He distinctly asserts that he never advised colored men to abandon the leaders of the Republican party and to set up for themselves.

The Democratic Idea of the Fate of the Negro.

U. S. Senator, Thos. M. Norwood of Georgia, in a recent address before the annual of Emory College in speaking of the negro as a free laborer said:

"But will not the next generation surpass the present, who are ignorant, and labor under the lingering evils of slavery? We, who are on the ground, and daily see the rising generation, know too well and too sadly the fallacy of this hope. The former slave—now free—is the best black laborer we of our children will ever see. He has the habit of labor, the discipline, the health preserved and the partial sobriety enforced by the restraints of slavery. The succeeding generation is growing up without parental discipline, without moral influence, and are educated to idleness and vice. The result of such habits on a nature indisposed to labor, and not gifted with a very rigid moral sense, need not be stated. The answer to the question is given daily by the criminal records of the courts, and we will see that record swell and grow with every passing year."

And he predicted a series of causes which would drive out the negro as a laborer or force him back into slavery.

If the so-called Democratic party, to which the Senator belongs, can maintain its grip upon the Southern States, then truly the fate of the negro is to be deplored. The Norwoods of the South, who for generations have lived in luxurious ease; whose entire wealth and prosperity was produced by the labor of the negro slave, and whose blood courses freely through negro veins, have turned upon the negro in his freedom with a determination to destroy him. As a slave the negro was simply the machine of his master. He needed neither will, nor mind, nor heart. Even God was a kind consideration to his ability to labor for his master.

The negro a free man, must be educated, and raised up to the plane of manhood,—this would not be a hard task if his former enslaver possessed the superior manhood he claims; but the task is a hard one when left to the negro unaided and opposed by the white element, ostracized from church and school house, knitted, spurred, and despised, truly this poor people have a tremendous task to accomplish to overcome the effects of two hundred years of degrading slavery.

The judgement of history is forming and the Norwoods of the South will be condemned as the enemies of mankind.

A national system of education will be the first grand step towards conquering the ignorance of the South, white and black.
