Columbus, Oct. 13.—The Democrate concede the Statesto the Republicans by 15,600 majority, and a fair majority in both branches of the General Assembly.

A friend at our elbow says, this reminds him of the braggart who went across the Atlantic in two ships. We must confess that we cannot see how a graps vine can be put in seven boxes, transported several thousand miles, and then be expected to do duty in the way of living and bearing grapes by the ton, after such a treatment. But what we wish to say is, that we have no idea that this is the great grape vin of Santa Barbara—we presume it is only one of a considerable number of large ones, growing in that vicinity. Besides, this has a reputation of being less than a century old, while the remarkable vine which has been so-often described as one of the great wonders of vegetation, if we remember rightly, is more advanced in

years.

The people of Santa Barbara would be silly, indeed, to permit the grand old grape vine to depart from their shores in seven or any other number of boxes. It would be very much like permitting the goose to be killed that lays the guiden area. A great many more people go to egg. A great many more people go to see Santa Barbara because of this vine, than to see the vine because of Santa Barbara. It is our opinion that so vandal hand has been laid on the great vine of California's prolific cenat, as yet—not even the Centennial, imposing as it may be, can demand such a sacrifice—but that for ages to come, it will still bear its tens of fruit, on its native soil, and be the ad miration of all who visit that beautiful and healthful spot, Santa Barbara.

The available school fund heretofore provided shall be distributed to the several counties of the State according to scholastic population, the distribution to be made by the Comptroller.

"Each county shall be laid off into school directors by the county commissioners" thereof, and one county superintendent, who shall have the experimental of teachers, shall be elected by all the qualified electors, and a board of school district shall be elected by the qualified voters of the district."
