DUNCAN, Sherman & Co., propose to pay creditors 75 per cent in full settlement of all indebtedness of firm.

There are four hundred Kn Klux in Franklin County, Illinois, who of late have been committing outrages. The Sheriff and citizens are on the war path after them. Gov. Beveridge has sent 100 stand of arms to help out.

It has leaked out that those two worthies, Judges Russell and Howard, the especial pets of Coke, got up a little plan to distribute "Republican tickets" in the counties of Medina, Kinney, and Maverick, with a circular or report that it was a ticket agreed upon at Hempstead Convention. We have not heard if this trick was carried out or not.

It is stated that of the present Congress, composed of 336 members, 200 are lawyers, 50 merchants and the rest editors and farmers. In the United States there are 40,000 lawyers and 2,500,000 farmers, therefore, there is one lawyer in Congress for every 200 of that profession, and only one farmer for every 130,000, as the latter class in reality, only number 18 in our national legislature. It is eminently necessary then, that the legal element in this country should be careful to select its representative men for public position, else a popular prejudice may be engendered which will be unpleasant in its exhibition.

MR. MORGAN O'CONNELL, son of the Irish Liberator, writes to the London Times to correct its statement that his father wished to be made Master of the Rolls, and that the Government of the day would not grant his ambition. Mr. O'Connell says he was offered the position, but refused it, and continues: "I was present when the late Sir Michael O'Loghlen made him, on the part of the Government, the offer. My father subsequently stated, 'It was a tempting offer; its value was enhanced by the manner in which it was made, and prominently so by the person through whom it was made—the best Englishman Ireland ever saw—the Mr. Quigley of Normandy.' Further, I can assure you, on undoubted authority, that he was previously offered the Chief Baronship of the Exchequer, which he likewise refused."

DEMOCRACY and with its humanity is on its grandest trial in this republic. The masses are the voters. They must be educated up to the responsibility of their vote, in part, compulsory. They can be, and we have the faith that they will be. Dr. Wadley does not believe in universal suffrage. The timid conservatism of the scholar should not have said it. The die is cast. The Rubicon is passed. It is now for every American to swear by all the faith he has in everything that is true and noble and worthy of humanity, that by God's blessing on the great educating factors of our body politic—the free school, an independent press, an untrammelled pulpit, the rural home and the town meeting—honor shall prevail, Freedom shall go under, the ozone of the country sweep its vital currents through the city, and the census, and every legislature and judicial hall, and democracy, weighed though it be by universal suffrage, should win the race.—Springfield Republican.

Sufferings at Sea.

The British ship "Bremer" has been brought into San Francisco into terrible distress; thirteen of the crew died of scurvy on the passage, the balance were helpless and three died in sight of the port of San Francisco. Plinnoff's attack upon the Government will gather additional force in view of such an instance as this of British seamen suffering on the high seas.

THE DELAYED TRAIN.

The accident to the train yesterday between Bremen and Chappel Hill was of a more serious nature than at first reported, six cars were thrown on the track, and some were precipitated down an embankment some twenty feet. The cars were thrown off by the engine running into a hole that was fast in a cleft ground. Frank Anderson, a brakeman, whose horse was at Bremen, was thrown from the train and who found he lay dead beneath one of the cars. After the train was righted and had again started ahead at the rate of twenty miles an hour, it came over having another accident owing to the section men having a couple of rails up. The engine saw the situation and slowed the train down. The section men saw the situation and hurriedly spiked the rails loosely in position. The train passed over but in its passage the rails were bent, but another accident was prevented by the caution of the engineer and section hands.—Austin News Aug 17th.

City Work.

The large sums of money expended by our city for work done upon the streets and ditches would not be begrudged if the work was substantial and what was bargained for. Look at our streets, so-called, macadamized;—in every instance the contract work has not been in accordance with specifications; instead of gravel they are covered with cobble stones and dirt. No levels were taken and no attention paid to drainage. The city engineer is either incompetent or has no pride in his profession, or has paid no attention to the streets, although his signature figures to the approval of the bills. The stone work done on the "upper labor" ditch, which excited comment some months ago, and which was announced by the EXPRESS as unworkmanlike and in every way unsuitable,—has proven as we said, and now if our city improvement committee will visit the ground they will find the walls built by Mr. Earhart crumbling away and the water covering the adjoining lands just as before these expensive walls were built. The money of the people was thrown into a mud hole.

All public work undertaken by the city should be constructed not only with an eye to present necessities, but to durability and excellence. The paving of streets after the method heretofore pursued should be stopped, and before a single piece of engineering is done there should be a competent, willing, well paid officer to do it.

Thousands of dollars are thrown away yearly through incompetence and stupidity to call it by no worse name.

Texas News.

MR. WATSON, just down from the frontier, reports that Mr. Phillips was killed last Friday in Backbone Valley, Burnett county, it was supposed by his brother-in-law; and on Saturday night a black man was killed by an unknown party. It was reported, also, that the deputy sheriff of Mason county had been killed and scalped by the Indians in Llano county.—T.

