hon. H. McCulloch," "friends various parts of the State," "General Maney," or some of them, have taxed him (in part, at least), with the authorship of these additional Instructions, or with indiscretion in regard to their circulation? Is that what has ruffled the serenity of his temper and caused him to come out with his last pronouncement?

General News Items.

FOREIGN. London, July 22.—In the House of Commons to-night Disraeli stated that the government would proceed with the agricultural and merchant shipping judicial and land transfer bills. He declined to say what disposition would be made of the measure. He hoped, with the assistance of the House to bring their labors to a close at a reasonable period. Much dissatisfaction is felt at the Premier's indiscretions.

Of the functionaries invited to the Lord Mayor's international banquet, the following have accepted: The prefects of the Seine, of the Pas de Calais, and of the Poles; the Mayor of Calais, Bordeaux, Geneva, Lyons, Turin, Florence, Christiania, Boston and Quebec, and the burgomasters of Brussels, Antwerp and Amsterdam. Scratches have not answered and twenty-two declined, including all the Germans invited.

London, July 22.—The Daily Telegraph says Regina has officially announced her intention of withdrawing her proposal for the continuance of the Brussels conference.

FRUSSIA. LONDON, July 17.—A special dispatch from Berlin to the Pall Mall Gazette, says the German Government has ordered the declaration by Catholic clergymen to the new laws shall be strictly secret, the purpose being to secure them from pervasion by the ultra.

HAWAII, July 17, via Key West.—The Spanish man-of-war Christine chased a British schooner into the harbor of Hayti, and the Haytian authorities found a contraband cargo on her. The British Consul, it is reported, is making an examination. The Cuban insurgents have captured two forts near Baracoa, together with their garrison.

CHICAGO, July 17.—A balloon, with Prof. Donaldson and a reporter of the Evening Journal, was seen thirty miles north, with the basket dipping in the water. A schooner turned to help the balloon, which re-ascended and moved northward.

Nothing heard of the balloon which left here Thursday night. It is generally supposed that it was swept into the lake by the terrific storm Thursday night. A special to the Chicago Times from Goshe, Ind., says yesterday morning a balloon was seen passing over that city in an easterly direction. It was high in the air, and the parties in it were cheering. Whether it was Donaldson or some other aeronaut is not known.

DEATH OF THE TRACK. OVERTON, July 17.—The northward bound passenger train of the International and Great Northern Railway, last night, at a point eight miles south of this, ran over three negro men who were sleeping on the track. One has since died from his injuries, and another is not expected to live, while the third one was but slightly injured.
