court, and the district attorney ought to be appointed by the judge, with a salary without fees.
From the "vasty deep" next came
A. W. HOUSTON, ESQ.,
member of the enterprising law firm of Houston, & Co., and nephew to the present Governor Houston, of Alabama. He thought the District Judge should be appointed for a long term of office—six years at least—and paid such salaries as will command the best talent, certainly not less than the present. He favors the election of Supreme Judges by the people, with a tenure of office from eight to twelve years, or for life, or good behavior, if possible to do so.
My last, though by no means least, interesting interview, was with
JUDGE WESLEY OGDEN,
a member of the Supreme Court during Governor Davis' administration. He thinks the judiciary should be as far removed from political and party influence as possible, placed above any necessary pecuniary want, and independent of popular biases and prejudices. To accomplish these he thinks all the judges should be appointed by the Governor, and with the advice and consent of the State Senate, or should be elected by a joint ballot of the Legislature. And, for many reasons, he is in favor of a long tenure of office.

Fort Worth, Sept. 11.—A young man named Brion Powers, living near Giddis, while on his way to Cleburne, was thrown from his horse and almost instantly killed.
Groesbeck, Tex., Sept. 11.—There was a shooting here this evening between a man by the name of Wortham, and Marshal Parter and Sheriff Shourden. Wortham went into a saloon, and hallooing, Parter and Shourden went to arrest him, and very soon the shooting occurred, Wortham receiving a deadly wound, and soon died. Neither the Sheriff nor the Marshal was hurt.
Rockdale, Sept. 11.—Mr. James Wickes, a respected merchant, while passing through the street with an infant in his arms, and accompanied by his wife, was insulted by a drunken crowd. A general row ensued, in which five or six were badly cut. Wickes was stabbed in the abdomen. He also received an ugly gash across the right arm. His wounds were pronounced fatal. Others were severely cut, but not seriously. A man named Alford is believed to be the one who did the cutting. He is under arrest, with several others.
Washington, Sept. 11.—The report of the Registrar of Vital Statistics for the week ending Sept. 11th, shows the rate of mortality of the whites to be near 20 per 1000, and of the colored nearly 50 per 1000. The rate of increase of the white population by birth over deaths was 14.45 per 1000, and the decrease of the colored population by death over births, 24.97 per 1000. Such a marked difference of mortality in the whites and blacks has existed for some months past. Various meetings have been held by prominent negroes to discover a remedy for this decrease.

A DEED-JAIL DELIVERY.
Jacksboro, Sept. 13.—About four o'clock this morning four unknown men quietly approached the man on guard outside of the jail, who was sitting with his back to the building, and presented their guns, then coming up on each side of him and keeping him covered with their guns. One of them took his arms away. They then approached the other man, who was asleep, he having stood guard in the early part of the night, and disarmed him, he awakening as they were disarming him, but offered no resistance, being covered by their guns. Two new took charge of the guards. The other two three files through the grating to the prisoners, who then went quickly to work on the bolts, cutting them off with steel axes. When the door was opened five of the six prisoners in the jail stepped forth into liberty. The escape was probably planned and carried out by the confederate of Joe Horner, who was arrested a few days ago on several charges, the principal one being cattle stealing. The other prisoners who escaped are J. Pough, charged with horse stealing; Jas. Potts, burglary; Wm. White, hog stealing; Geo. Cook, negro horse stealing. The guards were kept in the year of the jail, opposite the door, so that they could not see the operations. Horner and friends then ran to the road where horses were waiting, mounted and went west, cutting the telegraph line between Jacksboro and Giddis near the latter place. The other prisoners rode in an opposite direction, and probably will take to cover to get their shackles off. The guards were disarmed and the guards left standing by the jail. By daylight the prisoners were out, and the guards gave the alarm, but too late. Henderson, the negro, was last observed to the floor as he had been at night. The tools were taken from a blacksmith shop and were left at the jail, but his own tools were taken along. Nothing has been heard from them since.
