COURT REPORT.—District Court, the Hon. Geo. H. Noonan presiding. The Grand Jury came into the Court Room this morning and presented a number of indictments. The Court inquired of them whether they had any further business, and the foreman answering that they had, they were instructed to retire for further deliberation.

In consequence of the non-arrival of the Eagle Pass mail on Saturday, our citizens seem inclined to blame the new contractors, Messrs. Schott & Ashley. The truth of the matter is, there were no mail pouches on the route, and the postmaster at Eagle Pass could not dispatch the mail until after the arrival of the mail stage on Thursday. The mail arrived here yesterday morning, having come through in eight hours less than regular running time. The increase of service is the cause of the scarcity of mail pouches on the route. We are satisfied that Messrs. Schott & Ashley will be able to stick to a full compliance with their contract.

CHAMBER.—The proprietors of business houses in our vicinity, and passers-by, did not understand the cause of the cheer ing going on in our upper story yesterday evening, and as our "wonted system" has not been disturbed by the noise—as we expect to issue the Express to-day, the same as heretofore—we will give explanation.

The members of the Typographical Union took charge of our office at the beginning, and have managed it all along strictly according to Union discipline. They adopted their own scale of prices, and fixed their own hours of labor. Yesterday they were informed by the proprietors that, for their faithfulness and good management, they should be paid more than their adopted scale of prices called for. This brought about hilarious feelings, and the boys gave vent to them in three loud cheers for the success of the proprietors of the Express, and three for the San Antonio Typographical Union. Daily this, and nothing more.

A Double Crime.

FURTHER NEWS CONCERNING THE PLEASANTON OUTRAGE.

From Mr. C. F. Hinde, a well known citizen of Pleasanton, we obtain the following additional startling particulars of the horrible outrage committed in that neighborhood:

On Saturday night, October 1st, two men, well known in Pleasanton, named John Murray and Beauf. Cline, called at the house of Sam Johnson, a colored man, living near the town, and taking him from his bed, cut him fearfully in the abdomen. Johnson however getting away from them, and running to town, supporting his entrails, which had protruded through the gash, with his hands.

The two fiends in human shape, then returned to the house, and while one stood over Mrs. Johnson, threatening her life, the other ravished the person of the helpless woman. After the two had satisfied their hellish lusts, they returned to town, stabbing another colored man they chanced to meet on the way.

Murray was arrested the next day and gave bonds for his appearance at Court; but about this time another colored woman made complaint that she had also been ravished by Murray, a short time previous, and he was re-arrested, and this time placed in jail, the double charge not being considered bailable. Beuf. Cline had in the meantime escaped arrest, and is at large.

A few days after Murray's committal to jail, a number of friends went to the jail at night, and by threatening the life of the jailer, succeeded in effecting his release, and neither Murray nor Cline are to be found.

MURDER.

From the same source, we learn that a murder was committed at Dugtown, on the 6th inst., the particulars of which are as follows:

John Edenfield and George Thompson had a difficulty about two weeks since, in which Edenfield shot Thompson through the shoulder, inflicting a slight flesh wound. Both men threatened the life of the other, and on the 6th inst. they met in Pleasanton. Edenfield drawing his revolver and firing, killing Thompson's horse. He then approached Thompson and shot him through the head, killing him instantly. Edenfield is still in the neighborhood, but has not been arrested.

Our Fair.

The sixth annual Fair of the "Agricultural, Industrial and Stock Raising Association of Western Texas," will commence to-morrow and continue four days.

It is of the utmost importance to the city of San Antonio and Western Texas, that this, the greatest attempt that has ever been made by the Directors to make the Fair a success, should be strongly supported by each and every person interested in the welfare of the city and the surrounding country.

Everything has been done by the officers and directors of the Association that energy and money can do, and it now depends upon our people to turn out en masse, and patronize the Fair to the full extent of their ability.

