THE *Statesman* says that Col. John W. Glenn, a well known Republican, is now a reporter for the *State Gazette*. Well, what of it? A news paper man can write where he pleases, as well as a lawyer can plead where he pleases, we should think.

It is rumored in Dallas that two private banks in Marshall will suspend. The drought dries them up, and the hard money curse, as it comes with its terrible contractive force upon the muscles of Texas energy.—*Austin Statesman*.

THE *Washington Chronicle* of the 14th instant positively says there will be no change in the head of the Interior Department unless Delano, "for personal reasons, should voluntarily choose to resign, of which he has no intention, until the retirement of the present administration."

JOHN G. BREKID, the last Democratic Treasurer of Ohio, stole \$650,000 of the public money, an amount equal at the present time to a million. There was no restitution. Under Republican management not one dollar has been lost. Now come the Brekin party and ask to be restored to power in that important office.

THE *Chicago Times* thinks the *Baltimore Gazette* in error when it says that Senator Thurman "has degenerated from a statesman into a truckling time-server," saying that "he is just as much a statesman now as ever, which is a very small pattern of a statesman in deed." The *Times* does not seem to admire prominent Democrats as much as it did some years ago. At all events, it does not feel called upon to praise them simply because they are Democrats. Like many other leading journals, the *Times* has ceased to be a party organ, and has adopted the role of candor and common sense in dealing with public men and measures.

A NEW book by the author of "The Household of Bouverie," is certain to attract the attention of novel readers, for there are not many novels of its class that leave a pleasanter impression on the memory than it, and Mrs. Warfield has not written enough to take the freshness from her work. Her new title is not as happily chosen as the last, for "A Double Wedding; or How She Was Won," is a little suggestive of a common place sensationalism; but the story will be found bright and interesting, clever in its plot, and in its delineation of character, and quite worthy of its author's reputation. It has just been published by T. B. Peterson & Brothers, and will be a good book to take away for the summer vacation.

ROBERT DALE OWEN.—An Indianapolis journal announces the arrival of Robert Dale Owen in that city, accompanied by his two sons. It seems that the earliest tokens of insanity were the result of disease, and among other hallucinations Mr. Owen believed he was the heir to the earldom of Broadlaine and to an immense estate, and he began to plan how he would enter colleges and build orphan asylums. His whole conversation was as to "the best means of benefiting mankind." Unless independent paralysis should set in there are hopes Mr. Owen's mental faculties may be restored. The misfortune that has befallen this amiable, accomplished and high-minded gentleman will be regretted by all circles.

rumored War With Mexico.

Many persons in Texas seem to think there is a probability of a little war with Mexico. We do not believe with them. War will not arise in consequence of the military suppression of the robberies and murders on the Rio Grande. Mexico could not afford to go to war on such an issue, where she so inclined, to say nothing of her financial and numerical weakness. Even should the United States seek by annexation to extend the boundary between the two countries from the Rio Grande to the Sierra Madre, it would be accomplished by negotiation and not by war. The territory would be taken in compensation for the ten or fifteen millions worth of property taken from our citizens on the border.

Yet the *Austin Statesman* says that Washington letter-writers, and one from Long Branch, concur in stating that the President favors the extension of the Texas boundary line from the Rio Grande river to the Sierra Madre mountains, which will annihilate the present "free belt," the source of so much difficulty and bloodshed, and give a boundary line which can be properly defended. To accomplish this it will be necessary to filibuster to some extent, and this, it is stated, the Texans are about to do, as the arrest of Cortina does not seem to stop the marauding expeditions from Mexico. Says the *Express* correspondent:

"If this proposed Texas filibustering expedition receives even a wink of encouragement from the President then the Texans will go on. And this little fact of proposed resistance to armed robbers may be a little 'speak of war.'"

"The fact that United States vessels and supplies are now on the way to the Rio Grande looks as though our government were preparing for some sort of contingency there."