A NUMBER of farmers in Houston county have tried the experiment of planting northern corn, and that the result was in every instance satisfactory in the highest degree. The yield from this corn has resulted on an average in ten bushels more per acre, than from the ordinary corn of the country, both being cultivated upon the same quality of soil. This superiority in yield, it is said, is not greater than all difference in the quality of the grain. All these advantages are attributed mainly to the fact that this northern corn matures fully four weeks earlier than ordinary corn.

Mrs. SCHELL, a washerwoman, living in Dallas, did an act of charity, some days ago, which speaks volumes for her goodness of heart and Christian charity. It seems a poor stranger, a German, who could not speak a word of English, was taken sick, and laid in the woods on Trinity bottom in a most destitute and deplorable condition. Although an entire stranger, the woman took him to her home, nursed and provided for him, and doubtless saved his life. Such an act on the part of one who is working hard to earn a living herself is worthy of all praise.

Last Wednesday, about twenty miles west of Dallas, a party of movers, numbering fifteen or twenty men and women, became involved in a general fight, in which two or three were seriously wounded. The battle was stopped by the intervention of the women. The cause of the row is said to be some insult offered the female portion of the company.

W. J. JEFFREYS, who some time ago killed a man named McFall in Comanche county, and who made his escape from the officers, was killed a short time ago at Llano, in Burnett county, by a man known as Wild Bill. Jeffreys had become notorious as a daring outlaw, and was a great cattle thief. The Governor had granted a reward of \$250 for his capture.

A TERRIBLE shooting affray took place in Comanche county, on Thursday evening last, in which one Mr. Cook was severely wounded. There are several parties implicated in the affair.

Gen. J. T. HOOPER, an account of whose shooting on the 4th of last July by Culberty, in Devil's Bend, has been published, died on Thursday morning of last week at 3 o'clock. His death resulted from the wound in the face, an artery becoming mortified.

The New Five-Dollar Legal Tender.

The new issue of five-dollar U. S. legal-tender notes is being paid out by the Treasury. It is the first Government issue upon which the new Treasurer's signature appears. This note is of almost entirely new design. The face is, in general appearance, nearly the same as the one now in circulation, the exceptions being an improvement and increase of brilliancy produced by the omission of the green tint which covers all of the upper part of the notes of the old issue, and the further hand of the round seal from the right-hand end of the note, the latter having been replaced by a very beautiful combination of black and blue work, printed in red ink, adding beauty and greater security against counterfeiting. Upon the back of the new note (instead of repeated "transfers" from the same dies which facilitates the counterfeiters in his work by enabling him to counterfeit the back by simply copying three or four pieces of lath work every piece of lath work is distinctive in its character. The large piece in the center of the note has in it some fifteen different combinations of the lath, and is not marked by either figure or letters. The four corners are made up of distinct pieces of lath work, two letters V and two figures 5 being placed on respective corners, all differing in design, and the same may be said of the four small pieces of lath work—two at the top and two at the bottom—which help to form the center of the note.

The legend and all other lettering and scroll-work were evidently engraved by master hands, each being perfect in its kind. It addition to sharpness and distinctness in all parts, the back of the new note bears less of the green printing and shows more of the fibrous quality of the paper than any other legal-tender note. It presents a degree of perfection in engraving and an advantageous display of the fibers in the special Government paper and heretofore attained. The face of the note bears the imprint of the Government Engraving and Printing Bureau, and the back that of the Columbian Banknote Company, of Washington.

The new issue of \$10, \$20 and \$100 legal-tender notes will soon be ready for circulation. These several issues are intended to replace notes of the same denominations now in circulation. The signature of the new Treasurer, J. M. McKim, is on the autograph.—John C. New.—(Washington corr. Boston Post.)

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—The Tribune says discovery has been made that a large amount of the indebtedness of Duncan, Sherman & Co, held in this city, is "accommodation paper" in the form of the drafts drawn on them by a confidential clerk in their office, accepted by them, and sold to various banks through note brokers.

WHAT THE FIRM SAID ABOUT IT. NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—A reporter called on Duncan, Sherman & Co. this morning, in regard to the statement in the morning edition of the Tribune, concerning their issue of "accommodation paper." One of the firm stated that the bills were placed in the market by a partner which appeared to be perfectly legitimate to the firm according to a practice that prevails to-day with houses of good extensive credit. The total amount of the acceptances issued was estimated to be about \$1,000,000. Of this, \$500,000 were held in Rhode Island, and a considerable part of the remainder in other parts of New England. In regard to the letters of credit, for which Mr. Alexander Duncan had become responsible, which were reported in a morning journal to be \$20,000, the aggregated indebtedness of the firm in this form would reach about \$150,000, for which Mr. Alexander Duncan had deposited \$200,000.
