MAN EIGHTY YEARS OF AGE EX-PATIATES HIS CRIME ON THE

GALLOWS. HIS SON LOSES HIS LIFE IN AN AT-TEMPT TO CONVEY POISON TO HIM.

(From the Grandbury Vidette, October 2.)

On Tuesday night, near the hour of eleven, one of the jail gnards detected an armed man approaching the jail by crawling on the ground, and not knowing how many were concealed in the brush near by, fired, and the motionless object that remained on the ground told too plainly the unerring aim of the sentinel. Daylight revealed the fact that the victim was Jeff. the fact that the victim was Jeff. Mitchell. The young man was in a stooping posture, a double-bar-relled shot gun, tightly clenched in his hands, and a Golt's dragoon buckled around his waist, as though determined upon saving his father from an ignomious death on the scaffold. The body was carefully lifted and carried to the court house, where an investigation was house, where an investigation was held. In his pants pocket was a three ounce vial of laudanum tied up in a rag in such a manner that it could be fastened to a string that

gratings above.

The top of this head was blown off by the heavy charge of buckshot fired at irim. Jeff. was one of the youngest sons of Nelson Mitchell, and probably about twenty-one years of age. His intention was to convey the poison to tie old man at the risk of his life; whether his motive was to kill any on the guard is, of course, unknown. His horse was found hitched in the edge of town, his hat and shoes edge of town, his hat and shoes tied to the saddle. At the request of the father, the body was taken to the fail, so that he might take a last look at his boy. He stood at the grating, and gave orders to raise the coffin so that he could see the wound. "Yes," said he, "I did wrong; I wanted a little laudanum and told his mother to send him here to-night, and he sacrificed his life in obeying my instruction. He was a brave boy, and faced those guns without fear. There's not a drop of cowardly blood in that box. Take him home to his mother; It

was my fault." It was ascertained that old man Mitchell had possession of a pistol which had been sent up from the outside, a few nights previous to Jeff's last visit, and that he inteneed to kill the sheriff. The jailor made a peremptory demand for the weapon, and had to threaten that he would burn them out before the pistol was given up.

At an early hour yesterday morning crowds of people began pouring into town from all directions.

On Wednesday night the door man made several attempts to hang himself in his cell by means of a chain which he had torn from the door, but each time he looped the chain about his neck his nerves failed him; thus he passed the night in cursing the Sheriff and guard and in bitter recriminations guard and in bitter recriminations for the death of his 201, who was killed the night previous. On Thursday morning he was more calm, and complained of feeling very bad. The last night a guard was stationed in the cell to prevent any attempt at self-destruction. The doomed man slept about one-half the night and the rest of the time was spent in bitter denunciatime was spent in bitter denuncia-

At daylight he was in a better

At daylight he was in a better frame of mind and ate a hearty breakfast, after which Elder Harbison and Parson Robinson visited him and administered to his spiritual welfare. About one o'clock the wagon arrived at the jail, and bidding farewell to his fellow prisoners, he was escorted to a seat on his coffin, which he occupied until he arrived at the gallows. This consisted of two upright posts and a cross bar. The rope was looped about his neck and fastened above, when he arose and calmly addressed the assembled multitude as follow:

I have no particular regard for him, but he had no hand in the killing; was with me, one hundred and eighty vards away; I did not hunt after the Truitts. I can excuse Governor Coke for not granting a pardon or commuting my sentence. I suppose it was necessary to make an example of me. I want to know of Mr. Wright it be was informed that Jeff was coming to the jail on the night he was killed ?" Mr. Wright assured him that he had no knowledge of his coming. "Well, there is a lie out. Now, young men, be wary of the company you keep. When you find a man to be dis-honest, shun him. If I had never let old man Truitt get the advantage of me, there would have been no trouble. I want the rope loose I am not going to run away, but want to sit down."

The rope being loosened so that he could sit down, he made a request that his hands be unshackled, which was not granted. Here party began a quarrel on the out-side of the crowd, which, for a few minutes; created a commotion and nearly precipitated a stempede but order was soon restored, and the old man proceeded:

"I do not wish to say much more. If Jim Truitt had been killed, I should have been at home to-day I am convicted by talse swearing but am not afraid to die. 'He that that believeth and is baptized shall be saved,' and I believe that I shall be rewarded for the good deeds

He then calmly ordered the Sheriff to proceed with the execution, and many friends press ward to shake his hand. He dis played a remarkable amount of courage, and as he stood up for the final adjustment of the rope and while the cap was being drawn over his face, not a tremor shook his frame, but grasping the hand of Deputy Sheriff Seurs for a last fare-well as the wagom was driven from under him, he fearlessly swung off into eternity at fifty-two minutes after three o'clock. on Mitchell; we believe the only instance of the extreme penalty of the law, that has ever transpired in this section of the country.
