

Venice, Sept. 22.—The Governor of Asturias, who, serving the Spanish Government, does his best to maintain the independence of Spain, has been assassinated by a party of Carlists.

Madrid, September 22.—The police have discovered several secret repositories of arms and ammunition, which are supposed to be intended for a socialist rising.

The Spanish Envoy at the Vatican is instructed that the Madrid Government will be firm but moderate in its respect religion, but at the same time, protect the rights of the State. It is believed here that the Vatican will finally abate its pretensions.

CARLISTS OUT NOW.

Madrid, September 22.—The Northern army cut off all communication between the Carlists in Navarre and Aragon, who are compelled to cross the frontier. General Doregny has concentrated his forces around Estella.

REINFORCEMENTS FOR CUBA.

Santander, September 22.—The embarkation of troops for Cuba is actively going on, and up to the present time 4,000 men have sailed for that island.

Kansas City, Mo., September 22.—The Kansas City Times has a special from Great Bend, Kansas, which says that Col. Wheeler, a wealthy cattle dealer, who recently made heavy purchases in real estate in this city, and who was recently killed by cattle thieves in the Indian Territory, has returned to Great Bend, having captured five of the thieves and recovered all of his cattle.

Paris, Sept. 22.—The principal manufacturers of this city will hold a meeting on Friday in favor of the Monarchical restoration.

Paris, Sept. 23.—The Journal de Paris, on authority, gives a positive denial to the assertions of the Journal de France, on the 12th, to the effect that the Orleans Princess was about to renounce all claims to the throne and declare for the Republic.

BISHOP SIMPSON IN EUROPE.

Bishop Simpson, while at Sheffield, England, last month, met the Wesleyans who were in conference there, and made them one of his stirring addresses. The Bishop has been visiting different parts of Europe in connection with American Methodist missions, and was then on his way to Norway.

DANGEROUS ADVENTURE.

Two men fishing in Red River last week, in Montague county, hemmed in shallow water what they thought a monster cat fish. One of them jumped outside of him, and getting his hands full struggled so he thought, found it was an alligator. The muscular build—worse than a Mexican pony, but Texas stayed on him. Finally the other man succeeded in roping him, and together they got him out. He measured twelve feet in length.

PORTER HOUSE STEAKS.

This term had an American origin. In 1814 a hungry pilot entered a New York porter house on Pearl street, where much as well as drink could be obtained. Morrison, the keeper, had nothing but the ham ordered for the next day's family dinner, in the shape of a sirloin roasting piece, and from this he offered the pilot cut, which he accepted. After ravenously devouring it, he turned to his host, who was expressing disapprobation with the order. "Magnificent," another steak just like that." After having finished his steaks and porter the old pilot ordered his steaks to be sent from the roasting place for the master and soon his companions learned the good that lies in the "small-side-steak," and Morrison was obliged to instruct his customers, and the butcher, ordering his butchermen and messengers, designated them as "porter house steaks," and increasing custom and extended repute soon established the term now so common in all eating houses of our country and New England.

ANOTHER GALLANT.