Is the *Herald* a Democratic Paper?
Editors Express:

In Thursday's edition of the S. A. *Herald* the editor of that paper takes occasion to assure the public of the Democratic genuineness of the *Herald*. He says:

"As faithful to the doctrines and the traditions and the usages of the democratic party as the needle to the pole, the San Antonio *Herald* knows no variableness nor even the shadow of turning."

Having been a close observer of the erratic course of the *Herald*, and even a reader of the composite editorials which emanate from its editorial head, I think it is a question whether the *Herald* is any better guide, as a democratic organ, than the *Express*, nor do I intend to bring the genuineness of the politics of the *Express* into question by this assertion.

The *Herald*, if we judge it by its leading editorials, has no settled political principles. These editorials are made up mostly of extracts from Northern papers, and often the same article is taken from different newspapers, and presents an ill fitting piece of composite work.

The *Herald* has abused Gov. Coke, Hon. Jno. Ireland, and other leading democrats. It gave a very lukewarm support to the Democratic ticket for city offices at the last election, and is now advocating the so-called Independent ticket for the Constitutional Convention in the 30th Dist. in the face of the fact that there is a regular democratic ticket in the field, as legitimate in every respect as the democratic ticket in this District, which the *Herald* supports.

The true test of a party paper is its devotion to all the men and measures of the party, and a paper that acts as the *Herald* has acted does not deserve to be considered a party paper. It is nothing more than a mercenary concern that shapes its course to suit its position to its local patronage. X.

The Presidential Aspirations of Ohio Democrats.

A great many people are amusing themselves by figuring out the Presidential probabilities that will grow out of this contest, and assuming to speak as to the motives of Pendleton and other inflationists, as also those of Senator Thurman in their action before the convention met. Some have attributed to Thurman the motive of working in the interest of Tilden, of New York, and others have credited Pendleton and his followers with being in the interest of Hayes, of Delaware.

There are scarcely a few of the rumors that are current in political circles, the truth of which can not be doubted. There are two which I have heard relating to the secret policy of both Pendleton and Thurman, which, while they are like the others incapable of positive proof, seem to be more in accord with the generally received notion that men always look out for themselves first and their friends afterwards. I have heard it stated on good authority as these rumors are generally based upon, that Pendleton proposes to make another strong fight for the Presidential nomination next year. That he has placed himself upon an inflation platform to take the support of the South from Hendricks, of Indiana, who, it is hoped, will be placed in such an equivocal position by reason of his hard-money associations, and will lose the support of all of the Southern and some of the Western States. It is also hoped that Thurman, by reason of his opposition to the financial plank, will so weaken himself in Ohio that it will leave a solid delegation for Pendleton.

Thurman on the other hand is according to another rumor acting on a secret understanding with the Eastern Democrats, who will support him in the event of a choice after Tilden. It is understood that Thurman is to lend his tacit support to the non-money idea this fall and thereby become apparently a friend of the inflationists; that the South is to be divided between Pendleton and Hendricks, as was done by the Eastern bondholders in 1868, and it is believed that when it becomes impossible to nominate either of these men, Thurman will be accepted by the South in preference to either Tilden or Bayard, men of the most pronounced hard-money convictions, and that with the assistance of the Middle and Eastern and hard-money Western State, after Tilden's withdrawal, he can be nominated as the next best candidate.

It will be noticed as significant that all of these rumors do not touch William Allen, who, in the minds of some people, stands a better chance than many others named for being the next President.

Marine Captured.

Yesterday morning we published the killing of a man named Yancey by one Harris, who had and was pursued by neighbors. A gentleman from Georgetown yesterday reports that Harris was captured, and that he is now in the Georgetown jail. There is a different version of the circumstances of the killing from what we gave Tuesday. It is now said that Harris, who is a young man, killed Yancey's dog about midway between his own house and that of Yancey, when the latter came running to the place in a threatening manner. Harris commenced to walk backward with his gun drawn, telling Yancey to keep away; but Yancey pressed ahead and finally got hold of the gun barrel, and in the conflict that ensued the weapon was discharged, and Yancey was instantly killed, the whole lot entering his body.—*Statesman*.