The books will be open for entries until Thursday morning at nine o'clock, and we especially urge upon all who can, and have not done so already, to enter for exhibition such articles or productions as will be of interest to visitors. We are not informed as to what our cattle and sheep men are doing; but they will not be far behind in the effort to exhibit the best stock in the State. Texas is known the world over as the greatest stock country extant, and if our stock men have taken that interest in the matter which they have done heretofore, and which we expect they will do now, this department of the Fair will undoubtedly be a success.

The weather is propitious; the grounds easy of access; the accommodations ample and complete, and there is nothing in the world to prevent a general turning-out of the whole town. of the Democracy or the Republican party of this Convention.  
Mr. Brady said he did not consider the Statesman of sufficient importance to control or rattle the temper of this Convention. He was present at the convention that had so stirred the bile of the Statesman and had regarded it as a joke at the time.  
Mr. DeMorse said the whole subject matter was out of place, and unworthy the consideration of this body. He insisted that Mr. Martin of Navarro would withdraw his resolution.  
Mr. Bentfro said he was a native born Texan and a Republican from principle. He protested against the language used by individual members, many epithets had been hurled at Republicans, that was unnecessary and unkind. They have been spoken of as "Radicals, negroes," etc. The resolution was not concluded in respectful terms toward the minority on this floor, it having designated them as "negroes and Radicals." He knew of no such alliance as claimed.  
Mr. Dohoney thought it beneath the dignity of this Convention to be noticing all the newspapers said. He defended the liberty of the press but thought that when censured by it, it was a waste of time to make such a fuss about it. He was no Granger, but believed their objects were good, and he had been voted for by great numbers of them. He, as editor of the North Texan, had advocated the principles they do, before there was a lodge of the order in this State. There was no ground for the charges that had been made. It was a mere idle, good-natured conversation that had occurred.  
Mr. John Henry Brown said he was in favor of the "freedom" of the press, but not the "licentiousness" of it. He thought this whole matter had gone far enough, and was not worth noticing further.  
Mr. Ballinger thought the Convention was travelling outside the record. If they investigated this charge, they might have to investigate others, at a great cost of time and expense.  
Mr. Brown moved to lay the amendment on the table.  
The Convention refused to lay the motion on the table, by a vote of 33 to 27.  
Mr. Stockdale moved to erase by striking out the words "Radicals and negroes," and inserted "Republicans." Adopted.  
Mr. Crawford offered the following amendment:  
"That said committee be authorized to send for persons and papers and to administer oaths, and take testimony, and that the report of said committee contain simply a statement of the matters and things as they transpired in fact, and that all deductions and conclusions be left to the members of this Convention and the country." Adopted.  
Mr. Moore offered to amend by adding "and that in determining who are grangers, the President shall be governed by the usually accepted signs." Ruled out of order.  
On motion of Mr. Flourney, the whole subject matter was laid on the table.  
Mr. West moved to reconsider the vote engrossing the article on suffrage; but to pass the motion for the present.  
Mr. Scott moved to reconsider the vote tabling the resolution of Mr. Martin of Navarro. Carried by a vote of 48 to 18.  
The question then recurring on the adoption of the resolution, as amended, it was adopted by a vote of 46 to 23.  
BYING SESSION.  
Convention met at 2:30 P. M.  
The pending business was the consideration of the minority report on education, submitted by Mr. Sansom and others.  
The minority report was defeated, by a vote of 19 to 46.  
Mr. Dohoney offered an amendment to section six, as an addition thereto, as follows: "And that proceeds of these lands, when sold, shall constitute a part of the school fund of the counties to which the lands belong."  
Mr. Scott offered an amendment to the amendment, "that the Legislature shall provide for sale of these lands to actual settlers, in lots of eighty and one hundred and sixty acres; at prices to be fixed by commissioners; and actual occupants of said lands, shall have the right to take such lands at the prices fixed."  
Mr. Nugent offered an amendment "that county courts shall sell lands under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law."  
Mr. Flourney moved to postpone the whole matter under consideration until Monday night. Withdrawn.  
Mr. Murphy offered an amendment to section six, line thirty five, to read "and the proceeds of the sale of these lands, when sold, shall constitute a part of the school fund of the counties to which the lands belong."  
The amendment was adopted by a vote of 46 to 23.
