THIRTIETH DAY.

AUSTIN, October 9, 1875. Mr. Martin, of Navarro, rose to a question of privilege. He regretted that, on the previous morning, re-marks had been thought necessary to be made respecting the Statesman. Mr. Ross said, to bring the matter at once before the body, he would state precisely what he knew of the matter. He attached no importance to it himself, but would call on Mr. Johnson of Collin to explain. He considered the remarks that were made were thoughtless and inconsiderate; and was calculated to do great injustice to the Grangers, who were a worthy body of men. As to the States-man, all he had to say was, that while he recognized the full scope and tenor of a public journal to criticise public men or their actions, but when it seized upon a convenworthy men on this floor, it exceeded its mission. A Double Crime. URTHER NEWS CONCERNING THE PHEAS

From Mr. C. F. Hindes, a well known citizen of Pleasanton, we obtain the following additional startling particulars of the horrible outrage committed in that neighborheod:

On Saturday night, October 1st, two men, well known in Pleasanton, named John Murray and Beauf. Cline, called at the house of Sam Johnson, a colored man, living near the town, and taking him from his bed, cut him fearfully in the abdomen. Johnson however getting away from them, and running to town, supporting his entrails, which had protruded

through the gash, with his hands. The two flends in human shape, then re turned to the house, and while one stood over Mrs. Johnson, threatening her life. the other ravished the person of the help less woman.
